# SABBATH REST FOR GOD'S PEOPLE

We all know that in Exodus 20: 9-10, God says: "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord your God. In it, you shall not do any work....". Most devout Jews and Christians take that commandment literally and set aside the Saturday or Sunday respectively as a day off from the daily grind, dedicated to worship, honor, and attention to God. Interestingly, the number "7", in scripture, is understood to refer to completion or perfection. Our lack, our shortcomings, our sin, our missing the mark, our limitation, is remedied or made complete in Christ. The "seventh" or Sabbath day is when we take a break from our strivings and allow him to bring completeness to whatever He has called us to do.

But there is another "Sabbath rest" referred to in scripture, including Hebrews 4: 9-11: "There remains, then, a Sabbath-rest for the people of God; for anyone who enters God's rest also rests from their works, just as God did from his..." This scripture refers to putting one's trust in God's salvation as a Sabbath rest. Entering that Sabbath rest is a one-time event when we accept Jesus Christ as our savior and Lord. But there is also a way in which that rest can be experienced and appropriated anew in different seasons of our Christian walk.

I picture this kind of Sabbath as a space we make in our spirit for God to take care of things. Not the "devotional time" we set aside (also good!) but, rather, designating a "space" in our heart, attitude, and spirit, where we let God take over our affairs. In the same way we make space for God every seventh Sabbath day, we can also set aside a space in our spirit, a Sabbath where we let go of striving to make things happen, and instead allow God to complete and perfect our lives, our ministry, and the purposes to which He has assigned us. We take our hands off the wheel and our feet off the accelerator, and let God work. In this kind of Sabbath rest, we are trusting God, believing in His goodness, and assenting and yielding to His perfect ways.

In American culture we have the season of Thanksgiving followed by the Christmas season. At Thanksgiving we acknowledge and give thanks for how God has seen us through, provided for us, abided with us, and countless other ways he has blessed us. When we take that time of thanks, anytime, it leads to a place of rest, a place where we can abide in the knowledge that God is taking care of all things. The Thanksgiving season then point us to Christmas. After that day of "thanksgiving", we set aside Christmas day to celebrate Jesus

Christ, our savior, who made us complete in God. The helpless baby in the manger, like us, had to trust that Father God would take care of bringing to pass all that they together had planned for humanity.

We invite you to let your spirit enjoy the Sabbath rest God has for you, his children, by entrusting to Him, just as baby Jesus did, the completion of whatever He has planned for you this season!
