Rectors Ramblings

2 Kings 2.1-12; Psalm 50.1-6; 2 Corinthians 4.3-6; Mark 9.2-9

Dear Friends,

This week we hold His Majesty King Charles, and all those facing a diagnosis and treatment for cancer in our prayers. Apparently half of us will receive such a diagnosis at least once in our lives and this week's news highlights the importance for frank and open conversation around cancer, and the need for our continued support for those seeking a cure.

We have had a fabulous start to the week where we signed up 32 Young People and 5 Leaders to go to the Diocesan youth gathering called May Camp at Plumpton Racecourse at the end of May. This is the largest group we have ever taken, and we are one of the largest groups going to May Camp this year so your prayers would be gratefully received and many thanks to all have supported our Youth Work across the two parishes.

This Sunday concludes the Epiphany themes of revelation with the transfiguration of Jesus. His appearance with Moses and Elijah places him in a succession of witness and revelation, continued by the disciples who were present, and indeed by us today.

This week's scripture invites to reflect on the challenges of being a disciple and the importance of passing on what we have received to others.

Sharing our lived experiences, chronicling everything from pain management to drug addiction abound online, but who do they really benefit?

New research led by experts at the University of Nottingham and published this week in 'World Psychiatry' proves definitively that – in mental health settings at least – they do.

The team painstakingly curated a digital library of hundreds of audios, video, written word, and image files recounting stories of mental health recovery, told through prose, poetry and even the odd graphic novella.

Study participants, all with non-psychotic mental health problems like low mood, stress, and anxiety, were given access to use it as much or as little as they liked over the course of a year. The results revealed an uplift in their quality of life.

This research shows that sharing personal accounts of how people have overcome mental health struggles are effective at helping others in similar situations. Dr Stefan Rennick-Egglestone, the study coordinator, states that they kept all the narratives in – good and bad – in order to provide truth. It is this truth that has helped the participants within the study, with one person explaining that 'Just sharing the story, sharing the hurt, the confusion, or the fight was enough for me.' It connected people in a truth, and within that truth came a "me too" moment, and with that came hope.

In this week's Scripture's we are delving deep into our call to be witnesses and realising the importance of telling others about Jesus.

Dr Stefan's study highlights the importance of keeping things real.

Witnessing is sharing your experience, so let's not wait for us to be strong theologians, or fully grown adults - young people can do it right now. By sharing our journey, including our doubts, confusion, anger, and pain, as well as the wow moments, we could help connect others to God in a powerful way that makes them exclaim "me too!" and bring hope.

Looking forward to seeing you at our Ash Wednesday, this Wednesday at St Mary's 7pm, and don't forget our Lent Course Starts 7pm 22nd Feb.

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.

'I BEG YOU, BEAR WITH ONE ANOTHER IN LOVE'

As we see and hear the unfolding horrors of suffering of the people of Palestine and the people of Israel, we feel great sympathy. Before 7th October and the beginning of the present crisis, an ecumenical group of Christian women from Palestine, the land in which Jesus was born, prepared the 2024 World Day of Prayer Service.

As we participate in the Service, we are part of a great wave of prayer encircling the glove, which begins as the sun rises over Samoa and ends 36 hours later in the Pacific as the sun sets over American Samoa. We will be joining with people in over 146 countries and islands around the world to pray with and for the people of Palestine, and for peace.

The Service shares the experiences of 3 Palestinian Christian women, from 3 different generations, who witness to the power of bearing together in love, despite difficulties and differences, united in prayer for just and harmonious solutions that will bring an end to human suffering, achieving security and peace for all people around the world.
