ESSEX



Essex is a large county situated to the north-east of London and extending eastwards to the sea. Its southern border is defined by the River Thames, to the north it is bordered by the counties of Cambridgeshire and Suffolk, and to the west by the counties of Middlesex and Hertfordshire. Its situation means that it has always been home to a wide range of trades, from agricultural and seafaring activities to the typical occupations of the metropolis.

There are records of efforts to regulate weights and measures by the county authorities in the first half of the 18th century. The Acts of 1834/5 were implemented by the appointment of civilian inspectors, but they were replaced by police officers in 1844. Initially there were 15 police divisions, but there were a few changes, most notably in 1868 when a new Metropolitan District was established. The appointment of qualified inspectors began in the 1890s.

The county had four ancient boroughs, Colchester, Harwich, Maldon, and Saffron Walden, The Liberty of Havering (including the town of Romford) briefly exercised separate authority, and the town of Brightlingsea also claimed jurisdiction, based on an ancient right. West Ham became a county borough and a Weights and Measures Authority in 1888, as did East Ham in 1910 and Southend in 1914,

The trade in Essex was largely influenced by its proximity to the East End of London. The London firm of Warmisham set up a branch in Chelmsford in 1874. Other firms established in the nineteenth century were Davies in Colchester, Perry in Ilford and Southend, Housden in Forest Gate, and Quiney in Leytonstone.

Additional Districts for WM inspection (1859-1904)

[Chelmsford Chronicle, Essex Herald, Essex Standard]

The *Romford* district was set up in the former Liberty of Havering-atte-Bower in 1859, as a sub-division of the Brentwood Division. The police inspectors, who served as IWM within the Liberty of Havering-atte-Bower, were: William Gilpin 1859-75 and James Pepper 1875-9, when the power of inspection was removed from the Liberty. Pepper continued in charge of the subdivision, until his death in 1881and was followed by Thomas Simmons (1881-1885). Following the 1889 WM Act, when inspection in several boroughs devolved to the County, WM inspection was formalised within the subdivision with the issue of the number **509** in 1890. The inspectors holding office for this division were: Inspector William Willsmer (1889-95), Inspector Cooper (1895) and Supt George Allen (1896-1904).

The *Metropolitan/Ilford* district 15/**189**: Created in 1868, it was formed from parishes within the Brentwood and Epping districts, served by the metropolitan police; those parishes removed from the Brentwood district were replaced by those of the former Orsett district [*ES 1/7/68*]. The inspector could not be a serving member of the Essex constabulary but John May (1868-70) and James Rogerson (1870-76) acted as IWM on their resignations from the County Constabulary. Mark Robinson Kittoe (1876-1900) was latterly based in East Ham; he was followed by Daniel MacKirdy (q1890/1 in Dumfries) [*MR* 1900:66], who continued in post after the reorganisation of 1904.

The Borough of Harwich had used inspectors from within the Essex Constabulary since 1857, when the borough force was absorbed into the County one; inspection was not transferred formally to the County until 1904. However, following the WM Act of 1889, **461** appeared in the County listings and in 1893 the County agreed to rent the borough standards (at £1 per annum), conditional on their being maintained in good repair. The inspectors holding office under this arrangement were: Inspector William Fulcher (1889-94), Sergeant William T.J. Howlett **q 1892/3** (1894-95), Supt Herbert George Ackers (1895-97), Pc William George Page (1897-98), Supt Herbert George Ackers (1898-1904).

Grays 508 was established as a WM district, following the 1889 Act, under Supt George Jordan (1889-1904).

Maldon **510** was also established as a WM district, following the 1889 Act. Inspectors were: Inspector Charles Halsey (1889-91), Supt Thomas Gillis (1891-93) Supt Charles Halsey (1893-1901), Sergeant/Inspector Harry Laver (1901-1904).

Barking: became a London Borough and WMA in 1965 and took over No.607 from the county.

Basildon: an Urban District with a population of over 60,000, which successfully applied to become a WMA in 1965.

Brightlingsea: In 1833, the defence claim against a charge made by James Holby, the IWM for the Tendring Division, rested on the fact that Brightlingsea was responsible for its own WM, appointing their IWM at a Court Leet, established under Ancient Rights. This same view was put forward in 1871, when it was argued that Brightlingsea held an ancient jurisdiction as an appendage to the Cinque Port of Sandwich, that had never been cancelled, authorising them to appoint their own IWM; because of this right, the parish had been excluded from the Colchester Division [*ES 15/9/71*]. In 1887, a discussion was held re maintaining the rights of the parish to appoint its own IWM; at the meeting, there was a "formidable" display of WM, but most sets were incomplete [*ES 17/12/1887*]. However, in the schedule of inspection by the Essex Constabulary for 1890, following the 1889 Act, two visits to Brightlingsea are listed, as part of District 177. Despite this, in 1895, the right of Brightlingsea to appoint its own IWM was reasserted in 1895 [*ES 19/10/95*] and again in 1901 [*CC 6/12/1901*].

The mark is a simplified version of the ancient arms of the borough, depicting a cross with three crowns.

In 1834 it was reported that the inspector, William Barnes, continued in office under the provisions of a former Act, but was not appointed under the 1834 Act. In 1836, Thomas Rouse, ironmonger, was cited as the IWM [ES 22/1/36] but a year later the same paper carried news of his election as IWM, in opposition to Barnes [ES 21/4/37]; Barnes had also received the standards in 1837 [SBk]. By 1845, the standards were in need of repair and it was questioned whether the borough post should be held by the borough police, as the police now acted within the county [CC 14/2/45]. Despite numerous attempts to oust Rouse, with different views held by the Borough Magistrates, who held the power to appoint, and the Town Council who held the purse, he continued in post until his death in 1872 [ES 9/2/72].

Obadiah Downes (CC 1858-73) was finally appointed IWM in 1872 [ES 23/2/72] and followed in post by George Mercer (CC 1873-83) w], and R.O. Coombs (CC 1882-1902). was listed in 1892 and 1896 [AR]. In 1896 he was assisted by Albert Winterbottom (q1892/3 in Oldham), who left for Hartlepool in 1898. Adam Ward served from 1898-1904, when he was appointed IWM for the Northern Division of the County [MR 50:87]. Samuel Midgley (CC 1902-12) was stated to be IWM in both1902 and 1904 [K], but he was unqualified.

George Ball (q1902/3 in Lancashire) was in Colchester -1905-37, but curiously he is not listed in 1922 [*Hbk*], when the only inspector listed was T.H. Greenfield (q1908 in Liverpool).

Subsequently the chief inspectors were: H.G. Kimber (1938-1954) [MR 38:15, 54:219] and W.J. Bunn (1955-73-) [MR 55:27]. Adam Ward came out of retirement to serve from 1940-46, whilst Kimber was on war service [MR 50:87].

Until 1904 the office for the Metropolitan District of Essex was in East Ham, and it is probable that the county inspector continued to act for a few years after that.

The first inspector for the borough was William Kirk (q1908 in Nottingham), who was appointed in 1911. In the 1920s more numbers (all previously used elsewhere) were issued, as new assistants were appointed: 219 to R.Race, 222 to F.W. French, and 228 to E.C. Writer. These numbers were later transferred to other inspectors.

William Kirk retired in 1931 and was succeeded as chief inspector by L.E. Kirk (1931-56-) [MR 31:103]. In 1965 East Ham was united with West Ham to form the new London Borough of **Newham.**

William Burton (CC 1836-38) was appointed as inspector in 1834. Subsequent chief constables were: Thomas Wilding (CC 1838-42), James Pain (1842-45-), George Coleman (1848-57).

The borough police force was amalgamated with the county force in 1857. Thereafter inspection was done by policemen of the county force, acting under the authority of the borough: Robert Banks (-1858-63), John Guy (1863-82), John Megran (1882-87), William Fulcher (1887-94), William T.J. Howlett q 1892/3 (1894-95), Herbert George Ackers (1895-97), William George Page (1897-98), Herbert George Ackers (1898-1904). From 1889, District 461 appeared as one of the Districts covered by the Essex Constabulary (see above).

In 1893, Essex County Council negotiated for the Harwich standards and the borough, although unwilling to sell, was prepared to loan them to the County at an annual rent of £1, subject to the standards being maintained in good condition [ES 8/4/93]. Finally, in 1904 authority was formally transferred to the county.

In 1834 the inspector appointed was John Delamare of Romford, gentleman, who was also inspector for the Romford division of the county. He continued to act for the borough, until 1846 and was replaced by John Haydon, an inspector of police serving in Romford [*CC 5/6/46*]. Haydon was replaced in 1850 by Samuel Beardswell, serving in the Orsett division. In 1853, James May (of the Romford division) and John Lenaan were paid a year's salary as IWMs for the Liberty [*CC 24/6/53*]. The following year, May was acting alone and continued until William Gilpin took over in 1856.

Although the standard weights were reverified for the county in 1859, the Liberty continued to hold the responsibility for paying the inspector. William Gilpin continued in post until his resignation in 1875. Inspector James Pepper was appointed at the Romford Liberty QS to act in his stead [ES 7/1/76]. But under the WM Act of 1879, this responsibility was removed from the Liberty.

Havering became a London Borough, and consequently a WMA again, in 1965, and took over No. 609 from the county.

In 1827 standard weights were issued to the town clerk. In 1844 standard measures were issued to William Gill, inspector, who was a blacksmith, continuing in post until his death in 1867, although still listed in 1870 [PO]. The standards were reverified for the borough in 1861.

William King (CC 1863-78) was appointed as IWM in 1872 [CC 19/7/72] and was also listed in 1874 [Kelly], and George Wombwell (CC 1878-88) was listed annually as the IWM in the Essex Standard. The non-uniform mark was still in use in 1882 [AR], and no number was issued. Head Constable Charles Halsey was listed as the IWM in 1888 [ES 29/12/88] and, when the borough was disqualified in 1889 because its population was less than 10,000, he joined the Essex Constabulary, serving as the first IWM of the newly formed District 510 (Maldon) (see above).

Redbridge: became a London Borough and WMA in 1965, and took over Nos.179, 189 and 608 from the county.

The mark is a saffron (crocus) which gives the town its name.

In 1834 standards were issued to the inspector, Joseph Kent, a pattern maker. In 1842, a letter appeared in the Essex Standard, complaining that there had been no inspection of WM for ten years [ES 30/9/42]; in November of that year, W.S. Stuart was holding the standards [ERO]. But William Campling (CC 1848-49) was said to be the IWM, at the time of his murder [ES 13/11/49]. He was followed as Head Constable by James Doss (1849-52) and Benjamin Judd (1852-56); however, Henry Wisbey, a bellhanger and cutler, was cited as the Inspector in 1853 [ES 16/12/53]. The borough police force existed only until 1857, when it became part of the county, and Inspector Timothy Rowan, of the County Constabulary, was appointed IWM [CC 11/12/57]; he continued in post until his death in 1873. George Allen followed (1875-82). John Aylett was appointed IWM, in succession to Inspector Allen [CC 5/5/82]. On Aylett's early retirement in 1884, Inspector Cooper was appointed in his stead [EH 28/4/84]. Cooper held office for less than a year before George Jordan assumed the post of IWM [EH 23/2/85].

The borough was assigned No. 75 in 1879 but disqualified in 1889 because its population was less than 10,000.

In 1914 Southend became a county borough, and consequently a WMA, and was allocated No. 457 (previously used in Carmarthen.)

The first chief constable was Henry Kerslake (CC 1914-1935), who had qualified as IWM in 1908 in Durham. He was assisted by Henry Young (q1915/20 Winchester; -1922-28-), and Arthur Hunt (q1913 in Winchester, -1928-). The next chief constable G.R. Crockford (CC 1935-38) was apparently not qualified, but Arthur Hunt became CC and chief inspector of WM in 1939, retiring in 1953. He was followed by J.G. Clark (1954-72-) [MR 54:4].

When the CB was abolished in 1974, the new District Council successfully negotiated an agency agreement with the county, which allowed it to retain authority over WM.

Thurrock: an Urban District with a population of over 60,000, which successfully applied to become a WMA in 1965.

Waltham Forest: became a London Borough and WMA in 1965 and took over Nos.186 and 604 from the county.

West Ham became a CB in 1888, having formerly been part of Essex. F.A. Allison was appointed in 1888, being replaced in 1891 by the first qualified inspector John Bowen (q1891/2), who continued in post until 1909 [*MR* 1909: 28]. He was followed by Edwin Dixon (q1903/4 in Essex, 1909-39) [*MR* 1909: 85]. In the 1920s several new numbers were issued: 541, 542 in 1921; 543 in 1923, 544 in 1924.

Harold Cole (q1909 in Denbigh) was in West Ham by 1918, taking over as chief inspector on Dixon's retirement. He retired in 1947 and was succeeded by Andrew Allison (1947-56-) [MR 47: 3].

In 1965 West Ham was united with East Ham to form the new LB of Newham.

Wethersfield: standards [413] were issued to the Bailiff for this Manor in 1828. Inspection had ceased by 1866.


