# **Rectors Ramble**

"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it"

Hebrews 13

Dear Friends,

It is with a heavy heart that I write this newsletter with the tragic news coming in from Minneapolis USA that there has been another shooting of young school children. This time at a Mass, celebrating the start of a new school year. Honestly my heart breaks!

As we prepare to welcome our young people back to our Primary schools in Newick and Chailey and our new year 7's begin their journey into secondary school and joining NYC in a couple weeks, a time of hope, excitement and joy, I cannot imagine the pain and the trauma of all those families affected by this tragedy, and our hearts and our prayers go out to them.

Lord of Love & Prince of Peace,

Our hearts are breaking as we again lament the loss of life at another school shooting today, and the number of families grieving the loss of their children because of our violent ways.

God, give us to know your wisdom that we may be courageous advocates for peace and justice, praying that the legislators and law makers in America will hear the cries of our hearts from around your world today and protect the innocents of this country.

Grant us a double portion of your spirit that we may create cycles of hospitality and end cycles of hostility.

Make us to know the ways we can be bearers of good news in the power and love we know as Christ.

On Tuesday, Pam and I took Niamh back to the airport as she headed back to her home in Melbourne after a wonderful couple of months with family and friends in the UK. We will miss her terribly, but our love and joy go with her and for the adventures she has planned this year.

On the way to Gatwick, I was surprised by the number of roundabouts and zebra crossings, which had been transformed by red paint into symbols of the red on white flag of Saint George. National flags are so often associated with world sporting events, such as world cups, and I originally thought the flags were for the Women's Rugby World Cup

Upon returning home I was disturbed to discover the reason for the display of flags bearing the St George's cross was seemingly due to something entirely different.

Whilst for many these flags are a sign of respect or celebration, for others they have become more associated with far-right demonstrations and organisations. A recent BBC article asks whether the St George's (and Union) flags that have been appearing recently are statements of pride or prejudice. It is intriguing that this debate is happening around the time as many people in the UK have been arrested for protesting about the situation in Gaza by displaying the Palestinian flag?

One can't help but wonder if those who have recently displayed or graffitied the red and white cross of St George know that legend has it that he was of Cappadocian Greek origin, served in the Roman army, or that his father was from Turkey and his mother from Palestine. He was martyred for his Christian beliefs and, as well as being the patron saint of many churches and countries, including Ukraine, he is also venerated by Muslims.

Hebrews 13:1 begins this week's Epistle passage, 'Let mutual love continue' and I wonder how can we live out an attitude of hope and care for all people, especially during these times of increasing division?

We're reminded in this passage from Hebrews to 'keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters' (Hebrews 13:1). That sense of keeping on loving – to do it again, and again, and again, and again.

That can seem like a chore or a bind...or quite exciting.

Why exciting?

Because we have the opportunity to give it a go; learn from what goes well – and not so well; to experiment; try new ways of caring; and to learn from how other people care for us and for other people.

It also means we don't need to get it right first-time round; nor do we need to have it all together in order to care for someone else.

We don't need to have money to care for other people - it can be as simple as giving a smile or popping a homemade card or note through someone's letterbox.

It's quite easy to get disenchanted about helping others when we watch the news and see the division which is happening around us.

What difference does caring for my neighbour make when people are dying in Ukraine or starving in Gaza?

And yet humanity at its best is so diverse, so creative and so caring for each other, as Mel Thews daughter Sam said this week as part of her mothers Eulogy, "we are all walking each other home, all on a journey to a shared destination, the ultimate home, and that we each play a role in assisting one another on that journey"

If we *keep on* caring for those around us, we may find that our confidence to care increases at the same time.

So... who are you going to care for today? Or tomorrow? Or the day after? Go on...give it a go. Get creative.

Tell someone what you've done. Ask them what they've done.

Be co-conspirators together to care for those around you. And see how your confidence and your faith grows as you do so...

In our Gospel reading from Luke 14:1,7-14 Jesus uses the illustration of a wedding banquet to teach about humility and hospitality.

How can the Church model humble, open hospitality in the world today?

Do we, as Jesus instructs, ensure that we do 'invite the poor, the crippled, the lame and the blind'? The conflict in the Middle East is just one place where humanity struggles to reach its full potential to be human, as is our understanding of the refugee situation around our ports and coastline and our ability as a nation to be able to discern those with a legitimate right to asylum over those who would enter our country for the wrong reasons.

But the potential for different peoples to live alongside one another here could be a story of hope for all the world – a place of hope, against all hope.

As a statement on the Greenbelt act of communion order of service last weekend puts it:

"We choose to orientate ourselves towards a future that is good. We choose to live into the best possible future, not the worst one. We choose to build hope with our bare hands – not because we have given up on God, but because we have grasped that our hands are God's implements."

Hope is in our hands!

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.




