Matka Boska Zielna to Take Place August 14

As the month of August approaches, Stephanie Kovitz starts to pay particular attention to flowers and herbs growing in her Westside garden to see if they could play a part in one of the most beautiful religious ceremonies tied to Polish heritage in Grand Rapids – the Matka Boska Zielna Mass.

"What better way to honor our Blessed Mother than with fresh and colorful flowers and herbs?" asked Kovitz as she surveyed the groomed garden that she keeps with her husband, John. "It's just a wonderful tradition and feast day."

Kovitz will join a group of an estimated 150 people who will gather at St. Isidore Church, 625 Spring Ave. NE, at 7 p.m. Monday, Aug. 14 for the celebration.

Monsignor Edward Hankiewicz will lead the service that is a traditional favorite for local Catholics: a Mass with a blessing of flowers and herbs, music sung in Polish, and a procession to and crowning of a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the church courtyard.

After the service, there will be a reception in the downstairs auditorium of the church where light refreshments will be served.

PHS Lifetime member Sue Popma said she ordered a special Polish candy treat called Ptasie Mlecsko online for the reception since it proved to be such a hit as a refreshment last year. The

As the longest running ethnic festival in Grand Rapids, Dozynki has established a reputation for being a fun, family friendly event showcasing Polish culture, with live music and a large dance area, a children's tent, vendors offering Polish cuisine and items, and a tent that ex-

plains local Polish-American history and the contributions of famous Polish-Americans.

Other fun activities during the festival include the paczki eating contest, crowning of the Busia Queen and a performance by the P.R.C.U.A. Malbork Dance Ensemble, a dance group for youth ages 3-18 that teaches traditional Polish folk dances with authentic garb.

For the first time ever, the wifehusband team of Anna and Mark Hurning from Wronia, Szczecin, Poland will make an appearance at the festival to instruct visitors in authentic Polish cuisine. Through their Polish Your Kitchen brand, the Hurnings will demonstrate how to make some Polish dishes and sell cookbooks containing their recipes.

In Poland, Matka Boska is celebrated at the Feast of Our Lady of Greens, where herbs are blessed and then woven into wreaths that are hung near holy pictures and used as medicinal recipes as protection against illness and

The 2023 Dozynki Festival Busia Queen Contest is Now Open!

The Polish Heritage Society is accepting applications for the sought-after position of Busia Queen, a year -long honor that is bestowed upon a lady who has at least one grandchild by Aug. 18.

An election will be held Aug. 27 during the end of the three-day Dozynki Polish Harvest Festival at the Calder Plaza in downtown Grand Rapids to name the new Busia Queen, with festival goers casting ballots.

The lucky lady who is

named Busia Queen will be crowned at the festival and presented with a ceremonial sash, which she will wear to represent the PHS at the Pulaski Days parade, the Wigilia dinner, Polish Heritage Night at the Griffins, Matka Boska Zielna service and one non-PHS sanctioned event of the winner's choosing. Two benefits of being named Busia Queen include a \$250 donation made on the winner's behalf to the charity of her choice and a free annual seeking to become Busia Queen must be present at the election on Aug. 27 to be eligible for the honor.

Going with our theme of looking back, I am thrilled to announce the Polish Heritage Society turns 60 this year! We're planning a little celebration of the anniversary in October – more on that in the September issue of The Echo.

The Polish Heritage Society was originally called the Polish Arts Club, and two of the original members were Lorraine and Gerald Hardebeck. I visited their home this past month to learn more about those early

years, and Lorraine's memory was sharp as ever – the excitement and pride about the soci-

ety welled up as she talked about its origins!

"My husband Gerry's uncle, Edward Symans, came back to the United States after travelling all over the world and wanted to showcase Polish culture to the Grand Rapids area," past PHS president Lorraine said. "Ed wanted to bring Polish music and art to the forefront of the Polish community feeling that it been neglected."

Ed knew a lot of people of Polish descent in Grand Rapids, and he convinced Lorraine to join him in starting the Polish Arts Club. Soon were about 20-25 members of kindred spirits, meeting in each other's homes and working with the community at large to accomplish their mission.

Some of their early activities included arranging exhibitions of Polish Art at the Grand Rapids Art Museum, speakers from the Kosciusko Foundation in New York, Chopin competitions

at St. Cecilia Music Center, The Boys Choir of Poland and bus trips to Chicago and Detroit.

In 1970 when he became president, John Arsulowicz thought the society should increase membership by not focusing exclusively on the arts - that's when we became known as the Polish Heritage Society. With more than 250 members now, we try to support a variety of activities that in one way or another keep alive Polish tradition and culture. Some of my fondest memories have been inviting ArtPrize artists from Poland over for meals with other Polish Heritage Society mem-

The most visible event we sponsor is the annual Dozynki Polish Harvest Festival in August – the longest running ethnic festival in Grand Rapids. Here's where I make a pitch to ask you, dear reader, to become involved. Please make an effort to volunteer if for only one shift! It's easy to do: just go to our website, look under the Festival tab at the upper right hand corner and do to Sign up to help!

The PHS welcomes new member John Mitchell and his family to the society. John was born in Chicago to parents both of Polish descent, his mom being a first generation born in this country. "I spent many happy summers at my grandfather's cottage on a small lake in southwest Michigan," John said.

Making his own path in life over a 40-year stint, John lived in St. Joseph, Glenn Haven, South Haven and eventually skiing the slopes near Denver, Colo. Now in retirement with his wife, Virginia, the couple moved to the Grand Haven/ Spring Lake community to "live in a smaller community by the water and the lakes of Michigan."

John and I share a common disappointment that our grandparents worked so hard at becoming "Americanized" that we lost out on some of the paramount lessons and information we could have gained about our Polish heritage and culture. Like John, my knowledge of Polish heritage and culture was very limited. When my father joined the PHS and maybe even more so after he died, I wanted to gain more knowledge especially about the customs.
