Rector's Ramble

Exodus 12:1-14; Psalm 149; Romans 13:8-14; Matthew 18:15-20

Dear Friends,

It has been a heavy week of news.

On 26th August, a catastrophic flash flood swept down from the Nepal-Tibet border, burying whole settlements in mud within minutes. The death toll has since passed a thousand, with thousands more — including British nationals — still unaccounted for; rescuers have been racing against time to reach workers trapped in flooded hydro-power tunnels, and mass burials have begun for those who could not be identified.

Closer to home, the war in Ukraine ground on regardless, with fresh Russian air attacks on Kyiv this week and renewed hostilities between America and Iran, it is the kind of news that can leave us wondering what, if anything, is stable.

Into that uncertainty, Exodus 12 speaks with startling relevance. The instructions given to the Israelites are for a night of chaos and fear — a plague sweeping through the land, an empire in collapse, a people told to eat in haste with their sandals already on, ready to move. And at the heart of the passage is a mark: blood on the doorposts, a sign that this household belongs to God and will be kept safe as the disaster passes over.

It is not a promise that catastrophe will never touch the world — Egypt still burned that night — but a promise that God's people are known, marked and held through it.

As we think of families in Nepal searching for loved ones, and of a world that feels unusually shaky, that promise of being marked and held matters more than ever.

Paul's words to the Romans meet this same instability with a call to clear-headed love: *"the night is far gone, the day is near... let us live honourably... put on the Lord Jesus Christ."* Whatever we make of a continuing impact of climate change or the relentless grind of war abroad, Paul's answer is not panic but conduct — owe no one anything except to love one another, for love is the fulfilling of the law. In a season defined by upheaval and uncertainty, that is a bracingly simple instruction: whatever changes around us, we are called to be people marked by love rather than by the noise.

Our gospel reading from Matthew then gives us the practical shape of that love within community — how to be reconciled when someone wrongs us, how to seek out relationship rather than division, and the promise that where two or three gather in Christ's name, he is present among them.

It is a template for church life, and, frankly, one the wider world could use just now. We cannot choose this week's headlines. We can choose to be a people who gather, who reconcile, and who hold one another through hard news rather than adding to it.

Which brings me, thankfully to our own parish family, where there is much to give thanks for. Our blessing of the Possums Izzy dolls on Wednesday was a time of sheer joy, tinged with sadness as we said goodbye and God bless to so many of our Possums children now heading off to Pre-school and Reception.

On Friday our children and staff across our schools have started a new term, and we hold them in prayer as they settle into new classes, new challenges and new friendships — may this be a year of growth for each of them.

This Sunday we are delighted to welcome the Venerable Russell Dewhurst, Archdeacon of Hastings, for his Visitation to St Peter's, Chailey. Visitations are a chance for a parish to be seen, encouraged and held within the wider life of the diocese, and we look forward to his ministry among us.

At the same time, over at St Mary's, we will be rejoicing as Isla Heath who is in Year 4 at Newick Primary and has asked to be baptised on Sunday morning after attending our school assemblies, is welcomed into the family of the Church, marked with the sign of the cross, a sign of belonging, of protection, of new life beginning. Please hold Isla and her family and God parents in your prayers.

Finally, it is with a mixture of sorrow and deep thanksgiving that we come to remember the life of the Reverend Joy Gray, whose funeral will be held at St Mary's on Monday 7th at 2pm. Joy's ministry among us was a living example of our Romans and Matthew readings; a life spent in love of neighbour, in healing, in community, in patient reconciliation, and in quiet faithfulness. We give thanks for all she gave, and we hold her family and all who loved her closely in our prayers this week.

In a fortnight when the news has felt unusually unsteady, we are reminded that the Church's calendar keeps turning regardless: new terms begin, new members are welcomed by water, faithful servants are commended into God's keeping, and the wider Church continues to visit, encourage and hold us to account.

Whatever next week's headlines bring, may we be found doing what Paul asked of us — owing nothing but love.

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.
