Polish Heritage Society 2025 Academic Scholarship Winners

The Polish Heritage Society of Grand Rapids awarded scholar-ships totaling \$4,000 to accomplished students of Polish descent who are furthering their education in everything from teaching to pharmacy.

The society has awarded more than \$60,000 in scholarships during the past 20 years from money raised at its Dozynki Festival in late August.

PHS Scholarship Committee members Tad Broda and Rosemary Maciewski selected the recipients on the basis of their academic achievements, interests in extracurricular activities, community involvement and connections with Polish heritage.

In addition to scholarships, the students were named honorary student members of the Polish Heritage Society for 2025, and they will receive special recognition at the Dozynki Festival.

Origins of the Polka Pops Radio Show

Polka radio broadcasting was hot in Grand Rapids in the late '40's with regularly scheduled programming on 3 different radio stations. The Polka Time program on WGRD hosted by the godfather of local polka, Bob "Jasiu" Whitcomb had the biggest following. When the competition heated up, Whit-

comb fought back by rebranding his show as the Original Polka Time, and he redoubled his efforts at promotion.

Whitcomb would act as master of ceremonies at events, host store openings and engage in stunts that steam-

rolled the other shows. He once promised on his program that he would personally cut the lawns of revolving rooftop dining room – listeners who purchased lawn mowers from sponsor Ball Park Hardware.

One listener took him up on the offer, and about 3,000 people showed up to watch Whitcomb mow the lawn. In his typical showbiz fashion, Whitcomb arranged for two policemen and a guy in a Model T to escort him to the house. Then he had his "second" Wes Ramey massage his legs and fan him after each pass with the mower of only 20 feet. "After it was over, we all went to a hall and everybody got bombed," Whitcomb is quoted in a news story on the stunt.

"I remember my grandma would never leave the house when Jasiu Whitcomb was on the air," said Mary Puhalski, a long-time Polka Pops listener herself and a lifelong companion of legendary local polka DJ Ernie Pickem.

But the handwriting was on the wall for polka music, with rock, Motown and new country music taking off. WGRD switched its broadcast format in the early 1960s to Top 40, and Whitcomb tried his hand at real estate sales and the party store business. Then in 1972, Whitcomb accepted an offer from WJPW in Rockford to deejay a polka program.

"We used to visit the WJPW studio in Rockford," Puhalski said with a laugh. "We called it 'termite hill' because the station itself was like a garage built into the side of a hill." Whitcomb himself would jokingly talk on-air about station owner Jack "Payne's Palace," replete with a until a Middleville couple showed up to celebrate their anniversary there.

It was during his stint at WJPW that Whitcomb would rely on helpers Ernie "Pierogi" Pickem and Jerry "Golumki" Baczewski to find polka albums and deejay the show. While they were still working at WJPW, Pickem and Baczewski launched Polka Pops in 1979 on Tuesdays and Thursdays on station WEHB, a community radio station that was looking for ethnic programming. Whitcomb played his last polka on air in 1980 when he retired from WJPW.

Polka Pops was an immediate hit with listeners, and it expanded from an original one-hour format to 11 hours a week. An electrical engineer, Pickem also served double duty as station engineer. "We'd ask listeners for their old TV sets and radios and take the tubes from them to keep our transmitter on the air," he said in a newspaper interview in 1983. Polka Pops was christened in the 1980s as "the premier polka show of the nation" by a New York writer who admired the variety of music it played.

After a format change in 1991 at WEHB scrapped polka music, Pickem and Baczewski approached Scott Pastoor to broadcast Polka Pops on Jethro WYGR.

"We told them: Yeah, you bet,"" Pastoor said. "We are one of the few locally owned, Mom-and-

Pop radio stations in this market, so we've always thought we can do the unique Grand Rapids-type stuff that a big corporation would never do."

A number of personalities have kept the show running since the passing of Pickem in 1998 and Baczewski in 1999. Scott Pastoor's father Rich worked closely with the original Polka Pops duo to keep the tradition going, along with George Rosinski. Laura Szczepanek, who remains on the Polka Pops team to this day, learned the ropes of reporting on Polish doings in the city from Puhlski and Baczewski's wife, Diana.

Regular deejays now include Mike Boruta, Chris Kamyszek, Eric Mills, George Murphy, Scott Pastoor, Don Rosloniec, and Denny Ziomkowski. Polka Pops plays "happy, festive, party music," Pastoor said. "I may not listen to it every day, but it just brings a smile to your face."

Polish Heritage Society April 21st Board Meeting Report

The meeting of the Board of the Polish Heritage Society of Grand Rapids was called to order at 6 p.m. at the Polish Falcons Hall by President Teresa Bonham.

OFFICERS: Present: Bonham. 1st Vice President John Theisen, Treasurer Michael Jasperse, Recording Secretary Matthew Gryczan, Director Rosemary Maciejewski, Director Eric Tetsworth, Director Sarah Sharpe, and Director Angela Walejewski-Zasuwa. Late: Director Thaddeus Broda. Guests: Cultural Ambassador Richard Panek, Marilyn Lignell.

The minutes were distributed via email prior to the meeting. Motions made by Theisen, seconded by Walejewski-Zasuwa to accept minutes and reading of the minutes waived, passed unanimously.

Jasperse said the Finance Report showed the Workbook Final Balance is higher than normal because there weren't any checks written in March and minimal card transactions. Motion by Gryczan, seconded by Maciejewski to accept the report, passed unanimously.

Jasperse distributed a preliminary annual budget that details revenues and expenses. Panek

said it is important to have an annual budget because some philanthropic organizations ask for such a document to consider grant requests.

Detroit Polonia bus trip report by Panek noted that there were 41 participants, and he thought that \$80 was a good price point for bus trips within a 2-hour drive from Grand Rapids. Walejewski-Zasuwa said any future trips should consider whether participants will need the use of wheelchairs. Gryczan suggested that a fun photo of the participants and story be posted on Facebook.

Panek reported that 20 tickets had been sold for the June 7 Polish Piano Recital concert. He provided a summary of the marketing efforts to promote the event and said he took the liberty of offering free admission to students with the intent that parents will also attend. Panek said the PHS has purchased 30 radio spots on Blue Lake Radio to be aired 3 weeks prior to the recital at a cost of \$350 and acknowledgement as a media sponsor. Interlochen Public Radio is willing to give 20 spots solely as a mention as a media sponsor.

Bonham said that the board needs to formalize the appoint-

ment of Director Thaddeus Broda as Corresponding Secretary. Motion made by Gryczan to that effect, seconded by Maciejewski, passed unanimously.

Bonham reiterated that the doors to Polish Falcons hall will open at 5:30 p.m. May 19 in anticipation of the election, the board will hold its regular meeting from 6 to 6:30, and the doors to the hall will be locked promptly at 6:30 to hold the election. She said she has 3 people who said they were interested in running for director seats: Marzanna Butryn, Thaddeus Szyszlowski and Anthony Zasuwa. Gryczan said the open director seats are the seat formerly held by Thaddeus Broda (2025), and the seats held by Sharpe and Maciejewski (2025), both of whom are running again. The director seat formerly held by Tetsworth (2024) will be filled through appointment.

Gryczan reported that a PHSsponsored event will be held at 1 p.m. Sunday, April 27 to celebrate the restoration of the Ketchel monument. He said the she suggested that the PHS PHS will purchase a wreath of fresh flowers to place at the monument by a Ketchel family member and buy one round of drinks for participants at Fifth

Street Hall after the ceremony.

The board agreed to hold the June general meeting at noon June 22 at Oriole Park.

The group discussed that there are three main ways that the PHS communicates with its members and non-members: The Echo newsletter, PHS website and PHS Facebook. Panek is the editor of the newsletter, Sharpe manages the website, and Gryczan is temporary editor of the Facebook page. A committee of those individuals and Broda as Corresponding Secretary were scheduled to meet after the board meeting to discuss updating the SignUp Genius database in preparation for the Dozynki Festival.

Theisen said no meeting has been scheduled yet regarding-Dozynki Festival planning. Sponsorships have been slow. Bonham said she has been struggling with how to make various contacts and asked for help.

Walejewski-Zasuwa offered to help with sponsorships, and look at good merchandise to sell at the festival, such as koozies for beverages and new tee shirts in red sporting the PHS logo.
