Or learn to hop the polka to the sounds of some of the Midwest's best polka bands. Attend a religious service that conjures up the reverence and grandeur of a European cathedral, or learn some Polish while you whip up a delicious dish.

And get out and vote for the PHS Busia Queen, or run for the royal office yourself!

Deadline is midnight to apply as a contestant for PHS Busia Queen 2024-2025 at the Dozynki Festival.

Potential contestants need to complete and return an application that can be found on the PHS website https://polishheritagesociety.com under the menu item Festival, then Schedule of Events/Music and at the bottom of the page "Busia Queen Application."

Two basic requirements are that the Busia Queen must have at least one grandchild by the second Sunday of August and that she must be present at the election to be eligible for the honor.

Festival goers cast ballots to name the new Busia Queen on the last day of the three-day Dozynki Polish Harvest Festival that is being held this year at the Calder Plaza in downtown Grand Rapids. Contestants are encouraged to invite family and friends to vote on their behalf.

The lucky lady who is named Busia Queen will be crowned at the festival and presented with a ceremonial sash, which she will wear to represent the PHS at the Pulaski Days parade, the Wigilia dinner,

The annual Matka Boska Zielna Mass will be held at St. Isidore Church, 625 Spring Ave. NE.

This ceremony of grandeur is a traditional favorite for local Catholics: a Mass with a blessing of flowers and herbs, music
The Polish Heritage Society is sung in Polish, and a procession to and crowning of a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the church courtyard. All are welcome, regards of religious affiliation.

In Poland, Matka Boska is celebrated at the Feast of Our Lady of Greens, where herbs are blessed and then woven into wreaths that are hung near holy pictures and used as medicinal recipes as protection against illness and natural disasters.

Here the service is held at St. Isidore Church, which features intricate and deeply hued stained glass windows and Stations of the Cross written in Polish.

The Polish Heritage Society is an active sponsor of the celebration, providing flowers, herbs and the woven crown for This is the granddaddy of all Mary and refreshments at the reception. In past years, the Pulaski Queen and her Court and the Malbork Dance Ensemble of Grand Rapids have attended.
