PHAN is a statewide coalition of organizations working to protect high-quality health insurance coverage for individuals and businesses and to expand coverage to the uninsured."





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# SEPTA Brings A 1.4 Million Dollar Bus Loop Improvement Project to 23nd & Venango

the Allegheny West corridor, SEPTA recently gathered with local officials and community members to break ground on a major reconstruction of the 23rd and Venango Bus Loop. The project will result in the full renovation of a key, but aging facility as the busy loop that also fronts Hunting Park Avenue.

'In addition to modern amenities for customers, we envision the completed loop as a grand gateway to the revitalization efforts now underway in this section of North Philadelphia" said SEPTA General Manager Joseph M. Casey at the groundbreaking ceremony, where he was joined by the community members and officials including Philadelphia Councilwoman Cindy Bass, Allegheny West Foundation President Ronald Hinton, and other elected, business and community leaders.

Full construction kicked off this summer. Taking about 10 months to complete. The project will result facility includina:

 New bus boarding islands, passenger shelters, enhanced lighting, trash cans and recycling bins and signage. Bike racks will also be installed.

• Safety enhancements for customers. Pedestrians and motorists using surrounding roads with bus lane and crosswalk striping, a new bus driveways, and repaved [pedestrian sidewalks.

• Full accessibility under the Americans for Disabilities Act (ADA). ADA-cuts.

• New landscaping on the site and its perimeter will improve the atmosphere for riders and residents.

The \$1.7 million to be used for the 23rd and Venango Project will come from savings from funds secured with the assistance of U.S. Representative Chaka Fattah for a spate bus loop project that came in well under budget. In fact, Allegheny West will see

Joining a wave of redevelopment occurring in in a variety of improvements in and around the additional community investment of these funds through another loop improvement project at 35th and Allegheny scheduled for construction in 2015.

SEPTA serves more than 5,000 riders daily at the 23rd and Venango loop which serves as the terminus for Routes 33 and 56 and as a connecting stop on Routes 1 and R. In addition to the transit and neighborhood connections, riders also find the loop provides convenient access to the Salvation Army's Kroc Center, Baker's Centre Shopping Complex, and the ever-popular AWF/TastyKake Store, right next to the Hunting Park side of the SEPTA loop at 23rd Street.

SEPTA looks forward to providing the community with a first class facility, including Community Relations Coordinator Wendy Green Harvey, who encouraged Allegheny West residents and business owners with specific concerns about the projects impact to contact her at 215-580-7661.

So far it's been an ideal location geographically, in the middle of everything center city. We're close to Northeast Philadelphia, Germantown, Chestnut Hill, and North Philadelphia, as well. We're pretty close to

who's renting now. The really interesting piece here is that there's very affordable housing for people of all financial levels. It is also an incubator for small businesses. If you are a start-up company, this is the place you want to come".

Mark Sherman says there's close to 100 small businesses housed currently at Sherman Mills, with space still available for more renters. On the wellness end, they have chiropractors, accupunctorers, massausses and colonic wellness facilities. They have businesses that do palates classes, a fitness facility, on the physical education side of life, and also there's plenty of hair salons. There's also the creative artists, painters, potters, jewelry maker.

Dobson Mills goes like this: The Mills At East Falls: John Dobson purchased what is now known as Sherman Mills in the 1800's the Dobson Mills complex stretched over nearly 26 acres. Originally used to manufacture yarn, the mills produced everything from wool yarn to blankets, to overcoat material to various other types of textiles and starting in the 1870's, carpets. During the Civil War, Dobson made army blankets and uniforms for the Union Troops.


Sherman Mills is at the bottom of Ridge Avenue, just of W. Allegheny Avenue at Scotts Lane and it's one of Philadelphia's best kept secrets that needs to be told. That's one of the reasons City Councilman Curtis Jones toured the Mills late last Spring with a couple of his staffers. Councilman Jones, while having been to Sherman Mills on tours in the past, said some exciting things have been happening, and he was glad to come out and meet the owners of some of the newest businesses at Sherman Mills. Out of all of this, the Councilman indicated he's willing to do all that he can, to help spread the word about the "Hidden paradise", which is what he has now dubbed Sherman Mills.

Councilman Jones shared that these businesses he toured, pretty much compliment each other. Jones says he feels with the right marketing, the businesses can be a network of support for each other. For example, there's a Wedding Chapel at Sherman Mills. Councilman Jones envisions people who get married at the wedding chapel, just may want to book the Kairos room, (Banquet facility) for their reception.
