December 3rd, 2020 7:30 P.M. AT HIRAM TOWN OFFICE

To Nicole Day, a resident of the Town of Hiram in the County of Oxford, in the State of Maine. **GREETINGS:**

You are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Hiram, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Hiram Town Office on THURSDAY DECEMBER 3RD, 2020 at 7:30 o'clock in the EVENING, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of \$ 10,033.00 and appropriate the sum from the Municipal Officers Compensation and Municipal Officers mileage accounts as follows: \$3,120 into the town office staff account for reimbursement for insurance payments and \$6,913 to be put into the capital improvement account to be applied in the future towards a standby generator for the town office. Municipal Officers recommend to do so.

ARTICLE 3. Entertain a motion to adjourn

HIRAM VILLAGE UPDATES

We get by with a little help from our friends... and volunteers. Update of some recent efforts around Hiram Village

In these times of the pandemic that we are all doing our best to survive, many events and activities that we have come to expect are just not happening.

But, friends, neighbors and other volunteers are still making their best of what we can do. The several "Music-inthe-Park" events that have happened right across the road from Four Corners Store are a good example. This is



the "Troubadors" band, that has evolved from the band that Howard Allen led for more years than we can recall. Howard was here, and it deserves notice that last year he received the "Lifetime Legend Award" of Maine Country Music. I listened to them do some awesome covers of a few Eagles tunes. And, of course, the village is overjoyed to have Four Corners Store open, and we wish for them to have a great future serving our community.

The Mt Cutler Park was exceptionally busy around

Memorial Day and July 4th, when many people were looking for safe outdoor recreation, and many places for recreation had been closed. At times we had nearly 20 cars at each of the trail heads. Now the use has become more reasonable; on most weekends, each parking lot may have up to a dozen cars, and on week days, we can usually expect 3 or 4 cars at each trail head.

During spring and early summer we had several reports about the mess of trash at a contraband campsite up on the main ridge of Mt Cutler, near the South View Ledge. This crudely-made tent and all the things associated with it has actually been there for several years; we saw it many times while working on new trails on the mountain, but never had an opportunity to take time to work at cleaning it up. It has been a problem, because it is an eyesore, and it "invites" people to camp where they should not, and then build a fire where there should be no fires.

Fortunately, during the summer. Sarah Simaitis got in touch. explaining that she has used the mountain trails many times and would like to help with any work that would be useful. She was



willing to take on this project! On August 20, Sarah and a friend cleaned up and back-packed all of that mess from

the main ridge down the more-than-half-mile descent of the mountain. With very sincere thanks, we are grateful that this problem has been resolved.

Another Mt Cutler problem is that, regardless of all trail improvements that we have made on the north slopes during the past two years, the Ridge Walk Trail and the Saco Ridge Trail, trails that have existed for more than 40 years, have been lacking for attention. Some complaints have been made from folks who had some trouble following those trails. The problem is that, although the trails are well-established, the red paint blazes have not been re-painted since the Healthy Sacopee group helped us about ten years ago.

More volunteers have now helped us with

this. Phil Coyne is the current Trails Chairperson of the **Appalachian Mtn Club Maine Chapter**. As part of our original agreement for planning the Mt Cutler Park, the Maine Chapter has agreed to provide at least a day of trail work every year, and Phil got in touch to offer that work. On September 21, Phil arrived along with two other volunteers, and with a supply of red paint, brushes and other tools. Now, the red paint blazes are refreshed to be a very visible, bright red! Again, we are very grateful for the help.

If you want to hike **Mt Cutler**, there are information kiosks at both trail heads (on Mt View Avenue and on Hiram Hill Road), and each parking area has a map box with a free Trails Guide that we provide for all visitors. Also, you can see complete trail descriptions at the web site: Mainetrailfinder.com

Also at: Alltrails.com AllTrails has frequent hike reports, but the trail information is not all updated.

Mt Cutler is not the only trail system around Hiram. **Ingalls Pond** is also well worth a visit for a very age-friendly and scenic afternoon walk. Most of Ingalls Pond is actually in West Baldwin, but - by an agreement between the Town of Hiram and the Francis Small Heritage Land Trust - the Old County Road Trail continues across the Baldwin-Hiram town line and runs for about another 500 ft along Town of Hiram river shore. The Mountain Division railroad is also part of that trail system, both in Hiram and Baldwin.

A photo shows the family of Dan Hester's son where we found that an oak tree had split and fallen on that RR. Dan has since removed that tree, and also cut it up, and hauled it away to supplement winter fire wood. The RR needs to be kept clear, not just as a trail, but also because there is occasional rail traffic. Some people have their own rail cars, and the Maine DOT also has rail vehicles for doing track inspections. And this is also a major winter snowmobile trail.

The fallen tree was not the only recent problem on

our traveled ways. There have been unfortunate accidents at several places on our highways. A photo shows the **Hiram Fire Department** responding to an incident just south of Hiram Village, where a truck went off the road and snapped off a power pole. We owe deep gratitude to the volunteers of both fire departments for the many lives and properties that they have worked to save from damage or destruction.

Other volunteers work on less dramatic problems but their efforts are also of value to our community. Our public library closed in March, when COVID-19 infections resulted in needing to cancel events and to close offices and businesses. As guidance



developed to assure safe reopening, volunteers worked to enable having the **Soldiers Memorial Library** (SML) open with safety for both staff and for visitors. A transparent safety guard was installed for the Library Director desk, sanitation stations were developed for each entrance, and other preparations were made for sanitation and safety. To help with these costs, the Library trustees were successful in applying for a **CARES-Act grant** for \$5700. In addition to equipment and supplies, this allowed us to hire an assistant Sanitation Manager, to work with our Library



Director, making it possible to reopen the library on August 19. Since then, the library continues to be open



Wednesdays 10 AM - 5 PM and Saturdays 9:30 AM to 12:30 PM. This is half of our normal hours, and the library expects to stay on this schedule until there are conditions that allow the library to be open without need for two staff persons. There have also been special purchases that the library was able to make with approval of the Maine Humanities Council for these uses of the grant: we have a new book cart, a new outside book drop, and we added over \$2,000 of new titles to the collection of books and DVDs. Visit the library to see the changes and then take out a new book or movie.

There are also other changes going on with the library. As requested by the municipal officers, the trustees of the library are working

to make the management of the library become separate from the town office. (This does not mean that the public library will move; the Town of Hiram will continue to own the SML building, and there will be an agreement for the library organization to use the building.) Since the early 1990s the Library Director has been an employee of the town, and some expenses, such as salary and heating fuel, have been paid by the town office. These expenses have always been paid by using the library appropriation that the town has made at the annual town meeting, and the library has always reimbursed the town for any expenses that exceeded that appropriation.

To accomplish this change, the library has hired a payroll service, and is working with the Friends of the Library (FoSML) to accomplish a merger of SML into FoSML. FoSML is a 501c3 non-profit corporation that was originally developed to do fund-raising and grant applications for the library. Since then. FoSML has expanded to own the Arts Center building (the former church), and to have a series of educational and entertainment programs. Unfortunately,

the pandemic resulted in cancellation of those programs for this year, but the Arts Center is still being used as a place for having meetings that use the large space to assure safe distancing. In fact, about once each month the combined boards of SML and FoSML have been meeting there to work on planning this merger.

Hopefully, the volunteer board members will accomplish

these necessary changes by end of this year, and then the Library Director and Sanitation Manager will be employees of FoSML. The expectation is that you will visit the library to find that little has changed except continuing improvements of the services at both buildings. Board members are hoping that all will be pleased with changes that are developing, and that the Town will continue to support your public library in Hiram Village.
