Supreme Religious Council Right to Travel Act



TO ESTABLISH THE RIGHT TO TRAVEL ACT

Pursuant to the Moorish National Republic of Peace Constitution, Amendment XVIII, Section 3, wherein it states that “The MNRP shall make all laws necessary and proper for carrying out the powers vested in its government, departments, and officers under this Constitution,” there shall hereby be designated The Right to Travel, Safe Passage, and Lawful Movement Act to govern the internal protection, documentation, education, advocacy, and safe movement of Moroccan Nationals, Citizens, Residents, members, officers, agents, contractors, guests, invitees, and voluntary participants of the Moorish National Republic of Peace Religious Order.

TITLE I

PUBLIC RIGHTS, INTERNAL GOVERNANCE, AND COMMUNITY PROTECTION

CHAPTER 1 — PURPOSE, AUTHORITY, AND LAWFUL SCOPE

Section 1. Purpose

(a) The purpose of this Act is to recognize, preserve, and protect the inherent liberty of Moroccan Nationals and Citizens of the Moorish National Republic of Peace Religious Order to move, travel, assemble, relocate, visit, transport themselves, and participate in religious, cultural, educational, charitable, administrative, and community affairs without unlawful interference within the internal jurisdiction, programs, institutions, and property of the MNRP.

(b) This Act establishes internal rules for:

1. Safe passage within MNRP property, institutions, programs, and community functions;
2. Issuance and use of internal travel and identification credentials;
3. Member education concerning lawful travel, traffic safety, documentation, and civil encounters;
4. Internal advocacy and record support where members allege unlawful restraint, discrimination, harassment, or denial of lawful movement;
5. Internal disciplinary standards for members who obstruct, threaten, endanger, or interfere with the lawful movement of others;
6. Cooperation with lawful civil authorities where required by applicable law.

(c) This Act shall be interpreted consistently with the Constitution of the MNRP, the Public Laws of the MNRP, principles of due process, voluntary association, private property rights, religious liberty, peaceful assembly, lawful advocacy, and applicable federal, state, and local law.

Section 2. Constitutional Authority

(a) This Act is enacted under the legislative authority of the MNRP Constitution, Amendment XVIII, Section 3, which authorizes the MNRP to make laws necessary and proper for carrying into execution the powers vested in its government, departments, and officers.



(b) This Act is further supported by the constitutional provisions recognizing the MNRP as a religious and cultural national body exercising internal religious, cultural, organizational, and contractual authority over Moroccan Nationals of the MNRP Religious Order who voluntarily pledge allegiance to its Constitution and institutions.

(c) This Act shall not be interpreted to create civil territorial sovereignty, independent traffic jurisdiction, public-law licensing authority, independent police authority, or exemption from lawful civil or criminal jurisdiction.

Section 3. Lawful Scope and Limitation

(a) This Act governs only the internal, organizational, ecclesiastical, property-based, contractual, educational, and membership-related affairs of the MNRP Religious Order.

(b) This Act applies to:

1. Moroccan Nationals of the MNRP Religious Order;
2. Citizens, Residents, members, officers, employees, agents, contractors, guests, invitees, and voluntary participants;
3. Persons who enter MNRP property, participate in MNRP programs, or agree by oath, contract, membership agreement, trust instrument, application, policy, or written consent to comply with MNRP internal rules;
4. Conduct occurring upon MNRP-owned, leased, held-in-trust, administered, or controlled property;
5. Conduct affecting MNRP institutions, programs, ceremonies, assemblies, missions, transportation arrangements, or community safety.

(c) Nothing in this Act shall be interpreted to:

1. Exempt any person from federal, state, or local traffic laws;
2. Authorize any person to operate a motor vehicle on public roads without any license, permit, registration, insurance, inspection, or documentation required by applicable law;
3. Convert an MNRP identification card into a state driver's license or government-issued passport;



4. Authorize refusal to obey lawful traffic control devices, lawful inspection requirements, lawful court orders, or lawful commands of civil authorities;
 5. Authorize obstruction, resistance, threats, violence, or interference with lawful civil officers;
 6. Create criminal jurisdiction independent of the United States or any state;
 7. Supersede the Constitution of the United States, the laws of the United States, or the laws of the several states.
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CHAPTER 2 — DECLARATION OF RIGHTS

Section 4. Recognition of Lawful Movement and Travel

- (a) The MNRP recognizes that Moroccan Nationals and Citizens possess an inherent liberty interest in movement, travel, relocation, visitation, association, religious assembly, cultural participation, and peaceful community activity.
- (b) Within the internal governance of the MNRP, no officer, ministry, committee, security agent, property administrator, or member shall unlawfully restrict, detain, obstruct, harass, threaten, punish, or discriminate against any Moroccan National, Citizen, Resident, member, guest, invitee, or voluntary participant for engaging in lawful movement or travel connected to MNRP religious, cultural, educational, charitable, family, community, or administrative affairs.
- (c) The right recognized under this Act is a right of lawful movement and safe passage within the internal affairs, programs, institutions, and property of the MNRP. It shall be exercised peacefully, responsibly, and in compliance with applicable law.

Section 5. No Conversion of Liberty into Internal Oppression

- (a) No MNRP officer, official, ministry, committee, security personnel, or member shall convert the lawful movement of a Moroccan National or Citizen into an internal privilege requiring arbitrary fees, unauthorized permits, discriminatory approvals, political favoritism, or retaliation.
- (b) The MNRP may require reasonable internal procedures for safety, property access, event entry, convoy coordination, transportation use, youth travel, emergency planning, liability protection, and administrative recordkeeping, provided such procedures are:



1. Published or clearly communicated;
2. Applied fairly;
3. Related to legitimate safety, property, administrative, or organizational needs;
4. Not used to punish protected speech, religious practice, lawful assembly, or political disagreement;
5. Subject to internal review where abused.

Section 6. Protection Against Unlawful Internal Restraint

(a) No person subject to MNRP governance shall unlawfully restrain, confine, detain, block, seize, transport, threaten, intimidate, or coerce another person in a manner that interferes with lawful movement.

(b) Internal security personnel may only restrict movement on MNRP property when reasonably necessary to:

1. Protect life, safety, property, records, children, elders, or vulnerable persons;
2. Enforce lawful property rules;
3. Respond to emergencies;
4. Prevent violence, trespass, theft, disorder, contamination, or imminent harm;
5. Preserve order during lawful assemblies, court proceedings, ceremonies, or official functions.

(c) Any temporary restriction must be reasonable, non-retaliatory, proportionate, documented where practical, and followed by internal review where discipline is imposed.

CHAPTER 3 — DEFINITIONS

Section 7. Definitions

For purposes of this Act:

(a) **Travel** means the lawful movement of a person from one place to another for personal, religious, cultural, educational, family, charitable, community, administrative, or lawful commercial purposes.



(b) **Private Travel** means non-commercial movement by a person for personal, family, religious, cultural, educational, or community purposes. This definition is used for internal MNRP classification only and does not alter the requirements of public traffic, motor vehicle, licensing, registration, insurance, or transportation law.

(c) **Motor Vehicle** means any mechanically powered vehicle used for transportation upon public or private roadways, excluding railway locomotives and similar rail-based systems. Operation of motor vehicles remains subject to applicable federal, state, and local law.

(d) **Driver** means any individual operating a motor vehicle, including where applicable an individual engaged in commercial or compensated transportation. This definition may be used for internal administrative classification and does not alter legal definitions under applicable law.

(e) **Carrier** means any person or entity engaged in transporting persons or property for compensation. All carrier activity must comply with applicable transportation, commercial, licensing, insurance, safety, and regulatory laws.

(f) **MNRP Travel Credential** means an internal identification, membership, status, event, convoy, mission, assignment, or travel-support document issued by the MNRP for internal administrative purposes.

(g) **National Identification Credential** means an internal MNRP document identifying the holder as a Moroccan National, Citizen, Resident, member, officer, or participant within the MNRP Religious Order. It does not constitute a state-issued driver's license, government passport, public-law permit, or authorization to operate a motor vehicle under public law.

(h) **Safe Passage** means internal recognition that a person may move peacefully within MNRP property, programs, assemblies, or activities without unlawful obstruction, harassment, retaliation, discrimination, or unreasonable interference.

(i) **MNRP Property or Programs** includes lands, buildings, facilities, community centers, religious institutions, educational institutions, vehicles, vessels, transportation equipment, missions, assemblies, ceremonies, administrative programs, outreach programs, and trust property lawfully owned, leased, held in trust, operated, administered, or controlled by the MNRP.

(j) **Person Subject to MNRP Governance** means any Moroccan National, Citizen, Resident, member, officer, employee, agent, contractor, guest, invitee,



program participant, affiliated entity, or person who voluntarily agrees to follow MNRP rules, property rules, program rules, contracts, membership obligations, or internal governance procedures.

CHAPTER 4 — DOCUMENTATION AND IDENTIFICATION

Section 8. Issuance of Internal Travel Credentials

(a) The MNRP, through the appropriate ministry, bureau, registrar, records office, or authorized official, may issue internal travel-related credentials for administrative, religious, cultural, educational, charitable, and organizational purposes.

(b) Such credentials may include:

1. Moroccan National Identification Credential;
2. Citizen or Resident Identification Credential;
3. Membership status certificate;
4. Mission or delegation credential;
5. Event travel pass;
6. Convoy or group travel roster;
7. Internal emergency contact card;
8. Youth travel authorization form;
9. Elder assistance travel form;
10. Internal transportation assignment document;
11. Internal property access credential.

(c) These credentials may be used to:

1. Identify the holder within MNRP institutions;
2. Confirm membership or participation status;
3. Support administrative records;
4. Coordinate travel connected to MNRP programs;



5. Confirm authorization to enter MNRP property or attend MNRP events;
6. Assist with emergency contact, medical notice, youth protection, elder support, or internal accountability.

(d) MNRP credentials shall not be represented as:

1. A state driver's license;
2. A government-issued passport;
3. A motor vehicle registration;
4. Proof of insurance;
5. A public-law travel exemption;
6. A substitute for any document required by federal, state, or local law.

Section 9. Records and National Archives

(a) The Minister of Records & National Archives, Registrar General, or authorized records officer shall maintain accurate records of issued internal travel credentials.

(b) Records may include:

1. Name and membership classification;
2. Credential number;
3. Date of issuance and expiration;
4. Purpose of issuance;
5. Authorizing officer;
6. Emergency contact information, where voluntarily provided;
7. Revocation, suspension, correction, or replacement history.

(c) Records shall be maintained according to MNRP privacy rules, internal recordkeeping standards, and applicable law.

Section 10. Credential Misuse

(a) No person shall knowingly alter, forge, counterfeit, misuse, sell, transfer, lend, or falsely represent an MNRP travel credential.



(b) No person shall use an MNRP credential to mislead a civil officer, court, agency, insurer, financial institution, transportation authority, or member of the public into believing the credential grants public-law exemption, immunity, diplomatic status, or driving authority.

(c) Violation of this section may result in:

1. Written notice of violation;
2. Suspension or revocation of credential;
3. Suspension of membership privileges;
4. Removal from MNRP programs;
5. Restitution for harm caused;
6. Internal adjudication before the MNRP Court of Justice;
7. Referral to lawful authorities where fraud, forgery, false identification, or other external legal violations may exist.

CHAPTER 5 — SAFE PASSAGE WITHIN MNRP PROPERTY AND PROGRAMS

Section 11. Internal Safe Passage Rule

(a) Moroccan Nationals, Citizens, Residents, members, officers, guests, invitees, and voluntary participants shall have safe passage within MNRP property and programs when acting lawfully and peacefully.

(b) Safe passage includes:

1. Entry and exit from lawful assemblies;
2. Attendance at religious services, cultural meetings, educational programs, and community events;
3. Travel to and from official MNRP functions;
4. Movement within MNRP property consistent with posted rules;
5. Participation in outreach, humanitarian, charitable, or administrative missions.



(c) Safe passage may be limited only by lawful property rules, safety requirements, emergency conditions, disciplinary orders, protective orders, court or tribunal orders, or applicable law.

Section 12. Protection of Children, Elders, and Vulnerable Persons During Travel

(a) Any MNRP program involving travel by minors, elders, disabled persons, or vulnerable persons shall require reasonable safeguards.

(b) Such safeguards may include:

1. Written authorization for minors;
2. Emergency contact information;
3. Travel rosters;
4. Responsible adult supervision;
5. Medical notice where voluntarily provided;
6. Vehicle safety review for MNRP-sponsored travel;
7. Compliance with child safety-seat laws, licensing laws, insurance requirements, and applicable transportation rules.

(c) No person shall remove, transport, conceal, or relocate a minor under MNRP program authority without proper authorization from the parent, guardian, custodian, court, or lawful authority.

Section 13. MNRP-Sponsored Transportation

(a) Where the MNRP organizes transportation for events, religious missions, educational programs, charitable functions, or community operations, all vehicles, operators, carriers, and transportation arrangements shall comply with applicable law.

(b) Any person operating a vehicle for MNRP-sponsored activity must possess all documents required by applicable law, including where required:

1. Driver's license;
2. Vehicle registration;
3. Insurance;



4. Inspection;
5. Commercial license or endorsement;
6. Passenger transport authorization;
7. Safety equipment;
8. Any other legally required documentation.

(c) The MNRP may establish internal travel safety policies, including:

1. No impaired driving;
2. Seatbelt compliance;
3. No reckless operation;
4. No unlicensed operation for MNRP-sponsored activity;
5. No knowingly unsafe vehicle use;
6. No transporting prohibited items;
7. No unauthorized weapons or hazardous materials in MNRP-sponsored travel;
8. Mandatory incident reporting.

CHAPTER 6 — EDUCATION, ADVOCACY, AND MEMBER SUPPORT

Section 14. Travel Rights Education

(a) The MNRP may educate its members concerning lawful movement, civil liberties, traffic-stop procedures, recordkeeping, court processes, documentation, safety, and respectful interaction with civil authorities.

(b) Education may include:

1. The difference between private movement and regulated motor vehicle operation;
2. The importance of lawful licensing and registration where required;
3. How to preserve evidence during an encounter;
4. How to request counsel;



5. How to remain peaceful and nonviolent;
6. How to challenge unlawful stops, searches, seizures, citations, arrests, or discrimination through lawful procedures;
7. How to file internal reports for advocacy and documentation.

(c) Education shall not instruct members to resist lawful authority, obstruct officers, ignore court orders, drive without required documents, or misuse MNRP credentials.

Section 15. Internal Incident Report Process

(a) Any Moroccan National, Citizen, Resident, member, or participant who alleges unlawful interference with travel, movement, assembly, or safe passage may file an internal incident report with the appropriate MNRP office.

(b) The report may include:

1. Date, time, and location;
2. Names and contact information of involved parties;
3. Description of the incident;
4. Witness names;
5. Photographs, video, documents, citations, orders, or correspondence;
6. Description of injuries, property loss, delay, or harm;
7. Whether civil authorities were involved;
8. Requested internal assistance.

(c) The MNRP may preserve the report for internal records, member advocacy, education, disciplinary review, or lawful referral.

Section 16. Legal Advocacy and Lawful Support

(a) The MNRP may provide internal support to members who allege unlawful restraint, discrimination, harassment, excessive force, denial of due process, wrongful citation, unlawful arrest, unlawful search, or unlawful interference with religious or cultural movement.

(b) Support may include:



1. Internal documentation;
2. Administrative review;
3. Referral to licensed legal counsel;
4. Assistance gathering records;
5. Preparation of affidavits or declarations;
6. Educational guidance;
7. Letters of institutional support where lawful and accurate;
8. Advocacy through lawful channels.

(c) The MNRP shall not represent that it can dismiss external citations, nullify external warrants, override civil courts, invalidate traffic laws, or prevent lawful prosecution by issuing internal documents.

CHAPTER 7 — INTERNAL VIOLATIONS

Section 17. Unlawful Obstruction of Travel or Safe Passage

(a) Any person subject to MNRP governance who knowingly and without lawful justification blocks, obstructs, threatens, restrains, harasses, intimidates, or interferes with the lawful movement of another person within MNRP property, programs, or institutions shall be deemed in violation of MNRP internal law.

(b) Internal measures may include:

1. Written warning;
2. Removal from property or event;
3. Suspension of privileges;
4. No-contact order;
5. Restriction from travel programs;
6. Restitution for damages;
7. Internal adjudication;
8. Referral to lawful authorities where conduct violates applicable law.



Section 18. Reckless or Unsafe Travel Conduct

(a) Any person subject to MNRP governance who uses a vehicle, vessel, aircraft, bicycle, motorized device, or other conveyance in a reckless, intoxicated, threatening, unsafe, or unlawful manner during MNRP activity shall be deemed in violation of MNRP internal law.

(b) This includes:

1. Impaired operation;
2. Reckless driving;
3. Endangering passengers;
4. Transporting minors without proper safeguards;
5. Operating unsafe vehicles in MNRP-sponsored activity;
6. Fleeing accident scenes;
7. Using vehicles to threaten, intimidate, assault, or obstruct others;
8. Refusing reasonable internal safety rules during MNRP-sponsored travel.

(c) Internal consequences may include suspension from travel programs, removal from driving assignments, suspension of membership privileges, restitution, internal review, or referral to lawful authorities.

Section 19. False Claims of Exemption or Immunity

(a) No person shall claim, publish, teach, or represent that MNRP status, nationality, membership, identification, travel credential, or internal law automatically exempts a person from federal, state, or local motor vehicle laws.

(b) No person shall instruct members to misuse MNRP credentials as substitutes for driver's licenses, registrations, insurance, court orders, or lawful public records.

(c) Violation may result in correction, written notice, suspension of teaching authority, removal from official roles, credential revocation, internal discipline, or referral where fraud or harm occurs.

CHAPTER 8 — DUE PROCESS AND INTERNAL REMEDIES

Section 20. Due Process Required



No person shall be sanctioned, suspended, expelled, restricted, removed, or deprived of internal privileges under this Act without due process.

Due process shall include:

1. Written notice of the allegation;
2. Identification of the section allegedly violated;
3. Statement of facts supporting the allegation;
4. Opportunity to respond;
5. Opportunity to present documents and witnesses;
6. Impartial review;
7. Written findings where discipline is imposed;
8. Right to internal appeal or review as provided by MNRP law.

Emergency protective action may be taken where necessary to protect life, safety, children, elders, property, records, or institutional operations, but a prompt review must follow.

Section 21. Internal Remedies

The MNRP Court of Justice or authorized tribunal may impose internal remedies, including:

1. Written findings;
2. Corrective education;
3. Warning or reprimand;
4. Suspension or revocation of internal credential;
5. Suspension of travel-program privileges;
6. Removal from office or assignment;
7. Restitution for damages;
8. No-contact or protective restrictions;
9. Exclusion from MNRP property or programs;
10. Expulsion where serious misconduct is proven;



11. Referral to lawful authorities where applicable.

CHAPTER 9 — COOPERATION WITH CIVIL AUTHORITIES AND LIMITATIONS

Section 22. Cooperation with Lawful Authorities

(a) The MNRP may cooperate with lawful civil authorities where travel-related conduct involves:

1. Injury or death;
2. Vehicle collisions;
3. Impaired driving;
4. Child endangerment;
5. Human trafficking or unlawful restraint;
6. Assault, threats, weapons, or violence;
7. Fraudulent identification;
8. Stolen vehicles;
9. Hazardous materials;
10. Criminal conduct under applicable law.

(b) The MNRP may preserve records, witness statements, internal reports, video, photographs, credential records, rosters, and other evidence where lawful and appropriate.

Section 23. No Interference With Civil Jurisdiction

Nothing in this Act shall be interpreted to:

1. Prevent civil authorities from enforcing lawful traffic, transportation, licensing, insurance, registration, inspection, criminal, or public safety laws;
2. Authorize members to ignore court dates, citations, warrants, or lawful orders;
3. Authorize obstruction, resistance, flight, false statements, or threats;
4. Create diplomatic immunity;



5. Create consular authority;
6. Create recognized passports or driver's licenses;
7. Override public road regulations;
8. Exempt MNRP property or members from applicable law.

Section 24. Lawful Preservation of Rights

- (a) Nothing in this Act shall waive the right of any person to assert lawful rights, defenses, objections, motions, claims, appeals, civil actions, administrative remedies, constitutional protections, or statutory remedies in a competent civil forum.
- (b) A Moroccan National or Citizen may peacefully and lawfully challenge alleged unlawful stops, searches, seizures, citations, arrests, discrimination, excessive force, or denial of due process through proper administrative, judicial, or civil rights procedures.
- (c) All challenges must be made peacefully and lawfully, without violence, threats, obstruction, fraud, or misuse of MNRP credentials.
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CHAPTER 10 — EFFECTIVE DATE

Section 25. Effective Date

This Act shall take effect immediately upon lawful enactment, ratification, publication, and placement into the National Archives of the Moorish National Republic of Peace.
