WE ARE MOMS DEMAND ACTION

We are a grassroots movement fighting for public safety measures that can protect people from gun violence in America.

We work to pass stronger gun laws, fight bad gun laws and seek to close loopholes that jeopardize the safety of our families. We work in our own communities and with business leaders to encourage a culture of responsible gun ownership.

We work to identify, endorse and campaign for "gun sense" candidates and hold them accountable upon election.

We work to identify and support community violence prevention programs that are doing the hard work on the ground.













How are Everytown for Gun Safety and Moms Demand Action related?

- Everytown was created when Moms Demand Action and Mayors Against Illegal Guns merged.
- Everytown is the fully staffed umbrella organization with several "arms".
- Everytown compiles research, drafts policy and creates strategy and tools to:
 - Turn policy into law
 - Obtain funding for gun violence prevention efforts
 - Campaign for Gun Sense candidates
- Moms Demand Action, Students Demand Action and the Everytown Survivor Network are the all volunteer "arms" that puts those strategies into action




Overview of the Data on Gun Violence in the U.S.



Every day, more than 120 people in the US are killed with

And more than 200 are shot and wounded.




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44,341 people die by guns in an average year, a rate of 13.3 deaths per 100,000 people.



Gun Violence is a Uniquely American Problem

- The U.S. gun homicide rate is 26x that of other highincome countries.
- Access to a gun doubles the risk of death by homicide.
- Gun homicides are concentrated in cities—half of all gun homicides took place in just 20 cities.
- Within these cities, gun homicides are most prevalent in racially segregated neighborhoods with high rates of poverty.





Suicide by Gun

- Nearly 6 out of every 10 gun deaths are suicides.
- The U.S. gun suicide rate is 12x that of other highincome countries.
- Approximately 90% of suicide attempts with a firearm result in death.
- Most people who attempt suicide do not die—unless they use a gun.
- Gun suicides are concentrated in states with high rates of gun ownership.
- The rate of firearm suicide among children and teens has increased 47% in the past decade.
- White men represent 71% of firearm suicide victims in America.

Veteran Suicide by Gun

- From 2001 to 2020, nearly 87,000
 veterans died by gun suicide. This is
 16 times the number of service
 members killed in action over the same
 period.
- An average of 18 veterans die by suicide in the United States each day, 13 of them by firearm.
- Veterans are 3x more likely to die by gun suicide than non-veterans.

Nationwide, more than 86,000 military veterans died by gun suicide in the period between 2001 and 2020.

Children &

Teens

Firearms are the **leading cause of death** for American children and teens.



- ~4.6 million American children live in homes with guns unlocked and loaded.
- Every year, more than 4,000 children and teens are shot and killed
- In 2023 there were at least 427 unintentional shootings by children
- In 2023 there were at least 158 incidents of gunfire on school grounds,
- Nearly 2,600 children and teens die by gun homicide every year.
- Black children and teens are 17x more likely to die by gun homicide than white children and teens of the same age.



Gun Violence Disproportionately Impacts Communities of Color

- Black Americans are almost 3x more likely to be shot and killed by police than White Americans.
- Black Americans make up 13% of the population but 56% of firearm homicides.
- A Black American male is 16x more likely to die from gun homicide than a White male.



Black Americans are 12x more likely than white people to die by gun homicide.

Gun Violence is a Women's Issue


- Every month, an average of 70 women are shot and killed by an intimate partner
- Over 4.5 M women have reported being threatened with a gun by an intimate partner.
- Access to a gun in a domestic violence situation makes it 5x more likely that a woman will be killed.
- Women in the U.S. are 28x more likely to die by firearms homicide than women in other high income countries.

Mass Shootings

- A mass shooting is any incident in which four or more people are shot and wounded or killed, excluding the shooter.
- The number of mass shooting incidents and the number of people shot in them have increased since 2015
- To date there have been >249 mass shootings in 2024.
- They represent ~ 1% of all shooting incidents.

Federal Policy Successes

Bipartisan Safer Communities Act

1st major federal gun safety law of the century

SUPPORTING STATE EXTREME RISK LAWS

States can apply for their share of the \$750 million in new funding to implement Extreme Risk Laws.

STRENGTHENING THE BACKGROUND CHECK SYSTEM

State agencies can prepare to respond to new background checks for young people.

COMMUNITY VIOLENCE INTERVENTION PROGRAMS

Local governments and community-based organizations can apply for the new \$250 million in grant funding to build community violence intervention programs.

FUNDING SCHOOL SAFETY RESOURCES

State agencies can use the new \$300 million in grant funding for education about secure gun storage, threat assessment programs, and school security and emergency planning.



More Federal Policy Successes

- United States Supreme Court Reverses Fifth Circuit's Extreme Rahimi Decision
- We passed a record-breaking 130 gun safety policies representing our key legislative priorities.
- Blocked 95 percent of the gun lobby's dangerous agenda.
- Successfully supported states as they passed stronger gun safety laws.
- Helped flip Virginia State House and Washington's County Sheriff's Departmen.
- Helped flip Wisconsin and Pennsylvania Supreme Court to a gun sense majority



CA Efforts and Wins





California Legislative Wins

- AB 452 into law, a historic bill that will require schools to notify parents and guardians about secure storage laws to ensure guns are being stored securely.
- AB 988, legislation to create an implementation plan for the 9-8-8 mental health crisis hotline in California
- AB 1929, legislation to make community violence prevention programs and recovery services a covered Medi-Cal benefit
- SB 1327, first-of-its-kind legislation to create a private right of action that would allow individuals to sue anyone who violates certain California firearm laws, including those who make or sell illegal assault weapons or ghost gun parts, and those who sell guns to underage buyers



California Legislative Wins

- AB 1594, historic legislation to hold bad actors in the firearm industry accountable by establishing a firearm industry standard of conduct, and authorizing victims of harm from firearms in California, the Attorney General, or city or county attorneys to bring a civil action against a firearm industry member for violating that standard
- AB 2156, legislation to crack down on the unlicensed manufacture of firearms
- AB 2571, legislation to prohibit the gun industry from marketing firearm-related products to minors
- AB 1621, groundbreaking legislation to further regulate ghost guns. The bill would prohibit the sale
 of the unserialized parts that are easily converted into untraceable ghost guns by people who
 cannot legally purchase guns
- AB 160, legislation to expand access to victims' compensation for survivors of crime, including gun violence



California Legislative Wins

- SB 2 legislation to address the dangerous conditions created by the Supreme Court's decision in New York State Rifle & Pistol Association, Inc. v. Bruen by strengthening California's laws about who can carry a gun in public, what types of training are required to carry a gun in public, how law enforcement vets applicants for concealed carry permits, and where they can bring their guns.
- SB 452 legislation that will ensure California's microstamping law is finally and fully implemented, requiring that firearms sold in California incorporate technology which can help solve crime, stop retaliatory cycles of violence, and bring closure for survivors.
- AB 28 first-in-the-nation legislation to establish the Gun Violence Prevention and School Safety
 Fund to create a permanent funding source outside the state budget for life-saving programs,
 including the California Violence Intervention and Prevention (CalVIP) grant program, school safety
 programs, court-based firearm relinquishment programs, grant programs supporting equitable
 improvements to firearm homicide investigations, trauma-informed support services for mass

shooting victims, and more.

- AB 2621 (Gabriel) Gun Violence Restraining Orders Law Enforcement Policies and Training
- AB 1858 (Ward) Trauma Informed School Shooter Drills
- AB 2642 (Berman) Election Intimidation
- SB 899 (Skinner) Strengthening Firearm Relinquishment Processes
- SB 965 (Min) Gun Dealer Inspection Reports
- SB 1019 (Blakespear) Crime Gun Destruction



Local Efforts and Wins





Local Wins

- Passed City Secure Storage of Firearms Ordinances in Dublin, Livermore and Pleasanton
- Increased Visibility in More Cities
- Worked with Pleasanton School Districts for Secure Storage Awareness
- Developed Relationships with Veterans Affairs and Alameda County Health Department.
- Increased Number of Volunteers



Local Efforts

- Elections Work canvassing, postcard writing, phone banking and identifying gun sense candidates
- Working to pass a secure storage ordinance with the Alameda County Board of Supervisors.
- Continuing work with YouthAlive! A community-based violence intervention program
- Advocate for Be SMART, secure storage campaign at Farmers Markets, school districts, PTAs, community events, community organizations in Dublin, Livermore and Pleasanton
- Part of the Keep Hope Alive Collaborative for Suicide Prevention



Local Efforts, Continued

- Attending Veterans Events to raising awareness for secure storage and red flag laws.
- Support gun violence survivors
- Requesting Gun Violence Restraining Order Plans from Police Departments
- Writing letters, calling State Legislators for our priority bills




