Dear Old Boys,

As we reflect on this past year, we must give God thanks for bringing us through a very trying year for our country, our school, and also for many of us. Hurricane Melissa greatly disrupted our lives and, in particular, some of our educational institutions. Fortunately, Calabar did not suffer much damage; we still must repair some leaking roofs and damaged ceilings. Calabar, despite its own issues, stepped up to the plate, and students, teachers, and parents participated in a cleanup day at Westwood High School. In addition, the football team engaged with the Cornwall High School and Mannings football team, and the management team made a donation of JA\$100,000-00 to Cornwall and \$100,000-00 to Mannings. COBA has also pledged to support Westwood High School, which was severely damaged by Melissa, and we are hoping to combine all the collections from local and overseas old boys and make one donation in early January.

At the recent school graduation, COBA was very present, and each member of the graduating class (over 170 students) received a COBA pin. We want to thank 2nd VP Howard James for spearheading this initiative. We also had our annual Cocktails & Awards ceremony in November, and from all accounts, it was considered a successful event, despite the limited support from local Old Boys, probably because it had to be rescheduled twice due to the general elections and Hurricane Melissa. We thank the organising committee, chaired by Michael Roofe, for the excellent work done by the committee, and we look forward to the 2026 awards function.



Christian Chatrie, Our Cricket Captain

If you remember, in our last newsletter (3rd Edition, July-September), we shared about Christian Chatrie, our Cricket Captain, who suffered a tragic fall from a tree, resulting in a spinal injury.

We have an update about his condition from a supportive Old Boy (dated December 10th):

"I recently spoke with Christian's dad. There have been massive improvements, and he has regained upper-body strength and the ability to move himself from his wheelchair to his bed. He is also beginning to regain feeling in his legs, specifically his toes, and slightly moves his right ankle. Hopefully, he will start university in January 2026. He is still at Mona Rehab and will be going home for Christmas and will continue his physio at home for the holidays. Mentally, he is in a good place, but as is sometimes expected, has his low moments. But, he is strong."

This report provides an overview of the mentorship activities conducted by the Calabar Old Boys' Association (COBA) at Calabar High School during the period September to December 2025. These activities aimed to support students' academic, personal, and professional development through guidance and group mentoring sessions.

Overview

Thirty (30) COBA mentors indicated an interest in being engaged with students across various grade levels through scheduled sessions. Notably, ten (10) of these volunteers would have been via a virtual platform...the rest were 'in-person'.

The Activities would have included:

- Weekly mentorship session (Grades 7 -9) focusing on academic planning, goal setting, and study skills, among other topics.
- Career guidance (upper school) in diverse fields such as law, engineering, and entrepreneurship.
- Personal development seminars addressing topics like time management, leadership, and responsible decision-making.
- Identify at-risk students requiring additional support and encouragement through the established school's channels.



Mentorship Activities

Highlights


- 'In-person' mentors were assigned for all Grades 7 and 8. The others were spread across Grades 9 -13
- The school's administration requested a mentor for a specific Grade 9 class with special needs. This request was fulfilled, and the mentor-mentee interactions began to gain traction.
- Guest speakers/mentors, including notable Calabar alumni, offering inspiration and practical advice, were slated for the latter part of the term
- Likewise, virtual meetings were held with the COBA overseas interests and Calabar's administrative representative to kick- start the Virtual Mentorship Program in October / November and have it integrated into the school's calendar.

The mentorship activities were significantly impacted by the enigmatic Category 5 hurricane Melissa that wreaked havoc on the island. In addition to the gradual attrition in mentors' attendance, the first term's accomplishments ended with a whimper.

Conclusion

COBA's mentorship programme at Calabar High School for the September to December 2025 period was, to say the least, disappointing. Successfully fostering students' growth and strengthening alumni-student relationships, coupled with continued support and expansion of additional initiatives, are required to further benefit the school community in the upcoming calendar year and beyond.

Manning Cup Season 2025

We just concluded the 2025 ISSA football U19 competition where we made it to the Quarter Final of both the Manning Cup and Walker Cup competitions. The unfortunately, we were unable to progress past the Quarterfinal stage this year but this can still be considered one of Calabar's most successful seasons in since winning the competition back in 2005. This is the first time playing so deep into the season since 2017.

In the first round, we finished runners-up in the group behind Mona High, eventual Walker Cup finalists. We tied for the 3rd most goals scored (50) alongside KC. Only JC and Mona scored more goals than us. We played an attacking brand of football that was exciting to watch, so much so that many of the preseason favourites feared playing us.

Even though we ran out of steam in the latter stages and our inexperience came to the fore, what we were able to achieve this year was a step in the right direction and bodes well for the future of the Calabar football program.

In 2020, Calabar High School won an award for Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology (FIRST) Tech Challenge for institutions in Jamaica. 
Pocket Rocket Foundation






