





### SELF-DRIVING VEHICLES COMING YOUR WAY

Circling back to the NCOM Legislative Task Force Meeting during the recent NCOM Convention in Des Moines. Iowa, examining existential threats to motorcycling, NCOM-LTF Member Ed Schetter notified the NCOM Board of Directors that "Mercedes Benz is claiming the first Level 3 autonomous technology will be in production for their 2022 EQS equipped with Drive Pilot."

Level 3 is known as conditional driving automation, and it uses various driver assistance systems and artificial intelligence to make decisions based on

changing driving situations around the vehicle. People inside the vehicle do not need to supervise the technology, meaning they can engage in other activities.

During the NCOM-LTF's presentation on "The Demise of Gas-Powered Vehicles," Schetter reported that the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) is investigating 11 crashes since 2018 in which a Tesla vehicle with "Autopilot" has struck one or more vehicles involved in an emergency response situation.

Tesla currently operates at Level 2, partial driving automation, which falls short of self-driving because it comes with the expectation that a human will always be alert and ready to take over.

"We will keep you updated on the quickly changing technology on the road today," notes Schetter, who in addition to serving on the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM) Board of Directors and Legislative Task Force, is Executive Director of ABATE of Ohio.

### INFRASTRUCTURE BILL ON HOLD. FOLLOWING EXTENSION

If you don't know what's happening with the infrastructure bill, you're not alone, as even political insiders who should be in the know seem not to be. The vote on this 'highway reauthorization bill' is complicated by action to be taken on another measure, a sweeping social spending and climate package, that has been politically tied to the infrastructure proposal by congressional Democrats and President Joe Biden.

Despite both chambers of Congress agreeing to extend the FAST Act deadline, H.R. 5434; the "Surface Transportation Extension Act of 2021," Biden put the \$1.2 trillion infrastructure bill on hold, telling Democrats that a vote on the highway measure must wait until the party agrees on spending trillions more for his far more ambitious social policy and climate change package.

In addition to providing billions in new funding to rebuild America's deteriorating roads and bridges, improve airports and rail services, and expand highspeed internet access, the infrastructure bill still offers several pro-motorcycle provisions such as expanding prohibitions on motorcycle-only checkpoints, prohibiting law enforcement activities that profile motorcycle operators, evaluating biker profiling by law enforcement, specifies that motorcycles must be



considered in autonomous vehicle operation, allocates increased motorcyclist safety funding, and reauthorizes the Motorcyclists Advisory Council at the U.S. Department of Transportation.

### PHILADELPHIA TO HALT STOPS FOR MINOR INFRACTIONS

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania will become the first major city to ban stops for minor traffic infractions, with a historic piece of legislation that puts the brakes on police pulling over drivers for socalled "secondary violations."

The City Council approved a bill 14-2 that bans police officers from stopping motorists for minor violations, such as having a broken taillight or not having certain stickers displayed. Drivers who are guilty of those minor violations will instead receive a warning or a citation in the mail.

"So that an expired license plate or fuzzy dice in the mirror isn't a death sentence that it can be in some cases," said Councilmember Curtis Jones Jr., who is a co-sponsor of the "Driving Equality Bill."

Jones said the city reviewed 2.8 million stops and found that Philadelphia police pull over a disproportionate number of black drivers for minor violations. Supporters contend the new law would "end traffic stops that promote discrimination while keeping the traffic stops that promote public safety."

The bill now goes to Mayor Jim Kenney, who is expected to sign it into law, after which the police department will have 120 days for training and education before the changes begin.

### CALIFORNIA TO BAN GAS-POWERED 'SMALL OFF-ROAD ENGINES' (SORE)

As of 2024, California will ban "small off-road engines" (SORE) primarily used in gas-powered lawn equipment, such as lawnmowers, leaf blowers and chainsaws, in a new law signed by Governor Gavin Newsom.

The legislation, Assembly Bill 1346, will apply not only to fuel-fed lawn equipment, but also to generators and emergency response equipment operated by internal combustion engines (ICE), and "other assorted categories" including golf carts.

AB 1346, authored by Assembly member Marc Berman (D-Menlo Park), directs the California Air Resources Board to adopt regulations by July 2022

that would prohibit the sale of new "small off-road engines" -- a category that includes all gas-powered engines under 25 horsepower -- but does not regulate the use of existing equipment, and includes exceptions for farmers and emergency responders.

According to CARB, there are more small engines in California than cars, 16.5 million vs. 13.7 million, but have not been the subject of regulation and lack adequate pollution control devices.

Soon, all such equipment sold new in California will be required to be zero-emissions; either battery-powered or electric plug-in.

### KAWASAKI MOTORCYCLES TO GO **FULLY ELECTRIC BY 2035**

It seems that all vehicles, including motorcycles, are destined to become battery-powered in the near future. Honda, BMW, as well as Yamaha, have all announced their plans to go full electric by 2050. But for Kawasaki, their self-imposed deadline is coming much sooner, being in 14 years' time, and by 2035 all of their motorcycles sold will be electric-powered.

To help maximize resources and in-

crease management flexibility, Kawasaki Heavy Industries (KHI) has spun off its motorcycle division into the aptly named Kawasaki Motors, which will focus solely on the motorcycle business. KHI, meanwhile, will continue to oversee the company's interests in producing aircraft, ships, industrial equipment, and trains.

"Outdoor leisure activity has been popular during the COVID pandemic," said Yasuhiko Hashimoto, KHI President, adding that "We will strengthen our environmental efforts with our sights set on post-pandemic lifestyles."

These electric motorcycles in the pipeline for 2035 are so far intended for markets in developed nations, like Japan, the U.S., Canada, Europe, and Australia.

## HONDA, KTM, PIAGGIO & YAMAHA FORM SWAPPABLE BATTERY CONSORTIUM

Honda, KTM, Piaggio and Yamaha all got together to sign a letter of intent about their EV battery swapping plans, with the project's stated goal being to agree upon a set of shared standards to which all four companies plan to adhere, thus creating the Swappable Batteries Motorcycle Consortium.

Battery standardization has been one of the key stumbling blocks to electrification, but the big issue with battery swapping has always been the cost of the infrastructure. If there are to be enough batteries in circulation, this would require enormous investment by a manufacturer.

If every company used a different battery type, it would be both expensive and wasteful. However, if a battery in a docking station fits multiple bikes, scooters, mopeds and other small machines, it becomes more viable.

The hope is that by working together not only can they share costs, thus lowering prices both for the bikes and the infrastructure, but that they can work together to improve battery technology resulting in longer ranges and shorter charging times.

"Honda believes that the widespread adoption of electric motorcycles can play an important part in realizing a more sustainable society. For that purpose, we need to solve several challenges such

as extending the range, shortening the charging time and lowering the vehicle and infrastructure costs to enhance convenience for customers," according to Honda Motor Company Limited motorcycle operations chief officer Yoshishige Nomura.

"In the Consortium we have created, the founding members from the motor-cycle industry and other stakeholders will work together towards standardizing swappable batteries, their charging systems and surrounding infrastructure to create the environment for their use. Our final goal is to ensure that motor-cycles will continue to be chosen as a useful method of transportation in future mobility," Nomura concluded.

## MOTORCYCLE MANUFACTURERS PLACE ONUS ON INDIVIDUALS IN NOISE DEBATE

The ACEM - European Association of Motorcycle Manufacturers – has spoken out on the noisy motorcycle debate, issuing its response to growing efforts across the continent to ban bikers from certain routes over complaints motorcycles exude too much noise.

The union, which represents 18 man-

ufacturing companies and 20 national industry associations, is concerned bikers are being unfairly singled out for an issue that is endemic across all road users, saying modern motorcycles don't exceed the permitted decibel levels compared with many four-wheel alternatives.

Interestingly, the ACEM also supports the use of devices that measure noise and issue fines, since it places the onus on the individual potentially abusing the regulations, rather than the industry as a whole.

The debate over noisy motorcycles has stepped up in recent years, with the issue leading to a number of measures being implemented across popular routes throughout Europe. Germany and Austria have been particularly pro-active in introducing rules seemingly aimed

specifically at the motorcycle industry, going so far as to ban motorcycles entirely from certain stretches.

However, as the ACEM points out, Euro4 and Euro5 motorcycles are already designed not to exceed the permitted 77dB of noise (on average), but, that said, these machines can be altered by various customization techniques, just as with cars.

With this in mind, the ACEM's position is that manufacturers, the industry in its entirety and every biker shouldn't be unfairly targeted with specific motorcycling bans since the issue comes down to individual practice and can just as easily be mirrored across all modes of transport, thus applicable to all road users or none.

As such, the ACEM has taken the stance of supporting the use of noise pol-

lution devices, despite them coming in for sharp criticism from bikers, so long as the devices are placed in key locations, shifting the onus back onto the individual - regardless of machinery - and without using the sweeping brush of preventing all bikers from using certain routes.

## PRICES INCREASE ON BIKE PARTS DUE TO RAW MATERIALS SHORTAGES

The world may be getting back on its feet, notwithstanding the ongoing effects of the global pandemic, but the manufacturing sector in particular will surely struggle to go back to normal. With mass lay-offs following months of closure, companies around the world are finding themselves severely undermanned as business begins to open up, and demand increases.

Furthermore, the already problematic shipping container shortage further aggravated by the Suez Canal blockage in March 2021, parts shortages, supply chain breakdowns, and backlogs of cargo ships waiting to dock, continues to present challenges to global trade.

As such, multiple industries -- the motorcycle and automotive industries, particularly -- are experiencing production delays brought about by raw materials shortages, such as with the semiconductors and microchips in recent months. Now, price hikes in materials have hit the tire industry, with the cost of producing rubber increasing.

As expenses go up, so do prices across industries, as inflated tire pricing not only affects motorcycles, but costs for heavy industry machinery such as trailers, airplanes, and trucks.



### Indigenous Women Leaders Ride To Bring Awareness to an Invisible Crisis

The Medicine Wheel Ride is yet another way motorcyclists lend their time and efforts to worthy charity organizations. It's an intertribal and female-led 503(c)(3) non-profit charity organization that highlights the hidden crisis endured by Indigenous peoples.

"No More Stolen Sisters" and "Silent No More" are rallying cries for a movement that has grown dramatically in just three years. The Medicine Wheel Ride calls attention to and raises awareness for the silent crisis of missing and murdered Indigenous women and children (MMIWC) on and off Native American reservations.

Recent news stories about unmarked graves of Indigenous children at boarding schools in Canada have shined a light on how Native North Americans were mistreated by governing bodies. As of August, the remains of 5,296 children previously categorized as missing have been found. Relatives of the deceased were offered little explanation about how the children disappeared.

It's not just a Canadian crisis or one rooted only in the distant past. In Mon-

tana, the state's Indigenous population is only 6.7%, but nearly 40% of the 189 active missing-persons cases are listed as Indigenous. Twenty-one of the 60 missing Indigenous people had been missing for more than one year. On some reservations, women between the ages of 17-37 are murdered or disappear at a rate 10 times the national average.

Indigenous people, creating sound with loud pipes and strong voices, are silent no more as they speak out against this.

The Medicine Wheel Ride raises funds and gives voices to the missing. The riders are heavy with the weight of centuries of grief but are also empowering and hopeful as they assist families by holding events and rides to raise support.

Their efforts to make the silent crisis heard have not gone unnoticed. This summer, Patricia Hibbeler, CEO of the Phoenix Indian Center (the oldest Indian non-profit organization of its kind in the U.S.) and a legacy executive influencer in urban Indian country, awarded the Medicine Wheel Ride its Volunteer Organization of the Year Award for "Excellence in Leadership."

"The Medicine Wheel Riders are blessed women bikers, dedicated to paying homage to and raising awareness about MMIWC," Hibbeler said. "We are honored to support and partner with them around this issue plaguing our American Indian Communities."

"We started in 2018 as a women's rider and social group," said Shelly Denny, President of the Medicine Wheel Riders. Denny is a Phoenix resident, but was raised near the Leech Lake Ojibwe Reservation south of Bemidji, Minnesota. "We are Indigenous-led, but all are welcome," she said. "We are happy to have allies and supporters of any nationality, race, or sex."

The Medicine Wheel Ride grew from

a community of riders talking about riding and other casual things.

"There were a bunch of us talking on the phone once a week about what we rode and other social things," Denny said, "but as our relationships developed, we began discussing more serious things. A woman in our group wanted to create a support event for the family of a missing toddler in the Four Corners area. She set out to create a search party and provide food for the family. It's actually crazy how common an experience this is for native women."

The group had planned to ride together and attend Sturgis Bike Week and the Gathering of Nations Powwow, but when the full realization of what they had discovered sank in, Denny and her sister riders published an invitation on social media calling for friends and others to join in a ride more tightly focused on the issue weighing heavy on their hearts.

They planned their first Medicine Wheel Ride in 2019 over a route that actually took the shape of a Medicine Wheel, which is the story of life in a circle with lines divided into quadrants. These quadrants represent balance, the stages of life from birth to death, the four cardinal directions, and the sacred teachings associated with each of those directions.

"We wanted to ride a route in this shape and imbue this symbol on the map of Turtle Island, also known as North America," Denny said.

The Medicine Wheel superimposed on North America passes through Canada, the U.S., and Mexico. Two women from Winnipeg, Canada, completed the entire wheel, while others came from the four directions to meet at the Women's Freedom Rally in Topeka, Kansas.

In order to remember the purpose for riding and symbolically keep the names of MMIWC alive, Medicine Wheel Rid-

ers wrote the names of the

in the wind. Indigenous elders from New Mexico also sent prayer bundles to riders at each of the four directional starting points, which riders carried to the rally.

Medicine Wheel Rides are women-led and grassroots-organized, and they make it clear they are open to all riders and others who help support

the cause. My partner and I (non-Indigenous) joined a group of riders in May as we rode from Phoenix to San Diego to participate in the third Medicine Wheel Ride. {Ed: photos here are from this ride}

The San Diego ride drew a large gathering at the North County Indian dealership for the opening ceremonies, attracting 500 people and about 200 bikes. Attendees paused for prayers as smoke from burning sage accompanied bike blessings, testimonials, gifts, and greetings before throttling up on a 100-mile ride into the Western mountains.

Bikers roared upward from the city to mountains with red ribbons waving their powerful testimony tied to Harley-Davidson iron and Indian steel. The woman's name I picked from a large pile filled with red ribbons was from Wisconsin, coincidentally my home state.

Riders finished at San Diego Indian Motorcycle, with closing events including heartbreaking stories from family members of the missing or murdered, as well as drum songs, bands, and a talk from Bikers Against Child Abuse (BACA).

This August at Sturgis Bike Week, the Medicine Wheel Riders were the Mayor's VIP guests – along with the Legion Riders – for Bike Week's opening ceremonies on Friday night. On Sunday, the Medicine Wheel Ride took place, traveling Main Street in Sturgis to its central locale and stage. Mark Carlstensen, mayor of Sturgis, proclaimed the day as "The Sturgis Medicine Wheel Ride Day". After opening comments, the



Medicine Wheel Ride continued to Bear Butte where South Dakota Indigenous leaders and supporters delivered prayers and comments. Riders then went to the Crazy Horse Memorial, the official end of the Medicine Wheel Ride.

Three days earlier, the U.S. Department of the Interior and Bureau of Indian Affairs had published a bulletin calling for an investigation into this crisis and a call for nominations to join a newly established fact-finding commission. "This is a crisis that's been happening in our country since colonization, and it's very, very deep," Interior Secretary Deb Haaland said.

The Medicine Wheel Riders are relentless in taking advantage of motorcycles and their visibility to give voice to the silent while at the same time energizing voices for change from the local level and on up to the national echelon.


Motorcycle riders have proven countless times that they are empathetic to the disadvantaged among us through their events dedicated to charitable causes. The Medicine Wheel Ride puts resources to good work, using it to help families with gas money or other needs. They also purchase billboard space calling attention to the missing, and they donate gas and hotel room money when a family has to travel to search for a missing family member or recover human remains. In two cases last year, they shared their gifts with a healing center and a women's shelter in Rapid City, South Dakota.

"It's a difficult subject to talk about

and an important one," Denny said, "and it has to be done in a way that people can feel empowered by the talk. We can bond together, strengthen each other, support each other, and undo this crisis of missing and murdered Indigenous people."

Five hundred years of grief obscured in a shadow of silence is now a moving testa-

ment revved up on big bikes and finding its wheels. Details for future rides (San Diego and Sturgis) will be posted on the group's website, <u>MedicineWheelRide.com</u>.

## East Valley Biker Rodeo

The 3rd East Valley Biker Rodeo, hosted by the Rough Riders MC Longbow Chapter, was held on Saturday October 2, 2021. It took place at the Lost Dutchman MC Queen Creek Chapter Clubhouse in Apache Junction.

I want to thank Blackout of the Rough Riders MC Longbow Chapter and Shaun Claseman of the American Service Animal Society for your help with this article.

"Just like Veterans come from all walks of life, so do motorcycle riders. Whether you're on 2 wheels, a member of a Motorcycle Club, or neither; this Rodeo is for anyone who wants to attend and support a worthy cause. We owe the Veterans of this great nation a debt of gratitude. Local Organizations like the American Service Animal Society help Veterans right here in our community. These types of organizations require our support so they can continue to help our local Veterans in need." *Blackout, RRMC* 

The beneficiary of this event is the American Service Animal Society, aka Dogs4Vets. The more we learn about this organization, the more impressed we become. The Dogs4Vets Training Center is in Chandler. ASAS has been training

these Service Animals since 2006 and has become one of the largest training services in the USA. The organization is volunteer-driven, allowing for 91% of donated dollars to go toward the actual training of the students. The program is open only to Veterans who have a service-connected disability. Veterans who have physical disabilities as well as those Vets who deal with unseen but all too real disabilities including PTSD, Depression, and Sensory Overload are candidates.

The Dogs4Vets program trains a Veteran's own dog to become a certified Service Dog. If a Veteran has no dog, he or she is encouraged to adopt a rescue dog. 80% of the dogs in the program are rescues. This new Veteran/SD partnership essentially saves 2 lives at 1 time.

Unlike some service dogs that are trained to a specific set of useful tasks, THESE dogs are trained individually, to the specific needs of their Veteran partner. Shaun explained that it costs approximately \$22,000 per student to complete the ASAS program, BUT it is free to the Veteran. Classes start in March & September each year. There are about 100 Vets per year in the program. It typically takes about 9-16 months to complete

the ASAS program, depending on tasks needed. There are Veterans who choose to relocate to AZ to be able to participate in the program. The Veteran/SD Team receives lifetime support, training, & certification as needed, for free.

There were an estimated 250 attending the event throughout the day. It was a kid-friendly gathering. Along with the many independent riders we saw there, we observed more than 17 Clubs and other Organizations being represented.

Fifty-four contestants participated in one or more of the five rodeo events. The games were fun to watch. Congratulations to the winners!
