The good, the bad and the ugly and, we're not talking about my golf game!

The good: There are a number of "goods" to report this month. Membership continues to rise and interested parties contact us monthly to get more information regarding our group. We were mentioned in an article in "Simply Buckhead" in which Claude Rhen represented the group well. Find the article at (https://simplybuckhead.com/fun-long-after-60/). Additionally, we've filled some vacancies on our tee-box committee and related to that, we've implemented a workable interim solution to Bear Creek by simply turning number 8 into a par-5 from the tips. We have had good interest in the CPR training (the first of two sessions will have been completed by the time this newsletter publishes). And, we are getting fairly strong interest in our early commitments for the Member-Guest (interest indicated for at least 24 of the 30 rooms currently blocked at the time of this writing). See the website for more info.

The sad: We've sadly lost two members/former members in March. Both Jim Hood and Bob Smith passed and are now teeing off on a course with broad fairways, few hazards, and easy greens. The club has shared condolences with their respective families and has made donations to the charities of their choice in their honor.

The bad: Slow play. We'll keep fighting this time-bandit until we conquer it. We incorporated a number of initiatives in our play designed to reduce slow play such as: Moving the ball one club length, no closer to the hole, while staying in the same condition (in the rough, etc.); playing "ready golf" (which means when you're ready to hit and it's safe to do so, go ahead and hit even if another is further from the hole but not yet ready to hit – and be as prepared as you can be to hit your next shot before you get to your ball); and not counting stroke AND distance for lost balls, picking up at double bogey, etc. However, even with all of that, we still manage to have some groups fall one or two full holes behind. **DON'T BE THAT**

If you fall back a bit, speed up play a little to catch up. If you get to a par-4 and the group in front of you is off the green – you have fallen behind. Put yourself on the clock and pick up your pace.

The ugly: It's happened again. An "irregularity" regarding the close-up pins. This time two of our members were negatively impacted when someone removed the close-up pin from the designated hole at Providence (we assume in order to putt along a path where the pin was set) and accidentally failed to return it to its proper location on the green. If there are irregularities such as this regarding close up pins, our current policy on the tables is to award no one the points associated with the pin in question. The same is true when someone puts their name on a pin for the wrong flight. We've explored a variety of other options/scenarios regarding how to adjudicate these matters and this policy is really the only way to be equally fair to all impacted players. I'm asking the rules committee to consider whether or not we need to develop a more formal approach to this issue. Regardless, please return pins to their proper location on the green if you move them to putt, and make sure you mark the correct pin for your flight if you manage to find yourself closest on the green. Trust me when I say these seemingly simple things can be disappointing to the impacted members and can become nightmarish for the tables!

Some notes from the tables:

- 1) If you have been pre-registered but are going to cancel, please ensure the table captain is informed as soon as possible (text, email, or call);
- 2) In the past we tended to cancel only due to impending weather. Now, with pre-registration, if it becomes apparent that we won't have enough to play, common sense suggests that we cancel those rounds as well. We'll do our best to get the word out to try to get enough players for a round on those low-registration days.

We are continuing to get pressure from courses. The more Playership we have, the greater our bargaining position!



As Larry has stated, one of our primary areas of emphasis this year is membership. We have experienced a decline in membership over the last few years. Some of the decline can be attributed to the pandemic, but there are other factors at play as well. We are attempting to identify those factors and the steps required to arrest the decline and attract new members. More on that later.

I recently searched the SGAA archives, courtesy of Ted Pogue, in an attempt to find clues that might help in developing a membership strategy. That attempt was not productive for the simple reason that during most of our history membership was not an issue. In fact, membership was strictly limited.

Much of the history of SGAA is included in the New Member Handbook, but here are some additional facts, including some intriguing trivia.

- 1. Membership peaked at 445 in 1997. There was also a one year or longer waiting list.
- 2. It was not unusual to have 150 players in tournaments.
- 3. Guests were not permitted until the late 1990s except for member/guest tournaments.
- 4. Members were initially required to play 6 rounds per year. The group played only once a month and matches were played at the original Bobby Jones course, the first public course in the Atlanta area.
- 5. The required number of rounds was eventually increased to 15. Exceptions were permitted during certain years for Golden Age member (over 65) and Emeritus members.
- 6. Players were allowed to request exemption from the minimum rounds requirement for health or medical reasons of the member or his immediate family. The archives indicate that extensive documentation for exceptions was required.
- 7. There was a vigorous discussion of metal spikes in 1998. They were not banned, but were seriously discouraged.
- 8. Although computers were in limited use as early as the mid-1980s, most reports were manually prepared through the early 2000s.
- 9. Manually prepared reports of awards were made in newsletters, which were delivered by US Mail, as late as the early 2000s. The names Frazier, Goldsack, Fruit, Gabert and Thompson (H) appeared on reports frequently during the 90s.
- 10. In 2000, awards were made in gift certificates. Apparently this was not popular and the practice was discontinued quickly.
- 11. And finally, the room rate at the Howard Johnson for the member/guest in Dillard in 1999 was \$48.

SGAA has a rich tradition, and it's up to each of us to assure that the tradition continues.

A SHORT COURSE FOR NEW MEMBERS AND A REFRESHER FOR OTHERS

- 1— Arrive at the golf course in plenty of time to check in with the Table. If you are the first in your foursome to arrive, complete the scorecards (no more than two players per card) for your group and turn them in with the table fee (currently \$5 per member) and await your check in completion. No scorecards will be accepted without full table fees.
- 2 After receiving your score cards following the Table check in immediately go to the pro shop and pay the appropriate green fees.
- 3 If carts have been designated by the course for a particular hole grouping put your clubs on the designated cart; if carts are not pre-assigned by the course select an empty cart.

Scoring is defined in the By-Laws and various "handicap" points are given for your score on each hole and is as follows:

Bogey—1 pt.

Par-2 pts.

Birdie—3 pts.

Eagle or Hole in One—4 pts.

Double Eagle—5 pts.

SGAA Member-Guest at Lake Junaluska, NC 1-4 Oct, 2023


General:

Lake Junaluska was chosen as our venue for our annual Member-Guest outing for 2023 based on three key factors:

- <u>Value</u>: The average cost per couple not counting additional for the guest outing(s) came in at just over \$1,000 including lodging, two dinners (each), three breakfasts (each) and golf. When taking into account the significant increases in lodging and dining costs over the past few years, this is a relative bargain. The closest contender cost nearly \$1,300 per couple. AND, October 1 starts the fall "season" (high prices) in the Smokies we got Sept. pricing!
- <u>Convenience</u>: The venue is only about three hours from Snellville, which is about the geographic center-of-mass of our membership.
- Quality Golf: The old part of the course the original nine holes harkens back to the days of Francis Ouimet. The course is challenging enough for "A" players while not being too challenging for "D" players. It should be fun for all.
- The availability of non-golf fun: In addition to the rose walk that encircles the lake and other activities available at Lake Junaluska, the artsy town of Waynesville is only minutes away, where folks can spend some time strolling the historic main drag full of shops and restaurants. Options for the non-golfing guests, while still to be finalized, are likely to be a mid-day cruise around the lake followed by light fare at a lake side venue; and/or a shopping trip into Waynesville (or perhaps Asheville, still working on these details). And, we've been told that we may serve wine, beer, and Champaign at our dinners.



The Golf Course at Lake Junaluska



The 18-hole Lake Junaluska Golf Course in Waynesville, North Carolina is a public golf course that opened in 1919. Lake Junaluska Golf Course measures 5,108 yards from the longest tees. The course features 5 sets of tees for different skill levels.

Lake Junaluska Golf Course first opened for play in 1919 as a 9 hole challenge. In 1994 the course was expanded to 18 holes.

Most of the holes on this this short, fun, eighteen hole course are wide open and provide an experience that is challenging enough for our "A" players while being not too challenging for our "D" players. The older part of the course is somewhat flatter than the newer part. The pro told us that the course had two distinct personalities. As we played it, we saw that he was right.

Par for the course from the back tees is 68 and from the forward tees is 69 - though our treatment of the course will bring it up to 71 or 72 as we turn the longer par-4s into par fives. From the back tees, the course plays to 5,108 yards. The longest hole on the course is # 7, a par-5 that plays to 485 yards from the back tees. The shortest hole on the course is the par-3 #15 that plays 101 from the back tees.

As a mountain course, there is some elevation (more than the Waynesville Inn Golf Resort, but less than Smokey Mountain by our estimation). The most challenging hole is the par-4 16th hole, which has been featured in Golf Digest due to it's challenging nature. The challenge was created by the power company taking advantage of its right-of-way and placing several poles on top of a hill that dominates the left-center of the fairway. We'll be giving away a free sleeve of balls to any who can birdie this baby (though, it will be easier the second time you play it – it looks more intimidating than it really is).

As a point of reference. Dave, Ron and I played the course and we all would have made our points (+/- 1).









The Terrace Hotel at Lake Junaluska

We currently have 30 lake-facing rooms blocked at the Terrace Hotel at Lake Junaluska. The Terrace Hotel offers modern comforts and breathtaking views of the lake. We currently have 14 rooms with 2 queen-sized beds, 12 rooms with 1 king-sized bed, and 4 handicap rooms with 2 double beds.

Nestled in the heart of Lake Junaluska, the hotel has 105 guest rooms and is directly across a road (not a very busy road) from the lake-front venue where we'll be dining on Sunday and Tuesday evenings. Being on the lake, the Hotel is also convenient to the Rose Walk which encircles the lake and a gift shop (also in the building where we'll be dining).

We'll be taking advantage of the Terrace Hotel's dining room for a hot buffet breakfast on all three mornings of our stay.

The Terrace hotel also features a large great room with rocking chairs, board games (chess, etc.) and a large stone fireplace.

The hotel is located less than five minutes driving from the golf course.

PRE-REGISTRATION

(Or what goes on behind the scenes)

Shortly after sitting down at the computer he noticed his email inbox was beginning to get full. Nothing unusual about that as it was seven days away from a regularly scheduled in-town tournament and pre-registration opened today and he is a Table Captain. (When you pre-register on the SGAA website, like you should, an email is sent to the Table Captains who then log those emails pertaining to their particular tournament day)

He logged each of the emails in according to time sent and began filling out his worksheet. A four-some, a threesome, a single, and next was a double. His worksheet rows were numbered consecutively from 1 to 25 the first email went into row 1, row 2 was the threesome and the single. The double was noted as to the time received and put aside awaiting at least a single to complete a threesome.

So far, so good; then one of the Table Workers calls to advise a foursome had sent an email registration directly to the Worker outside of the website channel for registration. Now the Captain needs to know who's in the group [name and member number] being registered as well as the time the email was sent. The worksheet needed to be adjusted accordingly.

Another email arrives in the Captain's inbox with a threesome that includes two Table Workers. A group with 2 Table Workers gets a priority placement; so the worksheet undergoes another adjustment.

This becomes the day-to-day routine for the Table Captain for the next five days until the online pre-registration closes. Now the Captain is tasked with determining how many players (members and guests) are expected and notifying the course of that number. Once the Course has been advised as to what to expect, each player is entered into the Table Computer and the group assignments are posted on the website in preparation for tournament the next day.

Come tournament day, there are several players who did not pre-register and just showed up to play. These extra, or unexpected players, are assigned to any threesomes; as needed to complete a foursome. Or they are put together as a new group and assigned to the back of the pack.

The Course and the Table are expecting 43 players; but as the check-in progresses there's at least one group that hasn't shown up nor have they notified anyone they won't be making the tournament. This creates additional – unnecessary -- work for the Table. Let's try to lighten the load, so to speak, and let someone on the Table know you won't be playing as soon as you can.

And that is a glimpse into the life of a Table Captain in the week preceding a tournament

Editor's Note: I was vocally opposed to the idea of pre-registration and made no bones about it. The Board of Directors listened to all the comments and decided to let John and Danny test the idea on the Tuesday morning Table. There were some minor glitches during the test, but once the test period was over the Board decided to implement pre-registration for all of our tournaments. I have seen the error of my ways and now fully support pre-registration — IT WORKS!
