


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From Military To Civilian – A Seamless Transition

When members of the Armed Forces of the United States finish at least one year of their tour of deployment they need to enroll in the Veterans Administration (VA) program to obtain any VA Health Benefits they may be entitled to receive.

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- A veteran has two years, after separation, to apply for medical conditions that are a result of their service in the military. After two years the process becomes more difficult.
- If you require medical assistance from the VA after separation/discharge, bring with you a copy of your medical records, a copy of your DD-214, and two forms of picture identification.
- Any injury or illness incurred while serving on active duty as a regular, reservist, or Federalized member of the National Guard needs to be noted in your medical records.
- Enroll in the VA IMMEDIATELY. Do Not Procrastinate!! Know your rights and your responsibilities. If you are not sure, ASK-ASK-ASK-ASK-I!! Ensure that your transition is smooth. Know what you need to do, and DO IT!

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
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

JUDGE DISMISSES COUNTY AS **DEFENDANT IN TWIN PEAKS** LAWSUIT

A federal judge has dismissed Mc-Lennan County as a defendant in a civil rights lawsuit filed by three bikers arrested after the 2015 Twin Peaks shootout, but ruled the plaintiffs can pursue claims against the city of Waco and seven individual defendants.

The lawsuit, filed by the three bikers who were never indicted in the deadly shootout with law enforcement, is one of about 20 pending Twin Peaks civil lawsuits involving about 130 bikers with claims of unlawful arrest and conspiracy.

The plaintiffs allege former McLennan County District Attorney Abel Rev-

na was the final policymaker for McLennan County regarding the events at Twin Peaks, but U.S. District Judge Alan Albright ruled that a county sheriff, not the district attorney, is the final policymaker.

The lawsuit alleges Reyna was the county's final policymaker because he "was responsible for devising the overall prosecutorial goals and strategies" of the county on the day of the shootout that left nine bikers dead and 20 injured in a hail of police gunfire, but the judge ruled that "regardless of Reyna's involvement in helping to decide whether the arrests should be made, he did not have authority to make municipal policy."

The judge denied the city's motion to dismiss the lawsuit. The order leaves claims pending against D.A. Reyna, as well as the former Waco police chief, assistant chief and various named officers.

More than 200 bikers were jailed on identical arrest warrant allegations. Only one case went to trial, which ended in a hung jury favoring acquittal and a mistrial. District Attorney Barry Johnson, Reyna's successor, dismissed the remaining charges against the bikers.

According to a report by Tommy Witherspoon in Insane Throttle Biker News (www.harleyliberty.com), the lawsuits allege the defendants violated the bikers' Fourth Amendment rights by obtaining arrest warrants based on a fill-inthe-name affidavit that lacked probable cause. They also allege defendants violated their 14th Amendment due process right to be free from unlawful arrest.

PROPOSED IOWA ORDINANCE WOULD ALLOW ATVS ON **COUNTY ROADS**

A committee in Linn County, Iowa is working to pass a new ordinance that will allow ATVs to be driven on county roads, despite concerns about having off-road vehicles sharing the streets with regular vehicles.

County Supervisor Brent Oleson said a committee approached him about the ordinance, saying that "I'm all for not taking anything off the table, anything that gets people outdoors can only have positive benefits."

But Sheriff Brian Gardner told TV9 that combining ATVs and regular vehi-

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cles on the same road is just too dangerous. "They're off-road vehicles, and they're designated as off-road vehicles for a reason."

Oleson says they're going to look at what works for ATV ordinances in other areas, and hopes to have something passed before spring.

Right now, unless a town or county passes an ordinance allowing it, ATVs can only be driven on one of Iowa's eight riding parks or on private property. ATVs are also allowed to cross streets, with some restrictions.

VIRGINIA BECOMES 15TH STATE TO CREATE AN OFFICE OF **OUTDOOR RECREATION**

Virginia Governor Ralph Northam (D) has announced the creation of an Office of Outdoor Recreation to lead efforts to promote the outdoor recreation industry in Virginia and recruit new outdoor businesses to the Commonwealth.

The outdoor recreation industry contributes nearly \$22 billion annually to the Virginia economy, and employs more than 197,000 Virginians. Virginia will be the 15th state in the nation to establish an office or task force dedicated to strengthening the outdoor industry, and

the third on the East Coast.

"Every region of our Commonwealth is home to unique outdoor assets and recreation opportunities, which continue to earn national praise and are sought out by millions of travelers each year," Gov. Northam said. "In establishing a statewide Office of Outdoor Recreation, we are taking significant steps to recognize the importance of this industry as a true driver of economic development in the Commonwealth, and demonstrate why Virginia is the natural fit for outdoor business. Outdoor recreation not only improves the growth potential of our communities, but it also aligns with our goals on land conservation, workforce development, and public health."

The Office will lead an effort to grow the outdoor industry in Virginia through industry promotion, coordination, and recruitment.

NATIONWIDE MOTORCYCLE THEFTS DECREASING

While motorcycle theft has been a significant problem in the US, the latest National Insurance Crime Bureau report indicates that motorcycle thefts across the country went down in 2018, and in fact have been on a steady decline since 2016

after experiencing an uptick the previous two years.

A total of 41,674 motorcycles were reported stolen in 2018 compared with 44,268 reported stolen in 2017 -- a decrease of six percent.

By manufacturer, Honda was the most stolen bike brand, followed by Yamaha, Suzuki, and Kawasaki. Harley-Davidson rounded out the top five.


Unsurprisingly, motorcycle thefts in the US are at their peak during the summer months, with August, July, and September, in that order, seeing the highest number of thefts, and with about half as many bikes stolen in February 2018.

The report also gives a state-by-state breakdown, and notes that thefts are more common in large metropolitan areas as well. California leads the country in motorcycle thefts, with 7,035 occurring in 2018, followed by Florida with 4,279 thefts reported, then Texas (3,073), New York (1,777) and South Carolina (1,743). By city, New York City led the way with 1,310, then Los Angeles with 628, Miami (595), Las Vegas (540), and San Diego fifth with 527.

A total of 16,261 bikes were recovered from thieves in 2018, or about 44% of those stolen.

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STUDY SHOWS MOTORCYCLES MOST LIKELY VEHICLE TYPE IN U.K. TO BE STOLEN

One in every 46 registered motorcycles in the United Kingdom (UK) was stolen last year, according to new figures gained by a Freedom of Information (FOI) request by the Motorcycle Action Group (MAG). In London, one in every 12 bikes was reported stolen in 2018.

While the countrywide figure actually signals a modest 3.98% improvement over 2017, the national average of one in 46 still means that motorcycles are seven times more likely to be stolen than any other road vehicle!

"For a biker, the theft of their bike is definitely not a victimless crime," said Colin Brown, MAG's Director of Campaigns & Political Engagement. "More so than for any other mode of transport, riders become emotionally attached to their bikes. For some, the loss of a bike is akin to the loss of a family member."

With an average 500 bikes stolen a week in 2018 motorcycles remain the most commonly stolen vehicle in the UK, seven times more likely to be nicked than anything else, which is why security firms are coming up with ever-more sophisticated locks.

NEW HAMPSHIRE TO MODERNIZE DMV IN WAKE OF DEADLY JUNE CRASH

Following the deadly June 2019 crash that killed seven motorcyclists in New Hampshire, officials want to work with other states to prevent anything like this from happening ever again.

The truck driver currently facing seven charges of negligent homicide in those deaths -- who had a Massachusetts-issued CDL -- should not even have been driving, according to his combined driving record. The head of the Massachusetts DMV resigned and others at the agency were fired once this came to light.

Over the past few weeks, New Hampshire has also been conducting an internal review of its own DMV records and practices. On August 29, 2019, NH governor Chris Sununu gave a press conference with other top officials to share their findings. The results: nearly 4,000 drivers will have their licenses suspended following a review of over 13,000 out-of-state notices, as well as a backlog of 62 commercial license notices dating back to 2016.

One unintended and potentially good consequence of this terrible accident is that it's led New Hampshire to modernize its DMV system and automate notices, so that paper backlogs like this can't build up in the future. Additionally, the governor is now pushing the state legislature to allow the NH DMV to become part of a computerized state-to-state driver verification system using Real ID.

One of the biggest issues that the terrible crash brought to light is that truck driver Volodymyr Zhukovskyy had a number of driving offenses spread across multiple states -- that obviously didn't communicate effectively with one another. Creating processes that enhance communication of driving offenses across state lines seems like a logical step toward preventing catastrophes like this in the future.

EURO5 EMISSIONS RULES EXPECTED TO BRING TECH PROGRESS

The latest European emissions limits (Euro5) will be introduced from the start of next year on, and while many naysayers preach gloom about tightening emissions laws, others predict that they will spur development, creating bikes that are measurably better than their predecessors.

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Euro5 is the fifth iteration of European emissions limits that have got steadily stricter since the original Euro1 came in 1999, and the newest limits represent an astounding improvement over the two decades since: compared to the current Euro4 limits, Euro5 levels are down by a third

The big news is the introduction of a limit for 'non- methane hydrocarbons' (NMHC) -- quite literally hydrocarbons that aren't methane -- which wasn't measured before. NMHC makes up most of a bike's HC emissions, so the 0.068g/ km limit is a particular challenge. To reduce HC emissions in high-revving performance engines as well as at low revs, expect to see an explosion in the use of variable valve timing (VVT) as well as higher capacity engines to reduce reliance on higher revs; both of which will boost performance.

On the downside, as the bikes get more impressive, they'll also be more complicated, making them more costly to produce, and making maintenance more expensive.

As before, Euro5's introduction is staged. New models from January 1, 2020 must meet the limits but manufacturers have an extra 12 months to adapt existing designs.

Brexit won't exclude the UK from compliance, as they're already committed to remaining aligned with EU rules and other non-EU countries such as India and China are adopting similar standards.

FRENCH ROLL OUT 'NOISE CAMERAS'

France has begun tackling loud motorcycle exhausts, by installing a 'noise radar' capable of identifying the offending vehicle, with the device linked to Police CCTV cameras in order to automatically issue fines.

In the UK, the Department for Transport has likewise announced that they will be trialing new 'noise cameras' in a bid to cut down on illegal exhausts.

STURGIS RALLY SAFEST IN **FIVE YEARS**

Final Sturgis Motorcycle Rally figures indicate a slight decrease in overall attendance, but including a third fatality reported on Sunday, traffic deaths were the lowest since 2014 when two motorcyclists died. Four people died in traffic crashes during the Rally last year.

Accidents were also down this year,

with 52 injury crashes reported, down from 56; 41 non-injury crashes compared with 50 in 2018, according to the state Department of Public Safety.

The number of vehicles counted entering Sturgis, South Dakota during the 10 days of the 79th annual Sturgis Rally, from Friday, August 2 through Sunday, August 11, was down 1.2% from 505,969 in 2018 to 499,654 this year, according to the state Department of Transportation, which has been counting since 1990.

The record vehicle count was 604,441 for seven days -- Monday through Sunday -- of the Rally in 2000, the 60th anniversary, according to DOT figures. The record attendance, by head count, was an estimated 738,000 in 2015, the 75th anniversary, according to Rally officials.

TRADE WAR HEATS UP

An ongoing trade war continues to escalate, and with motorcycles once again caught in the crosshairs, whatever the outcome the cost of motorcycles is likely to go up. Trade tensions between the European Union (EU) and the United States involving ongoing disputes

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regarding aircraft subsidies has led the Trump Administration to respond with \$11 billion in proposed EU tariffs, including many motorcycles imported from countries in the EU.

The U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) has proposed 100% duties on motorcycles 500-700cc, as well as "parts and accessories for motorcycles (including mopeds)." (HTS subheadings 8711.40.30 and 8714.10.00).

The retaliatory tariffs could have far-reaching consequences for European-based motorcycle manufacturers, including Ducati, BMW, Husqvarna, KTM, Triumph and Vespa.

As of now, the product list is "preliminary", and riders are urged to make their voices heard.

MIC LAUNCHES INITIATIVE TO **INSPIRE NEW RIDERS**

The Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC) has announced a broad, longterm initiative to bring more people into the world of motorcycling.

"It's clear the industry needs to reach and inspire new customers. While many of us, with our individual businesses, have taken steps to grow ridership, we also should be working together, and the MIC wants to help make that happen," said Paul Vitrano, MIC board chair and senior assistant general counsel at Indian Motorcycle and Polaris Inc. "To help us fully understand the barriers to entry, and to create an inclusive strategic plan to conquer those barriers that will be available to all stakeholders, we have partnered with a team of researchers and strategists to bring fresh perspectives to this challenge and opportunity."

To initiate this strategic plan, the MIC has hired consulting firm Centauric LLC to lead the first phase of this initiative. "Centauric has committed an impressive multi-disciplinary team of behavioral scientists, engineers, and business consultants, and takes a unique approach to problem-solving. We are excited to be working with them on this critical initiative," Vitrano said.

The plan will be presented at the MIC's American International Motorcycle Expo (AIMExpo) in Columbus, Ohio, September 26-29, 2019.

"This is not designed to be a quick fix, nor is it just about sales," said Chuck Boderman, MIC vice chair, and vice president, motorcycle division, American Honda Motor Co., Inc. "It's about showing people how motorcycles can fit into

and enrich their lives, no matter where they live, what they do, what their hobbies are, or how old or young they are. This will take time, so we are committed to building a campaign that takes the long view... and how united as one, we can attract new riders to motorcycling."

FEMA WARNS: "BE PREPARED FOR ELECTRIC BIKES!"

"In about ten years it will probably not be possible to buy a motorcycle with an internal combustion engine in most, if not all, European countries," warns Dolf Willigers of the Federation of European Motorcyclists' Associations (FEMA).

Based upon information gathered during Sustainable Energy Week in Brussels, consisting of three days of presentations about how to make our society more sustainable; "When you think about future transport, think electric. Not biofuels, not hydrogen, certainly not carbon-based fuels, but electric battery-powered vehicles is what we can expect."

Transport is seen as a big contributor to the greenhouse effect. According to the EFA, the European Environment Agency, road transport emits nearly

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21% of the EU's total emissions of carbon dioxide (CO2), the main greenhouse gas. Both the European Union and countries inside and outside the EU want 'climate-neutral' transport in 2050. "This looks far away," says Willigers, "but remember that cars, the largest part of the vehicles, in Europe have an average lifespan of about twenty years. To have all cars on the road emission free in 2050 means that cars that do emit CO2 should no longer be on the market after 2030. Now it suddenly gets closer." According to Williger, in just over ten years, there should be a complete transition from cars with a (carbon-based fuel) internal combustion engine to battery-electric powered cars.

Already the governments of Denmark, Germany, Ireland, India, Israel, Netherlands and Sweden have announced that they will ban the sale of new 'carbon-fueled' cars from 2030. France, China and the UK have announced to stop the sale of new cars with an internal combustion engine from 2040. On the other hand, Norway wants to ban the sale of these cars already from 2025. "Indeed, I'm talking about cars, not about motorcycles," Williger explains, "But let's be realistic: when the sale cars with an internal combustion engine will be stopped after 2030, in one country (the Netherlands) also the sale of mopeds with an internal combustion engine, how big will the chance be that an exception will be made for motorcycles?"

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO CONSIDER BANNING HANDS-FREE DEVICES

England and Wales could make hands-free cellphone devices illegal for drivers, after research showed that it is no safer than using a hand-held phone, which would include a ban on comm systems for motorcyclists.

The Commons Select Committee has said that the Government should consider extending the law against using a mobile phone while driving and has called for a public consultation on the issue by the end of 2019. The Committee also recommended increasing the penalty for using a hand-held device and wants the police to do more to enforce the law.

Smart helmets and other communication systems are gaining in popularity for riders, as having access to our phones at all times has become a social and often professional requirement, and in recent years the industry has been booming

with increasingly versatile devices.

The committee's recommendation is based on a study that determined these systems are as distracting as using a handheld device, and whether behind the wheel or behind the handlebars, your attention is divided. According to the National Safety Council, drivers on the phone miss up to 50% of what's happening in their surroundings while taking a call and their field of view is dramatically narrowed down, so chances are, a similar proportion applies to riders.

If such a ban is imposed in the UK, it could spark discussions of similar bans in the rest of Europe and perhaps the rest of the world.

NO HELMET, NO GAS

Although India has a national helmet law, as of August 5 the highly urbanized city of Bengaluru will begin implementing a "No helmet, no fuel" policy that means any motorcycle rider, including their passenger, will not be allowed to buy fuel at any gas station within the city limits if they are NOT wearing their helmets.

"The Bengaluru Traffic Police has spoken with petrol pump owners across

the city seeking their cooperation to enforce the 'No Helmet, No Fuel' initiative," Bengaluru City Additional Traffic Commissioner P. Harishekaran told News18. "This is being done purely for the interest, safety, and security of people."

Bengaluru is not the first city to take such a step, as on June 1, 2019, the State of Uttar Pradesh, which has a population of 200-million, enacted a "No helmet, no fuel" policy and also prohibits motorcycle riders from using the expressway if they are not wearing their helmets.

NETHERLANDS WAR HERO GIVEN CHOICE BETWEEN MC OR MILITARY JOB

The Ministry of Defense has suspended a soldier for the first time because of his role in the world of motorcycle clubs, threatening Sergeant Major Maurice Vissers with removal from his job with the Ministry for being "involved in a prohibited motorcycle gang."

Vissers is not a member of a forbidden club, but is vice president of the Veterans MC, a military motorcycle club in the Netherlands to which many soldiers and former soldiers are affiliated, but he stands accused of having contacts with the Hells Angels as the clubs maintain friendly ties.

Earlier this year, the Ministry of Defense announced in a statement regarding the behavior of Defense employees that security clearances will be withdrawn if they have contact with a criminal organization or are "involved in outlaw motorcycle gangs such as Satudarah, Hells Angels, No Surrender or the Bandidos." Where the Ministry previously discour-

aged its staff from becoming members of '1% clubs', action is now being taken against soldiers who, for example, have a child or a partner in a prohibited motorcycle club, labeling them a security risk.

Despite having no criminal record and no other security issues, the Ministry of Defense has given the soldier a choice: leave the motorcycle club or Defense.

PUTIN MAY BE CITED FOR RIDING A MOTORCYCLE WITHOUT A HELMET

The Moscow Times has reported that Russian President Vladimir Putin recently attended a biker show organized by the Night Wolves motorcycle club in annexed Crimea, and state television showed Putin at the handlebars of a Ural motorcycle without a helmet on.

At least two people have filed complaints with the authorities on the basis that Putin had violated Russian law by not wearing a helmet, and a Russian lawyer has requested the traffic police fine Putin \$15 over the infraction.

"Putin is violating [the law] again," said Regional legislator Oleg Khomutinnikov in a complaint to Russia's Prosecutor General's Office, writing on Facebook; "So what, the violations are minor. But does that make them non-violations?"

"EASY RIDER" STAR PETER FONDA DEAD AT 79

Oscar-nominated actor Peter Fonda, who became a counterculture icon when he co-wrote, produced and starred in seminal 1969 road movie "Easy Rider"

fifty years ago, died August 16 of lung cancer at age 79.

The son of Hollywood legend Henry Fonda, he appeared in numerous biker movies, including "The Wild Angels" (1966), "Ghost Rider" (2007) and "Wild Hogs" (2007).

Fonda earned an Academy Award nomination for Best Original Screenplay for Easy Rider, which was added to the National Film Registry in 1998, having been deemed "culturally, historically or aesthetically significant."

In 1991, Peter Fonda attended the National Coalition of Motorcyclists' 6th annual NCOM Convention to receive the Silver Spoke Award for Entertainment; "In Appreciation For Improving The Image Of Motorcycling."

He was inducted into the AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame in 2002, not only for his work on Easy Rider but also for his motorcycle-related charity work, including the Love Ride.

His interest in motorcycles was the direct result of rebelling against the elder Fonda; "My father didn't want me to," he once told the *L.A. Times* newspaper. "It was like, in your face. As soon as I could, I bought a Harley. That was the beginning. Loved it. Never have stopped."

Every yogi is the same. But every yogi has been injured in their own way. Debbie McGregor, passionate yogi and motorcyclist, was first injured at age 11. It happened in a rodeo mishap when she was locked in a cramped chute with a panicked horse. A broken back sustained in a motorcycle accident in her early 30's became major injury number two, and she suffered a broken neck in a car accident during her early 50's.

"When I read about YOGA AND LEATH-ER: Yoga for Bikers," she said, "I couldn't believe it; something combining my two passions, I had to come."

After her car accident, Debbie was told she'd be paralyzed from the neck down, but she resolved to walk and was determined to ride her Harley Davidson motorcycle again. She invested in physical therapy and added yoga as a daily routine. Three years after the accident, Debbie is doing yoga and motorcycling around the country. "It's unexplainable how much yoga does in the path of healing. The more I do, the more I want and the more I heal," she said.

Paul, a 79 year old retired Chicago police officer, is another dedicated rider of Harley Davidson motorcycles but new to yoga. Like Debbie, he found his way to YOGA AND LEATHER, and considers it healing balm and an island of peace.

Recently, Paul's 900 pound motorcycle tipped over and landed on his foot. He hobbled into class wearing big boots and blue jeans, but did what he could. "I need it, it's good. I have to do it," he said. And he did.

Debbie and Paul signify the independent spirit which defines the motorcycle community. Motorcyclists want to express themselves in their own way, and bikers excel at adaptation. They ride through cold or hot, rain, dust, hail, and strong wind without windshields and roofs. Motorcyclists don't like riding in cars, and see automobiles as cages where experience on the road is sanitized and one-step removed. Bikers are strong willed and eager to wring the last drop of life from every experience.

Bikers love the journey; it's what keeps them going, and propels them onward. It even keeps them limping into a yoga class. This is my teaching community, and because I understand them, I started YOGA AND LEATHER: Yoga for Bik-

While most yogis don't ride motorcycles, they exhibit some of the same qualities as motorcycle riders, particularly independence of thought and a willingness to move outside culturally sanctioned boxes.

SIMILARITIES

Yoga and motorcycles may seem like an odd juxtaposition but there are similarities. Both activities require a good level of mental and physical stamina. Participants bike or do yoga because they want to, and both can lead to a sense of relaxation, wellness, and freedom.

Ideally, yogis and cyclists start by learning from qualified instructors that present the activity in sequential learning steps. It's not safe for any beginner to simply throw a leg up over a bike and drive away. But a rider, after taking a rider safety course, is a better and safer rider. In the same way, a beginner is wise to start yoga with a qualified teacher giving instructions. Like riding, this will help the yogi avoid injury and they learn the right way the first time.

Neither activity requires a religious affiliation, yet some stereotypes brand motorcyclists' as gang members, and yoga is wrongly branded as an outreach for Hinduism or a New Age religion.

MOVING BEYOND STEREOTYPES

Both yogis and motorcyclists' have been subject to stereotypes – which is an easy way to dismiss someone as fringe or outsider. Motorcyclists typically are not doing yoga. Many believe that yoga is easy, that it's only a women's activity, or that one has to be flexible to start.

Some people believe yoga is only for women. But from its origin, and up to the early 20th Century, yoga was practiced only by men. Worldwide today, many women practice and teach yoga, and in the US about 80 percent of yoga participants are women.

Similarly, some people believe motorcy-

cling is only for men, even though nearly 25 percent of all riders in the US are women. Motorcycling and yoga are undergoing changes, and with these changes, stereotypes no longer apply.





Recounting the Worst Motorcycle Wreck in AZ History



Second in a series of installments
by survivor Ernie Lizarraga

The light turned green and we rode for about a quarter mile. It was just past 11:56a because Phoenix Fire Department E56 [whose station is a block north of Carefree and a block east of the I-17 on North Valley Parkway] had just received a call and came up behind us honking their airhorn with their lights and siren on. We pulled over. Once they went by us we got back into our staggered position and continued for about mile as we approached 27th Drive. We slowed down and stopped behind a Jeep Cherokee that was stopped behind another vehicle for the red light. We were stopped for about 20 seconds when Dayle turns around and yells LOOKOUT!

I was knocked unconscious but learned all the details from attending the trial for the driver of the dump truck, being friends with my coworkers that were the firefighters that responded, befriending one of the first police officers and witness on scene, and going over police reports.

A dump truck right behind us going about 40 to 50 MPH, first missed Will by inches, knocking him down. It then smashed into Steve, Dan, Clyde and me causing us to become stuck underneath the front of it before hitting Terry, Jason, Julie, Todd, and Dayle. I became dislodged and fell to the street right before it hit the Cherokee. This caused the Cherokee to hit a Toyota Tundra in front of it. Then the dump truck exploded into flames from the ruptured gas tanks of the bikes.

The driver of the Tundra felt the jolt then sees the dump truck explode into flames. He gives his car gas to get away but his car won't move. The car behind him has locked bumpers with his so he floors the gas and forces the car locked onto his across the intersection. Just to the right of the burning dump truck is a Ford F250 that can't go anywhere because the cars in front and behind won't move. After what seems forever the car in front of him turns down 27th Drive so he can follow. By then the paint on the F250 had blistered from the heat. He gets out and runs directly to Todd and helps him get off the street.

The driver of the dump truck jumps out and runs to the parking lot of Walgreens across the street, stops, then runs back into the dump truck. He grabs a small black bag and runs back

to the parking lot. Witnesses said this seemed very strange because the dump truck was fully involved in flames.

The following details come from statements written by witnesses and given to the detectives.

Samantha Rangel was driving a black Suburban heading east on Carefree Hwy in the middle lane. 'There was one car ahead of me before the dump truck that started on fire. A motorcycle was run over and a man flew to the left on the pavement. I got out of my vehicle immediately being an ICU RN and assisted. Me & a couple guys opted to move a girl lying on her left Right side/fetal position unconscious on the left side of the dump truck, almost under the truck. We thought the truck was going to "blow". It was crackling. Flames were getting higher. We moved her to the sidewalk. She had a pulse and was breathing on her own, but did not respond and a clearly visible broken leg. The guy I saw thrown to the left of the back of the truck tire was on his left face with pulse & not responding visually but I did later see him move a foot. I tried to get people to help me move him also but everyone was afraid to get too close to the truck sparkling & in flames! Once officers came they shielded him with a thick blanket. The man I stayed with had pain all on his right side. He said something hit him on his right side. I kept him C-Spined and unhitched his throat latch but kept his helmet on. He said he was a pharmacist named Terry & he'd never rode with this group before. I took some vital signs & helped stabilize his open Tib/Fib FX & a disfigured right arm. He had good vitals & I used his cell phone to call his wife Kay, to tell her they were taking him to JCL Nth MTN. I heard several tires popping that sounded like gunfire. The truck was not moving and all the bikes were down'.

The girl Samantha moved that was laying in the fetal position was Dayle. I

was the guy laying on his left side and later moved his foot. My back was broken. Any movement could have severed my spinal cord; so I want to thank officer Brandon Epperson for preventing people from moving me and for shielding me from the heat and flames with a blanket. Thanks Brandon.

Justin Bufford wrote, "Driving in far left right lane witnessed a large dump truck struggling to stop for a red light in the middle lane. Just as he was about to rear end the vehicle in front of him he swerved left and struck Apx. 10 motorcycles. Within seconds combust into flames. I attempted to put the fire out with my extinguisher but failed, then helped move two Patients away from the fire as quickly as possible. Then proceed to move bikes away from the fire to prevent further explosions. And put positive pressure on a female motorcyclist head injury in the center lane". The two patients he helped move were Dayle and Jason.

Garrett Lambert wrote "I was in the far right lane heading east and I looked up and saw the diesel truck swerve left and hit multiple bikers. I jumped out of the car I was in and ran towards the fire. My pant leg was grabbed by one of the injured bikers and explained what happened also I prayed with her and told her that everything was to be alright. And about 1 minute later P.D. was here then about 3 minutes later fire department showed up, put out the fire. We were told to hang out and fill out this witness statement". Garrett's leg was grabbed by Julie.

Bernie Campa wrote, "I Bernie Campa was approaching the red light at 27th Dr. an Carefree Hy. An SUV & bikes were sitting at the light when the man in the dump truck veared from the right to the left lane almost taking me out then kept going & plowed through all the bikes taking out all but one biker smashing them into the SUV. I never saw nor heard his brakes, brake lights nor did I hear his airbrakes. It appeared to me that he was not trying to stop". The one biker the dump truck did not take out was Will.

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
