Local Bakeries Gear Up for Pączki Frenzy Next Week on Fat Tuesday

Come Sunday morning, bakers at Sandy's Donut House on Leonard Street will begin their non-stop, 3day marathon of making pączki for ravenous customers who want to satisfy their sweet tooth before Lent begins.

About 11 miles away at Marge's Donut Den in Wyoming, staff will start preparing for the Tuesday morning onslaught of pączki customers snaking around the inside of the building and out the door, all the while being serenaded by singer Kevin Cavanaugh and live music of the Silver Tones.

Other bakeries and grocery stores throughout metro Grand Rapids will offer boxes of paczki, the Polish version for what originally meant a prune-filled bismark that since has expanded into more flavored fillings. "Grandmas getting ready for Lent wanted to use up their lard and sugar in preparation for fasting, so they made Paczki before Ash Wednesday," said Marge Wilson, owner of Marge's Donut Den. "But they found that kids didn't like the prune filling, so they used other flavored

PHS Board Seat Opens, Looking for Help with Newsletter, Website

A board seat will become vacant for the May election of officers for the Polish Heritage Society of Grand Rapids, and the PHS is looking for assistance in maintaining its website, publication of its newsletter and marketing activities.

Those who are interested in helping with the website, newsletter or marketing do not have to be members of the Society board.

PHS Director Matthew Gryczan has decided not to run for reelection to another 2-year term, opening up a vacancy on the board. He was responsible for creating the new PHS website in 2019 and for refreshing the format and content of the newsletter last year, but he will not continue in those activities.

Gryczan and PHS Membership Chairperson Marilyn Lignell also are requesting assistance with maintaining membership rolls, sending cards of encouragement to members, identifying local businesses that agree to extend discounts to purchases made by members, and maintaining a list of complementary newsletters to non-members to acquaint them with the organization.

The number one requirement is enthusiasm to help a few hours a month – be it writing cards to a shut-in, writing a blog for the website, working behind the scenes on the newsletter or asking a business to join in the discount program.

The new PHS website is fully operational, so it only needs maintenance of adding blogs and photos, updating information and coordinating with PHS Corresponding Secretary Elena Chaidez, who edits the PHS Facebook page. The PHS website is built on the Go-Daddy Website Builder platform, so it can be learned easily.

"Working on the PHS website would be an ideal opportunity for someone who wants to ease into learning how to create and maintain websites," Gryczan said. "GoDaddy makes it easy to change information, create new pages and add features."

The PHS also uses Google Analytics to keep track of how the content on its website resonates with its members and the general public. The website drew more than 3,100 users last year.

The PHS website and system of writing blogs is an excellent way for people to learn the ropes of digital marketing, coupled with

jellies."

While Polish immigrants have made pączki since they arrived in Grand Rapids well over 100 years ago, the pastry's widespread popularity really took off here with the help from some American-style marketing by retail bakeries.

Wilson said she started baking pączki for customers in the early 1980s when she served as the national donut director and Michigan regional director of the Retail Bakers of America, a not-for-profit trade association founded in 1918 to foster success of the retail baking industry. She credits Carl Richardson, an officer of the association from Detroit, with promoting pączki as a new product based on the demand in his region. Wilson and Richardson developed and shared recipes with bakeries as to

"By now, just about every bakery has its own special way of making pączki," she said. "Along with our special fillings, we like to put powdered sugar on ours."

Lindsy Hoezee, part-owner of Sandy's, said the bakery is introducing cherryflavored filling for this first time this year, in addition

GoDaddy's Websites+Marketing program, Gryczan said. "The PHS newsletter is another great opportunity for people to learn how to create and publish newsletters digitally." Documents are generated in Microsoft Word and photos are edited using Paint, which are both commonplace software programs. The organization uses Publisher to layout pages and create Adobe PDF files that are sent to the printer for publication.

The newsletter is also a perfect outlet for people who like to write about local topics related to Polish heritage. "We're always looking for writers with local stories," he said. "While we are a humble organization that can't pay for stories, we give writers a byline and voice to a very receptive audience."

She said Sandy's has been making pączki for at least 40 years, so "it's a real tradition." Sandy's started stocking shelves with paczki on Feb. 6 to meet customer demands, and the bakery will continue to offer them through Feb. 20.

But the real crunch will come on Sunday through Tuesday, with non-stop baking. "It's a relief when its over, but it's fun too,"


