Wigilia in Poland

PHS member shares Wigilia traditions followed by her Polish relatives.

I visited Poland some time ago and re-connected with over 40 relatives who now message me and send me things, especially on my FB page - Polish Family History. We love to compare things in the US with things in Poland for instance so they sent me these pictures and many others.

Many traditions celebrated by families in Poland during the Christmas season are also celebrated by Polish Americans with some variations. Advent is a prayerful time of waiting for the Nativity of Jesus, and Wigilia is a tradition celebrated in Poland on Christmas Eve.

Wigilia (Polish pronunciation: [vi'gil^ja]) comes from the Latin word "vigil" and is a feast after abstinence. The feast begins once the First Star is seen in the sky as a reminder of the Three Wiseman traveling to see the newborn Jesus. The table is set with a place setting for a stranger which is a symbol of hospitality.

An important part of the meal is the Christmas wafer "oplatek" which is a thin wafer with a religious scene pressed into it. It is shared as part of the Wigilia meal and is a symbol of daily bread.

When oplatek is shared, blessings course may be fish such as herfor health and happiness to each other are expressed.

er's cousin who lives in Tomaszów Lubelskie, Poland) remembers that his father Bolesław used to mail wafers to his sister Mary (Raczkiewicz) Kufta in Muskegon, Michigan.

The Wigilia meal includes twelve separate dishes served to represent the 12 Apostles. Soup such as Borscht, mushroom, or sour rye is served first. The main

ring or carp served instead of red meat because abstinence from meat is required. Other possible Eugeniusz Raczkiewicz (my moth- foods are goląbki (cabbage rolls), kluski (noodles), pierogi filled with cheese and potatoes, Challah bread, kapusta (sauerkraut), cabbage-apple salad, and dried fruit compote. Bread or cakes with poppy seeds are popular.

> Eugeniusz told me that although they can buy everything in stores, that they are "old fashioned" and all dishes for their Wigilia are prepared at home by his wife Victoria Aurelia and shared with their children and grandchildren.

I remember my mother Shirley Longwell ordering opłatek made by local nuns from St. Adalbert. She remembers going as a young girl with her parents to Wigilia celebrations but we didn't celebrate that way as I was growing



up. We did, however, eat together with our family, open one present and go early to midnight Mass to enjoy the Christmas carols. You can still purchase opłatek at local church supply/Catholic bookstores or on Amazon.

On Christmas Day, we opened presents at home and then visited extended family for a large, festive meal. So some of the traditions were the same as celebrated by family in Poland but there was no longer a formal Wigilia meal.

A new tradition in the past few years is that I receive Wigilia wishes from family that lives in Poland such as "Wszystkiego najlepszego w życiu dla całej rodziny" (All the best for the whole family) and "Życzenia pokoju i szczęścia" (Wishes for peace and happiness).

Learning how my relatives celebrate Wigilia in Poland helps me understand more of the traditions of my family. How did (or does) your family celebrate? Wesołych Świąt!
