Our Pawsitive Impact Volunteer and Foster Programs hit their one-year anniversary with a celebration on Saturday, September 27. Volunteers were treated to breakfast, gratitude, and comradery at Bessie Mitchell.

Over the last year, 33 foster care homes cared for 285 animals for more than 7,500 hours. Forty volunteers contributed 3,400 hours to support more than 30 outreach events. Dear President Braun:

Over the last few weeks, I have become aware of some disturbing budget reduction options (including closing District neighborhood elementary schools) that were presented to the Education Master Planning Committee. As I understand that, at the same time the District grappled with budget concerns, the District paid off unused bonds, some of which perhaps could have been used for expenses like repairs, equipment, safety, and technology to relieve those expenses in the general fund.

The reduction of the tax rate apparently cost the District significant dollars, while at the same time, the Board in November 2024 asked the voters to approve the VATRE to deal with the District's financial shortfall which passed in our District; now we are still faced with budget problems in GCISD. It doesn't make a lot of sense to already be in this position. We have tried to determine how much of the bond money could have been used and how much the total loss in ad valorem taxes cost the District over the last four years before the VATRE's passage. However, that information is not easily attainable. This adds to the suspicion that this is information you don't want the public to know, or that you have not already evaluated all the financial options.

Concerns with Committee Composition

The stated task of this Committee is to review the current fiscal condition of the District, along with campus facilities, programs and the utilization of each building, and subsequently make recommendations to the Board of Trustees to address the budget shortfall. Taken at face value, this seems to be a reasonable approach, however, I take issue with the composition of the Committee. You appointed a committee that is comprised of 18 individuals, only two of which represent non-GCISD employees or Trustees that reside in Grapevine.

Grapevine has a population of approximately 52,000 and Colleyville 27,000. One might assume that the student and revenue generation split would be similar to the population of 2 to 1 or even more. One might expect that there would be a citizen representative from each school attendance zone. Despite this, Grapevine residents that are not District



employees represent only around 10% of the Committee membership. Consequently, there is no representation of any Dove or Silverlake constituents. While I would hope that the Committee members could look at the issues without bias, the optics should support that as well. I have heard two Board members say the Committee was selected based on their talent and not their location. This is a slap in the face to every citizen and every voter in Grapevine.

Second, the Committee is looking at closing campuses and reallocating students with their only focus being on classroom space available. There are many other issues to consider when looking at closing campuses and relocating students to other campuses. You must consider the street and utility infrastructure as well. It seems difficult to make a reasonable recommendation without knowing if it is feasible from a practical standpoint.

I am concerned whether Silverlake and Cannon can manage another two hundred students and the challenge that the parents will face in the delivery and pickup of students. We will not allow this increased capacity to destroy the peace and enjoyment of the surrounding neighborhoods. Furthermore, the sidewalks will be in the wrong place for many of the students and the crossing guard locations will have to be studied and reallocated as necessary. You cannot solve your problem and create a new problem for the City. These issues have to be worked out with the City before any decision can be made on school closures.

Other districts like Coppell have similar budget shortfalls and are only talking about closing one school. The closing of a school I understand only saves \$1.2 million per year and yet you have a \$10 million shortfall coming at the end of this school year. I understand that additional schools may have to be closed in the next year or two. Liquidation of this much of the District is unconscionable and begs the question of how will the rest of the gap be closed and what measures can be taken to ensure sustainability going forward?

Statewide Funding Challenges

I understand that state funding for schools has changed over the last few years. The Legislature has limited school districts in Texas and taken a lot of the local authority away. Even though our District received about \$14 million more this year than last year from the State, we still have more than \$30 million going back to the State because of Robin Hood. I urge the District to review the possibility of joining with other similarly situated districts to challenge Robin Hood in court again. I can't imagine the Supreme Court of the United States saying that it is constitutional for a District like GCISD to have to send more than \$30 million of its revenue to other districts and at the same time need \$10 million to balance their own budget or have to liquidate their school assets to balance the budget. Finally, we are being told that there have not been recommendations made and that the committee is still doing analysis, yet I was also told that the teachers at Dove Elementary



were told that their campus will likely be closing at the end of the year and they need to think about where they want to go or if they want to retire or leave the District entirely. Is the Committee really making recommendations, or is the Board just looking for Committee cover after the fact?

Exhaust all Other Options

Taking all of this into consideration, I would urge you to start from scratch. Appoint a balanced committee that includes proportional representation of Grapevine residents and includes someone that has some experience with each school in the District. Or better yet, in the alternative, thank the committee for their service and in their place, hire the best school financial consultant in the State to review the financial condition of the District and write a report that is transparent and understandable by the average citizen. You should carefully evaluate each option, working with the appropriate experts to determine feasibility. The report should analyze every possible alternative to school closing and prove that the closing of schools is the only viable alternative.

Finally, before you make any drastic moves, be sure that you have turned over every stone for revenue-thinking outside of the box with the creativity that GCISD is known to embody. Closing neighborhood schools disrupts neighborhoods and neighbors who rely upon those schools. It is impactful to property values and yet you continue to cut the tax rate. While I understand the difference between the interest and sinking rate and the maintenance and operations rate, is there a way, with voter approval to use the I&S rate to supplant expenditures that would normally come from the M&O rate? If that was an opportunity, I would urge you to see what the voters have to say. Would the voters support an implementation of copper pennies? It's not an ideal situation, but you don't know until you ask. There is a point of diminishing returns where lower property values caused by draconian reductions could result in less overall revenue to the District. I would expect that the citizens would rather raise taxes than close schools.

Once you have created a transparent, fair and balanced committee or sought the assistance of outside financial advisors and have exhausted all other means, the taxpayers will likely be more accepting of the results. Once again, I urge you to reset and start over.

During the Q&A, Shannon was asked whether she had spoken with City Council or the Mayor of Grapevine. She replied, "Yes, and just so you know, we invited them to be on the committee and they declined."

This directly conflicts with what you told us just three nights earlier—that "the city is not going to have any say; we were not appointed to be on the committee."

In addition, Shannon repeatedly characterized our efforts as "emotional" and spoke to us in a way that felt dismissive. What she calls emotion, we call passion—a deep commitment to being included in decisions that profoundly affect our school.

We love the staff, teachers, and children who fill that so-called "rundown" building. We aren't fighting for the building itself, but for the people and the community it represents. We will continue to explore every possible path to protect and preserve it.

Thank you for all you have done for our city and for your personal connection to Dove. We value your leadership and your willingness to keep us informed as we navigate this challenging time.

Dear Honorable Mayor Tate,

I am writing as a deeply concerned resident and parent to share my strong opposition to the proposed school closures and to ask for your leadership in advocating for a pause in this process.

Our schools and neighborhoods are simply not equipped to absorb an additional 200+ students per school. This would mean adding costly portables, reorganizing bus routes, and hiring additional bus drivers—while also straining already crowded lunchrooms and common spaces. The district has projected savings of around \$1 million to \$1.2 million per school per year, but it is unclear whether these numbers account for the inevitable additional costs of overcrowding and transportation changes.

Many parents warned the board years ago that lowering taxes while simultaneously raising teacher salaries could lead to a budget crisis. Unfortunately, that is exactly where we now find ourselves. Just four years later, we are faced with the closure of at least three campuses—and trustees have already signaled that more closures may follow.

I want to be clear that I, along with many neighbors, am willing to support another VATRE to preserve our schools. Grapevine has long been an attractive community for families, and keeping these schools open is essential to maintaining that appeal. If we lose the land these schools occupy, it will be gone forever—a permanent and irretrievable loss for our neighborhoods.

We also worry that Grapevine's unique, family-friendly character will erode if we allow our classrooms to become overcrowded and force children into long bus rides just to get to school. This is not the Grapevine we want for future generations.

I respectfully ask that you use your influence to advocate for at least a one-year pause in this process. We need time to develop better solutions that will protect our district, safeguard our neighborhoods, and continue to attract families to our community.

Thank you for your time, your service to our city, and your willingness to listen to the concerns of families like mine.

For what it's worth, I originally sent this email on Tuesday 9/23 but it bounced back and apparently was not delivered. It it my understanding that the cause was an internet disruption.

My husband and I are Dove parents who believe strongly in investing our time and resources into our community, whether it be the school through g being a Dove Dad or our neighborhood through organizing events looks National Night Out.

As the Christmas events kick-off today, the hypocrisy and conflict with the Parade of Lights is hitting me.
