ATTERS: Road map back to rehearsals - Latest Lockdown Recording #9: The Muppet What Music will you need for your personal outdoor rehearsal pad?

GREEN LIGHT: Outdoor rehearsals pencilled in to begin in May:



Almost certainly now, a return to rehearsals (initially ouitdoors in our case) is set to begin as part of the continued easing of restrictions at Step 3 of the Government's Road Map. Translated for us, this means Wednesday 19th May 2021 will be the day those who wish and are able can get together to rehearse at our risk-assessed, secure outdoor base, FC United (Broadhurst Park Stadium, Moston, M40 OFJ) for the first time since we last rehearsed there 5 months ago on 16th

December 2020. Where has that time gone?

'Hurrah' I hear you cry; but, to preach a word of caution after the Step 2 debacle in mid April, this will not be confirmed officially until 10th May at the earliest. We intend to hold a General Meeting via Zoom on Wednesday 12th May, specifically to confirm the position, provide all the arrangements for getting back together again and giving you all the opportunity to ask questions.

Your Committee has taken the decision that, once we get the definite go ahead, outdoor rehearsals will run each Wednesday up at FC United (with hopefully a Zoom option, too) from 19th May until at least Step 4 of the Road Map due to be introduced on 21st June, at the earliest. As always, we'll keep you fully updated and **please pencil in the 12th May** for the Zoom meeting. Thanks, **RF**



Norman Davies: 16/10/1925 - 29/03/2021:

On behalf of the Band, I formally extend and reiterate our sincere condolences to the family and close friends of Norman, who sadly passed away peacefully following a brave and thankfully relatively short battle with illness on 29th March 2021 and was laid to rest with his parents Elizabeth (1948) and Ernest (1983), at Manchester's Southern Cemetery on 16th April 2021.

For the past few weeks I have been diligently gathering information, pictures, anecdotes and treasured memories in order to attempt to do literary justice to

Norman's life, times and exploits. Having known Norman for almost 40 years, talking to family and friends and gathering aforementioned tales, I realised there was so much more to know about the man.

It also became apparent, thanks to all the information heading my way, that this Newsletter was not the appropriate vehicle to do him proper justice and therefore, in the coming days, a special supplement to this issue will be heading your way. We hope you will find it well worth the wait and it should be read with a cup of tea to hand; maybe a pot so you can keep topping up your brew. Fond reflections and stories were shared and many will find their way into the special supplement no doubt, along with the significance of the 20 pence's.



Very sad to hear the news. Norman was a real character. I've known him for many years going back to when he played for Prestwich Brass Band. RIP Norman. (Geoff)



Although current restrictions prevented all who wished to attend from being present at Norman's funeral on 16th April, the service prior to his burial was streamed live from the Old Chapel at Manchester crematorium after which, those able to be in attendance were joined in Southern Cemetery by those who had waited outside the chapel.

The graveside service in the warm sunshine was lovely; two of Norman's young relatives played a Tenor Horn / Trombone duet of Amazing Grace and the service was rounded off with the sounding of Last Post. Grateful thanks to Dave Lynch and Victoria Fullen who joined me in this final act which was appreciated by all concerned.
