Rachel does this through her work, primarily, in her two EOL businesses: <u>Alaska Natural Burial</u> and her recently opened crematory, <u>Flameless Cremations</u>. She also promotes a death positive community which includes choice in EOL care and conversations about death and dying as a board member of the Alaska End-of-Life Alliance. Whew!

The Power of a Death Positive Community

Death Café is an integral part of a larger Death Positive Community. This community sees honest conversations about death and dying as the cornerstone of a healthy society. The Death Positive Movement is a social and psychological perspective that encourages people to speak openly about all things concerning death and dying.

Death Café 907 – Anchorage reopened this conversational space in January 2023, after being interrupted by COVID (2020-2022), and has gained significant momentum since its restart. It operates as a social franchise following the guidelines and model developed by Jon Underwood and Sue Barsky Reid (2011) ~ (www.deathcafe.com)

We believe that talking about death will teach us more about how to live than how to die. We feel compassionately that the opportunity to bring people together in a non-biased, non-scripted space is important and effective. We're convinced that there is a great deal we can do to promote a Death Positive environment for as many as possible . . . and that, we will do!

We are further convinced that talking about death will not kill you!

To date, there are reportedly,
18,758 death cafés in over 89
countries -- proof that the whole
world wants to talk about death!
After all, it is an appointment
that we all have in common as
the mortals that we are.
