Hello, Hello! Newsletter Gets a Name

As the PHS newsletter improves coverage of local stories related to Polish heritage, the Editorial Board has decided to sharpen its identity by giving the publication a name.

This edition is the first to bear that name: *The Echo.*

We hope to live up to the standards set by the original *Echo Tygodniowe*, a weekly newspaper first published in 1900 by Walter Buskiewicz and edited by Louis Skory.

The Echo sought to satisfy the hunger of thousands of new Polish immigrants in Grand Rapids for news reported in their own language on topics that mattered most to them.

While it ceased publication in 1957, issues of *The Echo* from 1908 to 1928 are preserved on microfilm in the Grand Rapids Public Library.

While we don't claim to be a newspaper or have the same editorial caliber as the original *Echo*, we aspire to highlight the activities of individuals and organizations who keep Polish and Lithuanian heritage alive in West Michigan. In doing so, we keep faithful to the mission of the original *Echo*.

PHS Finishes 2022 on a Strong Note

As the books closed on 2022, the Polish Heritage Society of Grand Rapids found itself larger in membership and stronger financially, largely due to the many PHS members who actively engage in their Polish, Lithuanian and Eastern European heritage.

The year passed by on a high note with another successful Wigilia, a PHS event held annually since 1966 to

keep the tradition of the special Christmas Eve feast alive – a tradition that was once a common occurrence in local households a century ago.

Throughout the year, the society sponsored and supported activities that provided ways for those of Polish, Lithuanian and Eastern European descent to socialize and share their heritage.

Activities and support included Polish American night at the Griffins, scholarships for college students, Matka Boska Zielna, Dozynki Harvest Festival, a summer picnic and October general meeting with refreshments, exhibit at the Ethnic Herit-(Continued on page 2)

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age Festival at the Grand Rapids Public Museum, crowning of the Busia Queen, naming of the Polish Citizen of the Year, the P.R.C.U.A. Malbork Dance Ensemble, support for Ukrainian brethren and Wigilia.

More than 50 people attended this year's Wigilia, a rebound from the muted attendance at the 2021 dinner and the cancellation of Wigilia in the prior year due to the Covid pandemic.

As the premier cultural event of the society, this year's Wigilia was the result of hard work, dedication and generosity by PHS volunteers and sponsors. (See Marilyn Lignell's column on page 3)

The society's major social event and fundraiser of the year – the Dozynki Polish Harvest Festival -- was a smashing success. An estimated 15,000 flocked to the Calder Plaza during the festival's 3-day run ending Aug. 28. It reached the same attendance record levels in 2019, before Covid caused cancellation of the festival in 2020 and a weakened attendance last year.

As the longest running ethnic festival held within the city of Grand Rapids, the Dozynki has prospered with its four-F formula for success: Free, Fun and Family Friendly.

Nancy Borek was named Busia Queen 2022, and PHS Director and 2021 Busia Queen Teresa Bonham-Kozal was on hand to crown her as the new gueen. Matthew Gryczan was named 2022 Polish Citizen of the Year, an award given annually since 1977 to an individual who provided community service in the Polish tradition.

Polish, Lithuanian and Ukrainian heritage was on grand display at the festival. More than 1,100 people passed through an extensive exhibit of Polish-Lithuanian history curated by former PHS Director Richard Panek. The society also paid a special tribute to Mike Swidwinski, who passed away March 10, for his dedication in curating and expanding the exhibit.

The Polish-Lithuanian community also opened its arms to their Ukrainian brethren at the festival. The PHS gave several tables of space and a \$1,000 contribution to St. Michael's Ukrainian Catholic Church for ambulances used to transport casualties of the Russian invasion. Including the PHS contribution, more than \$4,000 was raised at the festival by St. Michael's.

PHS Vice President John Theisen said the financial success of this year's was largely due to large and small donors alike. This year's festival enjoyed the support of Pridgeon & Clay, Serra Honda, Micron Manufacturing, Center for Oral Surgery & Dental Implants, the city of Grand Rapids, GR Sister Cities, and smaller contributors.

More than 40 new members signed up at the festival, boosting membership by nearly 25 percent.

The society awarded schol-

arships to the following students: Rachel Warnke; Nicholas Klak; Alex Beaudette; Abigail Hunt; Olivia Gregorski; and Ella DeGraw.

PHS members Mary and Richard Panek, Marilyn Lignell and Gryczan manned a booth at the Grand Rapids Public Museum for its Ethnic Heritage Festival, where they informed visitors that Grand Rapids was ranked in the 2000 U.S. census as the 18th largest concentration of residents of Polish ancestry in the United States.

PHS has co-sponsored Matka Boska Zielna – known as the Feast of Our Lady of Greens -- with St. Isidore Catholic Church since 1971. This year's service and ceremony celebrating the Assumption of Mary took place Aug. 15 at the church, with Monsignor Edward Hankiewicz officiating. More than 200 people were in attendance.

The society hosted a general meeting and picnic June 26 at Oriole Park in Wyoming, where Ted Szyzlowski and Mike Kozal were installed as new board members to take the place of retiring directors Richard Panek and Mary Ann Bergevin.

At the October 16 general meeting held at Eastern Avenue Hall, Gryczan gave a presentation on the "Blue Army" and the names of local men who participated in that military action.

The PHS also supported the Malbork Dance Ensemble, a group that performs traditional Polish folk dances in costume regularly at festivals and events throughout West Michigan.
