CURATOR'S STATEMENT

Anel I. Flores's *I Am Home* is at once a great refusal to the here and now. The most comprehensive display of the artist's work to date, *I Am Home* presents approximately ninety paintings, serigraphs, digital prints, drawings, and ceramic sculptures, that embody the full scope of Flores's oeuvre.

Identity can begin with "what I am not." For queer Latinx folks, much of this thinking comes externally, by others either telling us how we should identify or by others showing us isolating behavior, "I am not this, so I must be that." Ultimately, though, this passive, reactive identification, built from negative space, can only be a launching-off point.

Flores channels this reaction into movement, invoking queerness to nurture their younger and older selves, to reclaim their neighborhoods, and to celebrate an alternate history and their gender euphoria. Throughout their life, Flores has built spaces to inhabit and belong. To build space to house their Brown, queer, trans body, their relationships, our world. Creation, in all its meanings, makes these spaces real, embodying Flores's desires and movements for their self and their loved ones. This magnificent collection brings us into the spaces that have housed Flores throughout their life, spaces to move on from and spaces to remain.

These works place us among the dreamy oil blends of vibrant sunset oranges, scarlets, sienna, and azures, the soft fluorescent watercolor haze, and the crisp digital graphic narrative scenes. In encountering this visual legacy, eyes will meet us. These eyes—Flores's own, their ancestors, their family—engage the viewer, unashamed and knowing. These gazes meet us on their terms, terms infused by Latina/e transfeminism, intersectionality, queer politics, culture, and resistencia. Flores brings every self that they have known and every self they bring to life into constellation. This retrospective presents a glimpse at an ever-shifting and bright starry sky of selves known through time, through others, and through knowing.

CURATOR'S STATEMENT (CONTINUED)

Viewing Flores's work, I recall José Esteban Muñoz's love letter to the queer past and future, *Cruising Utopia*. Flores' work is all about becoming and the queerness of place, of a utopia. Flores's *I Am Home* is more than a refusal, it is a great invitation to a place beyond the here and now. Flores calls upon the past, animates it, to understand it and to point to a feeling of hope.

CURATOR'S BIOGRAPHY

Mia I. Uribe Kozlovsky is a Austinbased writer, editor, and curator. Originally from San Antonio, she is the author of texts on queer, feminist, Latinx material and visual culture in central and south Texas, as well as creative fiction. She is an editor at the Coalition of Master's Scholars on Material Culture, an online publication dedicated to publishing work on material culture



from master's scholars and an editorial assistant at the University of Texas Press. In 2021, Uribe Kozlovsky completed a Masters at Tulane University in the History of Art with a speciality in modern and contemporary Latinx and Latin American art. Her graduate thesis investigated Latinx zines' collaborative roles in forming spaces, both discursive and physical, for feminist, queer, Latina/o identity-making. She also has a BA in Art History from Reed College.

ANEL I. FLORES

ARTIST STATEMENT

When I was invited to the Mexican Cultural Institute to have a Solo Exhibition of my gueer artwork, they told me to come and make myself at home. I feel at home when I am with queer family, so I invited a handful of my queer creative familia to be a part of it. Welcome to I Am Home. In I Am Home, I invite you to embark on a journey through the landscapes of my heart and soul. As an artist born in the vibrant Rio Grande Valley of Brownsville, TX and residing in San Antonio, TX, on occupied territory, my artistic exploration is deeply intertwined with the physical and emotional terrains I've traversed. Drawing from the rich tapestry of my upbringing. I find inspiration in the memories of driving across this land, from the tranguil shores of La Laguna Madre to the rugged mesquite-covered plains. My art evokes a sense of interconnectedness between past, present, and future, shaping the essence of my creative expression.

At the core of my work lies the narratives of my family, particularly the strong women and queer people who have impacted my evolution. Even amidst a narrative of survival marked by trauma and struggle—including experiences of sexual abuse, homophobia, violence, and rape—the resilience and feminist spirit of our grandmothers, infuse me with love for my Mexicana, Xicana, Tejana, and Indigena heritage of the Borderlands. Through the transformative power of artmaking, I discover a sanctuary where pain is alchemized into imagination and story. From my earliest years, drawing and storytelling were vehicles to envision alternate realities—spaces where I could also honor gender fluidity and emotional vulnerability. My art serves as a sanctuary for my queer body to exist authentically, a testament to resilience and a challenge to societal norms.

Today, my artistic journey continues to emerge into deeper themes of queerness, transness, and our intrinsic connection to the natural, metaphysical and energetic world. This exhibition bears witness to the painted landscapes of bravery, beckoning queer bodies to inhabit spaces of expansiveness and freedom. The works here transcend mere

representation; they are declarations of empowerment and reclamations of narratives. I am documenting the heart of queer south Texas, how it shows up in the pink skies, the palm trees wave, the gorditas on the comal and the gueer bird songs in the air. Queer existence defies physical confinement; it spills over into realms of imagination and spirituality. Through art, we dream, we commune with ancestors, and we forge new realities. Each stroke of the brush is an act of defiance against old paradigms, a recognition of our right to shine brightly in every corner of the universe.



I unveil my art in *I Am Home* not only as a personal expression, but as a call to arms in the broader movement of storytelling, representation, and being home for queer, BIPOC, trans, and all silenced, marginalized people, the environment, animals and the earth. By stitching the violent gaps left over by colonization, capitalism, and patriarchy — I invite others into the narrative.

Join me in celebrating the beauty and complexity of queer existence. Together, let us dream, create, and dance under the vast expanse of the cosmos. For it is in our unity that we wield the power to shape a more inclusive and vibrant world.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

An evolution of the Xicana/e movement in art and literature, now infused by Latina/e transfeminism, intersectionality, queer politics, culture, and resistencia, Anel I. Flores' thirty-year creative career has manifested as poetry, fiction, graphic memoir, and paintings. Based in San Antonio, Texas and from the Rio Grande Valley's Brownsville, Texas, their, creative process oscillates between disciplines in search of ancestral

Through the principles of Participatory-Action-Research and deep listening, Flores' work is an access point for viewers to engage against binary thought and into dreams of a world where we live at our fullest.

Flores holds an MFA in Creative Writing and is the author of Lambda Literary Award-nominated *Empanada: A Lesbiana Story en Probaditas*, forthcoming novel *Curtains of Rain* (2025) and anthology *I Love Us*, (2025). Their writing and art can be found in anthologies, journals and collections: *Writing that Matters, Vessels, Guadalupe y Malinche, Camino Real, Fifth Wednesday, RiverSedge, Infrarealista Review, Sinister Wisdom,* among others; and their play *Empanada*, first produced in 2002, continues to be performed internationally.

Their visual art most recently was exhibited in *Nuestra Delta Magica*, and has been displayed at the McNay Museum, Centro Cultural Aztlan, The Guadalupe Cultural Arts Center, La Peña, Presa House, The Tex Pop Museum Centro de Artes, among others. Flores has received several honors including the Mellon Foundation Democratizing Racial Justice Fellowship, Distinguished Writer in Residence at Our Lady of the Lake University, Participatory Action Research Project Fellowship, the Catalyst for Change Award, Women's Advocate of the Year, Nebrija Creadores Award, Squaw Valley Fellowship, and the National Association of Latino Arts and Culture Fund for the Arts.

In their community roles, Flores is founder of La Otra Taller

Nepantla, co-founder of Queer Voices and LezRideSA, has served as a board member at the Macondo Writers Workshop, the Esperanza Peace and Justice Center, San Antonio Youth Literacy, and the Pride Center. Her experience as a university and public school educator and Curriculum Specialist spans over thirty years and continues to inform her artistic practice. Flores is completing their graphic memoir *Painted Red* and the Bilingual edition of *Empanada: a Lesbiana Story en Probaditas*.



CURATOR'S STATEMENT

Upon the Mexican Cultural Institute for Pride's invitation to exhibit their work in a solo show, Anel I. Flores knew that no representation of their artistic career would be complete without the work of the queer creatives around her. In the starry sky of selves, Flores points to the connections in their life, illustrating patterns and shapes that define the kinships in their ever-evolving life. The people in our lives change us irrevocably, burrowing into our selves for us to recognize what we prioritize. These artists contribute to Flores's understanding of their self and the world Flores fights for. To apply José Esteban Muñoz's words, the artists gathered in this space arise from a utopian impulse of becoming: "the becoming of and for 'future generations.""

Flores brings together work by Erika Casasola, Anthony Francis, Hailey Gearo, Rose Two Feathers Hernandez, Julián Pablo Ledezma, Ocelotl Mora, Red Rojas, and Daniela Paz Talamantes Martinez. Through a range of mediums, the twenty-five works included in this exhibition push back against the idea of the Western individualistic artist by emphasizing the importance of chosen family, dreamed realities, and the communion in between. Casasola and Gearo depict abstract topographies to reveal a dreamed reality of vivid rainbows and sensuous curves. Francis,

Ledezma, and Mora frame the particular lens of resiliant realities through photographic portraits, working through the societal impediments to such lived experiences. Rojas's and Talamantes Martinez's chosen painted mediums aim to acknowledge and understand the past in the present through ancient codices and carefully rendered personal relationships. Connecting to these careful renderings of past through present moments, Hernandez's sculptural works breathe life and dimension into found natural objects and materials, reminding us all that the futures we dream of remain rooted to the earth and the natural world around us. Each artist is a creative that gives us such hope that their queer legacies as queer bodies will always resonate—even beyond the cosmos—with the boldness of their art. This is their home. This is our home.

ARTIST STATEMENT

Art is my compulsion, it is my obsession. Wielding a paintbrush like a weapon, forcefully making space for the uncomfortable conversations. Creating sacred space for my peers to act as a sanctuary of open discussion. The black, brown, and queer communities are much more likely to suffer from mental health challenges, and yet these conditions are still seen as taboo. Sitting in the discomfort



of vulnerability I share my struggles with mental health disorders. Being bipolar, my reality is regularly shifting from extreme moments of bliss and confidence with sharp juxtapositions of gut-retching heaviness. These works are meant to show how being bipolar feels, the internal experience. Every element represents the highs and the lows with a brief moment in between that allows peace to come up for air. Instead of struggling in silence, I'm bearing my wounds in hopes of creating safe spaces for others to share their own experience. I hope sharing myself so vulnerably will inspire others. At the very least it will let others who may be struggling know that they are not alone. Art has done that for me and I would like to return the favor.

Hailey Gearo is a multimedia abstract expressionist from Omaha, Nebraska. Hailey has always been drawn to art. Ever since she was a little kid, she enjoyed creating and expressing herself through drawing, painting, and sculpture. Hailey's art is ever-evolving. OCELOTL MORA

ARTIST STATEMENT



Mi Vida Trans (my Trans life)—a three-part, culturally immersive traveling exhibition showcasing large-scale portrait photography and stories catalyzed by altars, sculptures, dance, and installationtransforms trauma, breaks societal controls, magnifies Trans resilience, and reveals evolving humanity through the stories of Chicanx artist Ocelotl Mora and the show's Latino and Indigenous TransMale and Gender Diverse (TM&GD) participants. Mi Vida Trans is Mora's first art show the 42-year-old hadn't created

art since he was a teenager. "Mi Vida Trans is how I chose to transform my recent medical assault and resurfacing childhood traumas into tools of empowerment to overcome my own blockages and challenges due to my disabilities and the shame of being different," shares Mora. "I believe witnessing these images and stories in Mi Vida Trans has the power to demystify our Trans existences while highlighting the need for humanity and whole-process integration in our medical treatment."

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Ocelotl Mora, El/He/Him, is a self-taught, multi-disciplinary artist, a transgender man of 42, a pocho "Ni de aqui, ni de aya," Mexicano, caregiver, and advocate for trans and disabled people, indigenous two-spirit QTBIPOC traditional medicine, and queer elder communities. He was born in San Antonio, TX, but could not exist there leaving his home as a teen. He now calls the Tiwa lands of Albuquerque, NM, his home. Ocelotl brings the Chicanx aesthetic of rasquachismo, meaning, "lifestyle of the underdog," to photography, blended with digital art, writing, sculpture, installation, and dance. With raw vulnerability, he integrates community voices as he exposes his personal struggle to live authentically within his culture, illuminating the dire need for TransMale visibility and supportive healthcare for all Transgender people. mividatrans.org
