

DAY 2 - THE REIGNING KING AND THE RESCUED SERVANT

Read: Psalm 2, Psalm 20, Psalm 21, Psalm 110

Theme: God's Anointed Rules, Even in the Battle

Prepare Your Heart

Reflect

Psalm 2 opens with unrest. The nations rage, kings rebel, and yet God does not flinch. He has installed His King.

Psalm 20 surrounds that King with prayer before battle. Psalm 21 celebrates the victory afterward.

Psalm 110 lifts the vision higher. The Messiah is not only King, but priest. He rules with power and intercedes with mercy.

These psalms hold tension: conflict below, confidence above. In every struggle, God remains enthroned, and His Anointed Son reigns.

We do not cry to a distant God. We are heard by a reigning King who still carries the scars.

Study

- 1. List the descriptions of the King in Psalms 20, 21, and 110. What do they reveal about His character?
- 2. In Psalm 2, how does heaven respond to earthly chaos?
- 3. Psalm 110 speaks of Jesus as both ruler and priest. What does that combination mean for those who trust Him?

Pray

Jesus, You are not far off or indifferent. You are King and intercessor, sovereign and near.

Let me find rest under Your crown, and courage in Your presence. Reign in the battles I see, and in the ones I cannot name.

Journal

Is there a place in your life where chaos speaks louder than confidence? What would it look like to remember that Jesus reigns there too? Write honestly about your struggle, and invite His kingship into it.
