This classic 1949 non-fiction book takes place in the rural land around the Baraboo, Wis. area. It describes the responsible relationship between people and the land they inhabit, both in words and sketches. Twelve essays are organized around the seasonal changes of the natural areas and how the land, animals, and horticulture evolve throughout the year.

 Aldo Leopold was a professor at the University of Wisconsin and owner of a farm in Southwestern Wisconsin. He was widely known as an ecologist, forester, and environmentalist.
