Rectors Ramble

2nd Sunday Before Advent Malachi 4:1-2a, 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13, Luke 21:5-19

"Let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action."

John 1

Dear Friends,

Thank you to all who have made our season of Remembrance such a special time, packed services at both St Mary's and St Peter's, an afternoon concert thanks to Andy Rees and Armistice services with our Guides and Rangers on Monday and Bonfire Society on Tuesday in Chailey, and our Member of Parliament Mims Davies joining us on the Green at Newick for the two-minute silence at 11 o'clock on Tuesday.

These events each echo the words of the First Letter of John, "Let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." They call us beyond good intentions into lives of authentic love — a love expressed through truth, care, and concrete action.

This call is at the heart of our faith, and it lies at the centre of what many churches across the country are marking this week: Safeguarding Sunday whose readings are *Psalm 91*, *1 John 3*: *16-24*, *John 15*: *9-17*.

Safeguarding is not just a policy or procedure; it's an expression of love. It reflects our desire for every person to be safe, protected, welcomed, and valued within our churches and in the wider community. To safeguard is to love "in truth and action" — to take seriously the wellbeing of others and to nurture healthy, trustworthy spaces where relationships can flourish.

In recent years, the Church of England has been confronted with painful truths about its failures in safeguarding. We cannot ignore these realities. The journey toward healing requires honesty, repentance, and a willingness to listen to victims and survivors with humility. The Church must continually learn from the past, acknowledge where it has caused harm, and act decisively to ensure that love, protection, and justice define its future.

Psalm 91 is often titled "The Assurance of God's Protection." It paints a picture of God as a refuge — a strong fortress who shields and defends those who trust in Him. "I will protect those who know my name," the Psalmist writes. "When they call to me, I will answer them... I will rescue them and honour them." These words bring deep comfort to many. Yet for some, they may be difficult to hear. For those living with the scars of abuse — physical, emotional, or spiritual — such promises can feel distant or even hollow. The "terrors of the night" are not poetic metaphors but lived realities.

The challenge for the Church is to embody the safety and compassion described in this Psalm — to be a place where God's protection is made tangible through the care and integrity of His people. And just as importantly, we must sit compassionately with those who struggle with these texts, honouring their pain without dismissing it. Our task is not only to speak of refuge but to be one.

In the reading we had at St Mary's last Sunday's Remembrance Service from John's Gospel, Jesus says: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." The night before His crucifixion, He speaks not of power or glory, but of love and friendship. He washes His disciples' feet — even those of the one who would betray Him — and commands them, "Love one another as I have loved you."

This is the model of love the Church is called to follow: a love that refuses domination or abuse, that seeks equality, respect, and humility. It is a love that listens, serves, and restores. To love as Jesus loves means to place the needs of others before our own, to be present in times of trouble, and to offer compassion without judgement.

The First Letter of John expands this vision: "We know love by this, that He laid down His life for us... All who obey His commandments abide in Him, and He abides in them." True discipleship, then, is not about words or appearances but about living truthfully — acknowledging hard realities and standing with those who have been wronged or wounded. **Safeguarding work embodies this command.**

It demands truth — facing the painful reality that abuse has occurred within the Church — and action — doing all that is possible to prevent it from happening again. It calls us to listen to survivors, to place their voices at the heart of our concern, and to create spaces where everyone feels safe and valued. We long to be a refuge for the hurting and the vulnerable. To achieve this, we must nurture communities where mutual care and accountability flourish — where love is more than sentiment and protection is more than procedure. As John reminds us, love must be both truthful and active.

Jesus' command to love as He loves is an invitation to live in **mutual relationship**, where who I am is bound up with who you are. We are all members of one body. When one suffers, all suffer. When one rejoices, all rejoice. This is the community Christ calls us to build — a family where love protects, listens, and restores.

As we look ahead to coming week and the Feast of Christ the King, we remember that the kingdom of God is not for the powerful or the proud, but for the meek, the poor, and the broken.

The Church must be a place where the least and the lost find safety and belonging — a community that reflects Christ's heart for justice, mercy, and truth.

So let us recommit ourselves to this calling.

Let us love not in word or speech, but in truth and action — creating churches where every person, especially the vulnerable, can find hope, healing, and home.

Dear God,
help us to be a church
that loves, welcomes, protects, listens, learns, serves,
repents, restores, transforms, values, cares, believes.
God of justice and compassion,
hear our prayer.
Help us, heal us, guide us, we pray,
in Jesus' name. Amen.

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.




