1. House Bill 36
Involving abolishing Confederate Heroes Day.

Involving the creation of certain criminal offenses concerning firearm sales at gun shows; authorizing a fee.
3. House Bill 55
Involving the carrying and possession of a concealed handgun by a school marshal.
4. House Bill 60
Involving an increase of the state's minimum wage to \$15 an hour.
5. House Bill 69
Involving prohibiting abortion at or after 12 weeks post-fertilization.
6. House Bill 99
Involving the possession of two ounces or less of marijuana; authorizing a fee.
7. Senate Bill 68
Involving the duty of peace officers to intervene and make a report when a peace officer uses excessive force.
8. Senate Bill 69
Involving prohibiting the use of certain techniques when using force to make an arrest or search.
9. Senate Bill 250
Involving authorizing the possession, use, cultivation, distribution, transportation and delivery of medical cannabis for medical use by patients for whom a physician determines medical use is the best available treatment for the patient's medical condition or symptoms and the licensing of medical cannabis dispensing organizations; authorizing fees.
10. Senate Joint Resolution 15
Proposing a constitutional amendment requiring the state to expand eligibility for Medicaid to certain persons under the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

GOODBYE CALIFORNIA...HELLO TEXAS



Sky high taxes, excessive housing costs, sanctuary cities, and generally just going to hell in a handbasket are just some of the reasons the U.S. Census Bureau is reporting that Texas is the most popular destination for people and businesses moving from California.

They cite the business-friendly environment and wonderful tax situation of no state income tax compared to the 13.3% state income tax in California, the highest in the nation. 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

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

Infrastructure Improvements Update


Last year, we notified the public that we were pursuing two funding opportunities for various infrastructure improvements, chief of which was upgrading our 2" water mains to 6" lines, facilitating additional development as well as the installation of fire hydrants on those lines. In early December, the state regulatory agency (TCEQ) acknowledged receipt of our letter requesting reallocation of previous bond funds for these improvements. They stated our request had passed an administrative review and has advanced to a technical review. Once we receive approval, we'll be able to utilize existing bond funds to improve much of our distribution system to the benefit of the community. We have also submitted three major improvement projects to a Federal grant program, though we're not anticipating a response on our application until later this year due to the volume of applicants and the additional administrative reviews that accompany Federal funding. We were assisted in the application process by Ardurra, a grant administration firm who is confident that our projects met the scope and style of projects that typically receive funding. Any updates on these funds will be relayed to the community as we find out!




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

 (They couldn't live here)


Some of our folks

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

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
