Human Movie (36 min)

Human Movie is a media essay that uses glitched, deliberately "noisy" generated video and audio to explore the definition of being human through contrasts with and comparisons to artificial intelligence systems. Centering static as both an aspect of generative AI infrastructures and as a metaphor for confusion and uncertainty, the film provides a space where borders and definitions are deliberately fuzzy. Nonetheless, the film proposes that noise can be truly generative if humans cultivate creativity and embrace complexity rather than surrender to machines.

This is My Face (6 min)

Trapped at an ornate vanity mirror, a young woman spirals into madness while attempting to conceal severe acne. *This Is My Face* uses a combination of digital footage, Super 8mm, scratch film, and film painting to explore the act of concealment, what we hide from others and fail to hide from ourselves.

A film that tries to reflect the contemporary moment and the way it feels to exist in the 2020s as honestly and accurately as possible. Filmed in 2022, a group of people in NYC mostly just try to stay alive and feel okay in a society that seems to be degenerating in every direction. Now time and entropy has scattered us like garbage in the waves. but for one moment we were all together and we were beautiful.

The arrival of a pharmaceutical company's promotional VHS tape disrupts an otherwise ordinary day in the life of a Montreal shut-in.

Mechanism (5 min)

Mechanism is an experimental film which features a single character transforming into four comedic archetypes, randomly generated from over 150 terms derived from genre film, fashion, queer camp, web culture, and pop psychology. *Mechanism* explores the ways in which laughter can be divorced from humour, particularly for those for whom laughter is both the only escape and the damning symptom of hysteria, malaise, and malevolence.
