Rector's Ramble

Remembering and Hoping

Micah 4:1-8 | Revelation 22:1-5 | Psalm 46 | John 15:9-17

"See, the home of God is among mortals.

He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples,
and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes.

Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more,
for the first things have passed away." — Revelation 21

Dear Friends,

This week we gather for **Remembrance Sunday** and **Armistice Day**, moments when, as a nation and as individuals, we pause to remember, in prayer, in song, and most poignantly in silence, we look back on the wars and conflicts that have scarred our world and shaped our history.

We remember with gratitude not only those who gave their lives but also those who came home carrying wounds—both visible and unseen. Many were forever changed by what they endured.

We remember, too, the young men and women from our own communities who made the ultimate sacrifice so that we might live in freedom.

They served with a vision of a better world—a world where peace might take root and where future generations could flourish. If our gratitude for their sacrifice is incomplete, then the hope they died for cannot be fully realised.

That is why remembrance matters. It is not only an act of memory but a renewal of our commitment to the peace they dreamed of.

In our busy world, moments of collective silence are rare. Yet, on Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day, everything stills at 11 o'clock. The hush is striking precisely because it is so unusual.

At first, it can feel awkward—the sound of shuffling feet, a cough, a baby's cry, a whispered "shush." But then something profound happens. The noise fades, and in that space, something sacred opens up. In the silence, we touch something deep within ourselves and, perhaps, encounter God.

As a child, I used that silence to think of my Great Uncle Ted, who was killed in August 1917 during the Third Battle of Ypres, aged just 18—though his grave says 20 because he lied about his age to enlist. I also thought of my Grandfather Tom, who died in North Africa in 1942 when my mother was only a few months old. I was told I looked like him. Remembering Ted and Tom made the act of remembrance deeply personal, and it connected me to the millions of others who also carry stories of loss and love.

Many of us remember people we never knew—strangers who went to war on our behalf. Their courage, their suffering, and their sacrifice are beyond words. And that is why silence can be so powerful: there are no adequate words for what they endured.

St John of the Cross once said, "God's first language is silence." In silence, our hearts open to what God may be saying. We make room for His voice and for the presence of others. Silence is not emptiness—it is the space where love and understanding grow. Love cannot be practised in a hurry.

The suffering and sacrifice we remember this week also remind us that the world's ultimate hope cannot rest on human strength or politics, but in God alone. The prophet Micah spoke of a time when God's peace would reign—a New Jerusalem where nations would beat their swords into ploughshares, where the resources of the world would be shared, and where God Himself would dwell among His people.

For Christians, this hope is made real through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Through Him, we find a living, eternal hope that cannot be destroyed. As St Paul writes, "If God is for us, who can be against us?" (Romans 8:31).

This is the hope we share—the hope that gives meaning even in sorrow.

Yet today, our world still bears the marks of division and conflict. Across the globe, men and women continue to serve and, all too often, to die in the pursuit of peace. Since the end of World War II—eighty years ago—over seven thousand British Service men and women have lost their lives on active duty. Their sacrifice, too, must be remembered.

Therefore, this week we gather, as generations before us have gathered, to remember those who gave their lives fighting for peace, justice, and freedom.

We remember, too, the families who waited, the communities forever changed, the silence that fell where laughter once rang out.

As we do so, we continue to pray for peace across the world.

This Remembrance Sunday let us be encouraged to take this familiar ritual of silence and model more of our lives on it.

To remember, to reflect, to hear the voices we need to hear, those of other people and most importantly, to hear God.

May we allow ourselves to be broken by the pain of the past and the present, and through that, to also be transformed by the hope which the resurrection brings.

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.






