# Fr Martin's Murmurations

I spent Tuesday of this past week at the Benedictine monastery at Worth. Twelve priests and a retired bishop were addressed by a brother priest on the passage in Genesis 32 where Jacob wrestles with God.

Jacob names the place Peneul which means 'face of God' because he says," I have seen God's face yet my life is preserved." It was considered in Old Testament times to be fatal to gaze upon God. Remember Moses puts his face to the mountain as God passes by and in the wonderful passage describing the vision of Isaiah, he first has to be cleansed since he is a man of unclean lips, unworthy to be in the presence of the pure holiness of God.

This idea of an unapproachable God is, of course, changed by the coming of Jesus. Christians believe both divinity and humanity dwell together in Christ who is truly and fully God and truly and fully man. Such coexistence is possible because Jesus was human like us in everything but sin.

He came as we sing in the Agnus Dei to take away the sin of the world. One of the sin of the world is where a section of humanity ignores the plight of its brothers and sisters who are in need. The Gospel story for the fourth Sunday after Trinity tells the parable of the Good Samaritan. The representatives of law and religion pass by the injured victim on the other side of the road because they are too preoccupied to be bothered. No doubt they had urgent business to attend to!

This story is not only a dramatic way of showing us how we should treat others.. This is the radical Jesus speaking. If the parable was told today the victim may well have been an Israeli soldier and the carer a member of Hammas.

The distance between victim and helper in the Biblical parable was as great as that. Samaritans and Jews hated each other with a passion and for a Samaritan to be the hero of this story, told by Jesus, would have been truly offensive to Jewish listeners. No wonder they sought to get rid of this carpenter turned rabble rouser. The kindness of the Samaritan turns to pure generosity when he tells the innkeeper he will be responsible for all the costs that are incurred.

This story gets to the heart of our Christian life - or at least it should. It is a clear call to love our enemies. The story teaches us the only way to exterminate deep hatred and prejudice is by loving. Love which the law and religion were unable to provide. At the very heart of things Jesus tells us time and time again the only real solution to the cruelty and inhumanity we witness in our world today is love.

After loving God first we are bidden to love our neighbour as ourselves. The new commandment given on the night before he died was that we love one another as he loves us. His love was so great that he laid down his life for us. When we look at the world today we find secular pragmatism or political expediency, both created and sustained by an imperfect humanity, often seem to win the victory over divine love and compassion.

If the message of Jesus is to be delivered and received it must be through love.

Accepting differences, allowing human beings to live in the glorious liberty of the new creation in Christ are fundamental in spreading the Good News. I need to ask myself where am I in the story.

- Am I too busy with the law or with my religion to actually notice there are beaten up individuals all around me?
- Has God liberated me in order to knock down the barriers both law and religion may have built up in my life?
- When I look into the face of the Ukrainian or the Russian or when I look at the Israeli soldier and the children of Gaza do I see the face of God?

It is not easy but neither was my Redemption. I need to pray every day for help to both show and see the face of God in this very troubled world. But show it I must! I need to experience Peneul.

Have a week of blessings and love from our Father who is in Heaven.



# St Peter & St James celebrates 50 years of supporting the community, and launches appeal to ensure they can support generations to come

This Summer, St Peter & St James Hospice in Mid-Sussex is celebrating 50 years of providing expert care to adults with life-limiting illnesses and those close to them. The hospice, which serves the areas of Haywards Heath, Burgess Hill, Lewes, Uckfield and the villages in between, has maintained the same vision throughout the decades; 'to provide the best possible care, in the right place, and at the right time, to everyone who needs us'.

Amanda Fadero, Interim Chief Executive at St Peter & St James Hospice, comments: "Whilst we are incredibly proud to be marking this important milestone in the hospice's story, it is just as critical that we continue to support, and be supported by, the community to help us create our next chapter. The charity is running a 50 year campaign to mark this milestone within the local community including; thank you events and awareness-raising activities as well as aiming to raise £50,000 through community group fundraisers, the big £50 individual donation appeal, corporate support campaigns and the 50 for £50k club for trustees, patrons and major donors."

The site, developed by Susan Dinnage as a nursing home initially, was created in loving memory of her husband and local farmer, Jim Dinnage who died in 1963, and their son, Peter, who died in childhood of Hodgkin's Lymphoma in 1957. The Dinnages had previously set up and run a donkey sanctuary, and so to this day there are still resident donkeys, (Dylan and Dudley) on site at the hospice. Throughout the early years, the hospice continued to expand and increase its capacity to care for those living with life-limiting conditions. Fast forward to 2025, and the hospice cares for more than 1,000 people each year, providing vital services in people's homes, on our in-patient unit and through our Living Well Centre.

The anniversary also gives the hospice an opportunity to raise awareness across the community about specialist palliative and end-of-life care, to make people aware of the support we offer, and to provide people with information and support, to help them live and die well, according to what matters most to them.

Dr Helen McGee, Medical Director at the hospice adds: "As we celebrate 50 years, it gives us the opportunity to make more people aware of what hospice care is, and ensure they know that all the specialist adult services we provide at St Peter & St James Hospice are completely free of charge for all, irrespective of age, religion, background or ethnicity. We would like to thank our community for all their support over the last 50 years, which enables us to provide holistic care, wrapping our arms not only around the patient, but their loved ones too, for as long as they need us. It costs £6.9m to run the hospice each year, and much of our income comes from donations and charity shop sales, rather than central government, so we simply couldn't continue to do what we do without the generosity of our supporters in the local community. 
