



Hello Arizona – Editors Column reprinted from Volume 3, Issue 10, October 2001

We saw appalling and monstrous things happen the week of September 11, 2001. News of the horrific attacks on the World Trade Center Towers, the Pentagon, and the plane crash near Pittsburgh... Mind-numbing images coupled with information overload assaulted decent people everywhere as they were glued to televisions, watching history unfold.

Our most tangible evidence of what was happening -something that could 'tie' us to the events going on thousands
of miles away was... silence. Our office is located directly in
the flight path of Sky Harbor Airport. On a normal day, planes
come and go so often that they tune out of your daily awareness. The silence of the grounded planes could be deafening
at times... and a constant reminder of lives forever silenced.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to the families and friends of the innocent victims of this barbaric assault. We pray that these souls be gathered into the loving arms of the Higher Power before whom each of us will someday stand.

We've seen the most marvelous things happen since that day as well... and we hope that you saw them too. The goodness of so many decent people in the USA and around the world presented the opportunity for refreshing tears of pride and appreciation to dilute the tears of unimaginable grief. The firefighters and police officers running toward what all too soon could be their own end... The overwhelming response of humanitarian aid... Other countries honoring Old Glory and singing the Star Spangled Banner... And something that many Americans, unfortunately, will not see... the wonderful words of support from Motorcycling Organizations around the world that you will read in these pages.

In the days following the horrific events of September 11, 2001 we grappled with the question of what is an appropriate approach to this issue of the paper. Although we remind our readers that *Arizona Rider Motorcycle News* is not a *political* publication, we here are most certainly made up of *patriotic* hearts. While we realize that our readers look to us for entertainment and news of the motorcycling community, there was a feeling that what we do here is too frivolous for

such serious times as we now all find ourselves. To go about as if nothing has changed would be unconscionable and disrespectful to the greatest degree.

It was with some relief that we came to realize that we were not alone in our dilemma... Our feelings were being mirrored by folks who are part of the media on a much larger scale than *Arizona Rider*. We watched Jay Leno's careful and respectful return to the airwaves on the Tonight Show. We saw that he and his crew, in their big studio, were weighing the same concerns and that we were in our little office... His late-night colleagues were equally perplexed. In a time when people are looking for comfort and commonality where they can, this was somehow reassuring to us. This is not meant as a selfish statement... but as yet another way to show how much Americans from all over the country have been forever affected by these terrible acts of war. And how citizens who are worlds apart in circumstances are more alike than would ever have been noticed or imagined in the days before 9/11/01.

In keeping with trying to get back to some semblance of order we will continue to do what we always try to do... distribute news of gatherings that bikers host and attend. We've seen, experienced, and shared these events for years... rightfully using words like Brotherhood, Family, and Community. But now we hope to achieve some balance between the new definition of 'normal' and our community's need to share their thoughts at a time like this.

We want people to remember – the victims, their families, the rescue workers, the images... *ALL* OF IT. Just as we share words of tribute to our Brothers and Sisters who have left us to take their long ride... and they are not forgotten. But we also join so many others who realize that life must go forward.

So, what you'll find here will be news, introspection, feelings, and opinions about what has happened... along with articles that would have been here if September 11, 2001 had been just another day on our calendars. Stories we first thought of as inconsequential to the big picture can perhaps after all be sustaining to us in this time of sadness, anger, and confusion. We can think of no more needy time than this to remember the importance of Brotherhood... Family... and Community... for bikers, and for the world as a whole.

Remembering September 11,2001

Patriot Ride Shows Bikers' Pride in USA

The Patriot Ride took place on October 6 with riders gathering at the Wesley Bolin Memorial Plaza at 17th Avenue and Adams in Phoenix. They were bikes and trikes; all makes and models. 'Red, White, & Blue' was everywhere — on people and their rides. You could see that a lot of time and effort had gone into some of the decorating... plus there were some very patriotic paint jobs and looked pretty new.

The wide variety of people and types of scooters in attendance certainly demonstrated the patriotic spirit of the motorcyclists. CMA, EV HOG, GWRRA, Hacienda HOG, STAR, and VNV MC were among the groups represented, plus lots of independent riders. It was great to see the motorcycling community come together like this - and all on relatively short notice. Organizers W. Steven Martin and Barry Caraway {of Cyclerides.com} made the event happen in only a couple of weeks. The only notable problem at the staging area was no port-a-jons and a whole lotta people. Many thanks to the friendly folks at the AZ Mining & Mineral Museum for the use of their restroom facilities. There was steady traffic as people prepared to depart for the 50-mile ride. Side note FYI: The museum has some pretty interesting looking stuff and the tour is Free.

The goal of the Patriot Ride was to show Arizona and the Nation the patriotism of the motorcycling community, our support for the people of New York as they recover from the September 11 tragedies, and our Armed Forces.

W. Steven Martin commented that this may be the largest organized ride to take place in Arizona. Undocumented as it was, estimates ended up as high as 3700 riders. At takeoff, bikes were six deep, reportedly stretching to 10th Avenue. The 50-mile route went from the State Capitol out to Glendale, back to Scottsdale, then to Mesa, ending in the parking lot that serves W. Steven Martin's restaurant. Phoenix, DPS, and Mesa

officers escorted the Ride, including controlling traffic on and off of the freeways and at surface street intersections.

Before departure, Bruce was able to climb up on top of the Phoenix Fire Department Ladder Truck Number 1 for some good pictures. Thanks guys! Another vantage point behind the podium gave us a very heartwarming sight. We could see the people, fire truck, and a sea of bikes > 6 rows going back as far as we could see. The tunnel created by our city's certainly shorter office buildings was filled with bikes and sparkling chrome.

Bob Kahn, of the Phoenix Fire Department, recently returned from visiting the Twin Towers site, and was a speaker at the departure ceremony. He spoke of the destruction he'd seen at 'Ground Zero', the dedication and resolve of the firefighters and police officers he met in New York, and his promise to them that Arizona would not forget. "I can honestly think of nothing else that represents the American people and our way of life better than motorcyclists. Your sense of Freedom and Spirit will be shared for 50 miles representing our 50 United States. This ride will echo my promise to Truck #7 and to all of New York. We will not forget. Be safe, and God bless America."

Along with being a show of patriotic support, this ride was also a fundraiser for the Red Cross and other relief efforts. Bikers' generosity brought in more than \$15,000 to go toward the cause. This was a great event to be a part of, both as an American and as a Biker. Differences were on hold 'til another day. There was no disagreement on this day's theme > Pride and Love of Country.

NCOM CONVENTION PUTS THE HEART IN AMERICA'S HEARTLAND

Hundreds of biker's rights activists from across the country gathered in America's Heartland to discuss strategies and hear status updates regarding key issues of importance to all concerned motorcyclists, as the NCOM Convention convened July 23-25, 2021 at the Holiday Inn - Airport in Des Moines, Iowa for a weekend of learning, sharing and camaraderie.

From First Aid to traffic stops, this year's NCOM Convention addressed legal, legislative and lifesaving topics, in-

cluding a featured presentation on "The Demise of Gas-Powered Vehicles" by the NCOM Legislative Task Force that explored existential threats to our sport and lifestyle.

Other informative seminars included "Insurance Law and the Big Fight" during the A.I.M. Attorney Conference along with a "Biker's View of the Law" talk by NCOM Public Relations Liaison Bill Bish, and "Protect Your Privacy & Probable Cause" by A.I.M. Attorney Joey Lester.

The Silver Spoke Awards Banquet honored Darrin Brook, Vice President of ABATE of Florida, with the Silver Spoke Award for Media; Michigan A.I.M. Attorney Dondi Vesprini for Legal, and in a stirring dedication, Boar, NCOM Board of Directors Club Liaison, presented the Ron Roloff Lifetime Achievement Award, NCOM's highest honor, to former EMS Dick "Slider" Gilmore, SOS for his lively and life-saving "Two Wheel Trauma" first responder presentations across the country over the years.

NCOM Board Chairman James "Doc" Reichenbach adjourned with a reminder that next year's NCOM Convention is scheduled for June 23-25, 2022 in Nashville, Tennessee, so check back at www.

SENATE PASSES HIGHWAY BILL WITHOUT MOST MOTORCYCLE PROVISIONS

The U.S. Senate passed their version of the Highway Bill 69-30 on August 10, a \$1.2 trillion 2,000+ page Infrastructure measure to rebuild the nation's deteriorating roads and bridges and fund new climate resilience and broadband initiatives, but lacking the motorcycle-friendly provisions of the previously-passed House version, including only the reestablishment of the Motorcyclists Advisory Council (MAC).

The House Highway Bill contains several key provisions benefiting motorcycle riders; such as expanding prohibitions on motorcycle-only checkpoints, prohibiting law enforcement activities that profile motorcycle operators, evaluating biker profiling by law enforcement, specifies that motorcycles must be considered in autonomous vehicle operation, allocates increased motorcyclist safety funding, and reauthorizes the MAC at the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Typically, the Highway Bill would be taken up by a conference committee of both chambers to iron out any differences before sending a final compromise measure to the President for his signature or veto, but House Speaker Nancy Pelosi has indicated that they will not take up the bill until the Senate passes a separate, even more ambitious \$3.5 trillion social policy bill.

It could take months for Congress to pass both measures, if ever, but the current surface transportation bill expires on September 30 unless the deadline is extended.

FEDS LAUNCH BROAD **INVESTIGATION INTO AUTOPILOT ACCIDENTS**

U.S. regulators have launched the biggest investigation of Tesla's Autopilot software since the driving-assistance technology was introduced, investigating a string of collisions with emergency vehicles that resulted in numerous injuries and at least one fatality.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) announced its Office of Defect Investigations opened the official review on August 13 to look into 11 crashes across 9 states involving

Teslas hitting vehicles at "first responder scenes." An estimated 765,000 vehicles produced between 2014 and 2021, including every Tesla model, are covered in the investigation.

It will "assess the technologies and methods used to monitor, assist and enforce the driver's engagement with the dynamic driving task during Autopilot operation," NHTSA said. The investigation will assess the effectiveness of the system's "Object and Event Detection and Response" and circumstances under which Autopilot is designed to be functional.

The probe adds to the pressure on Tesla following a series of safety investigations in China this year and as regulators around the world grow increasingly concerned about nascent autonomous driving technology.

CALIFORNIA ADOPTS ANTI-PROFILING RESOLUTION

California's state Senate has passed Senate Resolution 41 by a vote of 39-0 on July 12 to "promote increased public awareness on the issue of motorcyclist profiling."

Introduced by state Senator Anna Caballero (D-Salinas), SR-41 "encourages

collaboration and communication between the motorcycle community and local and state law enforcement agencies to engage in efforts to end motorcycle profiling," and further "urges state law enforcement officials to include statements condemning motorcycle profiling in written policies and training materials."

Motorcycle profiling is defined as "the illegal use of the fact that a person rides a motorcycle or wears motorcycle-related apparel as a factor in deciding to stop and question, take enforcement action, arrest, or search a person or vehicle with or without legal basis under the Constitution of the United States."

VIRGINIA TO STUDY LANE-FILTERING

When House Bill 1236 to permit "lane-filtering" stalled last year on a 3-3 tied vote in subcommittee, Virginia Senator David Marsden (D-Fairfax Co.), chair of the Senate Transportation Committee, requested the state's department of motor vehicles to commission a stakeholder study on the possibility of motorcycle lane-filtering.

"Several meetings will take place



between now and the end of the year, at which point the DMV will issue a report to Senator Marsden," said Scott Schloegel of the Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC) who will be participating in the study. "We're seeing more states taking an interest in what California has allowed for decades. Oregon's governor recently vetoed a bill to allow lane-filtering and not long ago, Montana's legislature passed a bill allowing it."

HB-1236 proposed to allow lane-filtering -- riding between cars -- when traffic is moving at 10 mph or slower and the riders are traveling at 20 mph or less.

"We hope the study will show that lane filtering is an accepted safe practice in not only a few states here, but also many countries in the rest of the world," observed John Bilotta, Operations Director for ABATE of Virginia and NCOM Board Member, in reporting on the study at the recent NCOM Convention in Des Moines.

STURGIS BIKE WEEK "BUSIEST IN YEARS"

After a dip in average attendance during 2020, due primarily to the COVID-19 global pandemic, the 81st annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally has

been one of the busiest in recent memory, report officials at the event.

"There are more people here than in the 31 years I've been doing this," Meade County Sheriff Ron Merwin told the Rapid City Journal. Sturgis Public Information Officer Christina Steele said officials have heard the rally numbers could reach the 2015 record level of more than 700,000 attendees.

Public health officials have been raising Coronavirus-related concerns about the rally since before it started, particularly with the more contagious delta variant spreading across the U.S., but South Dakota Governor Kristi Noem (R), who rode to the rally, baulked at the analysis, calling 'super-spreader' fears "fiction."

BAD DRIVING POST-LOCKDOWN

When the Coronavirus outbreak shut down the country last year, highways emptied out as many people holed up at home. But those who got behind the wheel engaged in riskier behavior, leading to the deadliest year for U.S. traffic crashes in over a decade.

Traffic data indicates the higher death toll was related to higher average speeds in conjunction with more of those on the roads driving under the influence of drugs and alcohol and a slight decline in seatbelt use.

The outcome was grim. About 38,680 people died in vehicle crashes in the U.S. last year -- the highest number since 2007, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Despite fewer cars on the road, fatalities also increased among motorcyclists, bicyclists and pedestrians, even as the number of miles driven nationwide dropped by 13.2% compared to 2019.


In the end, traffic deaths nationwide in 2020 grew about 7.2%, and based on preliminary data from the first three months of this year, 2021 has the potential to be even worse.

The recent rise in speeding and deadly crashes has been seen in all regions of the country.

"Some of the drivers on the road seemed to feel traffic laws no longer applied during the pandemic because of the decrease in commuter traffic volume," said Sgt. Blake White, a spokesperson for the Colorado State Patrol.

As drivers have trickled back onto the highways, they've had to adjust to sharing space with others after a year

of open roads. One result has been increased road rage and other aggressive behaviors; Sgt. White told CNN.

Preliminary data show the U.S. saw an estimated 9,420 traffic deaths during the first three months of 2021, according to the National Safety Council, up 10% over the same period in 2020 and up 12% compared to 2019.

FUEL PRICES SOAR OVER SUMMER

As Americans hit the road this summer, they are finding a nasty surprise: high gas prices.

According to Patrick De Haan, the head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy, gas prices in some states are at their highest level since 2014, while others are at their highest since 2018.

The national average fuel price this August runs about \$3.18 per gallon --43% higher than this time last year.

The highest ever gas price average \$4.11 on July 17, 2008, according to AAA.

Gasoline demand is also nearing

pre-pandemic levels. But this year, the rise in gas prices doesn't just come from demand, the issue lies with a shortage of truck drivers.

California is reported to have the highest gas price across the nation, followed by Hawaii, Nevada, Washington and Oregon.

IMS NYC CANCELLED DUE TO **COVID RESTRICTIONS**

2020 was a strange and stressful year when most motorcycle shows were canceled. But if 2020 was the year of cancellation, 2021 has so far been a year of uncertainty, as this entire year has a caveat that events may be changed and/or canceled at any time.

CoViD strikes again, as the Progressive IMS Outdoors New York City stop will not be happening this year, as announced via Instagram and Facebook; "As a result of the state of New York's recent decision to enforce proof of vaccination and rapid testing for public events of scale, we have made the difficult decision to cancel the New York event."

It then goes on to say that International Motorcycle Show organizers believe that the other events on the 2021 schedule will remain intact, not because of anything to do with the virus but because their other venues have "less restrictive health and safety mandates."





We've been told repeatedly that AZ is unique in that




everyone gets along so well; the Patches among each other and the Clubs with the Independents. We see

The event shirts look really good. They were being printed by Bobbi Sivil who, with both arms in casts, {a whole 'nother story...} was still busy churning them out. The original



another. The car or motorcycle breaks down & you need a tow. Aggravating but manageable. You call a service & they come get you. Right? Well, hopefully.

A friend of ours found herself in this situation. Her truck died and she got to the side of the road. BUT... here in AriZona we are all too aware of cell phone 'dead zones'. She was in one of these 'zones' and she couldn't make a call. A tow truck happened to come along and she waved it down. On the trip into town the driver commented that she was lucky she waved. After she shared her story with us, I called Michele of Arizona Motorcycle Towing and had a VERY informative conversation with her on this topic.

There you are ... on the side of the road needing help... in the heat... in the desert... and you can't get a call out. Some drivers are hesitant to stop. Hopefully they'll get into town & pass the word along that there's a stranded motorist out on the highway.

Now to add insult to injury... you see a tow truck rolling up the road. Woo Hoo!! Salvation! The driver can see you clearly. The truck has no load already on it. But he or she drives right on by. So now your thinking... WTF!!!!!?

Did You Know that it is illegal for a towing company to stop for a disabled motorist? It is called 'soliciting business'. If the driver pulls over, they and/or the company can be ticketed. If you find yourself in this situation YOU MUST WAVE THE DRIVER DOWN! *Then* they can stop & render assistance.

While speaking with Michele she shared some other information that can be very helpful for people caught on the side of the road to know.

- ◆ Even if you can't get a phone call out, you MAY still be able to send a text. Get a text off to a friend who can get the 'rescue operation' underway.
- ◆ Call 911. Even if you can't get a phone call out in a 'dead zone', 911 reception usually works.
- ◆ If you are traveling in the HOV lane when you break down and have to pull off to the inside median, a tow truck cannot come in and pick you up. You have to be on the right-hand shoulder. NEVER try to cross the road on your own. Call 911 and explain that you are stuck in the median. DPS will come do a 'traffic break' to make way so you can safely push your vehicle to the right & off the road.

Here are some additional suggestions Michele offered:

- For couples who each have their own cell phone, use two different carriers. Sometimes one will work while the other won't.
- ➤ If DPS / LEOs stop to assist, you can tell them you want to call a certain provider, rather than who is next in their 'rotation'. You may need to be insistent, but they can do it. This is especially important when it is your motorcycle needing a tow. {Specialty cars... classics, customs, rear-wheel drive, etc. also have specific needs that a standard hook-style tow truck may be unable to handle.} So always keep the number of your favorite service with you.
- ➤ When you call your Roadside Service provider, you can tell them you want to call a certain provider, rather than who is next in their 'rotation'. Again, you may need to be insistent, but they can do it.
- ➤ You can call your favorite motorcycle or auto towing service from where you are stuck. Once the tow

is complete you can submit the paperwork to your Roadside Service provider for reimbursement.

If you do not have a Roadside Service you can call anyone to do the tow and pay them directly for it. If you leave the vehicle or do not have the money to pay someone to transport it, your vehicle will be towed to an impound yard where you'll need to pay the tow plus the associated impound fees. Then you still need to get it towed home or to a shop. That entails another round of fees. It can all add up fast. So it may be worth your while to look into Roadside Service providers.

While this didn't start out to be a commercial or a promotion, after what we learned it seems to be drifting that way. Some organizations, like AMA and AARP, offer coverage for both your motorcycles & autos, which is helpful in our community. Others carriers cover autos but charge extra for motorcycles. Michele added that Geico has a motorcycle-specific roadside coverage as does a company called Motorcycle Towing Services. Our AMA [American Motorcyclist Assn] membership includes Roadside. It's a pretty cool benefit, built in. It's something to research, to make the best choice for your needs. When considering coverage cost, keep in mind how many miles of travel are included per tow {you'll have to pay for any excess miles to your destination} and ask about what may be listed as "uncovered services".

None of us ever want to be in this type of situation, but if you are it's all good stuff to know.

From Military To Civilian – A Seamless Transition

When members of the Armed Forces of the United States finish at least one year of their tour of deployment they need to enroll in the Veterans Administration (VA) program to obtain any VA Health Benefits they may be entitled to receive. Enroll PROMPTLY by following these steps:

- Obtain a copy of your service medical records prior to discharge.
- A veteran has 2 years, after separation, to apply for service-related medical conditions After two years the process becomes more difficult.
- If you require medical assistance from the VA after separation/discharge, bring with you a copy of your medical records, a copy of your DD-214, and two forms of picture identification.
- Any injury or illness incurred while serving on active duty as a regular, reservist, or Federalized member of the National Guard needs to be noted in your medical records.
- Enroll in the VA IMMEDIATELY. Do Not Procrastinate!!
- Join a veterans service organization American Legion, VFW, DAV, AMVETS, Marine Corps League, Rolling Thunder®, etc
