MUSIC MATTERS Incl: Autumn Concert Preview, Pieces to Practise, Acts of Remembrance

Autumn Concert Preview: St Matthew's Parish Hall, 24th November 2018, the band held their last Autumn Showcase Concert, celebrating our 25th Anniversary as pictured right. A change of conductor in the autumn half term 2019 saw that year's event cancelled and we all know why no concert took place last year. However, now nearer our 30th than 25th Anniversary, we are delighted to be augmenting the colourful autumn landscape by once again hosting a showcase concert: **Saturday 13th November 2021** at Methodist Church Crumpsall. For supporters: doors open 6:45pm with the concert starting at 7:30pm. There will be very limited parking



at the church itself. Band to arrive by 6.30pm and volunteers required in the afternoon to set up the venue please. Help will also be required post concert to ready the church for the Remembrance Sunday Service the following morning. Full band uniform to be worn (as per the CCF concert in September) and any queries, please let us know. Thanks

The event will be fully risk assessed and entry for supporters will be strictly by ticket only priced £7.50 adults (£1.00 childeren accompanied by an adult). The adult price includes a programme and both prices include interval refreshments. We request supporters wear a face covering on arrival and until seated and also in any communal areas where social distancing protocols should also be observed. Hand sanitser will be available and the venue will be suitably ventilated. Tickets will go on general sale (online) during week commencing 1st November and all supporters who subscribe to this newsletter will be emailed the link and all relevant information to ensure you don't miss out. Although numbers will be limited due to safety reasons, there should be enough tickets to satisfy demand but we would urge you get yours at the soonest opportunity once the link is live. Live Music is Back, Folks! Thank you.

Potential pieces in the set list: To allow for some half term practice, thanks to Alan for providing this early indication of pieces under consideration for inclusion in the final set list, as follows:

Bring Him Home; Celtic Crest; Disney at the Movies; Greatest Showman; Highland Cathedral; Lord of the Dance; Mamma Mia; Pop & Rock Legends – Neil Diamond; Queen on Stage; River Kwai March; When the Stars Began to Fall.

Acts of Remembrance 2021: After last year's Covid-ravaged, yet surprisingly busy period of remembrance, things are scheduled to be a a little more like normal this year. Ideally, we would like to cover the 11am Act of Remembrance on the Sunday itself (14th November) at both Methodist Church Crumpsall (our traditional venue) and St Matthew's with St Mary's Church too, where we played outdoors last year. Last year's MCC service was held via zoom and we provided a pre-recording of the Last Post and Rouse so that both churches were covered. Unfortunately, bugler availability this year will only allow for us to play at MCC and the schedule for this year's acts of remembrance so far is as follows:

<u>Armisitice Day</u>: Thursday 11th Nov 2021 11am – Rob and Sarah will be representing the band playing Last Post and Rouse in Blackley Forest, organised by the 'Friends of Blackely Forest' and in the presence of staff and pupils of Bowker Vale Primary School.

<u>Remembrance Sunday</u>: 14th November 2021 11am – Rob and Victoria will be representing the band and uniformed organisations at the Methodist Church Crumpsall as has been almost uninterrupted tradition since 1982.

October 2021 Rehearsals in Pictures:

RUMPSALL CONCERT BAND – Band Heritage Series Part 17: 1978/79:

In Part 16, we reviewed how the Scout & Guide Band contributed to the Queen's Silver Jubilee Celebrations during 1977, with a settled band and leadership structure. Sadly, all that was to change as we approached the end of the decade:



After the celebrations of 1977, the founding Bandmaster of Crumpsall Scout & Guide Band, **Mr Tom Lock**, (pic left, June 1976), became ill and was only very occasionally present at band practices during 1978. Week to week running of the band fell to long standing member **Andrew Robinson** who took on the bandmaster role full time following the sad passing of Mr Lock in early 1979. Looking back, having utmost admiration for the man, I like to think that during his illness, Mr Lock found comfort from the band continuing in his absence and no doubt he could hear us practising each Friday evening as his house was less than 100 yards away from our 'blue hut' HQ.

Andrew's banding exploits began as a side drummer in the 191st Scout Band in the early 1970s and had progressed under Mr Lock from 1973 through the transition to the joint Scout and Guide Band in 1976 and onto the end of the 1970s. Before becoming Bandmaster he also undertook command of parades as Drum Major (pic right June 1977) and played the bass drum on parades and at events many times, too. Although a percussionist by trade, utilising skills, no doubt learned from his father, Norman, who was an accomplished woodworker and fervant supporter of the 191st Scout Group and the Band, Andrew proved a hit with us buglers by making a set of bugle cases of which three are known to still exist to this day; one being



pictured below. Prior to this, bugles were recklessly unprotected; transported to and from practises and parades via a bugle cord slung over the shoulder of sometimes less than careful young buglers.



Andrew, filled with the vigor of youth, had big plans for the band's development. Unfortunately, however, these remained unfulfilled as he had to leave Crumpsall and his voluntary aspirations and ambitions, to further his professional career which ultimately saw him working in Singapore; a big ask for him to get to band practise at the 'blue hut' in Crumpsall by 7pm each Friday S.

The following pictures define the all too brief 'Andrew Robinson' era in charge of the band as the 1970s drew to a close:



Local Whit Walks, June 1978: Both pictures left are noted for their lack of visible bands. However, both the Scout and Guide Band and 42^{nd} M/cr Boys Brigade Band were on parade that day. Pictured far left, the local Clergy with Rev'd **Fred Cheal** (leading St Matthew's and the recently expanded Parish including St Mary's Church following its 1978 closure) pictured front and centre, lead the procession off

Crumpsall Lane into Bank Road. In the background you will note the ranks of the 42nd M/cr Company following their band, led by **Ian Choularton** and whilst not visible, the band is sandwiched between the BB Company ranks and the entourage behind the clergy. Near left, at the top end of Bank Road, bringing up the rear of the procession, the 191st Scout Group followed by the 434th and respective Guide Companies, marching behind the not pictured Scout and Guide Band led by **Andrew Robinson**.



To close the decade, in October 1979, Bandmaster Andrew Robinson organised a band showcase for supporters and group members (no doubt to attract new members to the band) at St Matthew's Parish Hall. Pictured left, the band display their marching credentials. Shortly following this, event Andrew left the band and moved away due to work as mentioned above.

Library Corner – Part 2 – Vintage Instruments at Crazy Prices:

With 659 pieces now on the shelves of our music library, librarian Sue Atkinson continues to make significant inroads into cataloguing the vast quantities of music we possess. During her sojourn through the archives, Sue has unearthed some real gems as emphasised by the following adverts appended to scores, some of which are in excess of 100 years old:









From Mouthpieces to Trombones, music stands, to flutes and piccolos and valved and natural / slide trumpets, if you zoom in you'll find the prices (obviously pre decimal) are a pittance by today's standards but no doubt as relatively expensive to musicians of their time as they would be today. The emphasised band stamp, above right, shows the music containing the Trombone and Music Stand Adverts once belonged to the long disbanded York & Lancaster Regiment Band. The infantry regiment, garrisoned at Pontefract, West Yorks, was in service from 1881 – 1968, serving in both World Wars and chose to disband with honour in 1968 rather than amalgamate. Their regimental march is available for a listen on YouTube and fascinating history on Wikipedia.

To outline relative prices, the natural trumpet pictured above (without valves) is listed at circa £70 in decimal terms and

would today retail in excess of £1,000. More gems from the archives in the next instalment (December's issue) when we look at some of the stunning decorative artwork found on scores of old. Thanks to Sue, Stuart and Eva for their continued library management.
