



So how are children taught to read at Underhill?

A love of reading.


The skills of reading.




How can we promote a love of reading together?

Through showing that we love reading too and by being a reading role model.


Through choosing quality children's stories that they will love.

So how do we teach the skills needed for reading?


Schools in England use an approach called *Phonics*.

At Underhill we use an accredited Phonics scheme called Rocket Phonics.



What is Phonics?

In Phonics we teach letters, and the sounds that they make, in a certain order so that children can begin to quickly decode simple words.




So what exactly is taught each week?



Each week the Phonic lessons include;

- Two new letter sounds how to read them and how to write them in words. The sounds are linked to a picture to help the child to remember them.
- Blending skills for reading
- Segmenting skills for writing
- Letter formation how to form the letter using a handwriting patter.
- Tricky Words These are words that children cannot decode (sound out) but need to remember and recognise eg we and me.



So how can I help my child with Reading at home?

You can;

- Watch the Phonics video we send each week for Home Learning with your child which introduces the new sounds.
- Create a daily routine for your child to practise their reading books on Boost Learning for 10-15 minutes.
- Complete the FRED bookmark everyday.....





So how can I help my child with writing at home?

You can;

 Watch the Phonics video we send each week for Home Learning with your child and practise writing the letter sounds in their yellow Phonics book..





How many times should my child read each book?

By reading the book 3-4 times the children will develop their skills of fluency,

comprehension and prosody.






What is the FRED BookMark?

Everyday that your child reads please tick a box on the bookmark or add a sticker to reward them for their fantastic Reading.


We celebrate their bookmarks in school and every month they get a new one to complete.






