# PHS Wigilia 2024 Draws Biggest Attendance Ever

that Poles have observed for hundreds of years.

It was the annual PHS Wigilia, an event first launched in 1966 by the then-called Polish Arts Society to celebrate the Christmas season with the breaking of the oplatek wafer, specialty foods, Polish carols -- and each other.

The remarkable thing about the Wigilia held Dec. 7 is not only that it has continued for 58 years, but that it is on the upswing, due in large part to a committed small army of individuals who refuse to let the Polish traditions of Grand Rapids fade away.

"We had 103 people attend this year – more than I've seen in the 20 years I've been doing this," said Marilyn Lignell, chair-

woman of Wigilia. "I think it's a combination of a better venue with lots of parking, a creative menu that keeps with the nomeat observance and added elegance with servers."

The dinner is held at former Knights of Columbus hall on Muskegon that is under the management of Laurie and Bob Sipka. Wigilia volunteers help devise the menu with a professional caterer, and the food is served to the tables rather than holding the dinner buffet style. Candles, real cloth napkins and matching glassware adorn each table.

While they are quick to point to the tangible improvements to Wigilia, the Wigilia volunteers soft pedal the real engine

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## **Detroit Polonia Group Enriched by Visit to Grand Rapids**

The next stop on the bus trip was a luncheon at the Polish National Aid Society/Jackson Street Hall, which is the oldest continuously operating Polish hall in the United States.

Hall president Anna Tylzynski spoke about the history of the hall and it 's role in Grand Rapids Polonia. Doug Preston, who heads up renovation of the hall, discussed his work and addressed the motivation for the project.

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for the resurgence – it's a labor of love.

It's the husband-wife teams of Lignell and her husband Dan. Mary Panek and her husband Rich, and individuals such as Stephanie Kovitz, Sharon Hanks, Jarek Kozal, Nick Palmer and Marc Mileski who make it all work. The work is leavened by the patronage of Msgr. Edward Hankiewicz.

None of the elegant touches came without effort. The 100 handmade Christmas ornaments at each seat of the tables were made from milkweed pods foraged from local fields by the Lignells and Paneks. They then hot glued the pods together, for decoration at an afternoon party at the Paneks home.

"The decorting party builds community within the PHS," Mary said. "It's a nice afternoon to get to know one another kind of a welcoming thing."

Kovitz, who has been involved in decades of past Wigilia dinners, led the table setups the night before, ably aided by Hanks and others.

During dinner, volunteers explained each tradition as it took place. At the end of the meal, former PHS President Jeffrey Portko donned a St. Nicholas outfit to distribute candy canes to the audience, and the duo of Kozal and Palmer rounded out the evening by leading a koledy of Polish songs themed around the religious significance of Christ-

"Honestly, I didn't go to a Wigilia dinner before my father Mitchell died," Lignell said. "It was only after that I got involved, helping my mother, Donna. ## Share the Polish Tradition of Oplatek at Your Christmas Eve Dinner This Year

The first tradition observed at the PHS Wigilia dinner on Dec. 7 was the sharing of oplatek, where family and friends break off pieces of a thin unleavened bread wafer to share wishes of good will before sitting down to the feast.

There's no time like the present to start this custom if you don't celebrate it already.
