

Aside from golf, my favorite hobby is woodworking. I really enjoy retreating to my workshop and crafting a chair or a table out of raw, unfinished wood. I have a lot of nice power tools and hand tools that help me make accurate cuts or drill holes or sand surfaces. In order for my tools to function properly (and safely) they must be properly maintained. Saw blades and drill bits have to be sharp and free of pitch or resin and all metal surfaces need to be protected from corrosion and rust. Saw dust buildup on the tools can also make them less accurate.

You're probably thinking "that's nice Mike but what does that have to do with golf?" Well, having well maintained tools is just as important in golf as it is in woodworking. Golf clubs can be quite an expensive investment and most of us don't have the money or the desire to replace them every year or two. Properly caring for the clubs you have will help protect your investment and allow you to maintain your performance on the course year after year.

How often should you clean your clubs? Ideally, they should be cleaned after every round. If you clean off the dirt and debris with your golf towel after each shot during the round and wipe them down with a damp cloth after the round or when you get home, your clubs will be ready to go for your next round.

If you want to do a more thorough cleaning, a bucket of warm water and mild dish soap will do the trick. Let them soak for 5-10 minutes. Only submerge the club head because submerging the hosel might ruin the ferrule. Scrub the grooves with a soft-bristle brush (never use a wire brush.) Clean grooves help provide the "bite" you need to produce optimal flight and spin of the ball. Rinse the club head in clean water insuring that all soap residue is removed and dry it off with a clean, dry towel. Also, wipe the shaft off with the towel to insure it doesn't go back in the bag wet.

It is good practice to clean the grips of your clubs periodically. Otherwise, they may get slick and will probably wear out prematurely. The easiest way to clean them is to wipe them down with a moist cloth, then dry them gently with a towel. This removes surface dirt and grime and only takes a few minutes.

Where should you store your golf clubs? It is best to keep your clubs in a dry location. On a day-to -day basis your garage is fine. For longer-tem storage, a temperature controlled location is ideal. Extreme temperatures can be harmful to your clubs. It is recommended that you never leave your clubs in the trunk of your car when you are not transporting them to and from the golf course. On hot, sunny days the temperature in the trunk can reach 200°F which can break down the epoxy that joins the club head to the shaft and the glue under the grips. In cold temperatures, the grips can become slick and even crack if it gets cold enough.

With proper maintenance, storage, and protection, your golf clubs will serve you well for many seasons ahead. When you take care of your investment, it will take care of you out on the golf course.



There were no Letters to the Editor this month, however I will use this space this month to correct the information from my March article.

"The regulation size of a golf hole is 4.25" in diameter, the golf ball is 1.68" in diameter and the flagstick is .75" in diameter.


With the flagstick in the hole, this reduces the space left to allow your ball to drop into the hole to 1.75" (That's 4.25-.75=3.5 divided by two since you can only enter the hole from one side – or half). Now with just 1.75" of space for the ball (1.68" in diameter) to fall into the hole you end up with just .07" left

The above information is correct, as shown in this illustration



"However, with the flagstick out of the hole you have 2.125" of space for the ball to fall into the hole. With means you now have .445" left for error."

My error in the above statement came from forgetting about the part of the hole past the flagstick. In fact when the flagstick is remove the entire 4.25" is available for the 1.68" ball to enter the hole which means there are 2.75" and not the .07" left as per this illustration.



A SHORT COURSE FOR NEW MEMBERS AND A REFRESHER FOR OTHERS

- 1— Arrive at the golf course in plenty of time to check in with the Table. If you are the first in your foursome to arrive, complete the scorecards (no more than two players per card) for your group and turn them in with the table fee (currently \$5 per member) and await your check in completion. No scorecards will be accepted without full table fees.
- 2 After receiving your score cards following the Table check in immediately go to the pro shop and pay the appropriate green fees.
- 3 If carts have been designated by the course for a particular hole grouping put your clubs on the designated cart; if carts are not pre-assigned by the course select an empty cart.
