Course Description: *A Martyr's Psyche*[™] is a proprietary seminar and delivered in 1-Day, 2-Day or 3-Day formats, depending on the audience, is designed to equip law enforcement, military, and intelligence professionals with the psychological, ideological, and cultural tools necessary to understand and identify extremist mindsets before violence occurs.

This training explores the inner psychology of radicalized individuals and demystifies the indoctrination process used by extremist groups to recruit operatives locally and globally. Unlike conventional awareness classes, *A Martyr's Psyche*[™] is delivered by a former child soldier from the Middle East with nearly three decades of U.S. law enforcement experience investigating terrorism and transnational criminal networks. This unique perspective bridges operational intelligence with firsthand insight into the extremist psyche.

Participants will explore the religious and ideological doctrines often weaponized by terrorist groups, while learning how to separate mainstream practitioners from those who manipulate faith to justify political violence and ideological hate. The course highlights key cultural indicators, warning signs of radicalization, and geopolitical triggers that extremists exploit to recruit followers, especially youth and emotionally vulnerable individuals in both Eastern and Western societies.

Through realistic examples, structured content, and direct dialogue, attendees will develop the skills needed to detect pre-attack behaviors, strengthen community partnerships, and build cultural intelligence to prevent extremist violence in their jurisdictions.

Course Delivery Method: Lecture, pre-instructional strategy, class discussion.

Testing/Assessment Method: Student will be engaged in Q&A type questions, during the course of each lesson objective, as well as at the end of each objective to determine their ability to comprehend the material by open discussion Q&A based on the topic and case studies.
