### Busia Queen Crowning a Highlight of Dozynki Festival 2024

It may not be correct to say that it was a contest when there was only one contestant, but everyone agrees that this year's Busia Queen is a winner.

Capping off the Dozynki Festival at the Calder Plaza on Aug. 25 was the coronation of Delores Helen Stefaniak Pelton – or as everyone knows her, Dolly.

It was clear to the Busia Queen committee at the get-go that Dolly wanted the job mightily. The formal application for Busia Queen has space on it for about 100 words to explain the question: "Why would you like to be Busia Queen?" Dolly responded with a "Please see attached 4-pages" 700-word application, written neatly with great penmanship within the margins of ruled notebook paper.

Reading through the applica-

tion, its obvious that here is a woman who loves being of Polish descent almost as much as she loves being a grandmother and great grandmother.

There is "so much more to say about the God given gift of being Polish and carrying on the culture, but not enough time or space," Dolly wrote. She did a wonderful job answering the question with the time and space she had.

Dolly wrote with gratitude about being raised "with the culture and values that are so distinctly rich, regal and respectful." Since genealogy records of her family were destroyed, she and other relatives reconstructed the family's history that centered around the family farm at 10 Mile and Pine Island Road in Sparta.

"My aunts and uncles were given paper and a few questions," Dolly wrote. "The stories came back written in beautiful cursive, and their stories came alive in today's world...My remaining Aunt Anne at 102 years of age still reads 'The Book,' and it fills her heart."

Dolly has been married to her husband Tom for 56 years, and together they have 3 children, 12 grandchildren and 5 greatgrand children.

On the day of the Busia Queen contest, emcees Teresa Bon-

ham and Marilyn Lignell did their best to make it seem like a competition by asking questions at the food and beverage tent that only Dolly could answer in the affirmative.

And true to form, Dolly acted with utter surprise when she was called up to receive the crown and ceremonial sash from outgoing queen Lucy Maciejewski Preston, who distinguished herself throughout her reign as being highly active.

Preston shed a tear or two as she recounted the year and her gratitude for serving in the role. Earlier she said, "being Busia Queen means being everyone's Busia."

#### **Polish Heritage Society Seeking Members to Form Grant Committee**

Do you know of an organization or cause that could use the financial support of the Polish Heritage Society? Would you like to have some input into which organizations or projects are eligible for PHS grant money?

At its September meeting, the Polish Heritage Society board created a new subcommittee to formalize a system where grant money is distributed to organizations and projects that further the mission of the PHS and need financial assistance.

The grant subcommittee will consist of five individuals: one of whom will be a PHS board member who will serve as its chairman, the PHS treasurer, and three PHS members in good

standing who are not on the board.

The subcommittee will solicit and review applications for grants based on certain criteria, then forward recommendations to the full board for its review. Grants will be awarded once a year.

The new system seeks to formalize the grants that the PHS issues each year, in addition to the annual scholarships given out to students who pursue post high school education. In past years, the board has issued grants following the conclusion of the Dozynki Polish Harvest Festival – the largest single fundraiser for the PHS – and at various times of the year.

Individuals who wish to be considered for a seat on the subcommittee can send their intentions to the general PHS email site: phsgrandrapids@gmail.com. They will be contacted at a future date and given an application that has yet to be constructed.

Organizations and projects that have received PHS grants are as varied as the Polish National Aid Society in particular, Pulaski Days Halls in general, restoration of the Soldiers Monument at Holy Cross Cemetery, St. Michael's Ukrainian Church for its war effort, and a local chapter of the YMCA.
