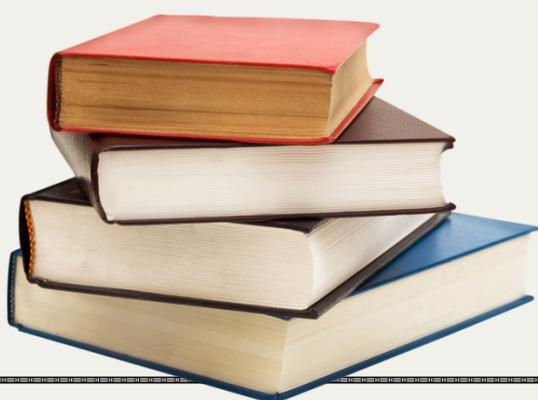

2. Second Book Rights: If your contract includes an option for a second book, consider whether the terms are fair and whether they allow room for renegotiation if your first book is successful.
3. Territorial Rights: Ensure you understand what regions (domestic or international) the rights cover.
4. Other Rights: These could include audiobook rights, film rights, and more.

While agents are professionals with your best interests in mind, they also have their own business goals. Be prepared to compromise but also know your bottom line.

The advance is a gamble—publishers bet that your book will sell enough copies to cover the upfront payment and generate additional profit. Advances can range widely, from as little as \$1,000 to as much as \$1,000,000, though most authors fall somewhere in the middle.

Remember, the advance is not "free money." It's an investment the publisher makes in your book, and until they recoup that investment, you won't see additional royalty checks. However, a higher advance can also indicate a stronger belief in your book's potential success.
