The mission of The Royal Canadian Legion is "to serve veterans and their dependents, to promote Remembrance, and to act in the service of Canada and its communities."



In essence, the purposes and objects of the Legion were born of the need to further the spirit of comradeship and mutual assistance among all who have served and never to forget the deeds of the fallen.

Currently, our branch has 148 Ordinary and 276 Associate members. An Ordinary member is a Veteran, and an Associate member is the

family of a Veteran. That is 424 people in total. That number is just a fraction of the total number of Veterans and their family members that live in the Yukon. Not all choose to be members of the Legion, but we will support all in the Yukon as we are just a conduit to ensure they get the help and support they need.

Since our last issue, many individuals have contacted us. Some require assistance financially or with VAC paperwork. Some are looking for guidance or fact-finding to see if they qualify for any VAC programs like medical assistance (physical or mental issues) or even pensions. Some just for an ear to listen.

We are also working with local agencies like Safe at Home and Blood Ties Four Directions Centre and national groups like Vets Canada to identify any homeless Veterans in the Yukon. The Post Traumatic Growth Association (PTGA) is a nonprofit

organization developed to support Veterans, First Responders, RCMP and law enforcement. PTGA has sponsored a number of events (glass blowing, trip to the hot springs) to help bring Veterans and their families together in a safe and secure environment. Many more events are being planned at little or no cost.

Working with all these local and national agencies opens many doors. During service, you are exposed to many horrors. Unfortunately, they follow you home, and this now affects your family. We aim to improve the lives of both the Veterans and their families.

The Legion is not your average social club, nor is it just a bar. It is a gathering place for those that served to share stories, seek comfort and aid when required. It is a place to go to be amongst those that understand or "have been there, done that and got the t-shirt."

On the 2nd and 4th Monday evenings of every month, the Whitehorse Legion will be open to all Veterans, Police and First Responders to get together. These will be held in the Legion Lounge from 1900hrs until 2100hrs (7-9 pm) until a more suitable venue is sourced. This time is reserved for all those seeking information or who wish to provide input into what services are required or expected from the Legion, Veterans Affairs Canada or other Veteran service providers.

As your Service Officer, I will advocate on your behalf to our Legion Executive Committee, Veteran Affairs Canada and service providers your concerns to help better enhance the future for Veterans, Police and First Responders within our community. The needs of current Veterans are ever-changing, and with your input, we (the Legion) can better adapt and service those in need.

Do you need assistance or benefits from Veterans Affairs Canada?

You are eligible to receive a Veteran's Service Card (VSC) if you have completed basic training and been honourably released from the Canadian Armed Forces.

Honour House Supports Veterans

Help us help our heroes because sometimes even heroes need a home...

Honour House is a refuge, a "home away from home" for members of our Canadian Armed Forces, Veterans, Emergency Services Personnel and their families to stay, completely free of charge, while they are receiving medical care and treatment in the Metro Vancouver area.

Representatives from Honour House have been travelling all over BC and the Yukon on the "Tour of Honour" to spread the word about this great charity. Two retired Vancouver City Police Officers spent about a week in Whitehorse.

Wayne and Lisa were kept busy all week with visits to the Corrections Officers, Wildland Fire Fighters, Emergency Measures Office and even a trip to Haines Junction and Carmacks to see the Canadian Rangers and community EMS staff. They even managed to slip in a tour of the Legislature and got some time with Premier Ranj Pillai and Minister Tracy-Anne McPhee. Inland-Kenworth Whitehorse even held a by-donation BBQ that was attended by many from the EMS world. A trip to Mighty Wash to get their vehicle and trailer cleaned was also in order. There they met some staff from NexGen Mechanical Solutions who own Mighty Wash. A portion of that day's profits is being donated to Honour House.

A big thanks to both organizations for supporting this cause

On Wednesday evening, June 17th, they put on a presentation at the Legion to about 30+ people from various EMS units, including the RCMP Veterans Association, CASARA and many others. A cheque for \$10,000 was presented to Honour House from the Whitehorse Legion Poppy Fund to support the great work they do. Many Veterans and EMS personnel and their families have stayed at Honour House during visits to Vancouver for medical appointments. It is imperative that this facility stays open to support these groups during their trips south.

People have enough to worry about with their family medical situations, and then compounding the expense of accommodations can be very stressful. Honour House has one paid staff, and all the rest are volunteers, so the money goes directly to support the upkeep of the facility.

If you are serving in the Canadian Military, RCMP, EMS (Paramedics, Firefighter (Volunteer, Full-Time or Wildland Fire)), Sheriffs, CBSA, Corrections, Emergency Dispatchers, Search and Rescue, Conservation or Fisheries Officers or are a Veteran or retired from any of these groups, you may be eligible to stay at Honour House.

If you are a Veteran (Military or RCMP), First Responder, EMS or family member who has a story of Remembrance that they would like to share, we would like you to send it to us. Every Remembrance Day, these stories are published in the "Lest We Forget" flyer, which the Whitehorse Legion distributes. CATF is our publisher and a huge supporter of the Legion and Veterans. The name of the Veteran whom the wreath is being purchased for will be published in the "Lest We Forget" flyer. Wreaths can also be purchased for display in homes, on grave sites, or at memorials.

If you are in the communities, we can arrange to deliver wreaths. It is important that no matter where you are, "Yukon Remembers."

Whitehorse Legion History



History of the **Royal Canadian Army Cadet Organization**

The Royal Canadian Army Cadet Organization traces its



beginning to 1861. At the time, the American Civil War (1861-1865) was going on, and the fear existed that British North America would be invaded by some of the warring parties. To prepare for such, educational and similar public institutions set up militia associations where males between the age of 13 and 60 would train in drill and weapon training.

In June 1861, the Trinity College Volunteer Rifle Company was formed in Port Hope, Ontario. Not to be outdone, in December 1861, the Bishop College School Cadet Company in Lennoxville, Quebec, also formed a cadet unit. At the time, the Cadet program was compulsory for all male students. It was organized and was run almost entirely by senior Cadets. Instruction was given in skills such as first aid, outdoor education, drill, and weapon handling. Actually, the Bishop College Cadets are the oldest continually operating cadet unit in Canada, as the Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps #2 (RCACC 2).

As these organizations were pro-military and part of the Militia, during the Fenian Raids of 1866, the Upper Canada Rifle Company, a Cadet Unit, was called to fight alongside its parent Unit at Ridgeway, ON, when a militia unit of the Fenian Brotherhood attacked the town. During the Louis Riel rebellion of 1885, various schools were issued military uniforms, weapons and other equipment in order to provide military training to their students, based on the School Cadets Organization. However, none participated in the ensuing military involvement.

In 1898, the Canadian Militia of the time issued High School Cadet Instructor Certificate to those male teachers involved in Cadet training at their schools. Then by a Special General Order of Parliament, the Cadet Instructor Cadre was formed in 1903.

In 1909, the Corps of School Cadet Instructors was established to provide a standard of training to qualified male school teachers, who, in turn, would train their Cadets under the same training standard.

Between 1921 and 1924, the Cadet Corps was reorganized and designated the Cadet Service of Canada. With the integration of the Canadian Armed Forces in 1968, the Cadet Service of Canada was designated as the Cadet Instructor List and male youth between the age of 12 and 18 were invited to join the Cadet Organization. Female cadets and officers were officially accepted into the Army Cadet Movement in 1975.

Then in 1994, it was re-named the Cadet Instructor Cadre (CIC), much as it was in 1903. A significant change occurred in 2009 when the CIC became a sub-component of the Reserve Force and was re-named The Cadet Organizations Administration and Training Service (COATS), which is where it stands at present. The instructional programs changed as time passed, and even though the program no longer operates as a pre-training for a military career, it still presents this option to participating youth.

As it had been a tradition since 1866, upon formation, an Army Cadet Corps would become affiliated to a close-by Army Unit, mainly for support and leadership. When the Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps 2685 (RCACC 2685) was formed in the 1950s, it was first affiliated with the 2nd Battalion of the Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI) stationed in Edmonton, AB. Then in 1962, when a Militia Unit formed in Whitehorse, The Yukon Regiment, the Corps adopted the name.

Through the years, the number of Army Cadets participating in the movement changed according to local training conditions and leadership, from as low as 10 to as high as mid 30s. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 restrictions, every Cadet Corps and Squadron in Northern Canada deeply suffered, and a number were shut down.

The Yukon Regiment Army Cadet Corps, however, survived the restrictions and is presently gaining strength. A tribute to its leadership and those Cadets who continued through it all, a bright future awaits the Corps.

The present **MISSION** of the Cadet Program is to contribute to the development and preparation of youth for the transition to adulthood, enabling them to meet the challenges of modern society through a dynamic community-based program
