

#### CRUMPSALL CONCERT BAND - Band Heritage Series Part 19: 1979/80 (Part 2):



A new decade dawns; a pivotal one in the context of our band's heritage. To recap, 1979 saw the Scout & Guide Band rocked by two events that were to leave the band rudderless; Firstly the band's founding bandmaster, Tom Lock, sadly passed away early in the year and his successor, Andrew (Andy) Robinson moved away from Crumpsall, due to work, at the end of 1979. Against this backdrop the band's very future was in doubt.

By contrast, the **42**<sup>nd</sup> **Manchester Boy's Brigade Band** (See The 42<sup>nd</sup> Company pic left, courtesy of Dave Austin, taken in St Matthew's Church grounds circa 1980) was still buoyant under the leadership of **David Joy**. Pictured, 2<sup>nd</sup> from the right on the front row is

my cousin **Steven Fullen** who was a novice bugler at the time, and following in the banding footsteps of his dad, **Ken Fullen**, a drummer with the 42<sup>nd</sup> in the 1950's. However, unlikely as it seemed at the time, it would be from the 42<sup>nd</sup> that Drum Major and side drummer **Russell Chadwick**, would cross the uniformed divide to help bolster the floundering Scout and Guide Band. As a friend and contemporary of Andy Robinson, the request for help may have been asked of Russell by Andy before he left Crumpsall?

Before this transpired during the spring of 1980, the Scout and Guide Band teetered on the brink and from January 1980 attendances at practices at our 'blue hut' home, plummetted alarmingly and members from the Guides of both units and the 434<sup>th</sup> Scout Group attended less and less frequently.

The low point came on a cold Friday evening in early February as just 6 band members from the 191<sup>st</sup> Scout Group attended practice supervised by Assistant Scout Leader (191<sup>st</sup>) **Tony Wainhouse** who crucially volunteered to serve the band as 'Leader in Charge' in the hope of a new band master coming forward. **Besides** Mr Wainhouse, the six members present at the Hut that evening were Paul Wainhouse (Bugle) the eldest at 17 along with side drummers Phil McConville, lan Phair, Michael Robinson, bass drummer Roger Willescroft and me (bugle/cornet) all 15 at the time with our Mocks / 'O' Levels looming.



My memory of that Friday night was one where no coordinated instrument or marching practise took place but, as a group of mates we kicked a ball around, whilst chatting in general and having a laugh until Mr Wainhouse prompted the conversation towards where we saw the band going? We sat down and chewed this over. Looking back now, at this very point on that cold February evening, with the benefit of knowing everything that has transpired since, not least – future National Champions and the very formation of Crumpsall Concert Band - we took an informal yes/no vote: 'should we call it a day?' or, ' should we carry on and see if things improved?'. It was by no means unanimous but we decided to carry on with Mr Wainhouse's continued caretaker support and review at the end of the Spring Term. Though we couldn't have possibly forecast the pivotal importance of our decision back then, essentially, 42 years ago this month, a group of teenagers determined the future of banding in Crumpsall which thrives, through CCB, to this day. Kids eh!

With the immediate future secured, Part 20 of our series will chart the Scout & Guide Band's tenuous recovery to the end of season 1979/80. Thanks for sticking with the journey; I'm glad I did ©. Rob

Thanks to Enid, Karen and Victoria for their efforts on our behalf and cards for all occaisions (well, nearly all) will be available to buy at any rehearsal at just 50p each, so, even if you don't see them on display but have been caught short and need a card quickly, please just ask at the break. There is sure to be something suitable available. It's all in a good cause with 100% of all sales going to support the band, thank you.

#### Committee News from the Board Band Room - Covid -19 Committee Statement - Feb 2022:

As you will be aware, the Government has recently announced the ending of legal restrictions in England, changing the onus from regulation to personal responsibility. As we go about our daily lives it is sometimes difficult to recognise that the pandemic is still with us as many aspects appear almost as normal as they were pre-pandemic: workplaces, retail outlets, sports & leisure destinations and public transport included.

Against this backdrop and the tide of normality outside of the 1.5 hours at band every week, your committee has determined that, at least whilst free testing is still available, we will maintain some key rehearsal protocols that have worked for all concerned so far, whilst putting in place some, what we believe to be, sympathetic, sensitive relaxation of measures as we adapt to live with Covid.

#### What we will be retaining and what modifications will be in place from 2<sup>nd</sup> March 2022?

- 1. Continued encouragement of pre-attendance testing (whilst still free) and non-attendance if positive (during the contagion stage) or displaying symptoms (even though isolation rules have been scrapped).
- 2. Registration for attendance at rehearsals and events with amended health declarations to chime with recent changes.
- 3. Ventilation protocols in rehearsal space will be maintained and Co2 levels will continue to be monitored and published.
- 4. One member / one stand in principle. However, where members feel comfortable and wish to share, with mutual agreement, they may do so. Parts too can be shared where copies are not immediately available.
- 5. Distance between stands can also be closer than the current 1.5m although members can choose to retain this space if they wish. This may not always be the case in performance settings.
- 6. From 2<sup>nd</sup> March 2022: **communal brews at the break will be reintroduced** for the first time in two years—the last such brew break was Norman's last on 11<sup>th</sup> March 2020. A minimum 20p will get you a brew and a biscuit © Clearly members can continue to bring their own sustenance if they don't wish to partake communally. The ventilated coffee lounge and foyer area will be designated for breaks and **grateful thanks to Karen** for agreeing to brew up for us.
- 7. Face coverings in communal areas remain optional.
- 8. Band members will be encouraged to arrive earlier where possible to help with the set-up of the rehearsal space.
- 9. The small hall will remain the designated space for leaving cases and coats etc. so as to maintain a clutter free rehearsal space.
- 10. Cloths on the floor to catch excess moisture from instruments will still be required.

This maybe a slower pace of change compared to wider society but we believe is a sensible, balanced approach to support all attending as our members' physical and mental welfare and wellbeing remain a very important priority.

As always our aim is that the band remains as inclusive as possible. These protocols will be reviewed regularly in line with any future changes in guidance and the general trajectory of the pandemic. Any questions, queries or suggestions from members always welcome. Thank You, Your Committee, 25<sup>th</sup> February 2022.




## - Part 4 - Generous Donation from Macclesfield via Staffordshire:

### February 2019:

After a vote, the new band tie was revealed at a February 2019 rehearsal and new banners were soon to follow too. In her second month as our Conductor, **Rosie Kingham** was keeping our Librarian busy with music selection requests including Memory, Mamma Mia, Queen on Stage, Simple Gifts, The Impresario, Instant Concert, Folk Song Suite, March to the Scaffold and **Rosie's signature piece**, **'Oklahoma'**, all 6 pages of it .



In Fondest Memory - Harvey Blood 07/08/1942 - 20/02/2022: Often from behind the view finder of a



traditional or video camera, Harvey along with wife Bernice was a supporter of banding in Crumpsall as far back as 1989/90 when their daughter Lynsey joined the Crumpsall Scout & Guide Band as a tenor drummer. Their support continued when Lynsey joined our band at it's formation in July 1993

and has remained right up to the present as can be seen left during the interval at our Autumn Concert last November as **Harvey shares a laugh** with clarinettist **Shelley Lanchbury.** 

Our band's first competitive outing in our marching format was at the West Craven Band Championships, Barnoldswick on 26<sup>th</sup> June 1994, a tremendous feat given we were less than a year old at that point. Pictured right ahead of our performance, **Harvey** (stood clutching his video camera) and a seated **Bernice** are pictured rear centrally in the *'Crumpsall Crowd'* of supporters that day with daughter Lynsey the centre of the trio of band members, in the foreground.



Away from banding, Harvey, a huge Manchester City fan, has been a long standing pillar of Crumpsall's community, working with the 'Close Neighbours Residential Association' to improve the environment in and around Bowker Vale Woods. Also as a member of the 'Cleaner Crumpsall Group' he has been involved in many community events to raise awareness and regularly participated in litter picks around the area - action pics shown below: At a planning meeting with Cleaner Crumpsall last November for the Christmas Tree light switch on, Harvey was asked if he would play Santa Claus. As a 'Blue' he jovially declined the invitation as he couldn't be seen wearing so much 'Red' .







On behalf of all in and around CCB, sincere condolences, thoughts and prayers extend to Bernice and family and wider circle of friends at this sad and difficult time. Harvey's supportive, community legacies will live on and will be visible every time the Snow Drops & Daffodils flower in Bowker Vale Woods. Harvey's funeral will take place at Blackley Crematorium on Monday 14th March 2022 at 10:30am. RF
