Dear Friends,

As I write this week's Ramble, I'm listening to the Album by Olivia Dean called The Art of Loving, and it kinda sums up what this weekend is all about as we come to this most loving of celebrations at Valentines Day How do we love? . . . how do we love each other?

After the Super Bowl Halftime Show on Sunday many Christians from both sides of the pond, took to social media to share strong reactions to Bad Bunny's performance.

For some, the style, music, or cultural expression felt uncomfortable, and the backlash was loud and immediate. Moments like this invite an important question: How are Christians called to respond when culture challenges or confuses us?

It's okay to have personal boundaries. Not every form of music or performance will line up with our values. But our faith calls us to consider not only what we believe, but how we respond. Jesus never told us to agree with everyone; He told us to love everyone.

Bad Bunny's performance reflects a specific culture and identity. For many, it was an expression of creativity and heritage. When our first response is criticism or dismissal, we may miss an opportunity to listen, learn, and reflect Christ's love.

Jesus consistently chose compassion over condemnation. He met people where they were, not where others thought they should be. As His followers, we are called to engage with the world thoughtfully, not fearfully and with humility rather than outrage.

In a world where backlash spreads fast, choosing grace is countercultural. And sometimes, that's exactly what following Jesus looks like, so how do we love each other as God loves us? As Christ modelled that love that cost God his only son

I hope this weekend you are able to find the time to reflect on just how loved you are by God, and how you might reflect that love out into our world.

I will be spending Saturday with my Valentine and 18 teenagers along with our Youth Worker Lee Buck at our NYC Youth Retreat looking at "Why do we Worship?" "What is prayer?" "Why do bad things happen to good people?" and "what does the Creation story mean to me?" "Self-Worth and Identity" and "How can I make the most of this retreat?"

Alongside this we will also be playing Task Master (that's me), Traitors, Nerf War, Spa Time, dodgeball, morning afternoon and late-night worship and creating famous landmarks from biscuits, cake, marshmallows and sweets!!!

Please be praying for our young people, that they may come to know the love of Jesus through our worship and our joy this weekend.

I'll be back in time for Wednesday which is our Ash Wednesday Service at St Mary's and we would love to see a full church as we come together at this start of Lent to reflect and repent together.

Next Monday 23rd Feb at St Mary's Fr Martin will start our Lent course reflecting over the coming weeks on how we "Let the Redeemed Tell their Story". 7pm for pudding we start at 7:30 and finish by 9pm

What does Lent mean to you? No biscuits? Giving up chocolate? Resisting cream cakes for a few weeks? Why give something up? Why do without? What is it for? What has it got to do with Lent anyway?

The word Lent comes from an Anglo-Saxon word: 'lencten', meaning 'spring'. In England we are in that time of year when in Saxon times people started to appreciate the lengthening daylight. This period has traditionally led up to baptism, a period of repentance and instruction. A time when those who had formerly worshipped pagan gods could make a very definite break with the past. Just as Jesus went into the wilderness for 40 days, so Christians have used this time to embark on a period of spiritual exploration and hopefully growth.

You may decide to fast, pray a bit more, perhaps read a book or attend a special course at a local church. Whatever you do, may you find yourself closer to God over the coming weeks, so that when Easter arrives you are really ready to proclaim the risen Lord.

This Sunday, immediately prior to Ash Wednesday is sometimes known as Transfiguration Sunday, marks the end of the season of Epiphany and is therefore known as the Sunday next before Lent.

There is a lot of talk about light during Epiphany, beginning with the shining star that led the Wise Men to Jesus. Epiphany literally means 'to shine on' or 'give light to' and today's gospel reading about the Transfiguration is all about light shining from people's faces, because they have encountered the mystery of God. Transfiguration is the culmination of the epiphany season, the grand finale, where Jesus is revealed to us as being one with God.

This biggest epiphany of all comes just before Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent. There is a connection between this epiphany - the transfiguration - and what is to follow. The transfiguration is the prelude to the cross.

Indeed, the gospel reading marks the transition in Jesus' ministry, after which He 'turns His face towards Jerusalem' and Jesus' return trip down the mountain is the beginning of his fatal journey to Jerusalem.

We too have our mountain top experiences where the light shatters the darkness which can sometimes come in our lives. After them we come 'back down the mountain' changed and inspired, back out into the world to which we are called to reflect the light and glory we have encountered. Sometimes for us, these too can be times of transition and going in a different direction, other times they serve as encouragement and inspiration for the path we are already on.

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.

We know when the early Christians met together they sang psalms and hymns, they read the scriptures and they broke bread.

They rejoiced in the belief that their sins had been washed away by the blood of Jesus and lived, as best they could, lives of righteousness.

They reflected the words of Isaiah when he wrote in Chapter 61 v 10 "he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness."

Christians sometimes live as if they have been clothed in sackcloth and ashes. The world needs more than ever to see us Christians fulfilling our vocation to be lights in this dark world.

Through the Lent Course this year we shall be called on to reaffirm our belief in our salvation and how we wear the robe of righteousness.

We shall think about how we acknowledge the truth," all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God (Romans 3v23) yet at the same time bask in the forgiveness that restores us.

We shall ask what it means to say in our hearts' "behold the servant of the Lord be it unto me according to your word" (Luke 1v38).

On one of our sessions we shall indeed sing hymns and psalms delight in the scriptures and break bread together. The climax hopefully will ask what it means to be the Alleluia people. What kind of people are those who are crazy enough to get up very early on Easter Day to welcome our Lord's victory over sin and death.

Hopefully this will all help to deepen your faith and increase your love for God and neighbour. It will I hope to truly become the Alleluia people.




