## **Polish Heritage Education Society Scholarship Program**

In November, the PHS board approved funding for the following scholarships available to college students for the Fall 2020 school year:

Grand Valley State University – one \$1,500 scholarship and one \$1,000 scholarship.

Aquinas College – two \$1,000 scholarships

Grand Rapids Community College – two \$500 scholarships

Davenport University - \$1,000 scholarship

Universal scholarship - \$1,000 scholarship to a college or university of the student's choice.

Students must have a 2.75 grade point average and must be of Polish descent. Financial need will be taken into consideration. All applications must be submitted by March 15, 2020. The above colleges

## Malbork Dance Group News: Amber Gillete named Director

Amber Gillette counts Pulaski Days in Grand Rapids as one of her favorite holidays – after all, that was the weekend that her husband Christopher proposed to her in 2014 after visiting the halls. Now she's taken that acquired love of things Polish to the next level as the newly elected director of the P.R.C.U.A. Malbork Dance Group-Grand Rapids chapter. "I just love what we're doing," said Amber, 28. "The kids are so cute when they're out there dancing -- it's so much fun to watch them."

Having grown up in Burnips from a family of Dutch and German extraction, Amber wasn't familiar with the Polish heritage in Grand Rapids. "My husband is from the Westside, so when he first said 'Let's go to Pulaski Days,' I said: 'What the heck is that?' After that, we started going to more Polish events and I loved it -- especially the food," Amber said. She became involved with the Malbork group after watching a friend's daughter perform.

Her daughter Finley is involved with about 20 other members of the group that performs traditional Polish folk dances in costume regularly at festivals and events throughout West Michigan. Formed two years ago, the local Malbork chapter provides costumes and instruction at no charge, with separate practice sessions Thursday nights for 3- to 8-year-olds and 9- to 18-year-olds. The group is scheduled to

perform Jan. 24 in the concourse of Van Andel Arena for a special Polish-American night before the start of the Griffins hockey game.

Much of Amber's responsibilities involve working with group choreographer Michelle DeBack and parents to ensure the children and young adults can perform at events. Amber also handles administrative functions and liaison work with the national Polish Roman Catholic Union of America, a fraternal and insurance organization based in Chicago. Members of the P.R.C.U.A. can enroll their children in Malbork groups, attend sporting events and language schools, and participate in trips to Poland.

#### **Poles in Texas**

Did you know that the oldest Polish settlement in the United States is 60 miles SE of San Antonio, Texas? Panna Maria, Texas was founded by a Franciscan missionary, Father Leopold Moczygemba, who started recruiting immigrants from Silesia in 1852. The Polish Heritage Center at Panna Maria (PHCPM) Foundation was established to recognize and celebrate the Polish immigration to Texas, which began at Panna Maria.

The first families came to Texas from the culturally distinct southwest area of present-day Poland called Upper Silesia. They came to escape Prussian oppression and establish a new life at the invitation of Father Moczygemba, who was ministering to the German-speaking Catholics in Texas.

Settlers began arriving at Indianola in early December 1854. With carts to haul them inland being scarce, they walked to their land grants near San Antonio. The immigrants arrived at their yet unnamed future settlement on Christmas Eve, 1854 where Father Moczygemba celebrated their first Mass in Texas, at midnight, under a large oak tree. They named the settlement Panna Maria (*Virgin Mary* in Polish) and established the Immaculate Conception Church, the first Polish parish in the United States. The oak tree still stands at the site. The town that was established quickly became an insular Polish enclave due to four factors:

- 1. It was bypassed by the railroads.
- 2. Settlers were unionist in the years leading to the Civil War and were occasionally massacred in Texas during this period.
- 3. Polish Resurrectionist priests arrived from Europe maintaining the uniquely Polish Catholic character of the town.
- 4. A sisterhood of Polish teaching nuns was established to provide education.

In the following years, immigrants from the Polish region of Upper Silesia settled in other areas of Texas where they established parishes in Cestohowa, Kosciusko, Bandera, St. Hedwig, Falls City, Yorktown, San Antonio, Meyersville, Las Gallinas, White Deer, and McCook.

Bishop John W. Yanta, a descendant of those first settlers and the first Bishop to be descended from the 1854 Polish immigration to Texas, established the Heritage Center Foundation on August 24, 2011. His dream is to build a Polish heritage center that would record the history of the trials and triumphs experienced by his ancestors beginning in the 1850s and extending to the present. The Center was blessed in *October 2014*.

## **Interesting Facts:**

The Texas Silesian dialect continued to be spoken for several generations.

The Panna Maria Historic District is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.
