As many of you know, last year my little branch of the Parnell family were getting acclimated to the newest "member" of our little family, a tiny black puppy named Cocoa Puff. I have to confess: I'm the only one who actually calls her that; everybody else just calls her Cocoa. It

made for an interesting year, having to tend to, care for, clean up after, and not step on a puppy running around the house. I guess I'd forgotten how much work a new dog can be! However, a year later and none of us (especially me) can imagine our house without her. Change can be an amazing, challenging, and sometimes wonderful thing.

In the same way, 2016 was a year for some amazing, sometimes challenging, but overall wonderful changes and blessings for us at Bishopville EPC! From hosting VBS to hosting missionary speakers, from hurricanes to the Solid Rock class (no connection, I'm sure), from prayer groups to new elders, 2016 was an incredible year for change for us—and let me say as your pastor, I have been impressed beyond measure at how well we as a church have not only "rolled with" but have embraced all that's gone on here!

The thing is, we should be both grateful and humbled by how amazing 2016 was for us: grateful because we know that God Himself has trusted us with these blessings, and humbled because we know

that God Himself has trusted us with these blessings.

This is God's pattern; He gives blessings to His people in order to both bless them and to challenge them: How will they respond? Will they rise to the occasion, trusting God in everything like Abraham with Isaac? Or will they be like King Saul, not trusting in God and looking for some neat trick to fix his problems instead? How do we respond? In Matthew 9, Jesus says, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." Starting in January, we're going to start looking at the things Jesus said, particularly those very interesting (and sometimes hard-to-understand) stories he told. So the sermons will all be titled, "Jesus said what?!?"

In this case, though, what Jesus says is pretty straightforward, and I'm proud to say, it can be used to describe how we – as a church – have responded to what God's sent our way: God provides more abundantly than we could ever expect or handle, and God, loving us like He does, gives us the means to handle those blessings. The disciples witnessed this in their own lifetimes; Jesus provided the incredible reality of the Gospel, the Holy Spirit drew masses of people to the Church through the Gospel, and God gave the disciples the right people at the right times and the right places to handle God's blessings.

So what do we look forward to in 2017? Our good Lord willing, more of the same! We should be praying for more opportunities to stretch ourselves and our faith, personally and as a church. We should be praying for eyes to see the opportunities—and the realities connected with those opportunities (read: challenges)—and for a spirit willing to follow God even through those challenges.

Again, I thank God that He's given me a church that has shown itself willing to put its faith in Him, to

follow Jesus into His story as they—as we—lead our community closer and closer to Him.

From the Pastor's Desk I'm going to borrow a little bit from Frank Herbert (Dune): If you're reading this sometime in the far-reaches of the future, know that the year is 2017 and that for the past 3-4 months, Facebook Live has been a "thing."

If you're (as likely as not) unfamiliar with the concept, "going live" means that a person attached to one (or more) of your social media outlets has decided to "livestream" or make immediately available a video they're taking, usually of themselves, at that moment. Sometimes those videos are "archived", which simply means the video is available to be watched at a later date, but mostly they're not. I don't know about what your social media "feed" looks like, but I hardly go a day without some Facebook or Twitter "friend" of mine "going live."

Interestingly, all this "live" video business has got me thinking about that famous quote (or misquote) attributed to Andy Warhol: that everybody gets 15 minutes of fame. Somehow his acerbic witticism about people's misguided quest for fame & fortune has been transformed from being a quest for fame into some sort of "right" to have 15 minutes of fame! So when I see my social media lit up with so many people "going live" I have to wonder if some of that isn't coming from our cultural obsession with celebrity, with being associated with or having this thing we call "fame."

The Bible says a lot about the drive, the obsession that seeks fame when it speaks of pride and humility. And while I could spend a lot of time looking at what the Bible warns about pride or how the Bible encourages a Christ-like humility, I instead find myself thinking about one of the most powerful sections in the Bible on the idea of what we now call "celebrity culture." Here's the thing: whether it's "going live" or it's "making a spectacle of yourself" or it's the latest ten-dozen articles on what some Hollywood actress is (or isn't) wearing, our culture is quite literally obsessed with knowing and becoming "celebrity." And no place in the Bible deals with the idea of "celebrity" in the church like 1st Corinthians 1:12-17:

"...each one of you says, 'I follow Paul,' or 'I follow Apollos,' or 'I follow Cephas,' or 'I follow Christ.' Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one may say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas. Beyond that, I don't know whether I baptized anyone else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with words of eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power. (ESV, boldtext emphasis is mine)

What Paul criticizes is a culture already obsessed with celebrity: I'm more important than you because of who I know, or who I follow, or who I like; you're less important than me because of who you know, etc. This is a culture that wants to define people based on levels of importance, based on levels of "fame". So they form little "tribes"—some of them are excited about Apollos, the new guy; others prefer Paul, the previous guy; and others want to hear from Peter (Cephas), a guy they've never met but have heard about... sound familiar? Even close to 2000 years ago, the church also was dealing with the issue of being or following celebrities.

So how should we respond? By being like the "I follow Christ" gang at Corinth, looking down our noses at the celebrity -hounds? By turning away from culture and forming our own, insulated enclaves? Or is Paul suggesting we handle fame—and those people we know who are hooked on it—in a different way?

Yep; he's going somewhere else with this. Paul advocates that the Corinthians, and the churches that live in "Corinthian" type cultures need to focus on something else altogether: On the power of the message of the Cross. The Cross isn't about fame; it's where all the sin & shame we have was put on our Savior. The Cross isn't about you or me or some celebrity; it's about a God who so loves His creation that He will give Himself utterly for them. The Cross is where we meet our Savior and where He makes us family with him. It's not about fame; it's about the Cross of Jesus and the Jesus of the Cross.

So, as we have the opportunity, let's use the tools and language our culture gives us to share that powerful, overarching message: the Message of the Cross and the Salvation it brings!

GUATEMALA MISSION TEAM PREPARES TO LEAVE



On January 18th, the Guatemala Mission Team embarks on an exciting and rewarding journey.

Anne Finch and Regina Whitaker will be part of a team of ten individuals who are all deeply involved in the work of the Association of Mam Christian Women for Development, a group of hard working indigenous women who struggle to improve the lives of their families. The team will be representing two denominations, three states, and five churches. Some of the projects include water filters, stoves for cooking, micro-loan programs, latrines, health promotion, prayer partners, as well as the sewing mission. The

purpose of the trip is to learn more about the programs and determine ways that we can assist them in their work. We will spend time each day in bible study and prayer with our Guatemala sisters and brothers.

We will be taking with us:

Funds donated to purchase sewing machines for the graduates of the two schools.

Over 100 baby caps that were made by members of a senior citizen group that Regina met this summer at the beach, knitted caps made by Mary Taylor, and baby caps from the Agape Kids Clothing Sale.

Over 100 neck warmers made by Julie Cothran of the Bishopville Presbyterian Church in Bishopville, SC.

Drawings from 38 children in Aldersgate Sunday School Classes and the After School Program. The drawings are being coordinated by Evelyn Johnson.

A gift from the Aldersgate Youth Group to a Guatemala Youth Group to purchase Sunday School supplies.

A prayer shawl made by members of the Aldersgate Prayer Shawl Ministry for a woman who is suffering from a chronic illness.

20 letters including pictures from Aldersgate Prayer Partners to their Guatemalan Prayer Partners.

Framed photographs for the walls of the new sewing school in Las Barrancas. The photos include a picture of Jesus surrounded by children, the first and second sewing school graduation classes, and photos of Aldersgate & Guatemala prayer partners.

Dear Friends and Prayer Partners,

"You crown the year with your goodness, and your paths drip with abundance." (Psalm 65:11)

As I look back over 2016, it is with a heart of gratitude and praise to the Lord. As I look forward to 2017- which marks 50 years of service in Mexico- I know the Lord who brought me here will continue to be my guide. Although vision and mobility are not what they once were, I still feel blessed to be useful in service to Him.

The changes I have witnessed in 50 years are many. Merida is a sprawling city of over a million people. There are more than 50 Presbyterian congregations in Merida, not to mention many other denominations. Health and education are top government priorities that have opened the doors to better quality of life and employment opportunities. But the greatest changes are what God is doing in individual lives.

Rodolfo, from Yalcoba, has overcome his alcohol dependency, and although he still serves as the town's Justice of the Peace, he has entered extension seminary and is thinking about serving the Lord full time. A modern day miracle! Martin has returned to his family, purchased a Bible, and is attending church regularly. Walter, who many years ago was reticent to accept the Lord into his life, was ordained an elder in my church on January 8th. All of these are a direct result of Dave's patient counsel and prayer. He would rejoice to see what God has done in their lives.

The seminary Dave founded in 1982 will celebrate its 35th anniversary this year, and the music school 30 years. Big celebrations are being planned, hoping to encourage prospective students. Perhaps I will be teaching 1st year piano again, if new students enroll for the spring semester in the music school. The economic situation is deteriorating and this will continue affecting the seminary. Political corruption is rampant and the economy in shambles. Everything is going up in price- gas, electricity, food- but the minimum wage is still only \$4 dollars a day. There have been many demonstrations against the government throughout the country of Mexico, but thankfully in the state of Yucatan these demonstrations have been peaceful for the most part.

The camp has not escaped these problems either. Property taxes rose 400% as the government wants to develop the Yucatan Gulf coast into a resort area. The camp governing board is considering renting the far end of the property (which spans a distance of just over two miles) to a shrimp hatching industry. This would show it is not being used for tourism and it would avoid being zoned as a tourist resort for tax purposes. The other end of the camp could be an ecological preserve, because sea turtles come up on the beach to lay their eggs each year. Although the government wants to develop the coast, it is also interested in preserving the wildlife and natural

resources. Using the property in both these ways would help to avoid the exorbitant tax rates that resort owners are being charged up and down the coast of Yucatan. The camp is also celebrating its 50th anniversary at the present site. Many meaningful decisions have been made in all these years, resulting in the growth of the church in Yucatan. The blessing of the Lord is evident in every area of ministry with which we have been involved because He has been faithful.

On Christmas Eve I accompanied the choir and some soloists, and played for the service at my church where over 400 were in attendance. I have decided to accompany the choir until Easter because they are doing a John Peterson cantata I know well. My vision is deteriorating too much to read notes in music with which I am unfamiliar. I have been learning everything by memory, listening and struggling to clearly read what I can. I will, however, continue to serve as church pianist and accompany soloists as often as possible after Easter.

I spent the Christmas holiday with Mark's family and the next day the Lord permitted me to travel to the states for a week and celebrate Christmas again (on the 26th) with Daniel and his family as well as Debbie and her family who had been visiting her husband's relatives in the Chicago area. I enjoyed seeing a little snow and breathing cooler air- Merida has had weather above 90 degrees for many days! Once again, I thank the Lord for the wonderful family he has given me, all serving Him in some way.

On January 4-7 I attended the meeting of the Sac-Be Presbytery in the city of Ticul. I was there selling books, Bibles and hymnbooks for the Christian bookstore and sold almost \$1,000 USD worth of materials. Pastors, elders and church leaders attend, getting together for prayer, fasting and taking care of presbytery business. Those days are like a retreat for me, with a joyful time of fellowship with friends I don't get to see very often. On February 6th, Dr. Will Ackles arrives for his annual teaching in the seminary. He has also graciously volunteered to be my chauffer on the weekends when we have invitations to visit village congregations. It is a blessing for these congregations to have him preach as well as serve communion.

With so much for which to be thankful, I can only praise God for His care for me. He has given me purpose and hope for the future and has supplied all my needs. My prayer for you is that you may also find in Him all you need in 2017.

From the Pastor's Desk "His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master."

Matthew 25:23

March will officially begin our Lenten season here in Bishopville. So it made me wonder again - what is "Lent"?

"Lent" is a liturgical season devoted to fasting in preparation for a particular celebration of the Church (to paraphrase the dictionary). This is a carryover from Catholic traditions; in fact, Catholics have, or had, two main seasons of Lent. We know the one before Easter; can we guess the other. (Hint: It has to do with the pink Advent candle) The thing is, as Protestants - and I can explain that term in great detail if you like - in fact, as a "Reformed" church, why do we, or why should we practice Lent?

To put it another way, what does Lent *do*? How does it, or does it even help us in our relationship with God? Does it help us "get ready for Easter"? How? After all, that's the stated purpose for Lent in the first place. Is there a Biblical call or cause for a season of Lent?

While it would be possible to answer these questions from within the tradition or history of the Church itself, I think it's better to go back to the source: back to what God says to us. Jesus Christ, in Matthew 25, told the story of a man who goes on a long journey and leaves behind resources for his people. This is, of course, the "Parable of the Talents" - one servant, given 5 talents returns with 10; another, given 2, returns with 4; finally the last, given a single talent, returns with nothing more, nothing less than (*quite literally, since he buried it*) a single dirty talent, unused and unappreciated.

Yes, talent is a word that refers to 10-years wages for a day-laborer. Yes, talent is a word brought over into English which has become connected with our idea of a "unique ability." But what does this have to do with Lent?

Jesus' point in this parable can be boiled down to 2 sentences, two statements the talent-giving master makes: "Well done, good & faithful servant!" and "You thought you knew me!" (vss. 23 & 26, my translation). The first statement he makes to the two servants of his who go to work, who invest in his kingdom, who build up and add to what has been given them - in other words, to those who know him and respect what he's doing, those who show their respect by using what he's given them to do what he needs doing.

Lent is about getting to know the Master who invests us with His talents, His resources, His earth, His lost sheep, His pasture, & His Church. Lent is a deliberate choice to put us (rightly) in second place, and to signify that by way of fasting from something we would otherwise need or routinely use for ourselves. Lent is getting to know Him and getting focused on His work, His doings. It's using one of our key talents (time & time-management) for Him.

To be honest, this is the only reason I would ever sacrifice anything for Lent - to specially focus myself on the Master & His Church, to give up something important to me in order to focus more on Him. Any other reason at all, whether tradition, liturgy, duty, or whatever, seems to fall so short of what Lent could & should be for us. As Jesus told us, Sabbaths & Sabbath practices are for our benefit - to get us close to Him.

So we don't want to fall into the trap the last guy did, who thought he knew the Master, but didn't really. He presumed, he assumed, and the result was bad for him. He wasted the Master's time & talent. God has been incredibly good to us; He gives us abilities, He invests everything in us. Let's use Lent, and let's use every season, to honor what He's given us!



From the Pastor's Desk Ignatius, the pastor of the church at Antioch, had been convicted under the Roman Emperor Trajan for being a Christian. He was transported from Syria to Rome, where he would meet his end facing the "wild beasts" of the Colosseum.

During his travel to Rome, he stopped in Smyrna, where he was visited by the pastor & leaders of the church at Ephesus. Ignatius wrote a letter to the Ephesian Church, in which he included a beautiful poem about Jesus: "There is only one Physician —

Very flesh, yet Spirit, too; Uncreated, and yet born;

God-and-Man in One agreed,

Very-Life-in-Death indeed,

Fruit of God and Mary's seed;

At once impassible and torn

By pain and suffering here below:

Jesus Christ, whom as our Lord we know."

Maybe these were the words of an ancient hymn, or maybe Ignatius was a talented poet. Whichever the case, when I read this story, I was struck by the attitude of my fellow pastor. He's on his way to die. He's under a death sentence for professing his faith in Jesus rather than submitting to the god of Rome, the Emperor. And yet his entire letter centers not on his own situation, but instead focuses on taking care of the churches & pastors with whom he serves. Even on his way to die, Pastor Ignatius just wants to be a pastor.

Ignatius & his church lived in very dangerous times to be Christian. In those wild days between the deaths of the last Apostles and the conversion of Emperor Constantine, the Church faced frequent threats and challenges. There were always outsiders who hated the Church, pagans and religious people who viewed the Christians as a strange kind of threat to their lifestyles. There was the Roman Emperor's cult, a sort of government-worship where the authority of Rome itself was worshipped as god. Then, of course, there was that ancient spiritual enemy at work, Satan, who influenced people to try and corrupt the Church's beliefs.

In a lot of ways, we're incredibly blessed to live in a very different day and age from our post-Apostolic brothers & sisters. But we must never forget that, like Ignatius and his church, we too have enemies. There are atheists, pagans, & followers of false religions who love nothing more than to tear the Church down and celebrate the failings of Christians and their ministers. Just read any article written about a celebrity pastor's fall. There are those who believe—rather sadly—that government is the most important "god" or savior. They look to the government and its power for answers first, rather than to God. But above all else, never forget the reality of that ancient spiritual enemy Satan, still hard at work today.

The Apostle Peter, another pastor through & through, says, "Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice insofar as you share Christ's sufferings, that you may also rejoice and be glad when His glory is revealed" (1 Peter 4:12-13). But how can we do this? How can we rejoice in persecution or suffering? How can we help each other—like so many of our brothers and sisters today who are persecuted? What can we do?

Pastor Ignatius, under a Roman death-sentence for his faith, says to the Ephesians and indeed, to us, too: "*embrace His present grace*". Take what Jesus has given you—His love, His sacrifice, His power, His Cross, His family—and live in that in whatever situation you find yourself. Like the Ephesians, go to and pray for those under active persecution, praising God for their own peace, while asking for peace for their brothers and sisters, and using their resources to better the lives of those they can. Embrace His present grace; live in the Savior, rejoice and be glad—and He is glorified. *Hallelujah! - - Pastor Chris*





I often joke with my wife that I've become a little 'superstitious' about my laptop. After all, it's survived 3 moves, 3 kids, 3 churches, 3 operating systems, and 1 major car wreck - I can't even wear the same shoes after all that! So I put up with my laptop's little quirks and issues. One of the smallest quirks I've noticed about it is, after so many years, sermons, articles, and so on, I've got some rather "worn-looking keys" on the keyboard. Just look at my poor worn-out spacebar, for instance; I must bang on that thing all day long! Now, some keys on my & on every keyboard get used more than others - it's just that we don't always keep a computer long enough to see how it happens.

Sometimes we notice the same thing happening in places other than keyboards. Sometimes, in fact, we might feel like we're that lonely letter 'q', all the way up in the top corner, unnoticed, unappreciated, & unused. We look around the church and see others doing what they do & being applauded for it, and we feel like our contributions are so... insignificant. 'I'm not doing *that*,' we think, 'so what I'm doing must not be so important for the church.' We might even feel like just hanging it up and not doing anything at all. We might feel like we shouldn't speak up or we should simply sit & warm a pew and nothing else. But is that what God wants for us? Is that what our church needs from us? What should we do?

In his first sermon after Jesus' ascension, Peter one of the most-used & best known of Jesus' 1st Church says something curious. He quotes from the Old Testament about God's plan: "But this is what was uttered through the prophet Joel: 'And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams; even on my male servants and female servants in those days I will pour out my Spirit, and they shall prophesy" (Acts 2:16-18). God's plan, Peter tells us, incorporates both the young & old, the important & unimportant, the great & the small. God's plan, Peter says, is to send out & use every member of His Church!

Now my fear is, we've become so acquainted with the stories of the Bible that we've lost a little of the wonder of what's happening there outside the Temple in Acts 2. What Peter (& Joel before him) declares is that when God pours out His Spirit on His Church, He pours it out on each & every person who makes up that Church - therefore each & every person in the Church has an important, Holy-Spirit empowered job to do! In Joel's day, as in Peter's, certain people were considered more valuable than others. Yet God, throughout the Bible, is shown to use those "less valuable" people all the time to do incredible things!

Think about it - 12 untrained nobodies from Redneckville, Israel found an organization that lasts thousands of years! A farmer's youngest boy kills a giant & becomes the king! A braggart little kid whose own brothers can't stand him saves not only his own family, but an entire country! An unloving preacher rescues a major city from certain doom! You couldn't sell these stories to Hollywood, but this is the history of our faith!

This is something the Church has affirmed & reaffirmed throughout its history: "[The Holy Spirit] calls and anoints ministers for their holy office, qualifies all other officers in the church for their special work, and imparts various gifts and graces to its members. He gives efficacy to the word and to the ordinances of the gospel. By him the church will be preserved, increased, purified, and at last made perfectly holy in the presence of God"—Westminster Confession of Faith, 34.4 (EPC Modern Language Version). To put it plainly, God has equipped every single Christian in the Church - no one is left out, and no ministry goes unequipped, and no Christian is unneeded for his or her church!

So what does that mean? It means that <u>you</u> can do what God makes you & calls you & equips you to do! And the wonder of it all is that, no matter who 'you' are, you're called, equipped, & created by God to do something you alone can do for His Church! Listen to Peter & Joel - you're never too young or old, too male or female, too rich or poor, too free or enslaved. God has poured His Spirit on you! And so we as the Church are deliberately connected; we're like a body, or like my keyboard. We need each other, and without each other, we're not the Church we can be. So let's notice each other and appreciate how God has brought each of us into our fellowship and our ministries. We each have a role to play, and a God who equips each of us and all of us for the incredible work - work we can't even imagine - that He'll be accomplishing through us & our Church. Blessings! -- Pastor Chris



Dear Supporting Churches,

As the Easter season ends, may the truth that Jesus is alive encourage us and give us joy as we serve Him. The choir cantata "Hallelujah, Jesus Lives," which I just played with the choir, always stirs my emotions. His resurrection gives us hope and strength for each day and for the future.

I am writing this letter specifically for our supporting churches, but I will also include some of this information in the general letter that will be going out soon. This letter is being sent to you all because an immediate need has come to our attention, but we are also seeking to assist the San Pablo Seminary in a long-term capacity. We are seeking to help the Seminary form partnerships that will come alongside it and enable it to continually offer more possibilities to those who would like to train to serve the Lord as pastors or music ministers here in Yucatan and the rest of Mexico.

Most of you are aware of the exponential growth the Presbyterian Church has experienced in Mexico and especially our southeastern state of Yucatan. We often share of the difficulty in meeting the needs of the churches as most pastors have anywhere from two to four churches or congregations to tend to. There simply are not enough leaders and trained ministers to meet the needs of the growing church. At the same time, many of the churches are in remote village areas that are extremely poor and are scarcely able to support a trained pastor or to help someone within their community receive training to serve in their churches. I have mentioned in my recent letters that the San Pablo Seminary has reached a crisis situation. The declining economy of Mexico is the leading factor in the low number of incoming students- only 2 in the School of Theology and none in the School of Music. This has placed a terrific strain on the seminary's finances. Regular expenses like payment of salaries, maintenance and food can barely be met. In addition to this, the seminary property was rezoned last year from an agrarian communal property to a residential property. The re-assessed property taxes more than tripled what they used to be. Because the seminary was unable to pay the property tax bill at the end of last year, a fine has been imposed on the combined bills for last year and now this year. We fear that if something is not done to help the Seminary cover this debt, the entire property- including that upon which our home is built- will be lost. The Seminary board has begun the process of legal recognition as a "religious, non-profit association" which would lower future taxes significantly, but at this point they still owe approximately \$15,000 USD in fines and taxes.

Our family is planning to take out a loan to cover as much of this cost as possible, but we are sharing the situation with you in case you are able and feel led to help in some way. The immediate need is to help the seminary recover from the debt resulting from property taxes. The long-range need, however, is for churches and individuals to help us set up a scholarship fund in order to be able to offer scholarships to students who desire to receive training for ministry but lack the necessary funds to study and/or live here in Merida during the time they are studying. As full and partial scholarships are able to be offered, the Seminary would once again be able to meet its financial needs.

Daniel's church in St. Louis, MO, has agreed to be the conduit for any funds sent to assist the Seminary in this matter. They will not with-hold any percentage for handling charges and will issue tax-deductible receipts. Any gifts sent to this address, with a note on the memo line stating "Merida, San Pablo," will aid with the property tax situation and begin a scholarship fund: Covenant Presbyterian Church

I will be visiting some of you in June, specifically in the Detroit and Philadelphia areas, and I would be happy to answer any questions you may have regarding this matter. We are looking to the Lord to direct us and show us His will in this situation and all it entails. Dear Friends and Prayer Partners,

"When He comes, our glorious King, all His ransomed home to bring, then anew this song we'll sing: Hallelujah, what a Savior!"

The heat has caught up with us after a very warm winter, the hottest on record. It has been above 100 degrees for days. Since there is no rain, everything is extremely dry and easily catches fire. The wind caused a tree branch to touch the electric lines just outside of the Seminary and a spark landed on the grass and burned a large portion of it before it could be contained. Thankfully, no one was injured and the fire department was able to stop the fire before it reached the neighboring properties.

The School of Music is preparing for a 4-day music/liturgy conference to be held June 5th-8th with a 100-voice choir of current students and alumni. Graduation will follow on June 9th. We are praying there will be a larger incoming class in August. There were about 10 students who had expressed a desire to start their studies this year, however, when classes started in August there were only two new students in the School of Theology and none in the School of Music. The leading reason for this lack of enrollment is the declining economy that makes it difficult for students to pay tuition and living expenses while studying. The students who were able to enroll are from larger churches in cities where more jobs are available. The students from smaller villages and more remote areas are able to receive little, if any, financial support from their sending churches. The need for a scholarship fund to be set up through the Seminary is critical so that total or partial scholarships are able to be offered to those who need it. The lack of incoming students to the Seminary has put a tremendous strain on the Seminary. They are finding it difficult to pay teacher salaries, regular maintenance, and food for those who live on-campus. In addition to this, property taxes have tripled and have not been able to be paid since last year.

The Seminary is facing a debt of about \$15,000 USD in property taxes and fines, and we are seeking ways to pay it while helping to bring a long-term solution. We hope to start a regular scholarship fund that would enable students to enroll and finish their theological or music studies. The Seminary is also seeking legal status as a "religious, non-profit organization" in order to reduce their tax rates. Daniel's church has been actively participating in this crisis. They have agreed to be a conduit for assistance sent to help cover the property taxes and/or to start a scholarship fund. The church will issue tax-deductible receipts without charging a handling fee. Gifts designated to this cause could be sent to:

We have enjoyed the visit of Dr. Will Ackles the past two months. He has been here teaching two courses at the Seminary and helping in so many ways- chauffeuring, preaching, and serving communion to remote village churches. Since I now only drive to places that are less than a mile from home, his willingness to take me to stores, banks and places I am not easily able to get to was so appreciated.

The choir presented the Easter Cantata "Hallelujah, Christ is Alive," by John Peterson, in various churches near and far. I struggled to re-learn it because note-reading is practically impossible. A year from now, plans are being made to do a choir tour to the neighboring state of Chiapas (8-10 hrs. away) with the same cantata. I made the commitment to accompany the choir on that trip.

During the month of June I will be traveling to Michigan (June 10-19) and Pennsylvania (June 19-28) to visit supporting churches and friends. On July 15th, the camp Porvenir will celebrate 50 years at its present location. My son Daniel will be here with Alyssa, his 15 year-old daughter, as well as Mark and his family, and Debbie with hers. Daniel will be at home one week, and then a group of about 25 people from his church will be arriving to continue a construction project and assist with VBS in the village of Citilcum.

My life has been different this school year with no first year piano students to teach. It is amazing how quickly one's schedule fills up, though, and my days have been filled with oversight of the house, preparing simple instant oatmeal or cereal breakfasts for the seminary students, caring for Diego and taking him to nursery school, setting up for the evening suppers of on-campus seminary students, going to choir practice twice a week, playing the piano at church and also visiting village congregations on weekends. Debbie continues teaching in Merida Christian School (homeschool co-op) in the mornings, at Schoolhouse teaching English in the afternoons, and preparing suppers for 11 students in the evenings. Mark's church continues to grow. Ellie is doing well in her studies in PA, and John has joined a Bible School that meets at Mark's church on Saturday mornings. Daniel and his family in St. Louis also stay busy with school and sports schedules for my three grandchildren: Alyssa, Caleb and Owen. Daniel serves on the missions committee and as an elder at his church. It is a joy to see God's faithfulness to our children and their children, all serving Him through every activity in which they are involved.

2017 marks the 50th anniversary of our arrival in Mexico in 1967. Looking back over the years, I can see how God has sustained His work here, and caused it to expand. We place in His hands the solution for the Seminary and Camp and the sudden rise in property taxes for both. We know His kingdom here in Yucatan is growing tremendously. To Him be the glory and praise.

From the Pastor's Desk I can still remember the blizzard of 1988: I was in Starr-Iva Middle School at the time, and for Christmas I'd gotten a GI Joe snowmobile toy that I desperately wanted to try out on 'real' snow. I got my wish & then

some; it snowed on & off for a full week that year, and the snow stayed on the ground another full week. My cousin and I were able to roll a snowball from our yard down the hill into the woods that stayed there until almost April! We were out of school both those weeks. Of course, we paid a price for all that time off in winter—we had to go to school until June 10 that year. I think this is why some people say that no good thing goes unpunished.

There's something special about summer break, something so special that we hate to let go of it, even for a few days. I think it's part of our shared experience growing up & going to school, and being kids who ourselves looked forward to the freedom and fun of summer. Who didn't love summer trips to the pool (or pond), hanging out with friends to all hours, sleeping in, or going to the beach with family & friends? The idea of "summer" is more than just a hot time of the year—it's a symbolic or cultural symbol, in many ways. Summer is fun, summer is free, and we appreciate summer all the more because of the time we spent away from it before it happened.

Paul makes an interesting statement to the Galatian church in the first sentence of chapter 5 of his letter there: "For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and don't submit again to a yoke of slavery." This is perhaps one of the most beautiful verses in the Bible. David Platt says, "Paul wants his readers to live free. Christ has saved them 'to be free,' and in that freedom they are called to live" (Christ-Centered Exposition; Exalting Jesus in Galatians, 2014). What Paul is telling us is that Jesus' goal in freeing us from sin & death is to enable us to live free from sin & death.

It's like the difference between summer vs. winter: In the summer, the world is open, active, alive, warm & welcoming; in the winter, everything is closed, sleeping, dead, cold & barren. CS Lewis illustrated this beautifully in *The Lion, the Witch, & the Wardrobe* by contrasting the world of Narnia before and after the arrival of the Christ-figure Aslan. Before he comes, Narnia is a world of everlasting winter, and afterwards, it comes to life, filled with birdsong, activity, joy, and freedom from tyranny. In some ways, we've lost the sense of difference between the seasons, given our protections from the effects of the cold & winter—and maybe we've lost a little of the wonder of summer, too. But for the Galatians, the contrast would be remarkable. Winter is bondage & darkness; summer is freedom to go, to do, to live in the light.

And this is what Jesus wants for each & every one of us. He wants you and me to live our Christian lives in a sense of remarkable freedom. We're not bound to religious rules or enslaved to religious traditions that exist to protect us from the wrath of an angry God. No, instead, we're given liberty to live free from shame, from death, from despair, and from the misery of a life bound to sin. We're given the freedom to walk in the summer garden of life with God. We're given the freedom to make the right choices, to be forgiven for our wrong choices, and to be allowed to make corrections – and apologies – as the opportunities come to us. We don't have to obey God to save us from His wrath; we can love him & show that love by honoring Him as our Father.

So how do we appreciate the summer of our faith in Christ? The same way we appreciate the summers he gives us after the long winters in our lives. We get out in that life and live it; we "glorify and enjoy" God. And we invite family and friends, neighbors and coworkers to taste the freedom that Jesus gives us—freedom from sin, freedom from wrath, freedom from the winter of the soul. And this sort of freedom is the thing that will thaw out any blizzard. Hallelujah! -- Pastor Chris



Recap of 30 years of ministry in the world-wide task of Bible translation

In July 1987 Estelle and I and our five children went to Dallas, Texas to begin our training for ministry in Bible translation. A year later, in 1988, we went to Tucson, Arizona to work a one-year internship with our Mexico branch.



In 1991 we went to the small town of Mitla in the state of Oaxaca in southern Mexico. There we oversaw the administration of our translation study center and the maintenance of apartments, cars, and offices. Then in 1993 we came to Waxhaw to work at the JAARS Center, where we served in public relations and international shipping.

In **1997** I began doing in-depth exegetical research, preparing **exegetical study helps** for Bible translators in the field, working in 1 Peter, followed by 2 Corinthians, and Romans 1-8. During this time I also completed a Master's degree in Biblical studies at Reformed Theological Seminary in Charlotte, NC.



We moved to Nairobi, Kenya in 2005, where I taught Biblical Greek and Hebrew, Biblical exegesis,



language program planning, sociolinguistics, and Biblical cultures. It was a great experience for our family, just like our time in Mexico had been.

Then in **2007** we returned to **Waxhaw**, where I resumed exegetical research, completing the second volume on Romans (covering chapters 9-16), and two volumes on Matthew's gospel. From **2009** to **2011** I made five trips to **Nigeria** to work in three-week long translation workshops focusing on the Gospel of Luke. During this time Estelle has served as a bookkeeper in our housing office.

In **2013** I began dividing my time between exegetical research and working in **Maritime Services**, helping to get a boat ready for service in the islands east of **Papua New Guinea**. Things took a new turn in **2015** when I began doing **Old Testament** exegetical research, helping prepare exegetical study aids for translators focusing on the Old Testament lectionary readings. This enabled me to use my Hebrew and Latin skills, in addition to Greek, all of which I really enjoyed. In **2016** I discontinued work on the hoat devoting my efforts full-time once again to Biblical exercise. No



discontinued work on the boat, devoting my efforts full-time once again to Biblical exegesis. Now I divide my time between the book of Acts and the Old Testament lectionary project. Researching both Old and New Testament texts gives me some variety in the work, which helps keep me energized for each day's tasks.

In every one of our **thirty years of ministry** we have been supported by the gifts and prayers of partners who want to have a part in touching the world through this ministry. **Thank you for how you have enabled us to do what we do!**

Analyzing 'One like a Son of Man' in Daniel 7:14

As I was studying Daniel 7:14, which was written in Aramaic some five and a half centuries before Christ, I found that it has deep theological significance, as it introduces the title by which Jesus referred to himself more than any other. The Aramaic particle \triangleright ka 'like' indicates both that he is like a man, but also that he is not just a man. 'Coming on the clouds of heaven' shows that he is deity, because in over seventy passages in the Old Testament it is God alone who comes on the clouds. Jesus explicitly said that he, the Son of Man, would come in clouds of glory to judge mankind (Mark 13:26, 14:62; Matthew 19:28, 26:64).

Bible translation – a justice issue

Have you ever thought of Bible translation as addressing an injustice, as righting a wrong? We can say it is a justice issue because it everyone in the world should have access to God's truth in a language that they love and understand best. We should look at it as a basic human right. For too many years large segments of the world's population have had no vernacular scripture avail-




able to them. That picture is changing, and God is at work in many places around the world and using many people to right that wrong, but it will still be years before everyone has mother-tongue scripture available, whether in print format, or in audio or video format for those who don't read.

Where are they now?

When I was Nairobi I taught Hebrew, Greek, and Biblical exegesis to students from six African nations. Some of those are working in Bible translation today. Zachayo Swallo and Saul Lwilla (below, at right) are Lutheran pastors working in the Kinga translation project in Tanzania. Safari Mbughi (below, at left) is a Moravian pastor translating

in the Kindali language of Tanzania.

From the Pastor's Desk "The book of the genealogy of Jesus Christ, the son of David, the son of Abraham." –Matthew 1:1

Someone once asked, "Why do so many of the books of the Bible include genealogies? Why does it matter who begat whom, and that so-and-so is the father of some other person? Why does God want us to know about this sort of stuff? Does it really matter?"

Okay, I confess. It was me, quite a few years ago, admittedly. But I don't think I'm alone in having asked that question about the Bible. Take Numbers, for instance, 4th book of the Bible; its first half is a census report! Flip over to the New Testament, to the stories about Jesus we call Gospels: both Matthew & Luke include lengthy (and very different) lists of Jesus' ancestors. All throughout the Bible there are these interludes, these lists of families, these begats and begottens—what should we do with this information? Most of it refers back to the Old Testament anyway, so why should we bother reading or studying it anyway?

To tell the truth, these are the sections of the Bible that often 'get' people who try to read through the Bible over the course of a year. I personally wonder how many well-intentioned Christians' New Years' resolutions have come crashing down every February when they hit the book of Numbers—especially after plodding through the hundreds of laws and statutes in Leviticus. What's the point?

Yes, I know, we've all had preachers who, over our lifetimes, have told us these genealogical charts are beneficial in showing God's love & plan across entire generations of time. These charts also show us our own connections, both to history and to God's working throughout human history. It gives us comfort to see that God is always faithful, to our ancestors, to our parents, and—we can trust—to us, too. I've even *been* a preacher who's taught these very things! But what if there's something more God tells us through these genealogies... There's a great literary technique known as *foreshadowing*, and the reason this is a great literary technique is because it echoes so precisely our own experience with things. How many times has something happened to us, and we look back and can clearly see how that 'something' happened? How many times do we say to ourselves, "Of course, I should have known this was going to happen, look at everything that built up to it!" Writers capitalize on this real-life phenomenon and call it foreshadowing—showing what's going to happen by showing the build-up to that happening.

So when we read Jesus' genealogy and read he's the "son of Abraham" we can remember Abraham putting on his 'only begotten' son Isaac's back the wood on which he will surely die. When we read that he's the "son of David" we look back on how David's friends and subjects rejected him, and how lonely he was as he walked through the gates of Jerusalem. We see the echoes of Jesus' life & ministry throughout the pages of the Old Testament, from Ruth's faithfulness to Perez' surprising birth. And as far as those seeming 'nobodies,' those names not associated with any actual histories, in them we can see how Jesus' story encompasses *everybody*—from the great & powerful King Solomon to the humble Nazareth carpenter Joseph.

So as we come to this month, a month steeped in the history & traditions of our own great nation, let's make some time to look back over the story of the people of the Bible. They aren't just names to God any more than we're just names to Him. They're the lives for whom Jesus did his work. They're the foreshadowing of the great ministry of the Greatest Missionary—Christ Jesus himself. Those who went before us show how we, too, are and will be an ongoing part of Jesus' eternal ministry; and to that we say, "Hallelujah!"



From the Pastor's Desh When I was a little boy, one of my very favorite toys (just after my He-Man collection) was a box of those little green toy soldiers, or as I called them "Army Men". I think I enjoyed them so much because they were (and still

are) an incredibly adaptable toy. You could use them with matchbox cars, having them direct traffic, or fight them against toy dinosaurs (I wonder if that's what inspired *Jurassic Park*?), or maybe put them on building-block forts. No matter what other toys I had out, those little "Army Men" could adapt. We've been in Bishopville now for 2 full years - Wow! As we think about our 2nd anniversary here, we can't help but think about all the ways we've adapted to each other. Me & my family have adapted to flat, straight roads, a somewhat "warm" climate, and just a few drops of rain every now and then. You, our church family, have adapted to my style of preaching, my "quirky" sense of humor, and my indulgence & enjoyment of the many, many great cooks we have here in our church family. Isn't being adaptable a great thing?

When I was in school they taught us that adaptability was one of the indicators that a creature would be able to survive. A plant or animal that could readily adapt to changes in its home or climate would outlast one that couldn't. I still remember the picture of the moth in my old science book that adapted to blend into tree bark that had been scorched by fire compared to a moth that didn't - it really stood

out. I'm sure the birds in that region called those un-adapted moths "dinner".

Adaptability is, believe it or not, critically important for the Church, too. Paul, in 1 Corinthians 9.19-23, says, "For though I am free from all, I have made myself a servant to all, that I might win more of them. To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though not being myself under the law) that I might win those under the law. To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (not being outside the law of God but under the law of Christ) that I might win those outside the law. To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, that I may share with them in its blessings."

Did you catch that? "I have become all things to all people." In other words, Paul says, "I adapted." Now this begs some very good questions. How did Paul adapt? What did Paul adapt? Why did Paul adapt? The "how" of Paul adapting is what we might call "culture" or "style". He fit his message to his target audience. This should be something we're all used to - businesses have been adapting messages this way for decades. You can watch commercials for the same product on 3 different TV shows - let's say, for toothpaste. On the kid's TV show, the toothpaste is the "awesome-est!", on a soap-opera, it'll help you get a kiss from Mr. Right, and during the news, the toothpaste advertises its facts. 3 different settings, 3 different approaches, but 1 message: "Buy this toothpaste." This is what Paul does with the

Gospel.

This leads to the "what"- Paul only adapts how he preaches Jesus Christ & Him crucified. He *does not change* the message. Paul adapts the message so that his audience will understand that their sins will only go away, their broken self-God relationship will only heal through the work of Jesus on the Cross. Paul doesn't water it down, but he changes his approach to accomplish the purpose for which he says he was called to preach & adapt the Gospel for the people to whom he's preaching & adapting

the message.

So "why" does Paul adapt the Gospel message to the different audiences to whom he preaches? Why is he "Jewish" to Jews or "law-bound" to legalists or "Roman" to Romans or whatever else fits into "all things for all people"? This is easy: Paul adapts the Gospel so that Jews, legalists, Romans, and all other types of people out there will hear the Gospel, and some of them will respond and be saved. So how can we adapt? We need to follow Paul's example - don't waver or change the Gospel, but change how we're preaching it. We need to reconsider the words, the tone, or the style we're currently using, and see how well it's doing - and how we can adapt & improve on what we're doing. Jesus adapted to us, and He gives us a great opportunity to share Him, His story, and His amazing, grace-filled love with people who, Lord willing, will adapt & love Him like we do.

So I passed this car the other day that had one of those provocative bumper stickers - you know the type, the kind of message that provokes "knee-jerk" responses. In this case, the sticker said, "God's not a Republican" and you & I PASTOR'S DESK both know the 2 sorts of immediate replies that person's sticker gets. It's either

someone yelling, "Yeah, you tell them!" or, just as likely, "Oh yeah, well He sure isn't a Democrat, so there!"

My kids will tell you, I'm not a big fan of bumper stickers of any sort, not political, not humorous, not even religious. I guess I come by this honestly—Daddy used to tell us, "There's no better way to wreck the trade-in value of your car." You know, I don't really know if he was citing facts, or if he was just telling us that to keep me & my siblings from decorating his cars...

Getting back to that bumper sticker about God's or Jesus' potential political affiliations, I got to thinking about something Jesus said in John 18. There He is, standing before the representative of the most powerful authoritative force the world had ever known at that time, and he says to that representative, that brutal, authoritarian governor Pilate, "My kingdom? My kingdom doesn't belong to this world."

That takes a little "unpacking": It could be that Jesus is simply saying He doesn't affiliate with any earthly nation or power. It could be that Jesus is saying He is the ruler of a nation that transcends the world itself or it could be that Jesus is saying a little bit of both - and that there's an overlap between the two.

Here's what Jesus says: He's the King of a Kingdom that exists both in Heaven and on Earth. That means that the people who make up His Kingdom are both in Heaven and on Earth—they're dual citizens, people of 2 worlds at the same time. This makes perfect sense, as Jesus Himself, in His perfect humanity and His perfect divinity, is the King of both this world and the world to come, or what we call Heaven. Jesus' kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, a permanent kingdom, a kingdom greater than any power that's limited simply to this world - even the most powerful nations that have ever existed, whether we're talking about ancient Egypt, Rome, or modern-day America or China. Nothing stacks up to the power and the nation over which Jesus is King.

So what does that mean for us?

Peter, in his first letter, a man who himself sat at the feet of the King to learn what it meant to be a citizen of both Heaven and Earth, writes this: "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people He claims as His own in order that you will shout His excellence—for He called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." Think about what Peter's saying. This is a man who'd been a blue-collar fisherman, a nobody in a nowhere backwater place. This is a man who'd failed, and failed big in not just one instance, but several times. This is a man who was imperfect and knew it.

But he knew he'd been chosen by the God-King Jesus - personally.

He knew he'd been given a clear purpose to bring people into the God-King's love & kingdom.

He knew that he'd been made holy by the God-King himself - in other words, that all his mistakes, all his failures, and all his imperfections were erased by Jesus.

And He knew that what the God-King Jesus had done for him, for Peter, he would do for anyone & everyone who looked to this King & Kingdom that are greater than any political party, power, nation, tribe, family, or people. Jesus offers hope, love, reconciliation to everyone, no matter who they are, where they've come from, or what they've done. Who knows - that might be worth a bumper sticker after all.

Dear Prayer Partners,

On a warm July day in 1967, having been commissioned in the Ward Presbyterian Church in Detroit, David and I started our drive to Yucatan, Mexico, ready to serve the Lord in whatever way He would lead. We had no idea how or where God would use us, but trusting in Him, and seeing the great need for pastors, we decided to dedicate our lives to train and educate the leaders of the growing national Presbyterian church of Mexico in theology and music. Today, fifty years later, I can say with Samuel, "The Lord has helped us all the way." (I Samuel 7:12)

The San Pablo Seminary, celebrating 35 years since its founding, has graduated hundreds of pastors and music ministers. This year was a low point, but it appears there may be at least 15 new students entering mid-August. We have begun to see a response to our prayers for a scholarship fund that would enable many who lack the monetary resources to be able to come and begin their ministerial training. The gifts received for this purpose have been a leading factor in the increased enrollment for the upcoming year and we are thankful for all who have made it possible through your prayers and also through your giving. Tuition is about \$100 per month, as is their room and board. On-campus students only receive their noon meal as part of their room and board, so Debbie is once again lining up support to help offer these students an evening meal at our home. The cost of the dinners is about \$1.50 per student and there will probably be between 10 and 15 on-campus students this coming semester. Debbie is seeking those who would volunteer their time, or be willing to donate food or even money towards the preparation of the evening meals. The property taxes still loom over us. We have until the end of this calendar year to pay the \$15,000 owed, and we have secured about \$7,000 toward that goal up to now. Thanks again for your part in helping us reach this goal!

On July 15th, we celebrated the 50th anniversary of camp Porvenir at its present location. I remember sitting on the sand dunes, expecting our 1st child Mark (born in November of 1967) and wondering about the future. The camp has been greatly used by the Lord to speak to hearts, to confirm calls to serve Him, and to present Jesus to people of all ages. I could never have imagined all that God was going to do in these 50 years. Mark has a group at camp this week of about 250 people. Many decisions are being made each day. In the upcoming weeks, the camp board will host two more camps: one for children and one for young people. We look to God to supply the many needs camp presents. He has been faithful time and time again to provide what was needed in every season.

My son Daniel and his 15 year—old daughter, Alyssa, were here until last week. They arrived in time for the camp celebration where he was one of the speakers. Last week he led a group of 24 from his church in St. Louis who were doing construction work at our Presbytery's retreat center in the village of Citilcum. This is their fourth summer helping with this project and it looks so different from when they began!

My trip to the U.S. in June was a good break from activities here, and an opportunity to see old friends and visit some supporting churches. I thank the Lord for enabling me to get everywhere without problems, and for all the wonderful experiences I had. I re-live each moment when I look through my photos. The trip home was very tiring - 20 hours from the time I got up in Pennsylvania until I was in my bed here in Merida. As much as I enjoyed my time away, it was good to be home again.

When I arrived home, I hit the ground running. The Sac-Be Presbytery meeting was held July 4th to the 6th, in the town of Sudzal (about an hour from Merida.) I was able to sell \$500 of books and Bibles and enjoyed the food end fellowship with everyone there. Upon returning, however, I developed a terrible headache that seems to be the result of bad sleeping posture on my folding cot while I was away at the Presbytery meetings. This caused strained ligaments and pressure on the nerves in the cervical vertebrae, and the pain was so severe I was hardly able to move. After visiting the doctor, and couple weeks of medication to reduce swelling and pain in my neck, I am doing much better now. I guess hammocks as well as cots are out of the question for me when I travel.

In all this, as I said at the beginning, the Lord has led us all the way these 50 years. I know He is faithful and will continue to do so.

If we could see beyond today, as God can see. If all the clouds would roll away, the shadows flee. O'er present griefs we would not fret, each sorrow we would soon forget, For many joys are waiting yet For you and me.

If we could see, if we could know, we often say. But God in love, a veil doth throw across our way. We cannot see what lies before and so we cling to Him the more, He'll lead us 'till life is o'er, Trust and obey.

Technology – friend or foe?

Have you every been frustrated by your computer, your smart phone, your GPS, or some other gadget that seemed to have a mind of its own? Many of us have had those moments, and some of us routinely seem to have a less-than-satisfying relationship with electronic gadgets. But however frustrating these devices may be to people who are less technically inclined, they have enabled a great leap forward for the work of Bible translation.


The Digital Bible Library—A Gutenberg Moment

Those of us working in Bible translation ministry are committed to the goal of ending Bible poverty. We believe that it is unjust for people not to have access to the Bible in a language they understand well and which touches them emotionally – in other words, in the language of their heart, their mother tongue.

But how can we speed up the pace of getting the Bible to those left waiting? Over 1 billion people don't have access to God's word in their own language, either because it has not been translated for over 2,000 languages, or because people don't have access to it for other reasons. While there may be Bibles or Scrip-

ture portions in a particular language, some people still might not be able to read it, either because the printed Scriptures are not available in the area where they live, or possibly because they are not able to read in their own language. It could also be because their cultures primarily use oral communication, or even because of blindness.

The good news is that due to **new technology**, much progress is being made. As part of the effort to end Bible poverty, the **Digital Bible Library** has been developed in a joint effort by several organizations as a repository for all digitized forms of translated Scripture. This library makes it possible for Bibles from around the globe to be digitized and stored in one place. Now ministries anywhere can access all this material, making Scripture easy to print, easy to release to audio or video, and easy to put on mobile devices.

The Digital Bible Library now hosts 590 Bible texts, but by next year over 1000 texts should be available. It is hoped that within twenty years Scripture in every language on earth will be there.

When Johannes Gutenberg invented a printing press with moveable type, that new technology made the Bible available in a way undreamed of before. The message of the Bible crossed borders, shifted power structures, and transformed cultures. Now because of the Digital Bible Library, the next Gutenberg moment is right in front of us.

Our Gutenberg moment means that God's word will become available for every heart in every tribe in every nation.

More on technology—the Translator's Workplace

The Translator's Workplace is a rather large library on CD with multiple translation tools, including Bible commentaries, Hebrew and Greek Scripture, and many versions of the Bible in various majority languages spoken around the world. Linguistic and exegetical resources are also available with the click of a mouse. The six volumes of exegetical summaries I have authored have been included on Translator's Workplace as well, providing translators in the field with instant access to a summary of a substantial cross–section of commentary opinion. Nearly all Bible translators around the world from all translation agencies make use of Translator's Workplace. In this tool we find that technology has been a tremendous friend and ally.

One more graduate



Here's a quick question: How many of you really, really love speed limits? Okay, how about zoning regulations? How many of you rush right out to the library to read the latest city ordinances, savoring every detail of them more than you would any novel or book? Huh... I seem to hear crickets chirping in my office.

Have you ever read Psalm 119 (which is not only the longest psalm, an acrostic covering all 22 Hebrew letters, and is also the longest chapter in the entire Bible at 176 verses) and wondered who in the world would write a love song about the Law?

Of course, we understand the important distinction between laws, speed limits, ordinances, zoning regulations and God's Law. Of course, we know that God's Law is vastly more important, farther reaching, longer lasting, and significant than any & all human laws. But the question still remains, do we love God's Law, really & truly - particularly to the extent that we'd write the Law a 176 verse-long love song? Why would anyone do that?

The thing is, Psalm 119, while the longest, is definitely not the only place in the Bible where someone talks about their love for God's Law - Paul does in Romans 7, and David himself does in Psalm 40. There he sings, "I delight to do your will, O my God; your law is within my heart." God's Law, he sings, is both his delight and his love. David celebrates the Law.

What's important for us to understand is why - why does David celebrate the Law so poetically? Why does Paul? Why does God expect his people to sing about his Law? To fully understand how we could & should love God's Law, we need to understand what the Law truly is - and this is where the Bible, as usual, is its own best interpreter. To truly understand the purpose & nature of the Law, we turn to Hebrews chapter 10. There, we find the Law is a shadow of the good thing that has come - Jesus Christ.

I bet I'm not alone in this: Do you remember grade school art, the day we all stood in front of that lamp and made shadow portraits, or silhouettes? Our faces would cast a shadow, and the teacher or someone else would trace our features onto the pages, and do you remember how proud your mom was to get that picture of you?

For David, for Moses, for Abraham, and for the people of the Old Testament, the Law served as a silhouette, a shadow portrait cast by the light of Christ Jesus. Using the Law, they could see the character, the nature, the sacrifice, and the love of a Savior who *would appear* hundreds, and in some cases thousands of years prior to his arrival. The Law was a shadow revealing the Savior to come - and so when they delighted in the Law, they were really delighting & loving the portrait of the Christ to come.

For Paul - and for you & me - the Law serves a similar, but different function. The Law is still a shadow portrait, but for us it outlines or emphasizes the Savior who *has appeared*. It shows us his full participation in our humanity, and the depths of his perfect obedience to God's expectations. The Law also gives us an outline to seek after - a way we can echo Jesus. It's like that old game show "Hole in the Wall." Jesus has gone through before us, and we can follow his way.

So maybe we should look for ways we, like David & Paul, can wax poetic and maybe even sing about God's Law. After all, like us, it's the product of the light that our Savior Christ Jesus projects for us.



NEWS from our Pakistani EPC Missionaries

We arrived back in Pakistan middle of August and have settled in nicely. Lynn and the girls are underway with the next year of homeschooling and seem to be off to a great start. The weather is still in the high 90's during the day and that means that our AC is still running non-stop. We are thankful that the nights are cooler and we enjoy time together as a family sitting out under the stars and occasionally a good game of hide and seek!

Next week we will travel to London, to co-host a group of PMA pastors for a short-term mission trip (Oct 3-11). The emphasis is on giving them a "Taste of Pakistan...in London" With the security situation currently in country, it is not advisable to host a group of western folks here, but since London has a Pakistani expat community of 1.2 million, it makes it a nice location to give our churches a little taste of what we experience (culture, food & language) working within this community. Our focus for this time together will be to deepen the relationship between us (field team) and the PMA (home team). We are grateful for the PMA getting behind us in such a way and making this effort to be with us. Our prayer desire is that the vision to reach the Punjabi people will go beyond Pakistan into the UK and US (both have large Punjabi populations). For this vision to be accomplished, the Lord has provided dear brothers like Alvin Kallicharran, the former West Indian cricket captain to come along side us. Alvin will accompany us in the UK.



Asaph continues investing in the cricket club leaders. This week we have had 4 leaders here in Lahore for a time of fellowship. These guys were so happy to be together with Asaph again. This year, Asaph bought them each a new pair of athletic shoes from the US, the joy on their faces was indescribable. One of the guys said that he was saving his pair to wear for Christmas!



This coming year we expect to see the ongoing development of the Serve Pakistan cricket field in Clarkabad. Newly planted trees and plants have made a nice boundary around the playing field and the more the boys water the field, the greener it gets. We are thankful that we have a place for all 9 of the Serve Pakistan cricket clubs to play and host matches. Serve Pakistan clubs are co-hosting a major tournament between PCB (Pakistan Cricket Board) registered teams in Faisalabad during the month of October. Also a Serve Pakistan junior tournament is taking place in late September in Lahore. Please pray for both of these events.

Asaph is an ordained Teaching Elder in the EPC. He is the son of a Presbyterian pastor and comes from a family that accepted Christianity in Central Asia four generations ago. He is discipling young men through sports clubs (cricket). His prayer is for a strong indigenous church that will be a light in a dark place. Lynn has previously served as a medical missionary in Central Asia. That is where Lynn and Asaph met. They have two daughters, Leah and Emma. Lynn is homeschooling their daughters as well as consulting with several Christian hospitals in the area of public health outreach.

It's November - What are you thankful for?

I bet you remember having to write your answer to that question back when you were in elementary school. I know I did (at least once every year), and I know my kids have. As the comedian James Gregory says, "It might be a

law, I don't know." Maybe it's because Thanksgiving is called (very often) a uniquely American tradition & holiday that we (culturally speaking) want to teach our kids to practice, well, giving

thanks. It's important, it's tradition, &, in a powerful sense, it's Christian.

The reason I say that is that we, as Christians, are a part of God's ongoing relationship with human beings, a relationship that started at our creation, & developed through the people of the Old Testament. Now, I noticed something interesting about that relationship that seems to contradict what I said in my first paragraph there - I said that Thanksgiving is often called a uniquely American tradition. The thing is, when we study the Bible we find out that it's not "uniquely" American at all. Thanksgiving is a part of our connection with God, & has been since the very beginning. As a matter of fact, God gives His people a tradition for Thanksgiving all the way back in Leviticus 7 - that's the 7th chapter of the 3rd book of the Bible, so we're going wa-a-ay back, thousands of years ago.

"And this is the law of the sacrifice of peace offering that one may offer to the Lord" (Leviticus

7:11; the passage goes on, through verse 18).

Leviticus tells us there are 3 types of these peace offerings: Thanksgiving offerings, Vow offerings, and Freewill offerings. The way God's people made these offerings was to bake some bread & some cookies (or wafers), and take it, along with a meat-offering, to the priest. Then, that person would either eat the cooked meat & bread with the priest that very day, or would save part of it until the next day (for the vow & freewill offerings). Sound familiar? Now, to understand the mechanics of this, you wouldn't just run up to the priest, out of the blue, to make this kind of offering-you'd work it out with family (at a bare minimum), possibly even your extended family. You'd be eating meat & bread, with plenty of oil, and you'd be eating it with your church family, as well. Meat, stuffing, family, church, & overeating? Sure sounds like Thanksgiving to me. Now, stop & really think about it - when Moses writes Leviticus, God's people didn't have those things yet. They were pilgrims. They were wanderers, exiles from the land they'd once known, all because of their faith. And yet, God, in giving them this Law about this peace offering is doing something incredible - He's telling them, "Look! You don't have it yet, but one day you'll be in such a position to sit around your table in peace, with your friends, family & fellow believers, and you'll have plenty to eat, plenty to enjoy!"

So this November, when you & I sit around our tables, when we see family & friends, delicious foods piled high and plenty, will we remember Leviticus 7? Will we remember to be thankful for & to the God who gives us the peace to have a whole day of Thanksgiving? I think we will.


Storm and shipwreck in Acts 27

For part of the last month I have been doing the exegetical summary of **Acts 27**. That chapter contains an intriguing and fairly detailed account of a prolonged storm at sea that ended in shipwreck for Paul, Luke, and 274 other people on board a ship bound for Rome. The account actually begins many chapters before that with Paul's friends begging him not to go to Jerusalem because of what they expected would await him there. And sure enough, Paul was mobbed in the temple, then he was the object of an assassination plot, and then he spent two years in prison in Caesarea, plus two more in Rome awaiting an eventual acquittal on the charges against him. But in between Caesarea and Rome was this sea voyage.

From a **literary standpoint** Luke's account of the two-week long storm and the shipwreck make for a gripping story. From winds and water currents, to sailors ready to abandon ship, or soldiers wanting to kill the prisoners, Luke describes one crisis after another, keeping readers on the edge of their seats as the drama unfolds.

From a **theological standpoint**, his purpose is to show how God overruled even the fury of a hurricane-force storm to get Paul to Rome to give testimony before the emperor, and in the process spared the lives of hundreds of other people aboard the same ship. Unable to know where they were at sea, and unable control the ship due to the fury of the winds, they came purely by the sovereign grace of God to a relatively small island in a very large sea. The probability of that happening strictly by chance is less than if you were trying to hit the bull's eye in a target a hundred yards away blindfolded.

But from an **exegetical standpoint** — which is where I come in — there are a lot of words in this chapter that don't occur anywhere else in the Greek New Testament, some related to ships and sea navigation, some to wind and weather, and some to geography. They need to be defined well, and the track the ship followed and the process of the sailors dealing with the storm need to be described well so the translator can communicate clearly to speakers of minority languages who have never read this account before, and in some cases, to people who have never seen the sea or even a sailing ship before.



From a personal standpoint we can take heart that God's purposes in our lives will be guided by a hand that is stronger than the storms that rage around us.

Retirement plans?

We currently have no plans for retirement. For myself, I hope to continue working as long as my health holds out. The knowledge and skills I gain through my study is, of course, cumulative, and I would hate to let any of that go to waste, so I will work as long as I can. Sometimes I have problems with eye fatigue from looking at the computer monitor and reading books all day. But as long as my eyesight and general health hold up, I hope to be able to continue on until I am in my 70's. I am 64 years old now, and hope that I still have another six or eight years to contribute to Bible translation.

How are we doing?

For the most part we are managing well, but we have had some challenges. One is the burden of debt that has grown over the years from having had more expenses than we were prepared to meet. This summer, for example, we have had several thousand dollars in car repairs and several thousand dollars in medical bills from a brief hospital stay for Estelle in July. Fortunately she recovered quickly from that and is doing well managing medications and monitoring blood sugar.

We hope that in the coming year we will be able to relieve expenses from medical insurance by going on Medicare, then two years from now by drawing social security. For now we would ask for your prayers as we navigate the reefs and storms of daily living that we, like you, continue to face.

Scripture celebration

On Tuesday, September 12, we held a celebration at the JAARS Center for the 31 Scriptures and Scripture portions that had been dedicated in the previous year. Twenty-five of these were New Testaments, and six were entire Bibles. All together these publications provide greater access to the word of God for 4,435,000 speakers of minority languages.

It was a wonderful celebration!

Every few years, I take out our copy of *The Chronicles of Narnia* and read it to the kids. If you or your kids have never read those 7 books before, I strongly recommend them! It amazes me that, even though my kids have heard these "Christian fairy tales" over & over, they look forward to reading them every time. Interestingly enough, there's a famous line (& entire scene) in C.S. Lewis' first of the Chronicles, *The Lion, the Witch, and the Ward-robe*, devoted to this season we've entered, to Christmas. Lucy, the book's main character, is told that in Narnia, it is "Always winter and never Christmas; think of that!"

I think Lewis captured perfectly, in that simple phrase, not only the desperate longing of

any 1st Century believer, but our own sense of anticipation & need. Haven't we all had those moments when it seemed like our lives were all about winter, but never Christmas? Haven't we all had those times of waiting & watching, but getting nowhere? Haven't we all needed some ray of light, some encouragement, some good word or good news to keep us going? Haven't we all needed Christmas to keep the winter's cold from getting to us? That's why, in Lewis' book, Lucy & her friends are so cheered with Father Christmas arrives with the news that the King is on his way! So we read that story, I hope we hear in his triumphant shout, "Merry Christmas! Long live the True King!" the echoes of our own hope in the midst of the winter of our lives. Maybe that's why the angel's loud shout resonates with us just as much as it did those 1st Century shepherds outside Bethlehem:

"Fear not! Behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people, for unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord!"

Those shepherds had been waiting, whether they could express it or not, for that kind of good news. Those magi in the East, staring up at the night skies had been aching to see his star rise. Simeon & Anna, Elizabeth & Zechariah, John the Baptist, even Mary & Joseph, they all had been living through the long, cold night of winter, waiting & watching—and now, in the fullness of time, good news of great joy for all of them had arrived: Christ Jesus the King has come! The long, dark winter's power is broken by triumphant joy.

I think that's why we've adopted winter as the season that best suits Christmas. We hear the arguments every year from those outside (& many inside) the Church: Jesus wasn't born in December, he was born in March! And that may be true, but when we celebrate his arrival in the depths of winter, we join with those celebrants of the first Christmas, to whom, after 400 long years of silence, God was finally speaking again. What could be more appropriate or more seasonable than that?

Now what should that mean for you & me? As Christians, we're not immune from troubles (Jesus said troubles would come in John 16), suffering (Rev 2), or other forms of "winter" in our lives. How will we endure them? Without hope—as if nothing will ever change, as if all we have is misery, depression, sorrow, or hunger? Always winter? Never Christmas? Or will we turn our ears towards the voice of the angel's shout—"For you, child of winter, the King has been born!"

Jesus Christ has come—it's Christmas at last! Let's live in the joy of that good news & glad tidings. Let's show the watchers & waiters out there that joy rises, even in the midst of winter. Let's show that these things we face, though not trivial or inconsequential at all, pale in comparison to the joy that has been revealed to us in the coming of a Savior who died to make us sinless & rose again to give us a future & a home.

Merry Christmas! Long live the True King!



Guatemala Sewing Mission

Update from Julie Cothran...
Just wanted to share with you about my knitting project. I've been knitting neck warmers for about 4 1/2 years and three times

a year they are hand carried to Guatemala to be distributed. This is part of the Guatemala Sewing Mission, which buys peddle machines for the ladies (these people live in a remote mountainous region, so it's cold at night, year round). The Mission also has sewing schools in two different villages where the ladies learn to tailor and embroider on the machines. There is no electricity in these villages. In November when I mailed the neck warmers, to the lady who delivers them, I included some scarves and knit hats I had picked up at thrift stores.
