Fr Martin's Murmurations

The Readings for the Parish Communion this Sunday, the fifth after Trinity are both well known and yet difficult.

In the reading from the amazing book Genesis we learn three men arrive near Abraham's tent. Abraham bows before them yet addresses them as 'My Lord'. It has been suggested this is prophesy of God being three persons in one God. The reward for the hospitality Abraham offers them is the promise of a son to Sara who hitherto had been barren. That promise being fulfilled by the birth of Isaac.

The Gospel reading tells us Jesus is visiting his friends Martha and Mary, the sisters of Lazarus. Here we find Martha busy preparing the house and food for their guest whilst Mary sits at the feet of Jesus listening on his every word. Martha is put out to be doing the manual stuff whilst Mary just sits and listens. When Martha complains Jesus seems to side with Mary.

We are very blessed in our both our churches because we can readily see the elements of hospitality and prayer in our lives. Our Rector and Priest in charge was imbued with a breadth of hospitality when he worked as 'mine host' in the pub trade and this gift has grown and matured throughout his priestly ministry. Hospitality is shown both at St Mary's and St Peter's in so many ways from coffee and cakes to barbecues and parish lunches. We drink both good coffee and excellent wines - not necessarily to be found in every parish church in the land!

Harvest Suppers and parish lunches are restaurant quality. A foretaste, perhaps, of the banquet to come! Happily, the Rector has a team of helpers to make hospitality be seen as a sacramental of our church life. My point being that such hospitality is an outward and visible sign of the love which exists within our parish communities. As descendants of Abraham we do not forget his message. Hospitality is of God!

Recalling the story of Martha and Mary can we find other reflections of the life in our parishes? I am sure we can. We are open to all no matter who they are or where they come from. Strangers are welcomed as they enter the church and made to feel at home. They will notice some sitting quietly whilst others are ,or have been, busy getting the service ready. Candles need to be lit, screens and music checked, making sure appointed readers are present, putting up the hymn boards and counting the number of hosts we will use at Holy Communion. All this and more after the church has been cleaned and prepared. Some are busy like Martha whilst others reflect Mary. But all present make up the whole assembly of God meeting together to worship Him.

I am reading a wonderful book by an American professor of Worship and Liturgical Theology, Jill Y. Cranshaw. Her book is called, 'When I in awesome wonder'. It is a work which distils liturgy from everyday life. Cranshaw tells us "Life is liturgy. Not just Sunday mornings or weekday prayer services. All of life. Even the commonplace happenings, places, and things of everyday living are liturgy, perhaps especially the common place things. Life is Liturgy". Thus, life is worship.

The apparent differences between Martha and Mary are not differences at all. The housework and the listening to Jesus are both acts of worship. The jobs people do of a Sunday morning are as much worship as the singing of hymns or the saying of the prayer of consecration.

If we stop to ponder we will surely find in both the churches hospitality and praise are hand in hand. Our task is to see life through God-tinted spectacles and the glory of God in all our activities. Having got to that stage of spiritual awareness the command from Jesus Himself is to show The Father's awesome wonder to others, so that they too might share His wonderful life.

Special Service of Celebration on Sunday 27th July

On Sunday 27th we shall celebrate the 50th anniversary of Geoff Clinton's admission as a Lay Reader following two years of study and practice in Ipswich. Geoff moved to Newick in 1975 and since then has been a wonderful servant of our Lord and our congregation at St Mary's.

Geoff has been a man of many parts over and above his successful professional career.

As a Lay Reader Geoff has a right of place on both our PCC and its Standing Committee (SC). He also led our parish as Churchwarden for a time. His diligent and informed attention to the needs of St Mary's, his wise counsel and his quiet delivery of well thought out and telling contributions to PCC and SC business, have greatly benefited St Mary's for over half a century.

Geoff was a leading light in the setting up of the Newick Distress Trust which has served Newick extraordinarily well for over four decades.

Geoff has led and preached at many of our morning services over the years and has been a regular leader of our monthly Evensong Services on the first Sundays of each month. He has delivered many fine sermons and we are delighted that his excellent eight sermon series on the Beatitudes will be available in perpetuity on our website. Geoff has also led and preached services at St Peter's Chailey, particularly since our Rector Paul become Priest in Charge there.

He has been an inspirational member of our congregation and his life a splendid witness and example to our church and our community of a Christian life well lived.

St Peter & St James celebrates 50 years of supporting the community, and launches appeal to ensure they can support generations to come

This Summer, St Peter & St James Hospice in Mid-Sussex is celebrating 50 years of providing expert care to adults with life-limiting illnesses and those close to them. The hospice, which serves the areas of Haywards Heath, Burgess Hill, Lewes, Uckfield and the villages in between, has maintained the same vision throughout the decades; 'to provide the best possible care, in the right place, and at the right time, to everyone who needs us'.

Amanda Fadero, Interim Chief Executive at St Peter & St James Hospice, comments: "Whilst we are incredibly proud to be marking this important milestone in the hospice's story, it is just as critical that we continue to support, and be supported by, the community to help us create our next chapter. The charity is running a 50 year campaign to mark this milestone within the local community including; thank you events and awareness-raising activities as well as aiming to raise £50,000 through community group fundraisers, the big £50 individual donation appeal, corporate support campaigns and the 50 for £50k club for trustees, patrons and major donors."

The site, developed by Susan Dinnage as a nursing home initially, was created in loving memory of her husband and local farmer, Jim Dinnage who died in 1963, and their son, Peter, who died in childhood of Hodgkin's Lymphoma in 1957. The Dinnages had previously set up and run a donkey sanctuary, and so to this day there are still resident donkeys, (Dylan and Dudley) on site at the hospice. Throughout the early years, the hospice continued to expand and increase its capacity to care for those living with life-limiting conditions. Fast forward to 2025, and the hospice cares for more than 1,000 people each year, providing vital services in people's homes, on our in-patient unit and through our Living Well Centre.

The anniversary also gives the hospice an opportunity to raise awareness across the community about specialist palliative and end-of-life care, to make people aware of the support we offer, and to provide people with information and support, to help them live and die well, according to what matters most to them.

Dr Helen McGee, Medical Director at the hospice adds: "As we celebrate 50 years, it gives us the opportunity to make more people aware of what hospice care is, and ensure they know that all the specialist adult services we provide at St Peter & St James Hospice are completely free of charge for all, irrespective of age, religion, background or ethnicity. We would like to thank our community for all their support over the last 50 years, which enables us to provide holistic care, wrapping our arms not only around the patient, but their loved ones too, for as long as they need us. It costs £6.9m to run the hospice each year, and much of our income comes from donations and charity shop sales, rather than central government, so we simply couldn't continue to do what we do without the generosity of our supporters in the local community. 
