sociation guided us all along this emotional path. His presence was particularly special and 'full circle', as Pastor Cliff also married us ... nearly 26 years ago.

The afternoon continued with family & friends enjoying camaraderie, breaking bread together, and sharing stories.

Bruce was born in Burbank, CA. His family lived in the areas of Lancaster and Quartz Hill. He grew up watching the jets out of Edwards Air Force Base.



After graduation from Antelope Valley HS in Lancaster, Bruce volunteered for Military Service. He was 19 years old when he enlisted in the Air Force, in 1966. He served in Da Nang Viet Nam as a gunfighter crew chief on the F-4 fighter jets.

1970, he worked in a variety of jobs but always came back to motorcycles & autos.
