Rector's Ramble

Exodus 16:2-15, Philippians 1:21-30 and Matthew 20:1-16

*"On each side of the river stood the tree of life, bearing twelve crops of fruit, yielding its fruit every month.
And the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations"
Revelation 22:2*

Dear Friends,

Thank you to all who came out to support our services and community events this week. Our lunch clubs were back in full swing at both churches, Worship2 welcomed many new faces on Sunday night, and our youth club again welcomed over 80 young people from across our two parishes and surrounding villages, and it was a joy to hear our Bellringers practising together, the ancient call to worship sounding across the village, and wowzah they sounded good.

Earlier on Wednesday, Lisa Leaf from Compassion UK, our new mission partner at St Mary's and Newick School, led a brilliant Collective Worship, and she will be preaching at our 10am service on October 18th.

This week has also held its share of both grief and joy. St Peter's supported family and friends at the funeral of Mark Kitchener last Monday, and today St Mary's holds the funeral of our beloved Harry Stripp — we hold in our prayers, Eva, all the family and the community Harry was part of for so many years.

And on Saturday, St Mary's we celebrate the marriage of Saskia and Jean, praying for them as they begin their married life together. It is a reminder of what community and church do best: standing with one another through life's joys and its sorrows alike.

This week's readings, as they so often do, arrived right in step with the news on our doorstep. Switch on the radio and you'll hear a few stories running side by side that caught my eye — including one slightly stranger item explaining that Lewes Town Council has approved a motion granting several rights to trees, among them the right to life, to flourish, to be restored, and to complete their natural life cycles. Local tree surgeons, understandably, are now terrified that pruning a rogue branch could result in a manslaughter charge, while autumn leaf-raking is apparently being legally reclassified as a mass eviction event. Asked how this would be policed, one officer admitted they didn't have mulch to go on, though Special Branch would no doubt get to the root of the matter!!!

But two other stories have stayed with me longer. One is that the summer just gone has been confirmed as the hottest on record in the UK — a season of heatwaves, wildfires and water shortages, with forecasters now warning of an unsettled, storm-battered autumn to follow. The other is about food banks, still handling record demand, still seeing more people in work than ever needing a food parcel simply to get through the month, because wages and benefits haven't kept pace with the cost of living. Two very different headlines — but they meet at the same point: a world, and a people, under strain, wondering where the next help is coming from.

It's into exactly that kind of anxiety that God speaks in Exodus. The Israelites, newly freed from slavery, are in the wilderness and afraid — not of Pharaoh now, but of hunger. They grumble against Moses and Aaron, and who could blame them? Freedom is cold comfort on an empty stomach. Yet God doesn't scold them into silence. Instead, God meets their very real, very physical need — quail in the evening, manna in the morning, daily bread gathered fresh each day, never more than was needed. It's a story of provision, yes, but it's also a story about trust: about learning to receive what is given, rather than hoarding against an imagined future. When we hear this week of families choosing between heating and eating, or of communities pulling together yet again to stock a local food bank's shelves, we are hearing an old story

quietly repeating itself. The wilderness hasn't gone away — and neither has the God who sends bread into it, often through the hands of ordinary, generous people.

Paul, writing from prison in Philippians, is in his own kind of wilderness, yet his tone is extraordinary: "*For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain.*" He doesn't pretend his suffering away — he weighs it honestly — but he refuses to let circumstance have the last word. Whatever happens to him, he says, let your life be worthy of the gospel, standing firm together, of one mind. In a season when British political life has felt like one long changing of the guard, and public trust in institutions feels thin on the ground, Paul's steadiness is a gift — not a call to stop caring about the world's chaos, but an invitation to root our identity somewhere deeper than the next news cycle. It is a quiet, patient kind of strength, the sort that doesn't need to shout to hold firm.

And then there's Matthew's parable of the workers in the vineyard, a story that never fails to needle something in us. Labourers hired at dawn and labourers hired at five o'clock all receive the same day's wage, and the early birds are furious. It isn't, on the face of it, fair. But the landowner's question lingers: "*Are you envious because I am generous?*" This parable sits uncomfortably close to our own debates about pay, work and worth, zero-hours contracts, the widening gap between wages and living costs, the dignity, or lack of it, afforded to those who cannot find full employment. God's economy, Jesus suggests, doesn't run on our careful ledgers of merit. It runs on grace that is, frankly, extravagant, and sometimes irritating to those of us who'd rather it were more measured. And perhaps that's the promise worth sitting with: that God's generosity is not rationed to match our sense of fairness, but given in full, again and again, to everyone who shows up.

All this arrives as we keep Creationtide, that season from 1 September to 4 October when the Church deliberately turns its attention to God as Creator and Sustainer of life, the same theme that will shape our Harvest services in the coming weeks. We give thanks for the gift of creation, and we renew our commitment to caring for it, at a moment when a record-breaking summer makes that commitment feel far from theoretical.

Rabbi Neal Gold, introducing Danny Siegel's book *Radiance*, writes of the Jewish mystical idea that the whole world is embedded with shards of divine light, often deeply hidden, and that our task, *tikkun olam*, is to seek out those hidden places, raise the light, and help restore the world to its proper wholeness. That is as good a description of Christian discipleship as I know. Repairing the fabric of a broken world — the physical environment and the people who inhabit it — will sometimes call for big campaigns and public advocacy. But far more often it will be the small things: the tin added to the food bank box, the neighbour checked on, the word of encouragement offered instead of the complaint withheld, the choice to use a little less and waste a little less. Each one a small act of trust that the God who sent manna into the wilderness is still, quietly and faithfully, at work.

So here is this week's wondering, for Newick and for Chailey alike: where, this week, might you uncover one shard of hidden light, in creation, or in another person — and help set it free?

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith, and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.
