The SCROLL



Being the end of 2018 and beginning of 2019, I took a little bit of time to go back over the messages I've been preaching these past few years. I noticed some trends: In 2015, most of my messages were from John's Gospel; in 2016, they came from the Revelation. In 2017, I bounced back & forth between the Old & New Testaments, focusing a lot on

Paul's writings and the Minor Prophets; and in 2018, I ended up preaching a lot of "1sts"—you know, 1st Peter, 1st John, 1st Thessalonians. So, I looked at these messages and I wondered from where do we go now? Where should I begin in 2019?

Well, there are a few issues to consider. One, only a mere *16 weeks* into 2019—and Easter happens! It's hard to think about, but the span between Christmas & Easter is relatively short, and I want to make the best of this *"between-events"* part of the year. Two, I've been dealing with a real sense of conviction that what I need most to work on as your minister is *discipleship*. The story of our faith is always one of discipleship, from the teaching & mentoring both commanded in Deuteronomy and exhibited between Moses & Joshua, to the 12, 150, & thousands that make up the church in Acts. Three, I think there's nothing better to start off the year than to jump (again) into the story of Jesus, *the Gospel*.

So where could I go to find something that would last 16 weeks, give me a good foundation to think about, learn & preach discipleship, and would be filled with the story of Jesus? Problem, meet your solution: *The Gospel of Saint Mark!*

At 16 chapters, Mark's is the shortest story about Jesus' ministry. It doesn't include Christmas, it hardly mentions Easter (*the Resurrection*), and throughout the book Jesus seems to be constantly running. A teacher of mine (*a Mark himself*) once quipped that, in Mark's story, Jesus seems to be an arrow flying through the air towards "the straight & sure bullseye of the Cross." I love that quote. Though it doesn't say so itself, the Church has, for 1000s of years, understood this little book to be Peter's own story, told to his friend Mark. This is the same Mark who deserted Paul in Acts and had Barnabas stand up for him when he repented, and possibly even the "youth" who fled naked from Gethsemane when Jesus was arrested.

In terms of the "story" itself, Mark's Gospel is a bit different from the others. Matthew wants to connect Jesus' story to the Old Testament. Luke wants to show how Jesus connected with Gentiles, women & children (*the "little people"*). John wants to connect Jesus to His Divine Nature—very God of very God, and so forth. For Mark, though, it's hard to see that goal, that connection. In his Gospel, Jesus seems to be "*Messiah incognito*"— the unrecognized Son of God. The crowds, the religious leaders, even his own disciples all misunderstand Jesus, all fail to fully connect with him. Only the devils (*and Mark is full of exorcisms*) and a Roman centurion seem to fully realize who they're dealing with. Maybe this is why Jesus seems to be in such a hurry (*he's "immediately" doing everything & going everywhere*) in Mark's Gospel—he's got to get to the place where he can fix all these broken connections!

So you & I might say that Mark wants to connect people who don't understand with the One they need most to understand, the One whose connection they need most. Mark wants to connect Jesus to you & me! Like us, Mark is a "next generation" disciple—he was taught by people who learned it before him. And, like us, Mark is a "*next generation*+" disciple-maker—he uses his gifts, his resources, his time & talents to teach the people who come after him.

In light of where we're going, I want to challenge all of us: Let's take these 16 weeks between now & Easter, and let's do something special with them. (1) Let's all *commit to read Mark's Gospel*, and not just to read it, but to study it deeply, 1 chapter in 1 week, between now & Easter. (2) Let's all *commit to discipleship*; to find somebody and study Mark together with them. Let's connect with each other, or with people in the community around us, in our families, our neighborhoods, our workplaces, or whatever spheres of influence we have. Let's invite somebody to be a part of our learning together what Mark has to say, not just to the Church as a whole, but to each & every one of us.

To help make these 2 things happen, my Sunday afternoon Bible study will focus on Mark's Gospel, and I'm going to commit to bringing us all the resources I can put my hands on that will help us learn, study, & grow in our own discipleship & disciple-making. Please keep me in your prayers, as these are exciting waters we're jumping into together, and I'll keep you all in mine.

The SCROLL

A few years back, Laura & I were eating in Hickory when we had one of those "what is wrong with you?" moments. You know, that moment when all you can do is cock your head to the side, raise your eyebrow, and, with incredulity ask someone, "What is wrong with you?" It happened at a pancake restaurant when she & I watched a group at a table,

one-by-one, walk out on their unpaid bill. Laura looked at me, and I looked at her, and we both looked at the table full of empty plates and said, "Did that really just happen?"

Sometimes we Christians get this picture in our heads about Jesus - how he looked, what his voice sounded like, or whether or not he liked gravy with his grits (what messiah wouldn't?). But I've noticed over the years that, when we start putting together our mental images of Jesus, we tend to leave a couple of things out. There are some things we could imagine about Jesus, but we wouldn't because... well, because they wouldn't be "Jesus-like" in the normal way in which we view Jesus.

Maybe I'm not being clear. Let's try a mental exercise - conjure up Jesus in your mind... now make him laugh. Not just some holy smile, not some divine chuckle, but one of those genuinely belly-busting laughs. What did that look like? Now think about Jesus as a 10 year-old boy, climbing a tree. Now picture Jesus, standing and looking with incredulity and anger at something wrong - imagine Jesus having a "What is wrong with you?" moment.

You probably think I've lost my mind - but bear with me. Early on in Mark's Gospel, Jesus shows up at church, finds a wounded man, and heals him. Nothing special, right? This is just what Jesus does, right? But look at what Mark says: "Jesus said to them, 'Is it lawful on the Sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to kill?' But they were silent. And he looked around at them with anger, grieved at their hardness of heart, and said to the man, 'Stretch out your hand.'" (Mark 3:4-5, ESV)

What happened was this - Jesus & his disciples, on their way to church, picked some grain and ate it. His disciples were hungry, what all the travelling, preaching, & healing they'd been doing, and so they picked some grain to chew on. Some Pharisees, also travelling with Jesus, went to Jesus to complain, to which Jesus responded, "The Sabbath was made for people, not the other way around." So they get to church, and there, in the church, is a man with a withered hand - and the Pharisees cluck their tongues, narrow their eyes and wait. You see, according to their theologians, to heal someone on the Sabbath was an even bigger no-no than plucking grains. Jesus could point out an Old Testament rebuttal to eating - but to heal? That was definitely working, and Jesus would definitely be wrong to do such a thing.

And this is the point at which we find that "what is wrong with you?" expression on Jesus' face. How clouded could their minds have become to let a human being suffer just for the sake of being proved right? How hard-hearted could they possibly be? How could they get Jesus so wrong? The thing is, you & I have to wonder, could we get Jesus or the Bible wrong this way? Could we make Jesus look at us this way? What's really happening here?

One of the biggest difficulties Jesus faces during his ministry are people who think they know what God wants or expects, and so they add their own spin to the Bible in order to make God agree with them. It's people who want God to fit their particular prejudices or preference, and so they twist or build up on the Bible things that appease their particular biases. The Pharisees, among the people Jesus encounters, are particularly quick to do this. Now, let's be clear about something - the Pharisees' intentions are good. They legitimately think they're helping people by being extra-specially careful about God's laws. But, what aggravates Jesus is that these extra-special precautions are actually getting in the way of people coming close to God. The "extras" make God seem spiteful or unapproachable, and at worst, just plain mean.

Jesus' mission is to show God in his purest essence - the Savior, the Redeemer, the Re-Creator. He's here to make things right. So, when we get the temptation to add to, to build onto God's expectation for the church, when we think the Bible's not enough, we need to double-check ourselves. What sort of facial expression might this get? Through it all, we know that Jesus came to seek and to save, and to help us get it right. Just like he asks the man in the synagogue, he's asking us to stretch out our hands, to reach for him, and to make sure we're holding on tightly to whom we need to hold on tightly, and we're letting go of what we don't need.

'Et cetera' is Latin for 'and the rest'. In this newsletter we thought we would share with you some of the 'etc.' type things we do here at the JAARS Center, things that are not our regular work assignment, but that we also do just as part of living and working here.

January 2019

I give a fair amount of time as a volunteer in our **JAARS youth ministry**. There are easily fifty or more high school and middle school students whose parents

work here, and because of the distance from here to some of the larger churches where our members attend, many of our youth would not be able to be involved in a viable youth ministry at church. More importantly, the unique cross-cultural experience of missionary kids can make it hard for them to relate to others their age who have not had those experiences. In our JAARS youth ministry those high school and middle school youth coming back from overseas can have fellowship with other students who can understand their experiences, and they can even re-connect with kids they knew in the countries where they and their parents have been living for the last four years or so. This is a great help to their adjustment to living here in this country.


My role involves relating to both high school and middle school kids in various settings. That usually requires about six to eight volunteer hours a week outside my normal work assignment. Sometimes I am an additional adult providing supervision for an activity, or chaperoning a retreat or outing, or just relating as another adult friend to the students. I also lead a Saturday morning Bible study for high school boys.

Estelle has some 'et cetera' involvements as well. The main one is that she helps with the distribution of donated bread and other food items that have been removed from the shelves at local stores and given to the JAARS Center. The arrangement we have is that JAARS sends a driver and van to pick up 'day old' bread, or other food items that are about to go out of date, and then people who are assigned to work here at JAARS can come each week and take what they need at a significantly discounted price—100% off!

Where's Waldo?

Forget about Waldo—where is Philip? Our youngest son, Philip, was sworn in as a recruit in the **United States Marine Corps** on Friday, January 4. He leaves for boot camp at Parris Island, SC, on January 22, just four days before his 20th birthday. After about 12 weeks in basic training he will go on to several stages of advanced training, some of which will be in North Carolina, though not anywhere near Waxhaw.

This is something that Philip has wanted to do for years. He had even enlisted in September of 2016 when he was a senior in high school, but was disqualified by a heart murmur. Earlier this year however the Department of Defense removed that heart murmur condition from its list of disqualifying conditions, so when Philip learned that he went back to the Marine recruiter and began the process again.



Would you please pray with us for Philip, that God would preserve

him spiritually, physically, and in every other way as he begins this journey into potentially dangerous territory? You could pray for us too, as this will be a big adjustment for our family as well.

The 1000th New Testament

The 1000th New Testament translation completed with involvement from SIL and Wycliffe Bible Translators was launched on August 11, 2018, in **a celebration in northwest Uganda.** The translation is for the Keliko people and represents the first time they can hear and read the New Testament in their own language.

The Keliko people, whose homeland is in South Sudan, traveled from all around to be present. Many came from local refugee camps in Uganda, but others hitched rides from South Sudan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). The event was attended by church leaders and local government dignitaries, as well as by international visitors from across Africa, Europe and North America.

The translation represents a triumph over adversity. Twice the translation efforts have been interrupted by civil war in South Sudan. The second time that happened, the team fled South Sudan, mostly to northern Uganda, but continued their work. "The translators are all Episcopalian pastors. They are very godly men and they pressed on," comments Jackie Marshall-Ringer, director of SIL in South Sudan. "Although we have provided technical and advisory support throughout, this is clearly a project that belongs to the Keliko church."

"The translation represents remarkable persistence on the part of the Keliko people to have the Bible in their own language," said James Poole, executive director of Wycliffe Bible Translators (UK). "That it also happens to be the 1000th New Testament that Wycliffe and SIL have been involved in made it an extra special celebration."

The SCROLL



Mark 9:21-24: Jesus asked his father, "How long has this been happening to him?" And he said, "From childhood. And it has often cast him into fire and into water, to destroy him. But if you can do anything, have compassion on us and help us." And Jesus said to him, "'If you can'! All things are possible for one who believes." Immediately the father of the child cried out and said, "I believe; help my unbelief!"

There are few passages in the Bible as poignant as this: A father cries out to Jesus, begging for the Master's help for his son, a boy afflicted with a terrible evil spirit that constantly seeks the boy's destruction. Can't we all hear the pain in his voice, even across the centuries and the written page, "Help me!"

But for what is this desperate father actually pleading? What does he ask from Jesus with that amazing, almost too deep for words, anguished cry, "*I believe; help my unbelief*!"? What help does he really need?

And here's the best question of all: When have you or I been in the situation in which we find this father - where he has belief, he has Jesus right there with him, but something is holding him back, something isn't as "connected" as it should be, and he knows, deep in his heart, there's something more, just on the other side. When have we been there, wanting to say to Jesus ourselves, "We believe; help us with our unbelief!"

William L. Lane, in the New International Commentary writes about this father, "*His cry expresses humanity and distress at being asked to manifest radical faith when unbelief is the form of human existence*." I think he hits the nail on the head. Jesus is offering him everything he's ever needed, particularly the solution to the most dire, most desperate situation in which this father has ever lived, a darkness few can imagine - the catastrophic illness of a child. Jesus looks at him & expresses sympathy ("How long?"), and then says to the man, "All things are possible if you believe." Keep in mind, this is the same Jesus who told his Church in John 14, "I've done some pretty amazing things - but even greater things than I did, that's what you'll do, because I'm sending you the Holy Spirit" (*my paraphrase*). I don't know about you, but I can't say I've done "greater things" than Jesus. I'm not even sure I've seen "greater things". Over & over, I've had conversation after conversation with Christians who, like me, wonder where the "greater things" have gone? At the same time, in these same conversations, we can't help but look around at our culture, at our country, and realize that our nation, indeed our entire world *needs to see & experience* these "greater things" of Christ Jesus through his Church!

And so, we're like this anguished father; "Unbelief is there, and of himself he cannot conquer it" (JA Chadwick, The *Expositor's Bible*). We believe in Jesus, we believe in the Holy Spirit, but because of our upbringing, because of our tradition of western rationalism, because we've been brought up with special effects & scientific discovery, it's hard for us to take the kinds of "leaps of faith" that Jesus is asking this father to take. Let's put ourselves in his shoes for a minute - he went to doctors; they failed. He went to the Church (the disciples); it failed. He's now facing someone who says, "if you believe..." Might that father be thinking, "Yes, but what if he fails me, too - can I bear that kind of let-down again? Can I deal with that kind of disappointment again?"

And yet - he *wants to believe* in Jesus. He wants to believe that Jesus is the solution to his & his family's deepest, darkest problem. He *wants to believe* that, in Jesus, all things are possible. He *wants to believe*. So here's the question for you & me - do we want to believe? Do we really want to see the "greater things" that Jesus has in store for Bishopville, for Lee County, for America & the world? Do we really want to see Jesus bring racial & familial reconciliation, a transformation of our culture, a return to morality and honor? Do we want to believe that we & the people we love the most can be healed? Do we want to believe?

David Platt, in his book *Radical*, challenges the American Church this way: "I dare you to test the claims contained in the gospel, maybe in a way you have never done before." He's saying this - Want to believe. Want to see the "greater things". Want to transform the world through the Holy Spirit, through the Gospel, through Christ Jesus. Want to believe! Lord, help me with my unbelief, too - I know you can.

I was in my mid-20s when I started wearing glasses. This is probably why I still wear the thicker metal -framed style glasses I've been wearing for the past... 15 or so years. I only

hope they'll make them bifocals eventually - or that my arm will grow a little bit longer in the next dozen years or so. The unique thing about my glasses is that, whether I intended to do this or not, they're a frame through which I see the world (those of you with glasses know what I mean). Every-thing I see clearly is seen within the boundaries of my lens frames. Anything on the outside is fuzzy or blurry.

Paul writes to the Corinthian Church, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life alone, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Corinthians 15:17-20). What he's essentially saying is this - see everything in life through the lenses or frames of Jesus' Resurrection. As Christians, it's impossible for us to see the world clearly outside of the Resurrection - it's fuzzy, it's blurry, and it's a little scary. But when we clearly look through the lenses of the Resurrection, what can we see clearly?

First, we can see clearly, through our Resurrection-glasses, that God has poured out his inexhaustible love on us through Jesus Christ. God's not some ogre or boogieman waiting to "get us" when we mess up. In fact, we can even see God pouring his inexhaustible love & grace even on the people in the Old Testament - you know, that part of the Bible so many people think is so "judgy" and dark. When we look at God through the Resurrection, we see clearly that He "so loved the world that He gave the world His only Son, that whosoever should believe on Him [Jesus] should not perish, but have everlasting life!"

Second, we can see clearly, through our Resurrection-glasses, how valuable we are to Jesus, both as His followers and as His church. We mean everything to Jesus - He died to set us free from sins, and He was raised in order to become "firstfruits" of our own Resurrection one day! At the same time, seeing through Jesus' Resurrection gives us hope for all those friends & family we've laid to rest over the years - this world isn't all we get, there's an afterlife, and for those of us in Christ Jesus, that afterlife is with all those who were also in Christ Jesus. In the Pentecostal church, we used to sing about how, "Some glad morning" there would be a happy meeting of all Jesus' followers. I can't wait! Finally, through Resurrection-glasses, we can see that God, with Jesus, through the Holy Spirit, has given us a purpose for our church within our community. One of my favorite William Shatner quotes comes from *Star Trek 6* (I'm a geek - I admit it): "We haven't run out of history just yet." Jesus' Resurrection is the beginning of what he finishes at the Bible's end, when Jesus ultimately declares, "Behold, I make all things new." Jesus makes and is making all things new - people are made new (born again), communities are renewed, churches are revitalized, even nations have changed courses because Jesus is still at work - and this we can see when we keep looking through those Resurrection lenses.

So let's encourage each other this Easter season to keep in mind the hope, the peace, and the grace of the Resurrection. Let's remind each other to see everything through Easter, and let's look forward—seeing clearly - to what Jesus is doing here & now, as He's still "making all things new!" Blessings, Pastor Chris

May is a great month - the school term ends, graduations happen, weddings happen, flowers bloom, farms kick off into an even higher gear, and we start to see the first fruits all around us, whether strawberries, plums, or blackberries. May is also a great month for the church. We start getting ready for VBS, we think about midyear missions, and we get a chance to re-

flect on what we've done as a church through the busy Christmas, Valentines, & Easter seasons, and take a breath and wonder: What happens next? So here's what's about to happen at Bishopville PC, starting this month, May 2019: The 4-5th grade class is starting their catechism/communicants class. Please keep them in your prayers, along with their teachers.

The Sunday Afternoon Bible Study will tackle questions that people have about the doctrine of election - as I jokingly titled it: "all the questions you've ever wondered about the elect, & were predestined to ask." Please join us, Sunday afternoons at 5:30, for prayer & study.

And, for Sunday morning worship, I've been led to start a series of messages on encountering God - his person, his presence, his providence, his provision - and to do this, I'd like us all to read a book about a boy, a girl, and two horses.

And at this point, my uncle Allen would reply, "Do what?"

Church is a multi-generational organism; she's a living thing, described as Jesus' bride, Jesus' garden, Jesus' body, Jesus' family. And, like any & every other family, the Church is made up of older & younger members, and those members grow and develop together. Our goal should be, as a church family, to encounter God together. So, we want to find a way to engage each other, to walk with each other, and the best way to do that is to take a pace that everybody can keep up with - which brings us to our book.

Out of all the Christian books written for children "of all ages", none (in my opinion) come close to being as effective as CS Lewis' *Chronicles of Narnia*. Reading these books, you easily realize that (1) Lewis loved God, and (2) Lewis loved children. These are fairy-tale adventures, these are great read-aloud stories, and these are lessons, written for a child's imagination & heart, that teach about God. And, out of the 7 *Chronicles*, none of them help us learn about encountering God more than CS Lewis' 1954 book, *The Horse and His Boy*. It's the story of a boy named Shasta, a talking horse named Bree, and an incredible adventure where he makes new friends, learns new things about himself, and encounters the Living God.

If you've never read Christian fantasy or children's books, it's a different experience. Please note, also, that Lewis is (1) a British Anglican, and (2) a man of the late 1800s, early 1900s, and the book itself came out in 1954. So there are going to be some challenging sections and different uses of language. But the overall message is solid - and the encounters with God the four main characters each have are timeless - and quite Biblical. This is where Lewis is the strongest. He joins his love for literature, his love for children, and his passion to introduce his Christian faith together, creatively, to make something that - for his time - was quite new and innovative. And through it, through his encounter with God on the pages of *The Horse and His Boy*, we too are encouraged to encounter God anew, and to use our own creativity, our own talents, and our own passions to help others encounter God, too.

If you want to join me & my family in reading *The Horse and His Boy*, you can find it (as of this article) for \$3.99 at <u>www.christianbook.com</u>. There are plenty of study guides that help, but one of the most valuable for family use is *Roar!: A Christian Family Guide to the Chronicles of Narnia*. It's available in paperback on Amazon for \$24, and ChristianBook has an ebook version for \$14.99.

At the same time, my messages for May will be built on the underlying scriptures, the encounter with God that helped to foster & grow this story - and our stories. I'll be providing notes, resources, and guides to help us as we, God's family here in Bishopville, encounter our Living Savior, our Living Eternal God



This wonderful time of the year confirms our faith and gives us hope of eternity. We remembered Dave's legacy on his sixth anniversary in March with a brief meditation and prayer of thanksgiving for his life and service here in Mexico.

These months have been very good, with visits to many congregations and special birthday services and anniversaries. Dr. Will Ackles and his wife Nancy have been here since early February and will be leaving April 9. He has taught New Testament and Homiletics here in the seminary and also in an extension center. He has also been my chauffeur for wherever I want to go! He has been a great blessing to us and we appreciate the many things he does when he is here.

On April 10 my daughter Debbie will undergo surgery for a problem with endometriosis. She has two weeks off for Easter break which makes it a little easier. Please pray for her and the pain relief she hopes to obtain as a result.

Seminary graduation will take place on June 7 and there will be 30 students graduating with a degree in Biblical counseling, 5 in Theology and 2 in Sacred music. The following morning after graduation I will fly to St. Louis. A year ago, I could barely walk so I was unable to visit supporting churches and friends. I now use a walker with wheels but still find it difficult to sit, walk or stand too long. I will try to be careful on this trip which takes me to six states from June 8-Jul 1. My son Daniel will be with me for 2 weeks driving me around visiting churches and friends in the US. I will have my cell phone with me if anyone would care to call. You may dial this number from the US: 011-521-999-225-7958. You can also call my son's phone number while we are in the US: (314) 223-9453 if you want to get a hold of me. If I don't see you this year, I will try to do so in 2020, if the Lord permits

Upon return on July 2, I will be attending the Sac Be presbytery meeting in Yalcoba, one of the places I visit every month, where I will sell Bibles, hymnbooks and other materials. Later in July, the camp that we organize will be held on the shores of the Gulf of Mexico for children and young people. The cost is \$50 a week, with another \$10 for transportation if it is needed. I have recently begun attending a small English Bible study on Friday mornings. Although I cannot see the study guide or read the Bible aloud, due to my limited vision, I find it enjoyable and helpful. Perhaps a verse to sum it all up is found once again in 1 Cor 15:58. PW Guatemala Mission News

THE GUATEMALA SEWING MISSION HISTORY

In 1987, Anne Law Finch, who is a Bishopville, SC native, went to the village of San Juan Ostuncalco, Guatemala as part of a mission. While there, Anne and other members of the delegation attended a Mam Christian Women's Association meeting. They asked the women: "If you could have anything, what would you want?" The women answered in unison, "a sewing machine!" After the meeting, the delegation borrowed a Jeep, went to town, and purchased the first sewing machine.

The purchase of that first peddle (nonelectric) sewing machine has evolved into a sewing school, run by the women themselves, that has trained hundreds of women to tailor and embroidery.

The Mam tribe is descendants of the ancient Maya. They are hard-working Christian women who struggle to overcome poverty.

Daily living for the Mam tribe is a huge challenge. They don't have electricity, running water or indoor plumbing. However, they do have an extremely strong faith in God.

The Mam Christian Women's Association helps women develop in four ways:

- Income earning power through a microloan procram
- healthy bodies for themselves and their families through health outreach
- new skills through schools and
- scholarships

 spiritual bonds through prayer partnerships In 2015 the Association opened a new sewing school this year in the remote village of Las Barrancas. The local Presbyterian Church donated land and the Association raised funds from US churches to construct a building, buy six sewing machines, and pay a teacher.

The Bishopville Presbyterian Church

Sewing Machines and Afghans In 2013, the Morning Circle of the Bishopville Presbyterian Church accepted the Guatemala

Sewing Mission as their mission.

They help support the Guatemala Sewing Mission by sending funds for the Sewing School. These funds are used to purchase pedal sewing machines for the graduates and by providing scholarships.

In addition, the Women of the Church provide the yarn and make the afghans, which afghans are used as fund <u>raisers for the</u> Mission.

Tyson's Neck Warmer Mission San Juan Ostuncalco and Las Barrancas are in the rugged highlands and many people suffer from respiratory problems. For that reason,

in 2014 the Women of the Bishopville Presbyterian Church began the Tyson's Neck Warmer Mission.

Since most of the cooking is done over open fires, the neck warmers are safe to wear (they fasten and won't slip off when bending over).

As of May 2018, almost 800 neck warmers have been made and hand-delivered to the Mam Association.

Baby Blanket & Cap Mission

In the spring of 2018, the Women of our church started the Baby Blanket Mission. We made and sent 28 baby blankets. In the fall, 14 baby blankets and 10 lap blankets were purchased from Good Will and sent to the Association.

The Women of our church provides the yarn for all of our missions.

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will

wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more; neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor

pain anymore, for the former things have passed away." (Revelation 21:1-4) We all have our little "guilty pleasures" - you know, the escapist romances, the soap operas, the sci-fi marathons, the video games, the cheesy '80s movies. For me, it's Bill & Ted's Excellent Adventure, a silly little late-80s movie about two California teens who, through time travel and music, change the world. Bill & Ted is known for giving Keanu Reeves his start, and for playing with the already silly idea of time travel in a pretty, well, late-80s and "most excellent" way. If you haven't seen it, let me spoil the movie's ultimate message by saying, "Be excellent to each other" and "Party on, dudes!" Like I said, "guilty pleasure" - maybe Laura would say, "Not guilty enough…" I particularly love the theme song from *Bill & Ted's Excellent Adventure*, a song titled "In Time" by Robbie Robb. It's one of those "*accidentally Christian*" songs into which you often run. By accidentally Christian, what I mean is a song or poem or story that, whether intentionally or not, has a Christian message. Here's why I say "In Time" is accidental-

ly Christian; the lyrics say: No fear, no loss, no tears, the time is almost here. Our dreams will all come true, I promise you, 'Cause I can see for miles and miles . . . One heart, one soul, one mind, Our eyes will not be blind. We'll see this rain come

down without this sound, We can all, we can all break free. In time we'll be dancing in the streets all night! Tell me that's not a redeemed world Robbie Robb is singing about - a world like the one John describes in Revelation 21, where everything is made new by the One who makes all things new, a world where the streets are for dancing, voices are for singing, and eyes are for seeing the King of Glory face to face! Now, if I could change one lyric from "In Time", I'd say in that second stanza, "We'll see his reign come down, and with a trumpet sound, we can all, we can all break free! In time..." But that's just me. How many times do we run across "accidentally Christian" messages in the world around us? Whether it's the

theme song from a guilty-pleasure 80s movie or a character in a video game or TV series, whether it's a series of allusions in a poem or book we've been reading, how often do we run across messages that reinforce or echo the Gospel of Jesus, the story of the Bible? Not only do we have a culture that - at least for the last 400 years - has been saturated with the Church & the Bible, we also have the presence of God himself, the Holy Spirit, who pours out what we call "common grace". That simply means that the Spirit of God is at work in the world in general, helping people - even artists, writers, & singers - pick up on, whether they intend to or not, the message that, "God so loves this world that He gave it His only Son...

So here's the bottom line: How do we, the Church, respond to the "accidentally Christian" messages around us? Do we recognize them? Do we appreciate the work of the Holy Spirit, do we celebrate the work of the Church Fathers & Mothers that made this possible? Better yet, do we take advantage of these messages when we interact with our non -Christian friends, coworkers, & family? Do we point out, when we're watching *Bill & Ted*, "Hey, that song sounds like what God's going to do at the end of time"? Do we say to a friend, when we're reading *The Lord of the Rings*, "Did you know that J.R.R. Tolkien was a Christian and a friend with C.S. Lewis?" When we're riding in a car with our friends, and Audioslave's song "I am the highway" comes one, do we mention, "This sounds just like what David says in Psalm 139, when he's struggling with God's presence"?

So, how can we do this? How are we going to be able to both recognize and comment on accidentally Christian messages to the people we'd like to introduce to Jesus? First, by knowing the Bible. We need to have a working knowledge of the message of the Bible, a firm grasp of the Gospel especially, so much so that we can't help but notice. Be in love with the story of Jesus forgiving you! Second, you'll never have a conversation with a non-Christian about an accidentally Christian message unless you have non-Christian friends. Yes, the Bible has several warnings about how bad company corrupts good character—so choose these friends carefully. But the message of the Bible is resoundingly this: The Church reaches the Lost by living among the Lost. Make friends, and introduce those friends to Jesus.

Finally, we can connect the accidentally Christian to the non-Christians we know best of all by connecting to & following the Holy Spirit's leading. He'll help us make the right friends, he'll give us the insights & opportunities, he'll guide us through those conversations - and all the while, he'll use our words, our studies, our prayers in order to reach people with their Savior Jesus' love - even if he has to use *Bill & Ted* in order to do so. Praise the Spirt for his Blessings in Jesus' name - Pastor Chris work!

Scripture comes to the Gungu people

In a village in Uganda, the guard on duty at the local radio station opened the gate and greeted the team arriving with New Testaments. He eagerly watched as a young radio presenter opened a box and took out a copy of the recently published Scriptures. The guard had heard the excitement surrounding the Gungu New Testament the day before, when a special event had been held to dedicate the newly printed books. There, many people had heard God's Word in their language for the first time, and because many were inspired to buy copies, the team had run out and had to send to a nearby town for more.

Now, whispering, the guard asked his colleague to read a verse from Matthew. The presenter read the verse aloud while the guard listened closely: "What do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul? Is anything worth more than your soul?" (Matthew 16:26 NLT). The guard urged the man to read it again, which he did.

Seeing the guard's interest, the team decided to give him a New Testament. The man leapt with joy, knelt on the ground, raised his hands in the air with excitement, laughed and hugged the Bible to his chest. "I've done so many bad things in my life," he said, "but now salvation has come to me. The Lord is with me!"


Still kneeling and swaying, he kept thanking them for the New Testament, and he called out the name of Jesus with great joy. Then he got up and started dancing spontaneously with the radio presenter, unable to hide his excitement — a moving and a powerful testimony to the impact of God's Word in the mother tongue. Someone asked if the guard knew how to read. "No," said the presenter, "but now he will be asking the young people in his home to read that Bible to him."

Made in God's image

I have often reflected on what it means to be made in God's image. One of the most fundamental affirmations in Christian belief is the doctrine of the Trinity, that God exists eternally in three persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This means that for all eternity God has existed in relationship, and at the center of such relationships is love, personality, and communication. The executive director of SIL, Dr. Michel Kenmogne, has pointed out that communication in language is one of the features of our bearing God's image—that we communicate, just as the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit have always communicated within the community of the Trinity. For us, just as with the Trinity, communication in language is at the center of personhood and of love.

God is a communicator—the *original* communicator. Hebrews 11:1-2 tells us that in the past God communicated through prophets in many ways, but in these last days *he has spoken through his Son*. The Word of God, the Bible, is the record of God's long history of communicating with us, as well as the record of the life and message of the Son of God. Translating the Bible into the languages of the linguistic minorities of the world is the goal toward which our organization works. Thank you for whatever part you have had in our efforts toward reaching that goal!

Update on the Lectionary project

I have been working for much of the last three years on the Old Testament Lectionary Exegetical Summary Project, providing translation helps for pastors and missionaries wanting to translate the Old Testament portions that are read each Sunday in liturgical churches (such as Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican, etc.). Of the 154 readings, 45 have been published electronically (all from Isaiah). Another 60 are ready to be typeset and published, 30 are near ready for typesetting, and 19 are in the beginning stages. I have authored 46 of the readings, and proof-read or edited 89 of the others, which represents thousands of pages of text. A few months ago I received an email from a Catholic official in the Vatican who assured me that they were enthusiastic about the project and were willing to assist in any way that might become necessary. This is encouraging. Your ongoing prayers for the project would be appreciated.

Philip left home on January 22 for Marine Corps boot camp, which is twelve weeks of mentally and physically demanding training. It culminated in 54 hours of field testing known as The Crucible, during which recruits get little sleep and endure considerable strenuous physical activity, including hiking 47 miles while carrying up to 45 pounds of gear. He graduated from boot camp on April 19.

Then on April 30 Philip will go to a Marine base near San Diego for advanced infantry training. We ask your prayer that God would guide and protect him wherever he goes.

The SCROLL



The Lord God said to the serpent, "Because you have done this, cursed are you above all livestock and above all beasts of the field; on your belly you shall go, and dust you shall eat all the days of your life. I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your seed and her seed; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel." - Genesis 3:14-15

My cousin Andy & I used to love to explore the woods behind my grandparents' house. They owned hundreds of acres of old hardwood forest, along with some pulpwood pine tracts, and we used to spend hours out there. We found a stream down there—not quite big enough to be a creek, too big to be a branch—and he & I decided to find out where it came from. We wanted to see its spring. So he & I walked upstream, following that little stream until it dwindled into a branch, that branch until it dwindled into a trickle, and that trickle until it became a little muddy patch at the bottom of a red clay gully. And there, bubbling out of that muddy patch, were the first drops of water that made up that stream—which we found out later, joined other streams and became part of the Rocky & Savannah Rivers.

Gospel is the word we use when we talk about Jesus' story, that incredible thing he did for us during his life, ministry, sacrifice, & resurrection. Gospel is, literally, "good news"—"god-spell" if you speak Middle English (*and who doesn't?*). Gospel is wonderful, gospel is awesome, gospel is celebration—in fact, that's why there's a whole genre of music called "gospel music". It comes from people getting excited about & moved by the story of Jesus' love, the story of Jesus' life, the story of Jesus' Cross. It's not just "news"—it's *the* Good News, the best, greatest, most wondrous amazing news of all time! It's Gospel, and it flows from God to us like a river of grace.

But where does it all begin? Where does the Gospel start? From where does this river "spring"?

Here's the obvious truth—you don't need good news until you've lived through something bad. And, just like that, we know exactly where the Gospel starts: All the way back "In the beginning..." In the beginning, God made the heavens, the earth, the seas, the skies, the plants, the animals, and human beings. He gave them only one rule: "Obey me & live. Disobey me & die." Sadly, the first humans *did* exactly what God said *don't*. And so God, being holy & just, gave them their punishment. He spoke over them a literal bad word: The Curse. The Serpent who tempted would be forced to crawl; the Woman who had been deceived would have painful childbirth; the Man who had chosen sin would be bound to the Creation, rather than his Creator. He would die—and all mankind would, along with Adam, taste death.

Yet...

Even in the Curse, we see the first seed planted, the first ray of sunshine peeking from behind that stormcloud, the first muddy bubbling of that mighty river of grace—the First Gospel. It happened when God cursed the Serpent to crawl: The woman's offspring, God said, will one day crush the Tempter. Think about that—in that one phrase, God pours out grace, even in the midst of the curse! The Woman, who'd been deceived, who'd been cursed with painful childbirth... would have a child one day who would crush her Tempter. The Man, who'd sinned, who'd been cursed with suffering & death... would have a son, a successor one day who would obey God and earn eternal life. The Tempter, who'd succeeded in corrupting God's creation, who'd been cursed to eat dust... would meet his end one day—along with the sin, the death, the destruction, the despair he'd brought into the world.

If that doesn't sound like Gospel, nothing else can! This is the source, the spring—and the river of grace that grows from that spring has a name: Jesus. Jesus is the fix for the curse, Jesus is the savior God promised wa-a-ay back in the Garden of Eden, Jesus is the Gospel. He is the one, who at the cross, defeats Satan (serpent), cares for his mother (Eve), and conquers and overturns the power of death for all mankind who follow him (Adam). Paul even calls Jesus the "second Adam, through whom life everlasting came into being!" Thank God for the source, for the Gospel, for Jesus! Blessings! - Pastor Chris



What does the Bible say about praying together?

The Church is under the attack of the enemy like never before. Our leaders and each of our brothers and sisters in Christ need our prayers. As members of the body of Christ we are to lift up one another!

Praying together unifies us as a body of believers

In John 17:22-23, Jesus prays, "I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one — I in them and you in me - so that they may be brought to complete unity." Praying together, as a group of believers helps bring the unity that Christ prayed for.

Praying together allows us to encourage and support other believers

I Thessalonians 5:11 says, "*Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing.*" By praying together for common needs, struggles, and times of celebration, we are able to encourage the other believers in our lives and motivate one another on to love and good deeds.

Praying together is not more powerful than individual prayer

Prayer is how we ask for, cooperate with, and rejoice in God's plam. God hears all prayers, whether we say them out loud or speak them in our minds, whether we pray as a group or individually. Both are biblical, and both are powerful, but corporate prayer opens up our hearts to the needs of others. Not only does it bring encouragement, repentance, edification, joy, and the feeling of love among believers, but it shows togetherness and the body of Christ working together submitting to the will of God.

2 Corinthians 1:11 (ESV) "You also must help us by prayer, so that many will give thanks on our behalf for the blessing granted us through the prayers of many."

Matthew 18:19-20 "Again, truly I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about anything they ask for, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven.20 For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them."

<u>The SCROLL</u>



Isaiah 5:11a, "Woe to those who rise early in the morning that they may run after strong drink..."

After I graduated, my alma mater, Erskine Theological Seminary actually gave me a coffee mug with the above quote from Isaiah printed on it. The mug sits on my desk where I can see it & smile... while I drink my "strong drink" of black coffee.

What's really interesting about this quote - other than Erskine's pun - is that it falls in a section of Isaiah where the prophet shares God's own lament. God made a vineyard, a place he prepared, tended, planted, walled, & weeded, a "pleasant planting" (Isa. 5:7). This was a place with plenty of room, art, fine music, beauty, & peace. This vineyard was, for lack of better words, beautifully amazing - greener than anything in Napa Valley or North Carolina, more idyllic even than the best vineyards in France or Italy, more wonderful than earth can imagine or produce.

This vineyard, says God through Isaiah, is God's people. His chosen, His claimed, His church, His nation. Throughout the Bible, we're told a LOT about the character & nature, the care & love, the justice & holiness, the glory & majesty of the Lord our God. The Bible reveals God to us, God's people. The Bible describes God - and, for me, one of the best ways to understand God is to listen to passages like Isaiah 5. Why? Because in these places in the Bible, we learn about how God looks at us, God's people, and when we do, we discover even more amazing things about God than we could ever imagine.

Let me give you this example - if you heard me talk about my kids, you'd hear me use some interesting, if odd, words & phrases. You'd have heard me call one of my kids "pumpkin" when she was 2. You'd have heard me singing about chocolate milk to another of them. You'd hear me call one "cat" and other "boy" repeatedly. You'd hear me reading books in silly voices, counting the number of turns between Rock Hill and Iva, yelling myself hoarse at basketball games, & playing with trucks on the floor. Now think about what this tells you - does this give you information about my kids? Or more about how I feel about my children? So when I hear God essentially saying, "You are my vineyard" - and I read Isaiah 5:1-6 about all the ways in which God shows his love for his people through the image of the vineyard, I am amazed all over again that, even in the midst of a passage that condemns God's people for their unfaithfulness to God, for their abandoning him for useless dead idols, that God shows them, proves to them, calls to them: "This is my love for you - I am your God. Be my people."

And so I look at my own life. How have I "gone after strong drink" - the strong drink of idolatry, of selfishness, of not turning to and embracing God's love, of not appreciating God's provision, of not accepting God's call? How have I "lacked knowledge" when God has shown me so much through the world he's made, the book he's shared, the Church he's given me? How have I "been quick" in how I judge myself - and how I misjudge God's true nature? How can I - grafted into God's vineyard as I have been (Romans 11) - get right again?

And so Isaiah 5 bleeds into Isaiah 6: What I broke, God himself can & will fix - he alone can help me see, hear, understand, & turn - and he will heal me. This is the promise of Isaiah, this is the promise of our Lord Jesus' life & mission, & this is the promise on which God has planted his Church, our Church. God fixes, God makes us right, God heals.

And so, as I look at my coffee cup (empty again!), I am brought back, over & over again, to Isaiah 5 & 6, and to the promise, the blessing, and the hope of the one true & living God, my Savior & my Friend, and I drink again the "strong drink" of what he's given me in Jesus. I am his vineyard, you are his vineyard, and God loves us and will be there for us - to give us joy, to give us peace, to give us safety & fruitfulness, all to the glory of his holy name!

The process of translating the Scripture into a language that does not yet have it does not start at a translation desk. It starts with doing language surveys of an area where the language is spoken. In the past this usually meant travel over rough roads, or even where there are no roads, going from village to village with a local interpreter. The language surveyor would ask questions to try to determine how well the people in one area understand others in neighboring areas, the degree of literacy, whether there are any existing Scriptures in use, either in the national language or possibly in some regional language, and how people feel about their language, or about neighboring languages.

Currently the process is more likely to begin in cities where speakers of the indigenous language or languages have relocated. It might also involve research at a university library to see if linguistic studies have been done of which we were not already aware. It may involve trips to government offices to ask permission to do research in an area. Then there is the field work...


Survey often requires travelling in parts of the country that are difficult to get to, which may involve some

degree of physical danger where roads that are less than ideal, and emergency personnel are few. In addition, on a survey outing you have less control over your sleeping arrangements and what you eat, so you are more exposed to picking up disease, or being bitten by insects or animals.

Then there is the complexity of determining language boundaries. In a cluster of villages or towns, one village—let's call it village X—may understand village Y and Z, but not village W, whereas village W can understand village X and Z, but not Y. Meanwhile village Y can understand village Q and Z, but not W or X well enough to read anything written in that language. There may be a trade language or creole that everyone understands, but which may or

may not have vocabulary adequate to talk about spiritual things. People also may not have a deep level of emotional attachment to a trade language or creole.

There are also questions about language vitality and use. That is, how many of the people still use the language *and teach it to their children*, and where is the language used? Do they use the language at home? At school? At church? At the market? What are the attitudes of people toward the language? Are they proud of it? Or does it have low prestige such that people would be unlikely to want to have Scripture in it?

Several nations exist today that did not in 1972, and some nations that were around then no longer exist. Security concerns have permanently affected air travel. The internet is a fact of daily life, and all businesses, homes, and cars depend on electronic circuit boards in one way or another. Cars are more expensive, but they are designed to last a lot longer.

Of special interest for our ministry is the fact that there are now hundreds more languages that have at least some Scripture, and there are translation programs in many hundreds more. Smart phone apps are making the gospel and the Scriptures accessible to many millions of people that did not have them before.

For us personally, our parents and most of our aunts and uncles have passed away and are no longer with us. On the other hand, we have added eight children, two daughters-in-law, a son-in-law, and three grandchildren to the family, and by the time you receive our next newsletter, another son-in-law will have joined us. We have lived at a total of fourteen different addresses in three different states and three different countries. We have been blessed with hundreds of *truly wonderful* friendships, meaningful work, and spiritually enriching and nourishing churches.



Why focus on the last 47 years, as opposed to any other number? That's when Estelle and I were married. Since August 19, 1972 we have had, and continue to have, a wonderful life together.


There are at least 1,500 years (estimated) between the Exodus and Paul's missionary journeys - as many years as the USA has been a nation, *times 6!* Think about it - in 2019, we're historically 6x closer to George Washington than Paul was to Moses. And yet, in that space of 1,500 years, Israel - God's people - learned about a prophecy that goes wa-a-ay back further (back even to the beginning of time) and came to its fulfillment only 20-30 years before Paul wrote his letters to the churches he'd planted during those missionary journeys.

In Genesis 3:15, God says to the serpent (Satan), "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; He shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise His heel." At the beginning of all time, a prophecy was given. 1,500 years before Paul's birth, that prophecy was received by a people on the run from slavery. And yet, after all that time, from the beginning of time until the day our Lord went to the Cross, that prophecy stewed, like the greatest slow-cooker in all of time & space, letting its aroma permeate the history and character of this people - God's people. This is why Peter can write with such boldness about God's patience and deliberate slow-seemingness. This is why God's people can look back on their own lives and see example after example of how God set blessings and opportunities into motion. This is why the study of church history can be so fulfilling - to see how God, throughout even the darkest-seeming periods of the church's life, works even through individuals to make great things - Reformations, Awakenings, Denominations reclaiming their Scriptural heritage - come to being.

God works deliberately, purposefully, doing things "in the fullness of time" for the sake of his people. He works to save, He works to redeem. *Boom*. Salvation is given. Amazing.

Now what can we say to these things? Our God is great, and greatly deserves our praises.

Sept. 6th, 2019

Dear friends and prayer partners,

"Jehovah himself will watch over you. He is always at your side to shelter you safely in his presence. You will be safe when you leave home and safely you will return. He will protect you now and he'll protect you forever more." From Psalm 121 (the Passion Translation).

The trip to the US in June proved the truth of these verses. My son Daniel and I were able to visit various churches and friends in the little over 2 weeks we had together. I also did some travel on my own, but this was the first time I had ever traveled using a walker. There were no problems. Upon return I attended the Sac Be presbytery meeting selling over \$500 worth of books and hymnbooks. Books can very be expensive here and many people do not have money to buy them. I get a special discounted price from the distributor, so I am able to pass on a savings in cost to the pastors and leaders at presbytery.

The summer camp season was very successful. The youth camp we run had about 200 young people and an excellent conference speaker, a pastor and teacher from the seminary. The evening campfire saw over 80 young people giving testimonies to the changes in their lives. 100 children attended children's camp. Thanks to those of you who gave scholarship help. Some of the children and young people whose lives were touched were there because of your help. My son Mark also had a camp with about 200 other young people in attendance. Many decisions were made for Christ during that week as well.

The seminary reopened August 19, with 11 New students, 4 in music and 7 in theology. Student body enrollment is now between 40 - 50 students, although some only take 1 or 2 courses. In addition, there are 2 extension centers and the biblical counseling program. This year I have 2 new piano students, 1 from Cancun and 1 from Tabasco.

I continue visiting different village congregations each weekend as I am able. It is sometimes challenging to find a person who can both drive and preach, but most Saturday evenings find me away at one of the more remote congregations in the state of Yucatan.

Debbie's homeschooling program increased with 10 new students in middle & high school. As the director, she has been busy getting all the materials together and lining up the teacher tutors for each grade. This is a ministry to families of missionaries and believers here in the city of Merida, but also a Christian outreach because about 1/3 of the students come from non-Christian families. All students participate in Bible classes and small group Bible studies at school.

Little Diego entered a young-fives Kindergarten class this fall. Here in Mexico there are three years of pre-school/kindergarten before starting grade school. He enjoyed learning to swim more this summer every opportunity he had, and will start Tae Kwon Do at school 2 days each week.

Debbie and I took advantage of having some vacation days to visit doctors. She is doing well following her surgery. I saw a dermatologist because of dark colored spots on my arms and legs. He feels it is the accumulation of sun on my skin all these 78 years! He's treating them and I have to return in a few weeks. However, he assured us it is nothing to be concerned about.

I thank the Lord for his help and protection at every moment. My times are in his hands and I am grateful that he has enabled me to do so much following last year's accident. May you feel his special help and protection as you begin your fall activities.

From the Pastor's Desk... Recently I had the chance to sit in on my middle daughter's algebra II class, and having done so, I am, as the Psalmist sings, "full of thanksgiving & joy" that our Lord called me to ministry instead of math. I remember Mrs. Bouchillon, in 11th grade trigonometry trying to teach me the quadratic equation - with help, I could get to the right answer, but on my own, somewhere along about 4 or 5 lines down, something would always go... wrong. There's a reason my kids, when they need help with math & algebra homework, look for their mom rather than their dad.

As a pastor, I often get questions about what books I would recommend for certain people or certain situations. This is something that happens to most pastors, so much so, in fact, that it's a pretty common sort of question asked during ordination exams for teaching elders (at least, in the last 3 presbyteries in which I've been a member). More often than not, these are books on prayer, theology, or about Christians living in & through difficult situations, or maybe books about Christians who have already lived through difficult times. Sometimes, though, the books are a little different. One of my own favorite Christian authors is C.S. Lewis, a Christian, a scholar, a professor, and the writer of a number of those books that fit - if nowhere else - in that "little different" category. There are his science fiction trilogy, his devotions, the Screwtape Letters, the Narnia books (Christian fairy tales, if you'd believe it!), and, of course, his book which defines - for him and so many others - what it means to live what Watchman Nee calls "the Ordinary Christian Life": Mere Christianity.

I haven't often recommended Mere Christianity myself, though I've very often had other pastors recommend it to me & to their churches. This isn't because I don't think highly of the book (I do!) nor because I don't think Lewis' powerful introduction to Christianity is valuable (it is!). I haven't recommended it because I haven't often had a reason. Today, though, I think I do. Increasingly, I am reminded we live in an age, in a culture, in a nation that has forgotten what it means to be truly, simply Christian - notice I didn't say the Church has forgotten this. It hasn't. Our nation, our national media, our national conversation (or what passes for it on social media), however has forgotten, and so it has created a neat fictional Christianity it uses as a stand-in for the real thing.

What do I mean? Christians - as defined by the American media & social media are either well-meaning ninnies, or Neanderthal brutes. "Bad guy" Christians are played or described backwards, anti-science, anti-progress, antiimmigrant, anti-intellectual, redneck bullies who want to oppress women, gays, & minorities, whose main dream is to push western culture back into the "Dark Ages" of institutionalized Christendom.

"Good guy" Christians are shown to be well-meaning, accepting, but still not-quite as smart, not-quite as brave, notquite as... good as they can be - but are useful for making inroads for the truly smart, truly progressive, truly intellectual forces to push the rest of the Church into the 21st Century.

The best Christians - according to this fiction built around the world having forgotten true Christianity - the absolute best Christians are those who understand that their religion, their faith, is but one of many, many truths that help people cope with the unknown. A flickering hope - nothing more, nothing less.

Yet, none of these are accurate, none of these are true, and none of these actually present the Christian as his or her true person. They've taken all the pieces of Christianity, added them together, but somewhere, the equation's gone horribly wrong.

Interestingly, even in 1950s England, CS Lewis saw this fictional view of Christianity beginning to develop, and Mere Christianity, in some ways, is his response. In Mere Christianity, he writes, "... being a Christian does mean thinking that where Christianity differs from other religions, Christianity is right and they are wrong. As in arithmetic - there is only one right answer to a sum, and all other answers are wrong..." (my emphasis). In other words, as Jesus himself says, in John 14.6, "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father except by me." To be a Christian is to take Jesus - the Christ - at his own word. To do otherwise is to say that Jesus, in John 14, is a liar or a madman - and if we do that, we lose the Christ.

So what do we do? Lament? Rant & rave on social media? Crawl back into bed and wish it were tomorrow? Or do we look at the age in which we live, seeing its fictional Christian, its bad-math Christian, and live our faith authentically, truly, real-ly in the same way that Mrs. Bouchillon's red pen worked across my quadratic equations? Do we offer - by letting the world see us, hear us, experience our prayers, our charities, our ministries, our love for one another, our love that overflows onto the "least of these" and even onto our enemies - a corrected view of what it means to be, as Lewis writes, "merely" or simply Christian? What opportunities might that create? What glory might that lift to the Lord Jesus our Savior? Live your purpose: Glorify God - and enjoy Him always as you live your faith, simply, purely, and truly, dependent on Jesus, the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Amen. - Pastor Chris

From the Pastor's Desk... "The best "No" vote I ever got...

8 years ago, this month, my friend Alba was diagnosed with what Duke University Hospital called inoperable cancer-and she was given no more than 1 year to live. As her husband Steven said to me this week, they've had 8, not easy, but wonderful years together since then-because "God is Great!"

Steven holds a special place in my heart, not only for his friendship & brotherhood in Christ Jesus, but because of a "No" vote he once cast. It happened this way-when God called me to leave my NC churches, I presented my resignation to the church, and Steven voted, loudly & clearly, "No." Now, that seems like a harsh thing to do, maybe even a disrespectful or unpleasant thing to say—but I can tell you that, both in that moment in 2015, and even now more than 4 years later, I can hear that "No" even today as one of the most blessed encouragements in my ministry and in my life. That "No" warmed my heart and reaffirmed—in that brief moment—God's calling, God's love, and God's grace in my life.

I thank God, and will always thank him for Steven's "No."

When do we need a "No" in our lives? That doesn't sound like the sort of answer we'd want to get. When we guys bend on one knee, open that box-is it "No" we want to hear? When we look wistfully at the car, pick up the keys, and head for the door—is it "No" we hope our parents say? When we pick up the phone on Saturday evening, dressed & ready to go—is it "No" we expect to ring in our ears? When is "No" a good answer? And that's just humanly speaking! Doesn't the Bible say—"And he will supply every need"? Doesn't the Bible say—"He has graciously given us all things"? Doesn't that sound like God would be the last person to ever say, "No"? How could he do that to us? How could he bless us through a "No"? Is it even possible?

Well—to answer that question, we've got to realize what God *actually* says, compared to what we think he says, or what we want him to say. So, what does God say? So does the Bible actually say, "He will supply every need"? Yes-in Philippians 4.19-20: "And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus—to our God and Father be glory forever and ever. Amen." Wait a minute—did you see that? Paul (writing this from PRISON), tells us, as he closes his letter to Philippi in prayer, that God will give us our NEEDS... through & in the person of Jesus Christ, for God's own glory.

Huh. I wonder what sort of NEED we might have for which Christ is the only provision? How about "He has graciously given us all things"? That comes from Romans 8.31-33, "If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies." Hey—isn't this saying the same thing as Philippians 4? God will give us everything we NEED... through & in the person of Jesus Christ, for God's own glory. And this time, it's not Paul who's being persecuted, "led like sheep to the slaughter daily"—it's the Roman Church!

God doesn't always say "Yes"—but he always gives us what we need in Jesus. And sometimes—and this is as hard to write as it is to hear—sometimes what we need in Jesus is for God to tell us "No." The same Paul—imprisoned when he wrote Philippians, writing to the persecuted faithful when he wrote Romans-this same Paul, in his second letter to Corinth tells us about a time God told him "No": "The Lord said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me" (2 Corinthians 12:9). Look at that—Paul asked to be healed, something he thought he needed, something that would seemingly improve both his quality of life and the quality of his ministry, and God said, resoundingly, "No-this is not what you need in Christ Jesus."

Paul needed his "thorn", his weakness. Peter needed to be humbled—and drenched, when he leapt boldly out of the boat. Mark needed to be left behind when Paul took off to visit the churches. Titus needed to be left in Crete (Titus 1.5), Trophimus needed to be left in Miletus (2 Timothy 4.20), John needed to be exiled on Patmos—because in those moments of God's saying "No", he was blessing each of these men with what they NEEDED in Christ Jesus. Where are you? What do you need from God? A "Yes"—sometimes (many, many times, in fact) God is indeed saying "Yes" to you in amazing, beautiful, wonderful ways. Sometimes-more times than you could imagine, in fact-he's said "Yes" by denying Satan's influence over you, by his Holy Spirit's restraining those who would or could harm you, by healing you or preventing you from injury. But sometimes—sometimes, don't you need God's glorious, gra-cious "No"—a "No" like Paul's, that thrust him entirely into the everlasting arms of Jesus? Don't you need God's glorious, gracious "No"—a "No" like Steven's vote, an affirmation, a blessing, even when you think you're finished? Sometimes nothing is sweeter, nothing is better than God—in his infinitely immeasurably good love—saying, "Child—I love you. No."



Dear friends and prayer partners,

Oh come let us adore Him. Christ the Lord. Let all that has breath praise the Lord. Let us praise, give thanks and worship the Lord because of His very best that He has given us.

From my house I can hear the seminary choir rehearsing for the December 5 concert which marks the end of first semester. It is also the end of my teaching until August because I cannot distinguish the printed notes for the students in the spring. There are now about 50 students on campus, not counting the expansion centers and the biblical counseling program or the youth program.

I continue visiting villages about two hours away most weekends, depending on if I can find a driver/preacher. In Yalcobá, the leader of the congregation is in need of surgery due to a hernia on his spinal column. Personal family and congregational concerns become my prayer concerns also. The people in these villages have been friends for many years and are almost like family to me. In Temax, Debbie and I recently went to say goodbye to some very dear Korean missionaries who have retired and will not be able to come back due to health concerns. Dave and I worked extensively with them. My Merida church recently celebrated its 133rd anniversary. In November, I played for a wedding there, accompanying a young man who plays flute and a girl who plays the violin. There are many avenues of service open to me.

Looking to the new year, the Sac Be presbytery will be meeting here in Merida, January 7-9. A friend is going to take me and help sell books with me. I will be able to come home to sleep at night which solves a big problem because everybody here sleeps in hammocks and I now can only use a bed. On February 4, the seminary reopens and Dr. Will Ackles and his wife will be coming to teach again. I look forward to their presence at my house.

My grandchildren are all occupied in applying to colleges and thinking about their future while the younger ones are still in school. Diego will be five January 1 and he loves reading the Jesus Bible story book every day, and playing with dinosaurs and cars. He and I go swimming at the same pool, although it is becoming a little cooler now.

My health is generally all right, although I still have some problems related to the accident. Low vision and impaired mobility have taught me a lot about patience and accepting what the Lord brings into our lives. I still am thankful for what I can do, and try to accept what I cannot do.

Let us face 2020 knowing it is in His hands and therefore will be for our good and His glory.
