APPALACHIA'S BACKGROUND

The primary source of income of this remote region of rolling hilltops and muddy roads near the Tennessee and Wighila borders was the coal industry. But when the Nation started to move away from coal-fired power plants, the glant companies closed down the mines, shedding 7,000 jobs in just 3 years. Nearly every county in eastern Kentucky lost jobs between 2000 and 2010. One-third of the region lives in powerty. Even before the mines started closing, children who grew up in Appalachia were often told to get out if they wanted to succeed. The region has been left without hope and many are in great despair and poverty.

When we arrived there on our first mission, we were left in shock! Some of the kids had never even seen a toothbrush, while others shared one between family members. Some kids wore only filp flops and shorts in winter, as this was all they had. Many of the children were more excited to get the socks in their hope boxes over the toys!
