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Award Winning Regional Artist to Teach Pysanky Egg Decorating Class

Join Jozefa Rogocki as she teaches the intricate art of pysanky eggs, a traditional folk art practiced in various regions of Poland, Ukraine, and other Slavic countries. The class, organized by the Polish Heritage Society, will take place March 21st at Sixth St Hall in Grand Rapids, Michigan. The class is offered at 2 different times; 11:30 am and 1:30 pm.

During the class, Rogocki will share her process for decorating these colorful eggs by applying a wax-and-dye batik process. She will demonstrate tools and techniques; discuss the history, myths, and traditional symbols engaged by this unique art form; and share a variety of designs that include contemporary interpretations of archetypal symbols.

Jozefa Rogocki is recognized as one of the masters of this artform. She was named an Arts Midwest 2025 Midwest Culture Bearers Award winner. Arts Midwest is one of six nonprofit United States Regional Arts Organizations, that join to strengthen local arts and culture efforts in partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts, state agencies, private funders, and many others. This award recognized her, among a group of Midwestern folk artists and cultural practitioners who keep traditions alive through craft, poetry, dance, vis-

ual arts, and more. Jozefa was recognized as one of nine extraordinary practitioners who are preserving traditions and passing them on to the next generation.

Jozefa was born in the U.K. of Polish descent and now lives in Michigan. She has been creating Pysanky Eggs for 20 years. A love of nature inspires many of her designs which are influenced by ancient patterns. Fascination with the traditional designs of marbled paper and pysanky eggs is reflect-

ed in her contemporary interpretations.

"I was born in the UK to a Polish father and an English mother" Rogocki said. "As a child I loved the beautiful, decorated eggs on the Easter cards we received from Poland. When I came to the US in 1999, I found a strong Polish community in Hamtramck, Detroit and began to participate in a traditional Polish art that

represented community and belonging for me: Pysanky, or decorated eggs, a Slavic folk tradition that is thousands of years old."

Wondering how Jozefa sources the eggs? According to her website, she maintains a "production team" of three endangered duck breeds. "Vera is a beautiful Welsh Harlequin, Kaczka a stropny Swedish Blue who protects her friends and Lagertha, is a majestic Cayuga, that shimmers dark green and purple in the sunlight. They produce eggs of varying shades throughout the year and enjoy their creative life in Michigan."

Rogocki says "I have practiced this art for 25 years and am honored to be recognized as an expert by my local Polish community. I learned the more advanced techniques from the Master Pysankarka, Helen Badulak, and have acquired extensive knowledge about the designs

specific to various regions in Poland and Ukraine.

Rogocki has participated in the Polish Dozynki Festival in Grand Rapids with the Polish Heritage Society, provided education workshops for the Polish Federated Home in Lansing, and conducted workshops at libraries in the Greater Lansing Area. She has also been invited to present her

work at the International Festival of Holland, Michigan. She says "I am passionate about the art of Pysanky and excited to continue reflecting contemporary relevance within this Eastern European folk art."

This hands-on workshop offers a rare chance to learn the art of Pysanky from a master who

brings extraordinary skill, patience, and heart to her teaching.

Former PHS Board Member Recognized by Polish Army Veterans of America in Chicago Meeting

A Chicago Polish war veterans' organization in Chicago presented the prestigious Ignacy Paderewski medal of honor to a local man for the research and restoration of the Soldiers' Monument at Holy Cross Cemetery in Grand Rapids.

Post 90 of the Polish Army Veterans' Assn. of America (PAVA) honored Matthew Gryczan with the medal at Holy Trinity Church in Chicago on Jan. 11 during a celebration of the post's Centenary Jubilee. The celebration featured a Mass dedicated to Post 90, a parade of participants dressed in authentic Polish garb from various eras, and a luncheon for more than 200 people.

Gryczan, 72, a native of Grand Rapids, said he was accepting the medal on behalf of the 70 local men who fought in the Blue Army during World War I for the

independence of Poland, the local Polonia who sacrificed to erect the monument dedicated in 1929, and all those who worked to restore the 14-foot-long granite monument.

Paweł Zyzak, the past Consul General of the Republic of Poland in Chicago, laid a wreath of fresh flowers and gave a speech at the Soldiers' Monument during a two-day visit to Grand Rapids to learn more about the city's Polish heritage in 2023. Gryczan spearheaded the efforts of the Polish Heritage Society to discover all the names of the men who served, and the history of the monument.

In addition to maintenance, the PHS annually raises Polish flags at the two flagpoles that flank the monument and plants red and white gladiolus in urns that replicate the original design of 1929.

The monument is prominently located at the northern boundary of the cemetery in Section D-New.

The Soldiers' Monument was originally dedicated to the more than 70 local men who fought and died for the independence of Poland during WWI. They weren't U.S. soldiers: they fought under the Polish flag with the blessing of the U.S. government. The federal government allowed all Poles who were not U.S. citizens and not subject to the draft to enlist in the new Polish army in France, nicknamed The Blue Army.

Hundreds of Polish Americans in Grand Rapids sacrificed to build the monument during the Great Depression. Schoolchildren gave their candy money, societies held fundraisers, and priests at the city's three predominantly Polish parishes encouraged parishioners

to give during special collections.

The committee began the collections in 1927 at a time when communities around the country were building monuments to U.S. soldiers who fought and died in what was then known as The Great War. What we now call

WWI ended in 1918, and citizens wanted to recognize the soldiers' sacrifices before their names faded from memory.

Many who fought in the Blue Army returned destitute and often disabled, and the United States, France and Poland did

not grant veteran status for their service. In response, the veterans and their families in America formed posts of the Stowarzyszenie Weteranów Armii Polskiej w Ameryce (known today under its English name PAVA) to be a mutual aid society for the veterans.

Veterans in Grand Rapids formed PAVA Post 97 which was formally accepted into the national organization in 1927. After years of declining membership, Post 97 sold the property and discontinued as an organization in 1981.

As it celebrates its 100-year anniversary, Post 90 remains as the last PAVA post in Chicago. Like others throughout the country, Post 90 has had to deal with declining membership. But the post said it continues to serve as a bridge between the Polish government and veterans of the largest Polish community outside of that country.

Organizations or causes that further the mission of the PHS and need financial assistance should submit applications to the society's Grant Committee for consideration by March 1.

The society supports organizations and causes that carry on the traditions introduced by Polish immigrants to Grand Rapids, preserve the history of contributions made by local Polish-Americans, promote Polish culture and cultivate ties between Grand Rapids and Poland.

Grants are awarded annually to organizations and causes based

on need and how the donations will be used to further the aims of the society.

Grantees are required to fill out the PHS Grant Request Form to outline their requests for funding. The form is available on the PHS website, or a hard copy of the form can be obtained by sending a request to the Society's email address: phsgrandrapids@gmail.com.

After they fill out the form, applicants can send it to the society's email address or mail it to the society's address at PO Box 1844, Grand Rapids MI 49501-1844.

To be eligible, all grant requests must be submitted in writing by March 1 to be considered for 2025.

The PHS Grant Committee will consider all eligible requests in the month of March and render its recommendations to the PHS board by its April meeting. The

PHS Grant Committee consists of the PHS Treasurer, a PHS board member and three PHS members taken from the general membership rolls who have agreed to serve on the committee.

The PHS board will consider the recommendations at its April meeting and vote to:

- fund the request in its entirety;
- modify the amount funded or scope of work;
- or decline to support the request.

All organizations or individuals who make eligible grant requests will be notified of the outcome by April 30 either by phone or in writing.

Organizations and projects that have received PHS grants are as varied as the Polish National Aid Society in particular, Pulaski

Days Halls in general, restoration of the Soldiers Monument as well as the Stanley Ketchel monument at Holy Cross Cemetery, Polish cooking classes at the Sons & Daughters Hall, St. Michael's Ukrainian Church for its war effort, and a local chapter of the YWCA.

PHS College/Trade School Academic Scholarship Applications Due By April 15

To those who don't know about the PHS, it comes as a surprise that the society annually gives out scholarships totaling several thousands of dollars to students attending institutions of higher learning as a way of supporting Polish heritage.

Even those who are aware of the scholarships may not know that the PHS board loosened requirements last year to make even more high school and college students eligible for financial assistance.

Over the past 20 years, the society has awarded more than \$60,000 in scholarships from money raised at its Annual Polish Dożynki Festival held in late August.

Commenting on previous scholarship winners, PHS President Teresa Bonham said, "We are always impressed with the cali-

ber of the applicants. Polish culture reveres learning and education, and we are furthering that tradition through our scholarship program. We want more Polish American students to apply for these awards."

In addition to scholarships, the students selected are named honorary student members of the Polish Heritage Society for one year, and they receive special recognition at the Dożynki Festival.

Students of Polish descent who plan to attend or are enrolled in just about any post high school education are eligible to apply.

Last year, the PHS published the new guidelines for eligibility on its website and conducted outreach to area schools to encourage as many applicants as possible before the April 15 deadline.

To be eligible, applicants must:

- be of Polish American descent; deserving of a scholarship.
- reside in Allegan, Barry, Ionia, Kent, Montcalm, Muskegon or Ottawa county; and,

- plan to attend or currently attend an accredited 2-year trade/vocational program, 2-year community college program or 4-year college or university.

Applicants need to provide:

- the scholarship application form;
- a copy of academic transcripts that show a minimum 2.75 GPA;
- two letters of recommendation from a teacher, mentor, coach, or advisor;
- a brief statement signed by the applicant that delineates his or her Polish heritage; and,
- a 200-word essay that shares career goals and why they are

Applicants can provide additional information that they wish the scholarship committee to consider.

After the April 15 deadline, the PHS scholarship committee will review applications and notify recipients of the scholarships and financial aid offices of the institutions by May 15. Winners will be asked to provide a photo of themselves for a story in the Echo newsletter and will be invited to the Dożynki Polish Harvest Festival in August for special recognition.
