
### Sue's Library Corner: Part 3: Scrawls, Doodles, Adverts and Strange Instruments continued:



**The results of Sue's labour up to the turn of the year** are on display in the picture left, with the number of sorted pads at that time being around 540. Currently, Sue continues to make impressive, steady progress with our library and is currently catalouging pad 572 as this issue goes to press. "Brilliant work Sue and grateful thanks for all your dilligence and hard work with our library. The task is in excellent hands." In this final part of the Library series (for now) we look at some further curios that have been uncovered:

This woodwind part (right) from a Mendelsohn overture was for Oboi or

Clarinets in C. An **Oboi** (2<sup>nd</sup> right) is a double reeded woodwind instrument invented in the mid-1700s and related to the Oboe. This score previously belonged to the Southport Corporation Military Band.





The arrangement (*near left*) by Fred Godfrey from around the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century of 'Les Cloches de Corneville' was originally composed in 1862. This extract from the pad shows the **Althorn** or **Antoniophone** part in Bb. Sue researched the latter and discovered the **Antoniophone** (*far left*) was an instrument used for a very short time period in the midto-latter part of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century.

As this mini series concludes, thanks once again to Sue with support from her family and our Vice President Eva Jacobs to whom our thanks extend also. In particular, thanks to Sue for her endeavours in uncovering and sharing some fascinating insights into just some of the historical contents of our music library. I hope you have enjoyed this series and as Sue unearths more curios we will build content to allow us to revist the secrets of our library once again, in a future mini series, all being well. #### PLAYER PROFILE #1: 'STUART ATKINSON'

#### When did you join Crumpsall Concert Band?: 2014 Any other bands past /present?:

No. I was coerced into the band as I had an instrument I couldn't play, the previous member (*David Ball*) had left, and I was apparently your best option. You were warned! And to counter that rather flippant start to this interview, I am hugely grateful to our Honorary Vice President Eva who took the time and expended a great deal of patience in teaching me to read bass clef. She also makes great cake too.

Instrument in band (Make / Model)?:

Electric bass guitar. My favourite is a Hondo II precision bass, probably made in the mid-70s. Not the most expensive of guitars but it has a good sound and it's the one I've had longest. It's basically a solid lump of wood which you would not want to drop on your foot. Everyone who picks it up remarks on its weight.

#### Any other instruments played?:

No (Ed – although spotted Stuart tinkling the ivories at St Matthew's on 23<sup>rd</sup> Dec – see last issue)

# If you were granted a wish to be able to play any other instrument that you can't currently play, what would it be and why?:

Drum kit (don't get any ideas though!) I've always thought the bass guitar was in many ways a percussion instrument (Larry Graham of Sly and the Family Stone would definitely agree, inventing the slap technique as he had no drum kit), and it's technically classed as being within the rhythm section, so it seems like a natural step.

#### Favourite genre / artist / band?:

Too many to say really but in terms of musical influences, I was always interested in any band where the bass guitar was up front in the mix, rather than plodding along in the background playing crotchets. I loved the grinding bass of J.J. Burnell of The Stranglers, the disco funk emulated by John Taylor of Duran Duran on their early albums, or Rush's Geddy Lee's phenomenal playing. (*Ed – Geddy Lee, legend and great choice Stuart*)

#### Favourite Album?:

Difficult to say but let's go for David Bowie's *The Rise and Fall of Ziggy Stardust and the Spiders from Mars*.

#### Favourite pastime?:

Locating, watching and raving on about old horror and sci-fi movies much to everyone's lack of interest!

Favourite Cuisine?:

Curry. Or Caramac.

#### Any other roles in the band?:

Treasurer and website manager. (*Ed – not forgetting lockdown recording engineer, risk assessment writer and other committee related jobs, Stuart. Thanks*)

#### Hopes for the next 12 months for the Band?:

For the band to get back to playing together, play some concerts and work on some more difficult pieces.



#### Favourite piece the band has played:

*Slaughter on Tenth Avenue* (I know I always bring it up as a joke when we're thinking about our next project, but there is so much in that piece to work on I really think we could do it justice one day).

#### Piece you would like to buy and play?:

Amy Winehouse – *Back to Black* (so long as we get the tubular bells out).

The band is gifted £10K to spend on / towards a maximum of three things. What would you spend it on?:

Promotional tour abroad establishing links with other bands; working on a piece with the intention of entering the National Concert Band Festival; upgrading the instrument inventory;

buying some more scores. Oh, that's four things. (Ed – trust a Treasurer to want more for their money 😣)

### CRUMPSALL CONCERT BAND – Band Heritage Series Part 10: 1969 – MAN ON THE MOON & BANDS ON THE STREET



As my wife reminds me every August, '1969 was a fantastic year' and our *Heritage* series has ticked around to the end of its second full decade. On the 20<sup>th</sup> July 1969, the USA put a man on the moon

after the Russians had looked like getting there first. Musically, The Beatles, a dominant and influential popular musical force in the 1960s, recorded their final album together, *Abbey Road*; released 26<sup>th</sup> September, whilst Led Zeppelin's second Album, released on 22<sup>nd</sup>

October, was destined to launch them into the pantheon of rock greatness where they would remain throughout the 1970s.



**Meanwhile, back at the ranch, the decade was to close with three local marching bands flourishing in Crumpsall.** The 42<sup>nd</sup> Manchester Boys Brigade Band still set the benchmark standard in terms of smartness and musical prowess but the 209<sup>th</sup> (Methodist) and 191<sup>st</sup> (St Matthews) Scout Bands were also enjoying their contribution to the local musical landscape.

**During the late 1960's,** besides the traditional monthly church parades (2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday) local bands were called into action for much larger parades & processions. The pictures below depict the 191st Scout Band on two such occasions, firstly the annual St George's Day Parade held on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> April. Later (1970's), this parade would become a North Manchester District Scout and Guide event covering, Blackley, Crumpsall and Cheetham with several bands being involved.



The second major parade of 1969 was the Local Trinity Sunday procession on Sunday May 25<sup>th</sup> and, as with all parades, the 191<sup>st</sup> band started and ended at the affectionately named 'Blue Hut' on Willow Hill Road (sandwiched between Crumpsall Lane Primary School and the Cleveland Hotel) which was built by the 191<sup>st</sup> Scout Group in the mid 1950's and sold to the 401<sup>st</sup> Scout Group in 1957 who kindly allowed the 191<sup>st</sup> band to use it as their HQ right up to the end of the Century. The pictures below show some poses before setting off from the hut, as well as the band in parade formation:




The Leaders picture above left shows: *Back Row L-R* Joe Allen (Bandmaster & Bugler), Charles Ashton (Group Scout Master) and Brian Heil (Assistant Group Leader and Lead Bugler). *Front Row L-R*: Barbara Lea (Assistant Cub Leader), Hilda Ashton (Akela – Cub Pack Leader) and two other Cub Pack Assistants. Next left shows a good portion of the Cub Pack and Scout Troop on parade that day. Third left sees the Band smartly at attention with drum sticks up in the ready position on Tansley Road (opposite the Parish Hall – our HQ) ready to set off and turn into Cleveland Road as shown in the final picture.

**In Part 11**, we move the story of our heritage into the 1970's, a decade that included some highly significant moments that, in time, would directly lead to the formation of our band. **Thanks once again for reading. Rob**

She has always been an avid and vocal supporter of the band serving as our original Secretary on the Committee from 1993 – 2008. She was always raising funds for us and ran a Jumble Sale for our benefit in January 2008 before her retirement. Prior to our band forming in '93, from the mid-80s in particular, Rosa was arguably the No1 fan of the Crumpsall Scout & Guide Band.
